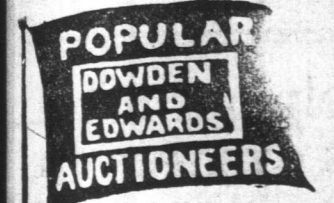

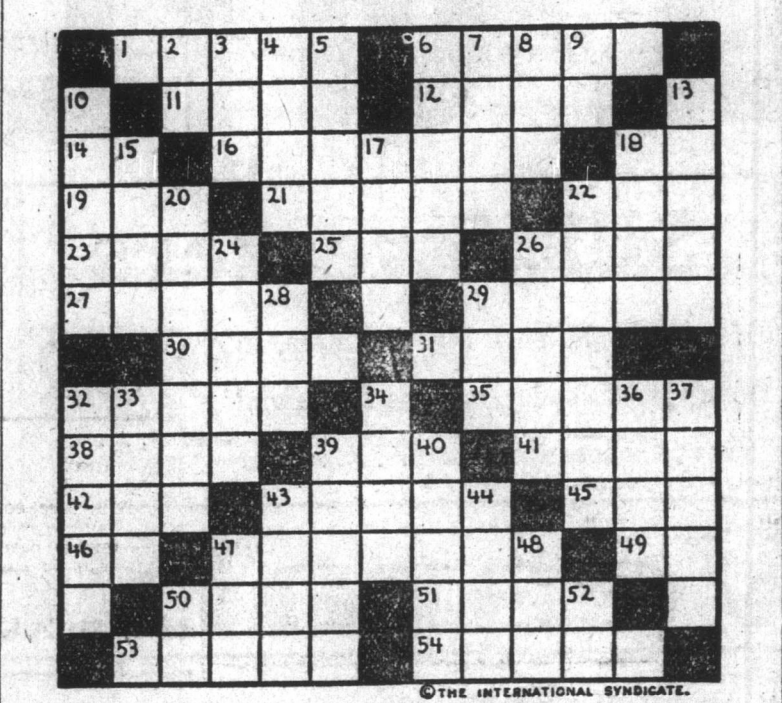
U.S. Plans the Greatest Airship of All

Dwarfing the giant proportions of the Los Angeles and the Shenandoah, and even the two great dirigibles ordered by Great Britain, is an air-liner proposed recently by United States naval experts. It would be by far the largest airship in the world. With a capacity of 6,000,000 cubic feet, nearly three times that of either of the American dirigibles and 1,000,000 cubic feet more than the British ones, it could be used for regular transatlantic trips. It would carry 80 passengers on a voyage and at least 32 tons of mail and freight. Counting on 40 round trips a year between New York and London, it is estimated that the levathan would make a net yearly profit for the United States Government of approximately \$5,000,000.

Municipal Council

WEEKLY MEETING.
The weekly meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councilors Martin, Guterbridge, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present.

After reading and confirmation of the Minutes of previous meeting the following matters were dealt with. An application was read from Mr. R. C. Hopkins for position of applanter. There being no vacancy, the communication was ordered filed.

Mrs. M. Dwyer wrote for the need of having Garrison Hill re-numbered and stated at the present time the irregular numbering at this place was an inconvenience and annoyance to the residents.

Mr. W. Whittle applied for lease of land, Mundy Pond Road. This was deferred.

Tenders for supply of Hose and Lead pipe were ordered to stand over. J. Anderson offered to supply horse for the Sanitary Department. This was ordered to be given consideration by the Sanitary Committee.

The Medical Officer of Health reported two new cases of Diphtheria, two Scarlet Fever and one Typhoid in the city during the past week.

Deputation from the City Taxi Drivers, consisting of Messrs. Volsey, Boone, Woods, Crotty and others, were then admitted to the meeting.

Mr. T. P. Hailer, on behalf of the deputation, informed the Council of the object of their visit, which was to see if some regulations could be brought into effect whereby bona fide taxi drivers only, who earn their living by this work, would be allowed to solicit fares or ply for hire.

Following the petition of the Managers of the Moving Picture Theatre for exemption from the tax on their performances, which came before the Board some time ago, it was decided that they be informed the Council is unable to accede to this request.

