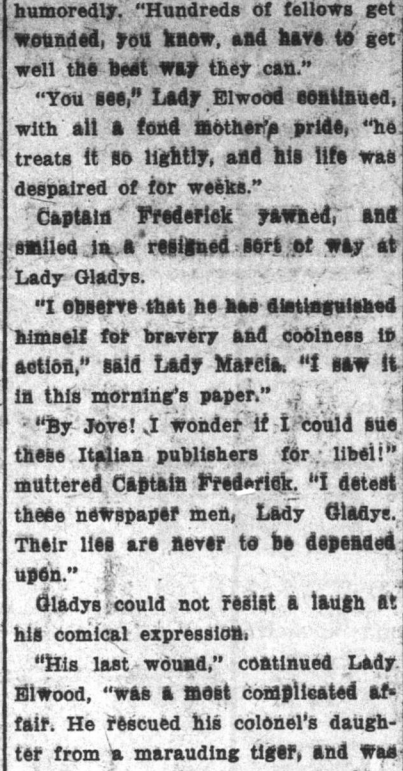

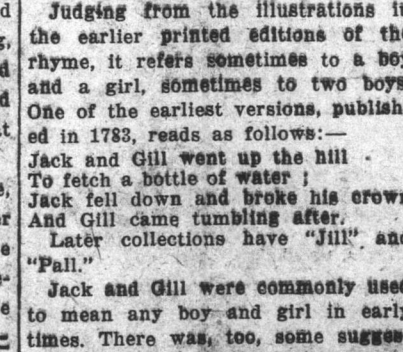

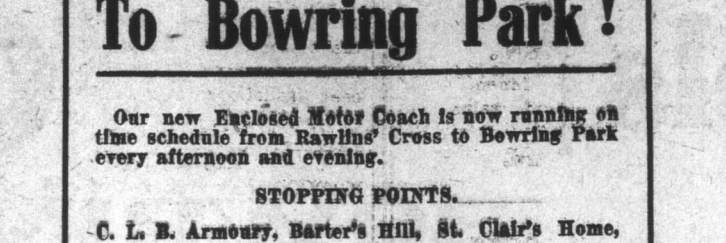

GERMAN VIOLATIONS OF TREATY. PARIS, July 26. The Council of Ambassadors decided today to send a sharp note to the German Government demanding the immediate destruction of the fire control and range finding school which German naval authorities have recently established at a strategic point on the Kiel Canal.

SYRIANS ATTACK FRENCH. CAIRO, July 26. The announcement of the confirmation by the League of Nations Council of the French Syrian mandate, followed by an attack by Syrians on French troops at Hauran, resulting in the killing of two officers and 17 men, and the capturing of many prisoners and war material.

MUTINY REPORTED AMONG IRREGULARS. DUBLIN, July 26. Irregulars continue to fall back before the advance of the Nationalist Army, according to Free State reports, but are making stubborn resistance at some points along the front.

AVERTED FOR A TIME. SYDNEY, July 26. The threatened general walk out of the coal miners of Nova Scotia was averted to-night, at least until August 15, when the shippers of the International Pier, Sydney, accepted the offer of the Dominion Coal Co. to increase their possible weekly wage from approximately \$21.00 to \$31.00.

THE DOPE SCOURGE. MONTREAL, July 26. The Montreal Star in a two-column front page article this afternoon says the worst narcotic drug scourge in its history is sweeping Montreal, if the alarmingly heavy number of serious cases of this kind which come into the city hospitals every day is to be taken as a criterion.

VODKA AUTHORIZED. MOSCOW, July 26. A decree authorizing the sale of vodka, which has been prohibited since 1914, is expected to be issued on August 1. Pre-war strength of vodka was forty-eight per cent alcohol. Under the new decree it will be thirty-eight per cent. Manufacture will be undertaken as a state monopoly.

RAILWAY STRIKE. MONTREAL, July 26. Although Union officials of Number 4 Division Railway Shopmen of Canada are not disposed to give out any figures regarding the strike ballots, now being counted, and which are arriving in Montreal from all over Canada, an official statement issued here says that the strike had been authorized and will be declared "should the railways carry out the threat to reduce wages."

THE CATTLE EMBARGO. LONDON, July 26. The Canadian Press learned to-night from an authoritative source that a Bill will be introduced by the Government in the autumn session giving effect to the wishes expressed last night by Commons for lifting the embargo on store cattle, as against Canada.

