This Committee have decided not to take any more evidence, and we think, on good grounds, for the almost universal conclusion come to days ago, by all who read the evidence is that McCandless knocked the bottom out of his case by his own evidence, nor has he been able to sustain a single charge made by him against any of the officers. The Globe says that the Committee describe the evidence as of "alfrivolous character, consisting chiefly of gossip and petty scandals amongst the former officials and employees;" and echo the sensible and universal conclusion of all decent people, that " it is not in the public interest to pursue the enquiry further." They find that injurious dissensions and insubordination occurred in the College while under McCandless's manage ment, and declare that the Govern ment were fully justified in dispens ing with McCandless' services. They finally express the opinion that the present condition of the management is satisfactory.

the House to-day, and on Monday, when it is published, we shall have something more to say on the sub-

The Rykert Case.

It is greatly to be regretted that the House did not see fit formally to register its unqualified condemna tion of Mr. Rykert's corrupt acts, and to expell him. We cannot see why that could not have been done, even although the evidence was not printed. This is the only reason given by the Globe, and to our mind, it is not at all satisfactory. That evidence was published day by day, members read it daily as it appeared, and they have the result of the Committee's labours in the report, which was sufficient to warrant them in taking action, in recording in proper shape their condemnation of Mr. Rykert and in expelling him from the House. True, the session may close soon, when the present Legislature pass. out of existence, so that Mr. Hykert will have no op-portunity of acting as a representative. But the House had a duty, nevertheless, to perform which in justice to the electors of Lincoln, and to the people at large, should have been done before they are dis-missed. Public morality demanded that they should have left on record their sense of Mr. Rykert's corrupt practices, even though he never sat another hour in a Legislature ball.

It is not at all likely that he will be re-elected, even though he should have the effrontery to put himself forward as a candidate. He leaves the House with the taint of corrup tion on him, and he may well thank his stars that he has been so leniently dealt with by the Government. Had he any member of it in the same dishonourable position, he would not have let him so easily off, But there is one comfort, we have heard the last of Mr. Rykert as a public man.

NORTH BRANT. - At a convention of the Reformers of North Brant, held Fancy Goods, Dolls and Toys at Cainsville on Thursday, Mr. Hugh Finlayson was chosen as the Reform candidate for that constituency, in the Local Legislature.