Reports of the City Engineer, Sanitary Supervisor, etc. were tabled. Resolutions for various Departments were granted and with the passing of accounts, disposal of several minor matters, the meeting adjourned.

Wholesale Prices increase in Great Britain

Wholesale prices in Great Britain in December, as recorded by the Board of Trade, showed a slight increase of 0.2 p.c. compared with the November average and an increase of 4.1 p.c. over the figure for December, 1923. According to advices received by the Bankers Trust Company of New York from its British Information Service, the increase as compared with a year ago was 29.9 p.c. in cereals, 4.6 p.c. in meat and fish, 24 p.c. in miscellaneous textiles, but it showed a decrease of 6.5 p.c. in cotton. Considering all items, the increase in food products was 10.2 p.c. while in other articles the increase was 1 p.c. The average figure for December, 1924, was 168.2; for 1923 it was 155.9.

Prison in Mid-Ocean

SECRETS.

As if an enormous giant had put his finger into the sea and stirred it, the entire North Atlantic slowly revolves in the direction of the clock's hands. In the center of the Sargasso Sea, a fantastic collection of floating islands, made of coral and inhabited by countless queer things.

Who knows how Herodotus, in ancient times, came by the alarming news he told of this mysterious region? It is only during recent years that it has been properly charted.

When Columbus and his men were blown into this oval-shaped vortex, the ship remained out of control for many days, and the crew thought they were condemned to perish in a prison, closely guarded by great sea barriers for 250,000 square miles. But a strong wind luckily carried the ship to safety.

Animal, Fish, or Bird? Supported in the water by small air bubbles, the feathery weeds of Sargasso are mostly olive-brown in color. The patches of white. The chief source of supply have been proved to be the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean Sea.

It is not like this strange floating island, but like land, the boom of the Atlantic. It is reported to be the home of barbarous and the hiding place of barbarous animals. Animals drifting about on the surface of the sea, with only the cover of moving seaweed, exposed to many dangers, not only the birds always hovering about, but the hungry fish lurking in the patches discovered sea, which is the bluest in the world.

To protect themselves, all the living creatures imitate, in a remarkable way, the color of their floating home. The protegee little animal is conspicuous owing to the disproportion of its head and jaws, and resembles the frog fish, sometimes seen in British coasts.

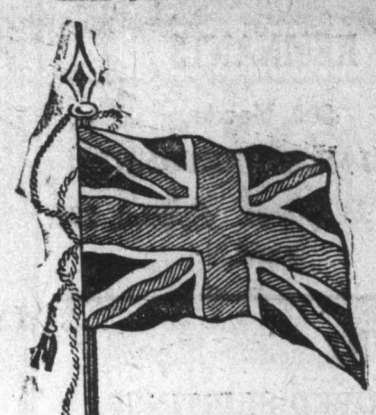

Proceedings at the Legislative Council

OFFICIAL SYNOPSIS. Thursday, Feb. 26th, 1925. The Council met at 4.20 pursuant to adjournment.

Hon. Mr. Morine informed the House that it was the intention of His Excellency the Governor to attend the Chamber for the purpose of giving his assent to the Loan Bill, and added that if the members were agreeable to permitting a bill dealing with the Seal Fishery, which would now be introduced, to pass through all its stages, His Excellency's assent could also be given it.

In moving the first reading of the Bill "An Act Respecting the Seal Fishery during the Present Year," Hon. Mr. Morine explained that for some time past there had been some irregularity in dealing with the matter of allowing the ships to sail earlier than previously. It is proposed to allow the steamers to sail on March 5th.

The principal argument in favour of earlier sailings is that the ships are old and consequently not very powerful. This measure was a temporary one, for should a more powerful fleet in time take the place of the one we now had, the Bill could be repealed. It states that "No sailing steamer shall depart for the prosecution of the seal fishery, during the present year, before 8 a.m. on the 5th day of March."

