Thence to twininger mails and passengers will be raced over an air-line railway in another thirty-six hours. From the Manitoba metropolis to the Pacific coast one of three routes is to be determined upon by the promoters of the "Imperial All-Red Route," as the latest highway to the Antipodes is known.

New All-Red Route

The lowering of the time of passage between London and New York, as well as Toronto, Pittsburg, Detroit, Chicago and other Canadian and American cities is an important consideration in the working out of the new project, according to Harry Chapin Plummer, who, in an article in the June issue of The National Waterways Magazine, published in this city by the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, states that by the Blacksod-Cape St. Charles route and Quebec, one day may be gained over the existing schedule maintained by the Mauretania and Lusitania between Liverpool and New York. He observes:

"Although conceived as a new medium of transportation between the capital of Britain and far-away New Zealand and Australia, the 'All-Red Route' in lands wheat supply by the shortest condition of a two-power war.

"Although a well known fact, it has never been brought home to the inhabitants of our islands how absolutely dependent we are on importation for our food supply, and it is hardly realized that, situated as we are, with New All-Red Route

Zealand and Australia, the 'All-Red Route' enters actively into consideration as a highway for distances that, while representing but a fraction of the grand total of mileage, are in themselves of great extent. From London to Winnipeg in five days is as important an object, relatively, as is accomplishment of a twenty-one-day schedule between London and Sydney. "This great highway through England, Scotland and Ireland, across the Atyantic to Labrador, across British North America, over the most northerly parallels of latitude yet followed by trunk line railways, and, diversely, ly parallels of latitude yet followed by trunk line railways, and, diversely, across the Pacific to distant Yokoha-ma, Hong Kong and Shanghai, and yet to more distant Auckland and Sydney, is planned to serve the pur-

sydney, is planned to serve the pur-poses of war as well as the pursuits of peace. It will be backed by the might of the combined resources of the United Kingdom, Canada, New Zealand and Australia." Railway Now Started Sir Thomas H. C. Troubridge, of London, and a syndicate of leading financiers of England, have let con-tracts for the commencement of con-struction work upon the line of rail-

"Australia and New Zealand, by the saving of almost a week in the journey to and from London will derive manifest commercial advantages. Canada, in the words of Vice-Admiral Sir Charles Campbell, of the British Royal navy, must become 'the central province of the empire and the carrier of all the traffic between the Australian colonies and the mother country.' Proportionately, however, Ireland must come to enjoy yet greater advantages. For the making of the erstwhile lonely and isolated Blacksod bay, on the Mayo county coast, the Atlantic terminus of the railway line from London must bring about the concentration at that point of the multitude of interests sure to follow the sudden diversion thither of a traffic universal in its scope and gigantic in volume. Grain elevators, coal and oil storage, warehouses and all the equipment of a great harbor terminus, whereto a vigorous and spreading population is sure to be attracted, will place Blacksod well in the race for maritime supremacy among the pout citles of the British Isles. The consequent effect upon the industrial position of the North Irish country, of which Blacksod will be the logical gateway, is obvious."



The government is preparing to prorogue this week, and the discussion upon the Naval bill will be over for the present.

There were four courses which the government might take. The most logical was to submit the question to the electorate in the form of a referendum or election. As it is very probable that the people would defeat the Borden naval policy submitted in either form, those two courses may be eliminated. It is not at all probable that the emergency could be sufficiently threatening to force the party in power to lay violent hands upon the Dominion senate so long as many thousand good party supporters are looking with eager eyes upon e senatorships.

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So the fourth course will be adopted. That is abandon the bill for the time being, do nothing at all, put the blame on the other party, and attempt to forget the entire episode. To take such a course is very humiliating, but that is better than submitting the question to the people or to do anything desperate with the senate.

So the Borden naval policy is dead. And dead it will remain for some time to come. It is not likely that it will ever be resurrected.



FEATURES GOOD AND BAD IN THE CITY PLAN OF CALGARY

Mawson Lectures on Some of the Possibilities for Making Calgary the Most Beautifu City of the West; Take Opportunities as They Come.

RUGGED BLUFFS ROUND CITY SHOULD BE SEIZED

Great Chance is Given in Hills That Encircle the City; Wider Streets and Some Running Crosswise Needed; District Rich in Trees and Shrubs.

Calgary may yet become the most beautiful city or Western Canada. So said Mr. Thomas Mawson in his lecture at the Public library on Saturday evening. Without foreshadowing any general or particular scheme which would be followed in his proposals for the planning of Calgary, the lecturer gave many instances of ways in which the City Beautiful might be made, while at the same time setting forth in concrete instances the various rules which guide the landscape artist in his work. Some of the principles set forth by Mr. Mawson were the construction of diagonal roadways instead of the regular rectangular scheme, the conservation of the ramparts of hills round to the removants of hills round. ion of the ramparts of hills round Calgary as a pourevard provided by nature, the provision of more ample sites for public buildings of the city, more playgrounds and beauty spots n the heart of the city, the buildin of a lake for boating, the removal the many advertising and other ugly eyesores which give the newcomer bal impressions about the city, and the placing of electric, telephone and tele-

Mr. Mawson stated that Calgary
gave a great opportunity for city planning, the city lying in a perfect amphitheatre surrounded by hills on every side. These hills should be kept,

It was rather taking every opportunity that presented itself of make an improvement. As an instance he gave the putting back of new buildings when the widening of the street was thought desirable.
