The Monitor, which has done a grand service for the cause of temperance in the public opinion, is now rapidly drawing to a close; even the substituted organs of the temperance party have not dared to touch the liquor traffic.

The question about to be submitted to a vote of the Canadian people is a momentous one, greater than is contained in any political creed, and one that is so far reaching that the whole world will be interested in the result.

The H. W. has editorially summarized the situation as below, and the case is so clearly put that we copy the article as a help to a good cause.

Prohibition is not the ideal way of dealing with the evil. It is an evil, bitterly realized, but then this is not the thing to do about it. Well, what is the right thing and what is the object of doing that? We shall probably never reach the ideal either in earth or in heaven.

When the time comes that we have no conception of anything higher than we have already realized, the joy of hope and, should imagine, the joy of existence will have ended.

When we have no transcendent ideals we shall have forsaken that which is divine in us, and shall indeed have ceased to be human.

The ideal becomes an enemy when it checks practical action. There are people in whom the ideal is over the head of the goal, but it is not the way of the Anglo-Saxons to do nothing because he cannot attain his ideal.

He goes across to, to what he sees his way to gain. His success in the world is due to his faculty for seeing how much is practicable, and accomplishing that. He endures a longer time than most people, but when it is realized as intolerable he takes the shortest way with it. When a theory stands in the way of kicking out a nuisance, it stands a chance of getting kicked out also.

All that we as a people want to know is that a given thing is a nuisance, with no redeeming qualities, and that we are able to do it, and the nuisance. We then proceed to abate it in the best way we can until experience shows us how to do it better.

The liquor traffic is a nuisance, with no redeeming qualities. We are able largely to abate it by prohibition. Before more homes are ruined and more children die for our sake, let us have done with it, and then when we have done what we can, do what we shall prefer to do.

"There won't be any law, so what is the use of talking about this prohibition?" This is about the commonest thing we hear, and it is evidently the latest argument with a great many who have not awakened to the idea that the opportunity to vote for or against the legalizing of the liquor traffic imposes any duty upon ourselves.