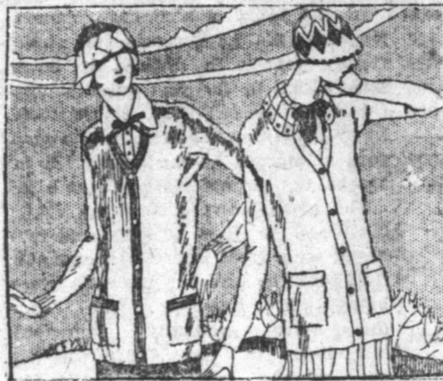

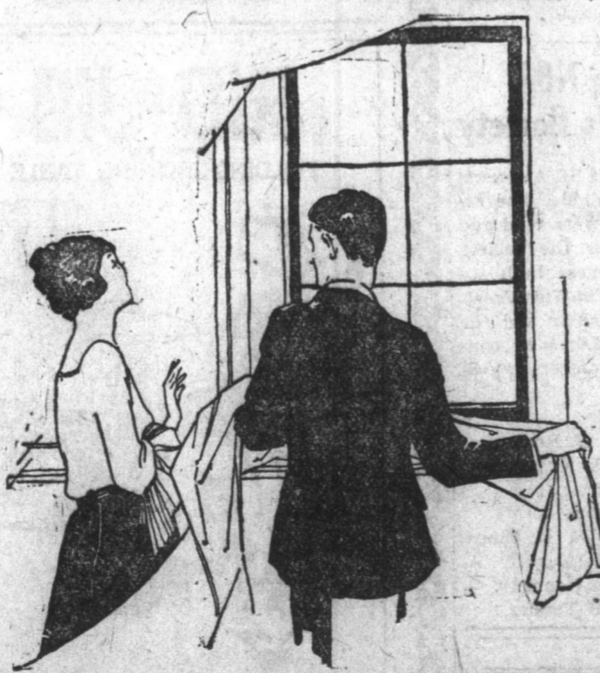

M. C. L. I. Debate

One of the largest Methodist College Literary Institute audiences for the season heard the following resolution debated at last evening's meeting of that body: "That disarmament would contribute more to world peace than all other agencies." Messrs. Geo. Peters, C. F. Garland, C. W. Puddister and Messrs. Thos. Soper, D. R. Penny and T. D. Trover argued for the negative. The affirmative speakers first defined the terms of the resolution and contended that "disarmament" means a universal limitation of armaments, consistent with national safety. Their chief arguments were to the effect that disarmament makes war impossible; that it gives a feeling of safety to all and allows the pursuance of peaceful pursuits; that it means happy homes with no dread of war which takes away the bread winners, in many cases never to return; that it makes for the production of those articles that are necessary to our well being rather than to the production of machines that work only for destruction; that no lasting peace is possible while the nations continue to arm; that it is an economic necessity, and that there is no other agency so effective in maintaining peace amongst the nations. Their opponents countered by pointing out that under existing conditions of society arms were necessary as a deterrent against war and for protective purposes. Nations must be prepared for eventualities arising out of the numerous influences for evil which exist throughout the world. The peace of the world can only be protected through the influence and use of armaments they claimed and stated that disarmament would have a calamitous result on civilization. The influences of the church, of education, of the exchange of international thought and many others were mentioned as being more potent factors in the maintenance of peace than disarmament.

Many speakers availed themselves of the opportunity of speaking from the floor and added much interest to the discussion. The general opinion was that it proved a very successful debate, evidence of which lies in the fact that the vote resulted in a tie. Mr. Wm. White was the debate chairman. Next Thursday evening the Institute is to be favored with an address on "Common Science" by Mr. J. C. Hogg, Vice-Principal and science instructor of the Methodist College.

The Earl of Oxford

An Honor That Has Won General Approval.
It is understood that the offer of a peerage to Mr. Asquith was made on the direct initiative of his Majesty the King. It was an honour that has won universal approbation as a recognition of a vigorous and disinterested career of public usefulness. And so as the Earl of Oxford Mr. Asquith will enter the House of Lords, from which Gilded Chamber his influence as a great and reliable statesman will permeate to the Lower House and indeed throughout the country.

It is stated that the second title selected by the new Earl is that of "Viscount Asquith of Morley" (Mr. Asquith's birthplace in Yorkshire), and that this will be borne by his grandson, whose father (Raymond) was killed in the war when serving with the Grenadier Guards.

