Serious Collision on the Great Western Railway.

London, Aug. 30.—The second train bringing the Great Western employees here from the pic-nic at Belle Isle ran into the tail end of No. 26 freight about a quarter of a mile west of Thamesville, about two o'cleek this morning, badly the mashed engine, conductor's car, and two passenger coaches. The engine broke ose from the tender and tumbled into the ditch. Two passenger coaches, by the concussion, were "telescoped," and report says that sixteen persons are in-
