# THE MURDER OF MR. McGEE

### TRIAL OF WHELAN

At the request of Counsel for the defence, the court adjourned the case at 2 o'clock this afternoon till 10 a.m. to to-morrow, in order to allow of the arrival of an important witness from Cincinnati. Of the merits of defence, now almost closed we need say little. It does not appear to me in the least to break down the strongest evidence against Whelan, but his counsel have made the most of it, and Mr. O'Farrell as the one getting up the case has been indefatigable, both in and out of court, and the three other counsel for the defence have never relaxed in their efforts.

Mrs. Scanlan sworn, Turner and Whelan used to come to my house to drink; never heard prisoner make threats against McGee.

James Fitzgerald, another waiter, sworn,

### ROBBING PETER TO PAY PAUL.

The Toronto Telegraph charges Mr. Rose, the Finance Minister of the Dominion, with using the money specially procured on the guarantee of the Home Government for construc ting the Intercolonial Railway, to pay off part of the floating debt of the Dominion. If there is any truth in this rumor, and we are inclined to think there is, Mr. Rose has perpetrated a piece of financial dating com pletely eclipsing the acts of Mr. Galt. Our cotemporary says :-

"By what authority, people cannot help asking, was this diversion of the Rumes, and General Fancy Goods. railway loan made? Under the Imperial guarantee, four trustees were created to see that it was properly applied. Two officers of the Imperial Exchequer act as Trustees for England, and Messrs. Baring and Glys act in the same capacity for Canada.

Mr Rose could not have temporarily diery from the Latest Designs. Mr Rose could not have temporarily di verted the loan from its special purpose without the consent of these trustees. And we may be sure they did not Guelph, September 12tn. give that consent without obtaining some substantial security that the money will be forthcoming when it is required to pay for the construction of the railroad, as the work progresses. They would not dare to give their consent on any other conditions; and even then, it cannot be said that their action is free from censure.

The expedient now resorte ! to may possibly admit of being once repeated. The balance of the loan money may be put on the market in time to per mit of the temporary diversion of the money thus taken to pay the floating debt being prolonged. But this financial expedient would not admit of being extended beyond a certain When the railroad is completed, the money provided for its payment would have to be forthcoming, and then the hypothecated debentures will have to be put on the market. No one can foresee the circumstances, or the state of the money market under which the operation may have to be made, or what the ultimate cost of the present facilities, gained by questionable means, may be.

It cannot be admitted as a plea in justification of what has been done that the money has been obtained at a cheap rate. The Imperial guaran-tee would never have been given to enable Canada to borrow cheaply for ordinary purposes.