One reads to-day with renewed interest the tributes which Lord Birkenhead paid to Mr. Asquith in the recent book in which he sketched the careers and estimated the values of contemporary personalities. "Mr. Asquith's character," wrote Lord Birkenhead, "is a national asset. He fights cleanly, wins without insolence and loses without rancour. And it will be said of him, when the vast criticism is weighed, that here was a statesman, honourable, generous, and sagacious, who rendered great service to his country at a time when, by any other living Englishman could have done that which he did, and without which the State might have tottered to ruin."

Veterans of Sea Survive Dangers

Sailing Ships Are Not Yet Vanished Memory.

It is now some forty or fifty years ago that the steamship effectually displaced the sailing vessel. As a result many persons have discovered an interest in these vanished or vanishing masterpieces of shipbuilding, says The London Morning Post. We shall now have to accustom ourselves to knowing the eloquent Lady Bonham-Carter as "Lady Violet Bonham-Carter." Princess Antoine Bibesco will become Lady Elizabeth, but will not use her new title.

Under Other Flags.
Most of these have passed to foreign ownership; Scandinavian, Portuguese, Spanish, Italian, South American. British shipowners part with their old ships when the expense of employing them becomes unprofitable. The reason why foreign owners can afford to buy and to sell old British vessels is that they work them at a cheaper rate. The foreign ship-owner buys a vessel at a low price and appoints his son or his son-in-law to be master, who probably has a share in the ship, and collects other relatives for the rest of the officers and crew, so that the ship becomes a sort of family investment, much like the arrangement which prevailed in this country eighty or a hundred years ago.

There is, for instance, the Malro, a four-masted bark, sailing under a South American flag, once the Sir Robert Fernie, owned in Liverpool. She did much business in the war. The Melanope was launched in 1876; employed in the Oregon trade between Alaska and Tacoma, and has now fallen to the duties of a coal barge out Vancouver way. There are sailing ship masters alive to-day—and commanding steamships—who served their apprenticeship in a small bark, and went on to full-rigged ships in which they sailed to every quarter of the globe.

One such captain commanded a bark in which, by order of her owners, a Bible was served out to each member of the crew. Pasted on the inside of the cover was a printed note asking the receiver to make a practice of reading one chapter daily. And a very good practice, too. Another master served with the famous Captain Starkey, of the Black Ball Line, of which it was said that no



The Deaf Hear by Touch

To teach the totally deaf, hitherto incurable, to hear through the palms of their hands is the amazing purpose of an instrument invented by Dr. Robert H. Gault, professor of psychology at Northwestern University. The device has not yet been developed to the stage where it may be applied universally for the relief of deafness, but with the aid of the instrument Doctor Gault has succeeded in teaching five deaf persons to identify perfectly 15 sentences containing 60 one-syllable words.

The instrument somewhat resembles a telephone receiver and operates on a similar principle to the telephone, except that, instead of carrying sound vibrations to the ear, it causes them to reach the hand or some other sensitive part of the body. It is necessary, then, for the person using the apparatus, to recognize what speech sounds caused the particular vibrations he detects.

Rotary Meeting

MR. H. E. COWAN DELIVERS ADDRESS ON ROTARY EDUCATION.

"Rotary Education," was the subject of a very interesting address delivered by Mr. H. E. Cowan before the St. John's Rotary Club, yesterday. The talented speaker was introduced by Chairman Rotarian "Charlie" Hunt. Answering the question as to why the Rotary was started, Mr. Cowan stated that the idea of founding such a club was first conceived in the brain of Paul P. Harris, an attorney of Chicago. On the completion of his university career, Paul P. Harris travelled around the world for many years; meeting many peoples of different lands. Eventually he returned to the United States with the intention of practicing his profession in Chicago. Being a stranger in a big city he had to contend with the solitude and sense of isolation which is the fate of many strangers in any metropolis. Under these circumstances he conceived the idea of founding a club whose members might not only become acquainted with one another, and develop a spirit of good fellowship, but also devise means of proving useful to the community. Acting on the inspiration, Mr. Harris called together a few friends and explained the idea of the formation of a club and which was so enthusiastically received that the first meeting was held on February 23, 1905 in the office of one of the founders. Thenceforth meetings took place regularly, each member acting the part of host in his office, in turn. In the course of a few weeks however, the membership became so large, it was necessary to hold meetings in hotels and restaurants.