GAVAN DUFFY RESIGNS. DUBLIN, July 26. Gavan Duffy has resigned as Foreign Minister in the Provisional Government. He announces that while he agrees with the Government's military power, he opposes its policy on certain other grave and urgent issues so strongly that he cannot longer honorably remain with the administration.

U.S. BANKER LOST WITH ALL HANDS. BOSTON, July 26. Captain John Powers, of Rockport, and the crew of five men of the Malice Enos have been given up as lost, the Interstate Fish Corporation, owners of the vessel, announced to-night. Nothing has been heard from her since she left for George's Banks on July 2nd. She carried supplies for a week's fishing.

A BOOM TO BRITISH SHIPS. LONDON, July 26. British coal exporters are scarcely able to conceal their satisfaction at the situation created by the miners' strike in the United States. One of the north country coal owners refers to the time when American exporters poured coal into foreign ports during the British stoppage of coal exports. The suggestion has been made that the British miners who last week passed a resolution of sympathy with the American miners, might attempt to restrict exportation. Such, however, is deemed improbable, especially as no practical support was sent

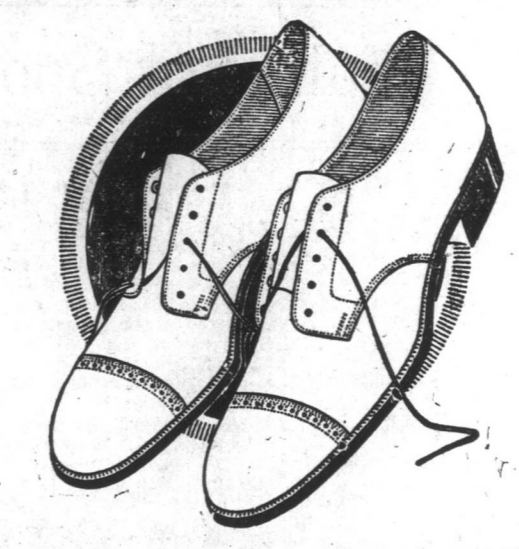

He will make long journeys to friends, and when he arrives he will give his time to dancing, singing, and merrymaking. Indeed, by many of the inhabitants, the winter darkness is eagerly awaited.

Cold Storage.

ARTICLE BY LORD MORRIS.
The July issue of "Ice and Cold Storage" contains an article by Lord Morris entitled "Cold Storage in its Application to the Newfoundland Fisheries." Says Lord Morris: "Cold Storage will accomplish some day for Newfoundland fish what it has done for Australia and New Zealand in their great products. I have always believed that along modern lines, such as cold storage plants, is the surest and safest course for the development of the great fisheries of Newfoundland." This is what he would do with the fish when caught: "I would erect cold storage plants every thirty or forty miles from Blanc Sablon to Cape Chudleigh. They need not all be erected at the same time, but three or four every year, until the chain is completed. The fishermen should be fitted out with proper boats. They would then easily be able to supply these cold storage plants with four or five times more fish per man for the season than they have in the past been able to catch. There would be no labor in the sense of fish-making; no time lost re-making. Rain or shine they could catch the fish, and they would be relieved of the cost of salt and the loss by depreciation, which has always been the trouble on the Labrador coast thru the lack of salt when the fish were there and bad weather when the time came to make the fish.

Having secured the fish in the cold storage plants it would then only be a question of moving it from the coast. That could be arranged by cold storage ships, which could easily transfer the whole catch before the

ice came down in December, a pound of the catch could be stored in large cold-storage plants along Atlantic seaboard in Maine or Massachusetts. Then in the winter months from December to May, the States and Canada could have fresh fish from these stores for fast, lunch and dinner."

When next you go to have your features handed down to immortality remember these tips, given by an expert. The camera does not tell the truth, so you've got to "kid" it.

Always bend your body slightly towards the camera. It does away with that stiff appearance.

Either smile openly or not at all. A faint smile only gives a suggestion of sadness in the finished picture.

The direction of the eyes is most important. It is advisable not to look directly at the lens, as it imparts a hardness to the face, but if you must stare into the camera's eye, smile freely, and the expression reproduced will be pleasantly animated.

Girls with beautiful eyes should remember that they can show them up to the best advantage by inclining the head forward a little, and keeping the eyes directed to a level somewhat above that of the camera.

An appearance of alertness is given by turning the head at a slightly different angle from the rest of the body.

Keep your hands out of the picture if possible, but if they have to be in, let them be seen from their narrowest point of view. Only people with perfectly regular features should be taken three-quarter face.

