The Steel Rails Test.

The fact that an American company has, in the face of English competition, made a sale of 10,000 tons of steel rails to the Canadian Pacific railway, is something that free traders will not readily account for.

It is also absurd in that part of it which maintains that any manufacture, requiring protection at home, can never compete in national markets with the same manufacture in a free trade country.

Our neighbors firmly hold the grip on production, to the extent of \$17 per net ton on steel rails. And yet, though they will not allow a ton of English rails to enter without paying that duty, they are able to sell, against English competition, in the neutral market of Canada.