The name "Rotary" was suggested to Mr. Harris because of the fact that the first meetings were held in rotation at the different offices of the members. To-day, "Rotary" stands for better business practices and lofty ideals. "Fundamentally, Rotary is a philosophy of life that undertakes to reconcile the ever present conflict between the desire to profit for one's self and the duty and consequent impulse to serve others. This philosophy is the philosophy of SERVICE—'Service above Self'—and is based on the practical ethical principle that 'the profits which serve best.' Thus was Rotary defined by the fourteenth Convention of Rotary International.

Primarily, a Rotary club is a group of representative business and professional men, who, accepting the Rotary philosophy of Service, seek first to study collectively the theory of service as the true basis of success and happiness in business and in life; and second, to give collectively, practical demonstrations of it to themselves and their community; and, third, each as an individual to translate its theory into practice in his business and everyday life; and, fourth, individually and collectively, by active precept and example, to stimulate its acceptance both in theory and practice by non-Rotarian as well as by Rotarians.

The growth of Rotary has been phenomenal. Three years after the

first club was formed in Chicago in 1905, the second club came into existence at San Francisco, and thenceforth the formation of clubs became frequent and the growth of Rotary International stupendous. For the first five years to February 1910 the number of clubs organized, was ten. One year later, in August 1911 the fiftieth club had been organized—the first overseas club in London. In July 1919 club number 545 was organized at Shanghai, China. In November 1921, club number 1047 was organized in St. John's, Nfld. From 1921 to date 1600 Rotary clubs have been organized. At the first Convention held in Chicago in 1910, sixteen clubs having a total membership of 1500 were represented. In 1915 when the sixth Convention was held at San Francisco 188 clubs having a total membership of 19,000 were represented. The Convention of 1921 held at Edinburgh recorded a representation of 975 clubs, with a membership of 70,000. To-day there are over 1600 clubs whose membership exceed a total of 100,000.

The benefits of Rotary may be summed up: in making the acquaintance of men one should know; genuine wholesome good-fellowship; developing true and helpful friends enlightenment as to other men's work, problems and successes; education in methods that increase efficiency; stimulating of one's desire to be of service to one's fellow men and society in general. Rotary endeavours to promote and foster activities that develop citizenship, incidental to which is its work in connection with boy life, crippled children, playground associations, etc. With the short time at his disposal, Mr. Cowan stated it would be impossible to treat the subject of "Rotary Education" in a manner befitting its vast scope, and could only therefore, endeavour to convey a mental movie picture, in miniature, of the organization of Rotary in 1905, its marvellous growth from that date, until to-day men of all races, creeds and colours, meet every week, in all parts of the world to give their best service in the promulgation of the ideals of Rotary. Mr. Cowan was accorded a hearty

13th Annual Report

OF THE SOCIETY FOR PROTECTION OF ANIMALS.

Your Excellency, Ladies & Gentlemen: In presenting to you the thirteenth annual report of the Society since its incorporation in 1912, I do so with a great deal of pleasure and satisfaction, as the year's work has been pleasant and encouraging.

The Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Fred R. Emerson, whose accounts will now be presented to you, show a cash balance \$257.62.

During the year the ladies of the Directorate and their friends have worked with enthusiasm and the treasury enriched as a result. We are greatly indebted to our Vice-President, Mrs. Walter S. Monroe and friends who organized a Tableau Dramatic Entertainment in the Casino Theatre, February 13th and 14th. During the summer a Garden Party was held at the residence of Mrs. Tasker Cook, Forest Road, and these efforts of the ladies resulted in a total net proceeds of \$726.16 towards the expenses of the Society. To these friends we place on record our grateful appreciation and thanks.

Our Committee appointed to collect annual subscriptions, owing to trying out new methods were not as successful as we hoped for, nevertheless, our liabilities were all met and a balance left for the year.

