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



## HINTS WORTH REMEMBER-ING.

Wire baskets nailed up on the wall of a pantry make a nice receptacle for vegetables, especially when a pantry is small and has little floor space. Try washing your teeth with lemon water. Squeeze half a lemon in a glass of water and

wash your teeth with it. If you have an accident with the belt of your sewing machine you can repair it yourself. Make fresh holes in the belt and put through, allowing for tying, a piece of millinery wire out of an old hat brim. Tie the two ends firmly and smoothly together.

You will find this a success, and it will last. When ready to boil white clothes cut a lemon in half and drop it into the boiler. Do not iron garments made of outing flannel. Brush them with a stiff brush, and it will renew the softness.

To make ferns, geraniums and nearly all house plants grow put a teaspoonful of ammonia in one quart of lukewarm water and water the plants. Do not use more than twice a week.

A very coarse scrubbing brush will be found the best thing for removing the threads, hairs, etc., which are so hard to get out of the brushes of a carpet sweeper. Add two tablespoonfuls of tur-pentine to one pailful of water and soak colored cotton goods overnight. This will usually set the daintiest colors, even in low priced lawns, and will not injure the fabric.

#### Pigeon-Whistle Concerts.

One of the most curious expres-sions of emotional life in China is the application of whistles to a flock of pigeons. These whistles, very light, weighing hardly a few gram-mes, are attached to the tails of young pigeons soon after their birth, by means of a fine copper wire, so that when the birds fly the wind will blow through the whistles, and set them vibrating, thus producing an open-air concert, for the instruments in one and the same flock are all tuned differently.

There are two distinct types of whistles—those consisting of bam-boo tubes placed side by side, and a type placed on the principle of tubes attached to a gourd-body or wind-chest. They are lacquered in yellow, brown, red, and black to pro-tect the material from destructive influences of the atmosphere. The ube-whistles have either two three tube-whistles have either two, three, or five tubes. In some specimens the five tubes are made of ox-horn in-stead of bamboo.







Besides, it very soon dawned upon me that the oars in the approaching boat were muffled.



Useful Birds. THE FLICKER FOND OF ANTS.

One of the Largest of His Species, He Performs Good Service to Mankind. Kills Tree Borers-Puzzles and Games For Little People.

One of the larger woodpeckers familiar to every one is the flicker, or golden winged woodpecker, which is generally distributed throughout the United States from the Atlantic coast to the Rocky mountains. There it is replaced by the red shafted flicker, which extends westward to the Pacific. The flickers, while genuine woodpeckers, differ somewhat in habits from the rest of the family and are frequently




FLICKEB PECKING A HOLE IN A TREE

seen searching for food upon the ground. Like the downy and hairy woodpeckers, they feed upon wood boring grubs and ants, but the number of ants eaten is much greater than that eaten by the other two species.

The flicker's habit of pecking holes in buildings sometimes greatly annoys his human friends, and it is particularly noticeable in the California species. Observation has shown that the object of the work is to obtain shelter for the winter. In the east most of the flickers are migratory, and only a few re-main north, where shelter is necessary. These generally find a safe retreat in the hollow tree in which they nested. To the woodpecker family more than to any other agency we owe the preservation of trees from hordes of destructive insects.