Finally, be taken in a dark dress, and never wear a hat. Apart from the fact that a hat tends to distort the shape of your face in a photo, nothing so quickly changes in fashion as headgear.

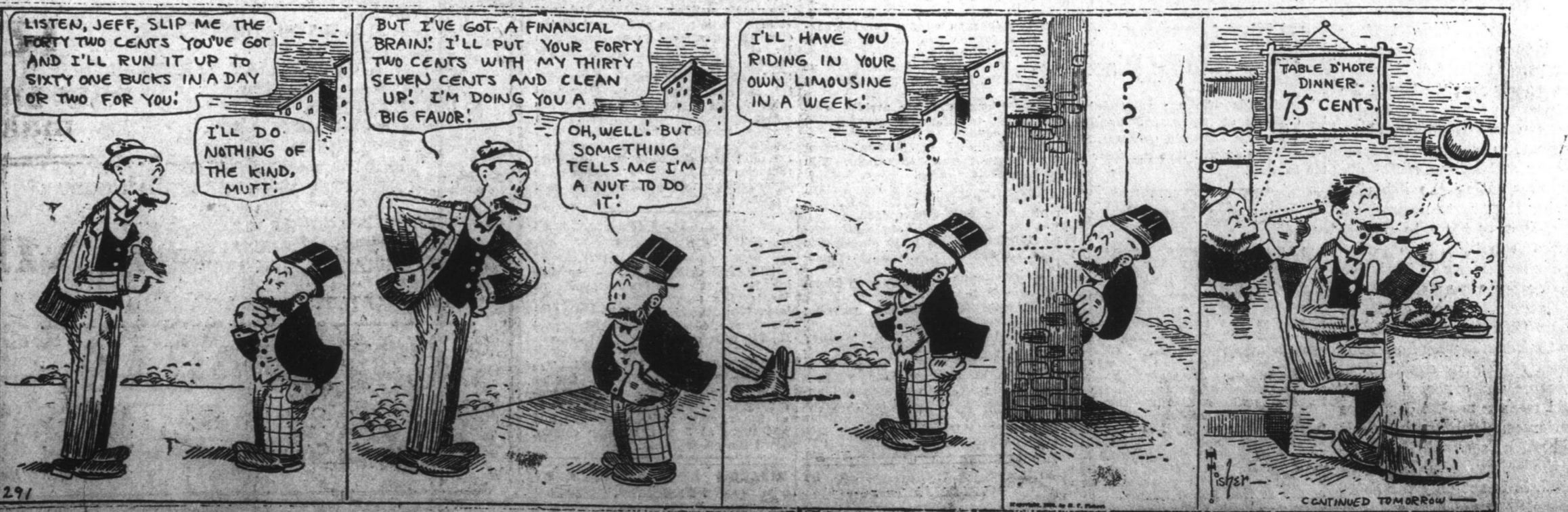

COLD STORAGE.

In the current issue of an English fishing journal, "Ice and Cold Storage," published monthly in London, England, a very readable article by Lord Morris discusses the value of Cold Storage as applied to Newfoundland's fisheries, and predicts a rosy future for this colony once the proper methods are adopted and carried out on a scientific basis. So far Newfoundland has but touched the outer circle in the shipping of refrigerated fish. Beyond a firm or two on the South West Coast, few of our merchants have taken kindly to the idea of exporting fresh frozen fish. Perhaps that is because it is too great a wrench to depart from the old system of drying, or it may be that the extra expense of erecting costly plants for the holding of fish in cold storage, whilst awaiting shipment would not be commensurate with the returns from such consignments. Cold storage and what a boon it would be to this country, has been talked of for years. Several experiments have been made, but few turned over enough on the transaction to encourage a continuance. Apart from the Newfoundland Atlantic Fisheries Plant here in St. John's, no other concern has yet taken up the matter of trade in fresh frozen fish with the United Kingdom. The West Coast people before mentioned do a fair business in exporting fresh salmon, halibut and a few other qualities, during a part of the year, but these are sent over comparatively short routes, and are not taken from cold storage, but are packed in ice almost as soon as they are caught and shipped immediately. It is not often that such shipments are destined further West than St. John, New Brunswick, and in all cases are carried by Canadian express trains. During the winter months small lots of frozen cod are sent from Port aux Basques to Nova Scotia points. But as a rule codfish are not profitable for export in a fresh state in the summer time, hence there is little done in that direction. Salmon, Halibut and Turbot, all containing less water than codfish, and therefore capable of resisting a high temperature for longer periods, thus lending greatly to more remunerative ventures, are the fish that are more eagerly sought after in the warm season than cod. Beside American and Canadian shore fishermen, in motor boat, motor schooner and sailing craft are daily prosecuting the fisheries, bringing their fares home fresh and delivering them to dealers in like condition, so that there is no scarcity of fresh fish food for the consumers in the ports served by these craft. To develop Cold Storage and bring it to that degree wherein all our harvest of the sea could be refrigerated and exported fresh, would mean a radical departure from recognized methods. It could not be accomplished without the outlay of millions of dollars. It is not only the shore