One of the most important features of this year's activities was the support given our proposal for the appointment of a Government Veterinary Surgeon to be associated with the Public Health Department as an Inspector of Cattle and meat imported into this country. Owing to the sensational reports current at the time regarding the removal of the embargo on the export of diseased cattle from Canada to this country and the imminent danger to our people from such action, a committee was appointed to interview with various members of the Executive. Dr. Alex. Bishop was appointed to the position. This was an achievement which received hearty support from the Press and the general approbation of the public. Because of this the authorities in Nova Scotia have recently appointed a Veterinary Surgeon to inspect cattle to be exported.

In May the Directors decided that if sufficient support was forthcoming, a Workhorse Parade would be held during the month of August, and much preliminary work was done by the various committees appointed in connection with the plan. It is much to be regretted that I have to report that for several reasons it was found impossible to hold this parade and to make it a success. That it should fall through was a great disappointment, but we are looking forward seeing a parade this year.

Several requests have been received for permission to establish Branches of the Society. This has been granted in the case of Grand Falls, and the matter of establishing a Branch at Corner Brook is now receiving attention. From other centres where a large number of animals are kept we have received emphatic evidence of the interest taken in our good work, and this has been borne out by the Veterinary Inspector, D. J. Smith, whom we engaged to visit the various lumber camps during the month of January. He visited eighteen camps at North Brook, Bonne Bay, the Humber River, and inspected all the horses at Corner Brook, Deer Lake, Main Dam and Fore Bay, and South Brook where logging operations are in progress.

I am pleased to be able to state that nearly all the horses seen were found in good condition and well cared for. This is very encouraging, and our Agent wishes to express his gratitude for the assistance and courtesy offered everywhere by the various Managers whom he met in the course of his trip. This is an experiment, which we hope to keep up every winter, but we can only do it as long as the public continues to support us. This sort of work must do good both directly and indirectly. It encourages those who are already supporters of our cause, and it carries the gospel of kindness of animals into places where it would otherwise not go. It prevents cruelty and it furthers a humane spirit.

Those members who read the weekly report of our Agent, Jones Barber, are familiar with the work done by the Society here in the city. It is interesting, however, to see in summary form an analysis of his year's work and this I propose to read to you:—

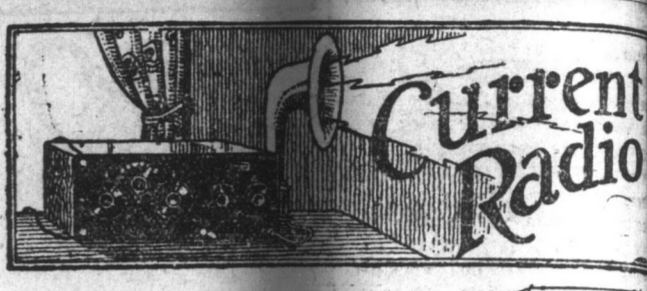

SOURCES OF LOSSES

What Losses Mean

Someone tells you that the antenna we know are bad until we have replaced all the joints in the antenna ground wires, put in real insulators in the antenna, moved the antenna away from the building and on an elevator shaft, substituted condensers and coils for inductors, soldered all joints in the antenna itself, cleaned out excessive wax from the battery connections and many other things. If we had depended on ear and done one of these things a time we would be sure that nothing gained. But in the laboratory we found that every change added to the percentage of increased signal strength until we had finished we found that overall gain was some 50 per cent. THAT means the signal strength increase in DX would be enormous.

The effect is a cumulative one. A bad joint may not kill the strength entirely but it certainly does its best to ruin it. When you are advised to eliminate some loss, don't depend on the elimination of this one but try to greatly improve reception and set. We eliminate things which keep on eliminating!

