The amnual meeting of the Board of Governors was held Phusitay, Nov, 27 ; the attendance, in spite of the anpropitious weather, was the largest on record, while the interest and enthusitism evoked showed the occasion to be one of morethan ordinaty importance.

Among those present were Eady Vin Horne, Meslames Phillips, Hagar, Von Rappard, Prylor, Sheifield, Mathers. Gillespie. Mebert, Patton, Finley, Watson, Guittith, Thompson and Costigam, Misses Moodie, Cleck, Baylis and Wiatson, Mifessers. Betl, (A)gden, Hatgar, Baylis, A'Connor, Dawson, Batbeau, Elerk, McGillis, and Drs. Muller, H. M. Patton, Grithth, Morgan and A. D. Patton. The President, Mr. J. T. Hugar, ocoupied the chair, and Mr. E. J. Dawson acted as secretary.

The minutes of the last quatedy meeting were read and confirmed, following which came the presentation of the anmat reports of the varions departments under the supervision of the Governors:
consisting of reports from the 'lreasurer, Medical Superintendent, Noman's Auxiliary, Eudy Superintendent of the Phillips lraining School, and the Committee of Management. the seading of the Treasureves report showed a balance on the right side of the ledger, with the hospital free of debt at the close of the hospital year, a state of affairs hitherto unknownintherecords of the institution. the-state of the finances and the reading of the Medical Superintendent's report called forth some criticism of cating for so many outside private patients at the prevailing rates of remuneration ; that in veality the favomale showing was only obtaned by the extanordinary donations of the past year, and that failing these, there would be a deficit instead of acredit. As the monthly revenue (exclusive of extraordinary donations) exceeded the monthly expenditure for the past year, the surplus being applied to wiping of the old debt, the force of the craticism-did not seem apparent, and was moreof aconjectural nature. However, it was well conceived and awakened interest, and aronsed debate in amane: somewhat at variance with the usual prosatic conditions usually prevailing at such meetings. The various reportswere approved of and-ordered to be sent to the Homoropathic Association, to be printed inthe amnual repore of $190 \%$. As they will appear, fully, in that publication, it is-unnecessaly to reproduce them at present.

The real interesting part of the meeting came with the election of officers for the coming year, the next business on the programme. Mr. John T. Hagar was unanimously re-elected to the presidency; a ballot was necessary for the re-election of Messrs. E. G. O'Connor and Roswell Fisher as vice-presidents, their opponents being Dr. H. M. Patton and Mr. Touis Barbeau. Dr. E. M. Morgan, honorary treasurer, and Mr. I. J. Dawson, honorary secretary, were unanimously reelected. The personnelof the Comittee of Management seemed to be of more than passing interest, judging from the appearance of little printed lists in the hands $=0$ the favored, lists which, as the author contended, contained names of those who would better serve the hospital than the oll committee, yet eight of the ten names were those of last year's office holders. Opposed to this nomination was one calling for the re-election of the old committee. There being some twenty odd namés to choosea committee of ten from, more were in danger of being added añ tea time was on hand, the whole being a situation calling for rapid fire oratory witl attempted production of statistics to prove that the Eommittee of Manageinent ás then consticuted was damgerous $=\overline{a n d}$ dould be attached (firmly) to another hospital, located at Verdun; the difticulty was finally solved by the withdrawal of two names from "the little printed list" and substitution ef two from the past year's committee, making the new committee of management exactly the same as last year's; in other words, after much oratory, melting glances, prayersand questionable thoughts the old conmittee was re-elected, the consensus of opinion being that themanagement had better beleft in tried hands for the present.

Dr. A. R. Griffith was unamimously re-slected modical superintendent, strange to say no opposition being offered this year. The honorary auditor and solic-
itor were also re-elected. Miss Marie Robertson was elected a Life Governor.

The meeting lasted nearly two and a half hours and the interest was kept up to the close, making it in all respects one of the most successful everheld, purtending a great personal interest in the welfare of the hospital by its friends and well-wishers.

## BAZAAR

The Bazan held in Windsor Hall under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary, proved a success in every way, and wäs generally pronounced to be the brightest, prettiest and best ever held.