plant that is necessary. There must be, to make it a success, refrigerating stations along the coast, cold storage steam or gasoline collectors, cold storage railway cars, and last but by no means least transportation steamers fitted with cold chambers of sufficient capacity to take collections at least fortnightly. When all these can be obtained, Newfoundland will be in a position to compete in the fresh fish markets of Britain and America. Not before.

Success Rewards Efforts

BODIES OF VICTIMS OF SATURDAY'S DROWNING TRAGEDY RECOVERED.

The strain of suspense was relieved yesterday afternoon, when intelligence was received in the city that the bodies of Charles R. Duder and Chesley Crocker had been found, and were being conveyed to town. That was three days search by hundreds of men rewarded, for since the first news of the tragedy reached town no efforts were spared and nothing was left undone in the attempt to bring to the surface the bodies of the unfortunate victims of one of the most deplorable tragedies of the times. The body of Mr. Duder was first found and soon afterwards that of Mr. Crocker was brought to the surface. The story of the recovery of both the victims is as follows:

The search yesterday was conducted with more precision than previously, and this was due to the finding on Tuesday evening of Mr. Duder's hat and trout pole. The latter had evidently been dragged by the reel catching between two rocks, and the position in which it was found indicated the direction from which the boat drifted, and gave the searchers a guide for their work.

At 10 o'clock William Hynes and his boat mate Edward Power, of the Battery, both of whom had been on the pond the previous day, caught their hooks in a heavy object which moved as they slowly pulled their lines. After they had lifted the object about five or six fathoms from the bottom the weight lightened very considerably as if something had given way. They continued to pull in their lines, however, and found that they had been successful in recovering the body of Mr. Duder. The books had caught in his rubber boots. They immediately made known their find to the other boats, and then took the recovered body to the shore. Before they had time to return the body of Mr. Crocker had been recovered in the same spot by men in the boat of Mr. Morgan of Torbay.

When Mr. Duder's body was brought to the surface it was found that the arms were outstretched as if they had been grasping something, and there is every reason to believe that they had held Crocker's body. The fact that when raised some distance from the bottom Mr. Duder's body suddenly lightened very considerably, as if some weighty object had broken away, and the further fact that the two bodies were taken from the same spot, very strongly indicate that they went down clasped in each other's arms; and the probability is that Mr. Duder, who was a strong swimmer in earlier days, endeavoured to help his companion, who it is now known was unable to swim, but being heavily clothed, wearing an oil coat, oil leggings and rubber boots, was unequal to the task, and they both died together. Just such an act would have been expected in a man of the type of the late C. R. Duder.

The bodies were recovered in 70 feet of water in the middle of the pond. When examined it was found that their watches had stopped, one at fifteen minutes to ten and the other at eleven minutes to ten, indicating that the tragedy had occurred some time after 9.30 o'clock on Saturday evening.

Both bodies after being taken to the residence of Mr. W. H. Duder, were prepared for coffin by Undertaker Carrall, being placed in identical caskets. At 8 o'clock last evening they were reverently conveyed to their respective homes, from which they were removed this afternoon to their final resting places in God's Acre.

ICE ON NORTHERN LABRADOR IMPEDES FISHERY.

The following message from Capt. G. Barbour, of S. Senef sent from Makkovik was received this morning:—Just arrived here from northern Labrador where there is a fair sign of fish. At Turnavik and Allik there are fair signs. Not expecting much fishing north until August. Last week weather was stormy, N.E. winds prevailing. This week the weather is good. There is a good sign of fish at Iron Bound Islands.

Names of Finders of Bodies.

The following comprised the crews of the two trawlers used in the finding of the body of the late Mr. Duder: Sergt. Churchill, Messrs. Curnew, Edward Meist, Wm. Hynes, James Power. In the boat which recovered the body of Chesley Crocker were Messrs. Martin Murphy, James Croke and John Morgan. The trawlers were using two sixty fathom trawl lines.

