Elora, with its Public Library containing 7000 volumes, with its really fine museum, its two parks, its enterprising business men, its pretty girls, its beautiful converging drives, and last but not least, its grand soenery of rocks, through which two rivers have washed a channel at some points is 91 feet deep from the flush of the banks on either side.

Aptly has Elora been named "The City of Rocks," and its inhabitants intend that in future the rest of the Province shall know something of the majesty of these grand, aweinspiring formations of nature.
