ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Board of Governors was held Thursday, Nov. 27; the attendance, in spite of the unpropitious weather, was the largest on record, while the interest and enthusiasm evoked showed the occasion to be one of more than ordinary importance.

Among those present were Lady Van Horne, Mesdames Phillips, Hagar, Von Rappard, Taylor, Sheffield, Matthews, Gillespie, Hebert, Patton, Finley, Watson, Griffith, Thompson and Costigan, Misses Moodie, Clerk, Baylis and Watson, Messrs. Bell, Ogden, Hagar, Baylis, O'Connor, Dawson, Barbeau, Clerk, McGillis, and Drs. Muller, H. M. Patton, Griffith, Morgan and A. D. Patton. The President, Mr. J. T. Hagar, occupied the chair, and Mr. T. J. Dawson acted as secretary.

The minutes of the last quarterly meeting were read and confirmed, following which came the presentation of the annual reports of the various departments under the supervision of the Governors:

consisting of reports from the Treasurer, Medical Superintendent, Woman's Auxiliary, Lady Superintendent of the Phillips Training School, and the Committee of Management. The reading of the Treasurer's report showed a balance on the right side of the ledger, with the hospital free of debt at the close of the hospital year, a state of affairs hitherto unknown in the records of the institution. The state of the finances and the reading of the Medical Superintendent's report called forth some criticism of caring for so many outside private patients at the prevailing rates of remuneration; that in reality the favorable showing was only obtained by the extraordinary donations of the past year, and that failing these, there would be a deficit instead of a credit. As the monthly revenue (exclusive of extraordinary donations) exceeded the monthly expenditure for the past year, the surplus being applied to wiping off the old debt, the force of the criticism did not seem apparent, and was more of a conjectural nature. However, it was well conceived and awakened interest, and aroused debate in a manner somewhat at variance with the usual prosaic conditions usually prevailing at such meetings. The various reports were approved of and ordered to be sent to the Homœopathic Association, to be printed in the annual report of 1902. As they will appear, fully, in that publication, it is unnecessary to reproduce them at present.

The real interesting part of the meeting came with the election of officers for the coming year, the next business on the programme. Mr. John T. Hagar was unanimously re-elected to the presidency; a ballot was necessary for the re-election of Messrs. E. G. O'Connor and Roswell Fisher as vice-presidents, their opponents being Dr. H. M. Patton and Mr. Louis Barbeau. Dr. E. M. Morgan, honorary treasurer, and Mr. T. J. Dawson, honorary secretary, were unanimously re-elected. The personnel of the Committee of Management seemed to be of more than passing interest, judging from the appearance of little printed lists in the hands of the favored, lists which, as the author contended, contained names of those who would better serve the hospital than the old committee, yet eight of the ten names were those of last year's office holders. Opposed to this nomination was one calling for the re-election of the old committee. There being some twenty odd names to choose a committee of ten from, more were in danger of being added and tea time was on hand, the whole being a situation calling for rapid fire oratory, with attempted production of statistics to prove that the Committee of Management as then constituted was dangerous and should be attached (firmly) to another hospital, located at Verdun; the difficulty was finally solved by the withdrawal of two names from "the little printed list" and substitution of two from the past year's committee, making the new committee of management exactly the same as last year's; in other words, after much oratory, melting glances, prayers and questionable thoughts the old committee was re-elected, the consensus of opinion being that the management had better be left in tried hands for the present.

Dr. A. R. Griffith was unanimously re-elected medical superintendent, strange to say no opposition being offered this year. The honorary auditor and solic-

itor were also re-elected. Miss Marie Robertson was elected a Life Governor.

The meeting lasted nearly two and a half hours and the interest was kept up to the close, making it in all respects one of the most successful ever held, portending a great personal interest in the welfare of the hospital by its friends and well-wishers.

BAZAAR

The Bazaar held in Windsor Hall under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary, proved a success in every way, and was generally pronounced to be the brightest, prettiest and best ever held.

The thirteen booths were well disposed through the hall, prettily decorated, and presided over by charming women and attractive young lady helpers. The platform was transformed into a cosy refreshment room with small tables and comfortable chairs. Palms and potted plants were used in decoration, with green and white drapery across the stage. The young ladies who waited, prettily costumed in white, were kept busy both afternoon and evening answering the calls for their services. The tea hour was a very busy one, and expressions of satisfaction were eloquent praise of the way the tea was managed.

The music by Prof. Hume and his pupils delighted all who heard it, and proved a great addition to the Bazaar. The piano was kindly loaned by the Mason & Risch Piano Co.; electric lights were adjusted and supplied by Mr. Cummings; a gas stove by the Montreal Gas Co., and was attached gratuitously by Messrs. Hughes & Co. Messrs. James Paton, Renaud, Edwards and other carpenters gave their services on the different booths; paper to decorate was supplied by F. E. Grafton & Sons, Geo. Holland & Sons and Mr. A. J. Williams. The Herald printed the large posters, and the Star kindly put up a notice on the bulletin boards on Windsor and Peel Sts. Messrs. W. H. Eaton & Son donated the tickets, and many of the well known city firms, with friends far and near, sent donations of all kinds to fill the tables.

To the many kind friends who assisted by their presence, their gifts or their services, the hearty thanks of the Woman's Auxiliary are gratefully tendered.


