

SOMEHOW over \$80,000,000 in gold were shipped from the United States to Europe during the past year, and still the shipment of the precious metal continues.

European money lenders and holders of American securities have become distrustful of the currency system and the railway and other corporation managers of our country.

They are calling in their money; hence this steady drain of gold from this side.

In addition to this unfavorable state of affairs the general government has had to borrow \$100,000,000 in gold to keep a sufficient amount in the national treasury to maintain its credit.

Lately, however, this gold reserve has been increasing at the rate of about \$100,000,000 a day and more gold will be borrowed in a short time.

The position of the present congress in its refusal to pass measures to remedy the existing state of affairs is indefensible, although they endeavor to defend their attitude by claiming that the outward movement is purely a commercial transaction, a simple strategy which will in time adjust itself.

The present movement is not a normal one, however. Leading bank presidents, applied to for assistance positively refused to help Secretary Carlisle unless they had cast from the banks their contributions towards making the present situation one of absorbing interest.

On Monday, President Cleveland sent a congratulatory message on the financial situation, but subsequently withdrawing his support from the plan outlined in the Carlisle bill.

He suggests that the only way left for the government to proceed is to issue the issue of U. S. bonds. He recommends that the secretary of the treasury be authorized to issue bonds for the purpose of maintaining a sufficient gold reserve, and for the redemption of legal tender notes.

Manures and Fertilizers.

Paper read before the Woodstock N. B. Dairy Association, Woodstock, N. B. The intelligent farmer of to-day understands the fact that the condition of the farmer is widely different at the present time from what it was a quarter of a century ago.

Our lands having become exhausted of their natural fertility, have now to be supplied with plant food of artificial means. In the face of this fact, the farmer will remark, it will become clear to him that every bushel of grain which he places on the market nets him much less than it formerly did, even if the price paid for it be the same.

Our farmers have now every year or two or three a crop of grain or other crops that are not so good as they were some years ago. This is due to the fact that the soil is becoming exhausted of its natural fertility.

It behooves every farmer to look his position in the matter of dairying, and he should not be slow to take advantage of the improved methods of farm making. He now knows that little or no fertility goes off the farm when a pound or two of solid, but when a bushel of grain or a ton of hay is sold a large amount of fertility goes with it.

By paying more attention to dairying, the farmer can feed his hay and grain to his milk cows, and obtain better prices for it in the form of butter than he can by selling the raw produce, and at the same time he can secure a fertilizer that has no equal in the market today.
