New Ferry's Good Run

The C. P. N. Steamer Victoria at the Outer Docks.

Liner For Victoria-First Class Vessel.

Much Work Still to Be Done Before She is Ready For Service.

The new C. P. N. steamer Princess Victoria—which was built at Newcastle-on-Tyne for the Victoria-Yancouver route—arrived yesterday morning, after a passage of 50 days, and although at no time did the steamer travel other than at economic speed, her run is the best that has been made by any of the vessels that have come to Victoria from England.

With the C. P. N. red and white flag at her mainmast, the new steamer tied up at the outer docks about 9 o'clock yesterday morning. She was met by a crowd of C. P. N. officials and others on the wharf to meet her. Without her housework, and with the ironwork of the ship, she presented a strange appearance. She looked little like the photograph reproduction in these columns. The clear lines of her hull model were shown, though, and were much admired by shipping men.

The upper works are to be completed at Vancouver—that is if no interference comes from the greater part of the crew, such an event it is understood that the steamer will be brought back to Victoria and the work will be done here.

Lumber Men Stirred Up

Regulation As to Survey of Timber Leases Causes Much Talk

Vancouver, March 28.—It is inferred from a letter from Mr. Howson, secretary of the Canadian Wheelmen's Association, that the Dominion championship cycling meet will take place in Vancouver on Dominion Day. Howson says: All the Toronto clubs are in favor of Vancouver as the place of meeting.

Four law suits have been brought in the Supreme Court by R. P. McLennan, who sues for \$22,000 insurance money, on steamers struck at Dawson for which J. T. Genelle stood trial, and was acquitted. Genelle turned the insurance over to Mr. McLennan before the steamers were burned.

The announcement in the last Provincial Gazette respecting timber licenses, came as a bombshell to the camps of the loggers. In the first instance before the loggers could grasp its true significance, they were told that the government was to take up their claims and yield up the vast timber resources of the province to the leaseholders and lumbermen and corporators with capital.

Yesterday afternoon nearly every logger in the city called on Messrs. Martin and H. B. Gilmour, M.P.'s, and asked them if they approved of the plan that the government should have a hand in the logging industry. They explained that it would mean an additional \$100 or \$200 for every mile taken up, and was too great a burden on the logger, besides all land now held would have to be surveyed before a renewal could be secured. Both Mr. Martin and Mr. Gilmour, after talking over the matter, informed the delegates that they did approve of the new law. That while it was evidently intended to serve a good purpose, it was, however, in their opinion, a burden on the logger. Mr. Martin, at the request of the delegates, consented to refer to the loss of self-interest, and what he could induce him to recommend to the government to have the order-in-council rescinded.

The new law was the topic of conversation in the timber world yesterday. Still another strike is threatened in Vancouver. The painters demand more pay and shorter hours. The master painters consent to the demand for an eight-hour day, but refused an eight-hour schedule. A strike may take place next month. It is also reported that four-hundred blacksmiths have filed a demand for an adjustment of their schedule.