New Rhodes' Scholar.

MR. CECIL PARSONS ELECTED.

At a meeting of the special commission at Government House this morning Mr. Cecil J. Parsons was elected Rhodes' Scholar for 1922. Parsons is a son of the former M.H.A. for Harbour Grace and will graduate in medicine at McGill next year. He will then go to Oxford for a post graduate course. Mr. Parsons was awarded the scholarship last year but was unable to take it. The two other candidates for the award this year were Mr. Martin Cashin and Mr. Raymond Gushue. Masonic Funeral.

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIES ATTEND BURIAL OF LATE C. R. DUDER.

Impressive ceremonies attended the funeral to-day of the late Charles R. Duder, former District Grandmaster of the Province District Lodge of Scotch Masons in Newfoundland and who met an untimely end on Saturday last. The funeral cortege was one of the most imposing which St. John's has ever witnessed. Thousands of citizens turned out to pay their last tribute to a man whose personality had endeared him to all who knew him, and whose end was met while he was attempting to save a companion from a watery grave. The funeral was at 3.15 p.m., this hour having been selected by the Police Master of the Standard Manufacturing Company could first attend the obsequies of the late Chesley Crocker, which took place at 10.30 a.m. The funeral of the late Mr. Duder was a full Masonic one, and at 2.30 p.m. the Masons met at their Temple and formed up, afterwards proceeding to the house of the deceased Grand Master. The Masonic Body led the procession in this order: District Grand Tyler, Inner Guards of the two City Lodges, the Grand Scottish Jurisdiction, Tasker and St. Andrew, the Stewards of the Lodges, and the members of Whiteway, Avalon St. John's, Heart's Content, St. Andrew's, McKay, Northcliffe, Carboner, Harbor Grace and Tasker Lodges. Then came the ruling Masters of the lodges, the District Grand Lodge of England and the District Grand Lodge of Scotland. All the fraternity were in full regalia and presented a most imposing and impressive appearance. Following the Masonic Body came a hearse containing the floral tributes, whose beauty is almost indescribable. Each lodge had contributed a special wreath and the flowers had been skilfully arranged to make Masonic Emblems of extraordinary beauty of appearance and design. The wreaths sent by the many friends of the deceased were also of a very beautiful character, and the hearse with the flowers came that drawing the casket. This was a beautiful one and was covered with flowers. Following came the family, relatives and intimate friends of the deceased. Then came the Directors and employees of the Standard Manufacturing Company, the Council and members of the Board of Trade, the members of the St. John's Rotary Club, representatives of the French Navy, and citizens. The procession moved to the General Protestant Cemetery by way of Duckworth, to Water Street by the King's Beach and Waterford Bridge Road. At the grave-site the service was conducted by Rev. C. H. Johnson and Rev. R. J. Power. After the committal, the Masonic portion of the ceremony was performed by Rev. C. A. Moulton, District Grand Chaplain, S.C. The Grand Honours were given for the last time, after the chanting of the last Masonic hymn, "Come brethren 'ere to-night we part" was sung by the hundreds of outside voices. The funeral was largely attended, and throwing by every individual member of the fraternity of a sprig of ever-green in to the open grave, and the obsequies of the late Charles R. Duder were at an end.

FUNERAL OF CHESLEY CROCKER.

The funeral of the late Chesley Crocker the other victim of the drowning accident took place from his home, Nunery Hill, at 2.30 p.m. today. The remains were enclosed in a beautiful casket which was laden with flowers. Amongst the wreaths was one from the Masonic fraternity. The funeral was largely attended. The employees of the Standard Manufacturing Company co-workers of the deceased walking in a body. The arrangements were conducted by Undertaker Carrall. At the R. C. Cathedral prayers for the dead were recited by Rev. Dr. Greens after which interment took place at Mount Carmel Cemetery.

SYRIAN PRIEST DELIVERS AN ELOQUENT ADDRESS.

The Reverend Father Awad, Syrian Priest, who arrived here recently from Toronto, visited the Syrian Community of Newfoundland, delivering a powerful address Tuesday night to a large gathering of Syrians at the residence of Mr. Kalliem Noah.

The Reverend Father began with a vivid description of the history of the Maronite Church, impressing upon the minds of his audience the fact that Syria and Syrians were no exception and that they fought and shed their blood for Christianity. Syrians could boast of their ancestors; Lebanon had its martyrs and freedom was handed down to you. Guard, honour and preserve your great legacy, economic and social chaos. The foundation of religion is Love: Love God and love your neighbour. Love is a bond of union and in union there is strength.

