CANADIAN FILMS.

It has long been a subject of regret and of some surprise that more enterprise has not been exhibited by Canadians in producing national moving pictures. With unrivalled scenery, a history exceptionally romantic, teeming with adventure, pathos and thrilling incident, all the ingredients for gripping pictorial dramatization are present, and yet this rich field has remained practically neglected, and we are dependent on alien producers, out of touch with the genius of the country.

At last a real attempt is to be made to remedy this defect. The Canadian Mistoric Features, of Vancouver, are about to produce a "made-in-Ganada" film, which ought to supply the long-felt want. The subject chosen for the first experiment is founded upon the Rev. R.G. MacBeth's well-known book, "Pelicing the Plains," the graphic story of the North-West Mounted Police, which has been read and admired by all who love their country and its institutions and has received the highest praise from literary critics. Mr. MacBeth wrote from an intimate personal knowledge, and has produced a book of absorbing interest.

The story of the Mounted Police, as it will be presented in the picturization of this narrative, is the story of the settlement and growth of Western Canada. It is a topic which appeals to young and old alike, an epic of courage, of endurance, of virile achievement. The dangers and tragedies of the early days, the noble accomplishment of the great pioneers, the railway builders, the gold-seekers; the suppression of rebellion and the tracking down of criminals - it may well be believed, as the prospectus claims, that such things "properly portrayed as a living pancrama, with the Mounted Police as the central figures, will dwarf into insignificance the fictional productions."

It is hoped that other works of prime interest to Canadians will be produced later, and all will wish for the success of the enterprise. If the company holds to its intention to produce a series of educational films of this character, presenting authentic history in a manner to entertain and impress itself on the minds of the audiences, it will be doing a serviceable work for cinema patrons, and at the same time will be contributing a to an important national movement. We have been too long fed from extraneous sources, and are becoming surfeited with that kind of diet.

I am very glad a project is on foot to use your book "Policing the Plains" as a basis for a film. I can imagine nothing from a Canadian point of view more interesting or more inspiring. Even outside of Canada I am sure such a film would be very acceptable and I wish Mr. Steele all success in his efforts to give such a film to the public. The making of these films is, of course, a very costly project. It is not a matter of a few thousands, but a matter of many tens of thousands and I cannot imagine any set of business men taking it up unless they were in such a business, nor would men invest money in the project if the idea were to make this film and this film alone. There are, of course, many wealthy men in Montreal who give most liberally and generously to all charitable and patriotic endeavour. This, though, is not a patriotic thing and would be regarded solely as a business venture and Capt. Steele would have to impress them with the merits of the scheme.
