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THE FRUITFUL OPPOSITION.

The Liberals in Eastern Canada are pursuing a singular course with respect to the trade between the Dominion and the United States. They seem the good advice and refuse the encouragement given by Sir John Macdonald, Sir John Thompson, Lord Stanley, Lord Aberdeen and the Minister of Finance and insist upon advocating reciprocity with the United States after that country has contemptuously repelled their advances. They are doing their best to convince the people of this country that there are no new channels of trade available and that since it has been their very dear friends the Americans to her their doors against the introduction of Canadian farm products, all that they have to do is to sit down and sulk, grumbling the while at the Conservative Government and the Conservative majority in the House of Commons.

When Sir John Macdonald calls Canadian farmers to make the best of a bad job, they abuse him and declare that nothing can be done. They would fain throw the responsibility of the McKinley tariff on Sir John Macdonald and his supporters but they find that they are laughed at as often as they venture to do so. They have therefore given up the attempt but they refuse to be comforted. The attitude of those who speak for the Liberal Party is undignified and unreasonable. They persist in crying over spilt milk.

We are quite sure that when sensible Liberals contrast the cheerful and courageous utterances of the Leader of the Dominion Government with the vain and purposeless complaints and the unwhimsical whinings of their own organs, they must be ashamed. It is observable that the Liberal press has addressed the public in the most unbecoming manner. The reciprocity proposals have been rejected by Congress and the passage of the McKinley tariff has become certain. The leading men of that party appear to be undecided. They have not come forward to encourage and advise those who look to them for guidance. They are silent, while their newspapers waste their space in trying to make the situation look blacker than it really is.

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ONE MORE STEAMER.

The C. P. N. Company Decide to Add Another Fast Boat to Their Fleet.

Construction to Commence at Once—Best of all in Speed and Elegance.

With a view to the perfection of their service, the C. P. N. Co. are completing arrangements for the building of a new and thoroughly first-class steel steamer, which will, in all probability, replace the Islander on the Victoria-Vancouver route.

The new steamer will be of the same style as the Islander, but of a different model. She will be built in England, as the cost would be less than in this country.

According to the arrangements with the builders, the new boat is to be 300 feet in length, 40 feet in beam and with 16 feet hold. She will cost in the neighborhood of \$200,000, and will be completed within nine months of the present date.

She is promised to possess a speed of twenty knots, and will carry 7,000 passengers, although her staterooms will only number one hundred. The new steamer will be a great improvement on the Islander, and will be a great asset to the C. P. N. Co.

A FLY ON THE WHEEL

Because The Colonist kept well within the truth in its announcement regarding the Kamloops well with the characteristic candour, says: "We are afraid that artesian water has not been struck." It is difficult to conjecture what our contemporary means by the phrase "artesian water"...

It does seem singular to see our contemporary expressing a doubt in some pages which it resolves in another of the same issue. With information it obtained from the Sentinel it could not have doubted whether the well was a flowing one or not.

The Times boasts about the part it took with respect to the well boring enterprise. The truth is that it was in this business, as it is in most others, just a fly on the wheel as the Government would have done exactly as it has done if the Times was not in existence.

NOT TO BE THOUGHT OF. We see that the organizer of the Liberal party in Ontario has notified the different Reform Clubs of the province that the party has decided that October, November and December should be spent in holding a series of meetings in the province to place the question of reciprocal trade with the United States before the electors.

We are at a loss to see why the leaders of the Liberal party have decided to continue an agitation which has been going on in the past and which must necessarily be equally fruitless in the future. There was an excuse for the reciprocity agitation when there was some uncertainty as to how the Canadian people would receive it.