As a commercial center, he said Syria in the near east to-day is well on its way to regain the glory of the Ancient Phoenicians, who in the dim past lived on their soil and which interment took place at East St. who were the first civilized traders.

New Company Incorporated.

TEN MILLION DOLLARS CAPITAL.
The proposition of constructing a railway with the station of operating a train ferry service, which was projected some 8 years ago, but lap-
proposed during the war period, has again
set on foot, and a company, cap-
italized at ten million dollars has
recently incorporated to carry
out the scheme. In 1914, a company
known as the Newfoundland Railway
and Train Ferry Syndicate Ltd., was
registered in England and, represent-
ed by H. B. Thompson, made a pro-
posal to the government of the
provision for the construction of a railway
way for the construction of a railway
from Ram Bay, Trinity Bay, to Little
Harbor, Placentia Bay with
the intention of operating a train fer-
ry service to Lousburg. The scheme
embraced the construction of a
railway from Humbermouth, Bay of
Islands to South West Arm, Green
Bay, with a branch line to White Bay,
and having a train ferry service from
Islands to Gaspe in Quebec,
Newfoundland. Government on
the Newfoundland Government on
certain conditions granted this com-
pany many concessions and exempt-
ions. The new company, known as
the Great Lakes Newfoundland At-
lantic Company, Ltd., was incorpor-
ated here a few days ago with the ob-
ject of acquiring the assets of the pre-
sent company and as far as can be
ascertained, Mr. Thompson is still iden-
tified with it. As called for by the Act
there are three signatures to the
papers, viz Messrs. John Fenelon B.A.,
O'Neill Conroy, and W. J. Wallace.
The capital of ten million dollars, is
divided into 100,000 shares of \$100
each. It is probable that they will be
based on the American market. As
reported in the Telegram some time
ago, the directors in connection with
the project were at work locating the
sites and apparently it is being car-
ried out without much fuss. Should
the undertaking materialize it will be
the means of opening up many av-
enues of employment, as the company,
besides operating the ferry, proposes
acquire ships, barges and air craft;
to carry on business as proprietors of
docks, jetties and elevators. They
will also deal in fish, and operate
cold storage plants, supplying elect-
ricity for light or power, smelting,
sawing, lumbering, cattle and sheep

Convict Brides
HOW THEY ARE CHOSEN.
(Glasgow Weekly Herald.)
In India nearly all long-term prisoners, male and female, are sent to the jail at Port Blair, in the Andaman Islands, situated in the Bay of Bengal. Most of them, when they speak for the Andamans, leave India never. Some die, some are "let off" and marry and settle down in the islands, and bring up families there. If a male prisoner has conducted himself properly, and has served a sufficient term of his sentence, he is allowed to marry a female convict—that of course, always providing she is willing.

He states his wish to the chief warder, and is taken, along with other convicts, over to the female jail, across the harbour.

In rotation, a dozen usually there are about a dozen available every week, and when all are assembled, they are lined up in a room the female jail.

The first man's number is called. He goes out and earnestly at the woman he likes, and presently indicates the youngest and comeliest.

"Will you have him?" asks the matron in Hindustani.

She shakes her head.

Undeterred, the man tries again. He is unsuccessful two or three times, and is eventually accepted by a full-grown woman, who accompanies him with a demure grin.

They move off together in charge of a wardress. The necessary formalities completed and the Commission's sanction obtained, they will be married and allowed to take up their abode on a plot of land and settle.

Wife-Murderers Not Popular.
The next man is not so successful. He begins with the first woman in the line, and goes steadily down the line, but all refuse him.

The next man's number is called, and so the choosing proceeds. Occasionally the matron will put in a word, but more often than not she is refused by each of the women in turn.

The women invariably ask the matron the same question in Hindustani, "Why are all anxious to learn the name of this man?" Most of them are wife-murderers, and the women think twice before accepting them.

Of course, many of the men are there for murder, but this does not seem to frighten the women, who are as it were, without exception, all the servants of the European officials are convicts, the butler, who waits at the table is a murderer, and so is his wife, the cook, but nobody seems to mind.

When the matron's hair is washed in the evening by her maid, she takes care to sit in front of a mirror, lest the ayah, who is sitting behind her, should catch her eye.

How Noses Are Shaped.