 Sir—Your Editorial in your issue of January 28th dealing with the representation of the West Coast in general and St. John's in particular are getting a way of representation. The coastal line from Cape St. John to Fortune Bay, about 100 miles of coastline and area of Newfoundland, is represented by four members in the House of Assembly. Of them is in the Executive Council they are representing forty thousand inhabitants. On the other hand Conception Bay (which is larger than St. George) with only two thousand inhabitants has two members, and if I am not mistaken are in the Executive Council. The Departmental Heads, Hargrave, with a smaller population than St. George's, has three members to represent it. The Colonial Secretary, Minister of Public Works are for that District. There are five members on the West Coast and yet they have three members, which is very unfair. Should Ferryland continue to have two members when that District is entitled to one? Newfoundland has the need of a better representation in the world, a result of that system the St. George's are deprived of important jobs in their own province having, and these jobs are held by men from two and three Districts who have members in the House. You ask why come on without a murmur? I am sure that without a murmur Mr. Downey, ex-M.H.A. St. George's, that it would be a fair Government candidate for the District unless justice in the way of representation know what happened. Many of St. George's old supporters did not vote for him. I myself voted for the Government for that reason redistribution on per capita single member districts as can be without interfering with the denominational quota. Conception Bay is only entitled to six members while the West Coast and Fortune Bay are entitled to seven instead of four as at present. I hope you give this space in your Paper and thanking you for your attention, I am,

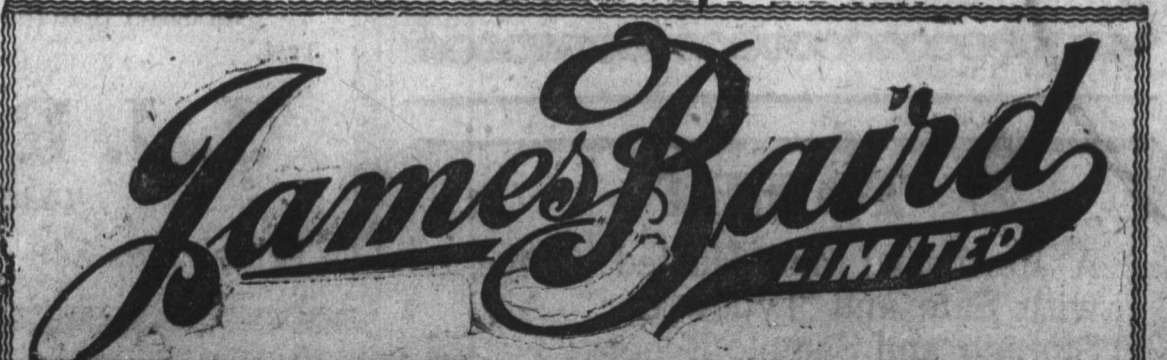

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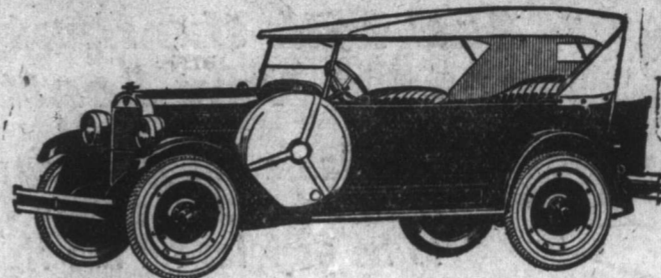
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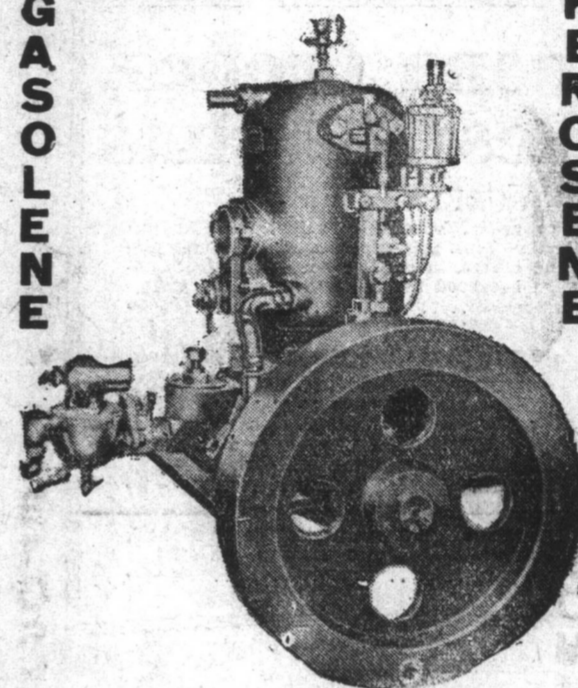
