ECLIPSES.

There will be four Eclipses during the year 1885; two of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I. March 16th, there will be an annular Eclipse of the Sun, visible here as a partial Eclipse.

Eclipse begins March 16th. 3 h. 17, in Longitude  $136^{\circ} 57'$  W., in Latitude  $13^{\circ} 30'$  N.

Eclipse ends March 16th, 8 h. 13, in Longitude  $32^{\circ} 51'$  W., in Latitude  $49^{\circ} 6'$  N.

II. March 29-30, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, not visible in these parts. Visible in the Eastern portions of Europe and Africa, in Asia and the Western Pacific Ocean.

First contact of shadow, with Moon's limb  $189^{\circ}$  from the North point, toward the East, when the Moon is in the Zenith, in Longitude  $135^{\circ} 58'$  East of Greenwich and in Latitude  $3^{\circ} 16'$  South.

Last contact of shadow with Moon's limb  $104^{\circ}$  from the North point, toward the West, when the Moon is in the Zenith, in Longitude  $89^{\circ} 32'$  East of Greenwich and in Latitude  $3^{\circ} 48'$  South.

III. September 8th, there will be a total Eclipse of the Sun, visible in the South Pacific Ocean, and therefore not visible here.

Eclipse begins Sept. 8th, 6 h. 34 m. in Longitude  $171^{\circ} 53'$  E. and in Latitude  $16^{\circ} 12'$  S.

Eclipse ends September 8th 7 h. 7 m. in Longitude  $84^{\circ} 8'$  W. and in Latitude  $50^{\circ} 29'$  S.

IV. September 23rd, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon visible here, on the Atlantic Ocean, North and South America, and on the Pacific Ocean.

Moon enters penumbra Sept. 23rd, 11h. 52m. Astronomical Time.  
Middle of Eclipse " " 14h. 20m. "

Moon leaves penumbra " " 17h. 27m. "

First contact of shadow with Moon's limb  $37^{\circ}$  from the North point, toward the East; when the Moon is in the Zenith, in Longitude  $95^{\circ} 45'$  West of Greenwich, and in Latitude  $0^{\circ} 13'$  South.

Last contact of shadow with Moon's limb  $73^{\circ}$  from the North point towards the West; when the Moon is in the Zenith, in Longitude  $141^{\circ} 37'$  West of Greenwich and in Lat.  $0^{\circ} 18'$  North.





**CITY POSTAL DELIVERY.**

The following are the arrangements in connection with Free Postal Delivery in the City of Montreal:

Letters and papers should be addressed to Street and Number at which to be delivered.

Notice of Change of Residence should be promptly notified to the Postmaster in writing, and renewed at the expiration of three months, they being acted upon only during that length of time.

There are five deliveries made daily in the central divisions of the city, at 8.00 a.m., 10.00 a.m., 11.30 a.m., 2.00 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. Four daily deliveries in the other divisions, at 9.00 a.m., Noon, 2.00 p.m. and 3.30 p.m.

Hochelaga and Point St. Charles.—Two deliveries daily; 9.00 a.m. and 1.00 p.m.

Every effort is made to secure the satisfactory working of these arrangements. If however, irregularities occur, they should be at once reported to the Postmaster.

The above rates must in every case be prepaid by postage stamp. When posted wholly unpaid they cannot be forwarded, but will be sent to the Dead Letter Office. Insufficiently paid letters for Canada, on which the first half-ounce rate of postage is fully prepaid, are forwarded charged with double the deficient postage.

Insufficiently paid letters for or from the United States, on which a single rate of postage or more has been paid, are charged with the deficient postage on delivery.

Wholly unpaid letters for or from the United Kingdom and the other Postal Union Countries (except the United States), are charged double postage on delivery, and insufficiently prepaid letters, double the deficiency.

No letter, &c., can be forwarded registered to any destination unless both the postage and registration fee are fully prepaid.

**Post Cards.**

Post Cards issued at one cent each cannot be transmitted to any place beyond Canada or the United States. Post Bands can be obtained at the rate of \$1.25 per 100.

Post Cards for Correspondence between Canada and Postal Union Countries are sold at the Stamp Agencies at 2 cents each.

**RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.**

Letters originating in Canada re-direc'ted to any of the Postal Union Countries will be forwarded, even if taken out of the office and subsequently re-posted.

**MATTER WHICH CANNOT BE FORWARDED THROUGH THE POST.**

Any Explosive Substances, glass, liquids, or other matter likely to entail risk or injury to the ordinary contents of the mail, will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

Spectacles and eye-glasses, if securely put in cases not likely to allow the contents to escape if broken in course of conveyance, may be sent by Post within the Dominion on prepayment of parcel post rates.

Letters containing Gold or Silver Money, Jewels, or precious articles, or anything liable to Customs duties, cannot be forwarded by Post to any of the Postal Union Countries, except to the United States.

**REGISTRATION FEES.**

Within the Dominion.....	2 cts. each letter.
To Newfoundland.....	2 cts. each letter.
To the United States.....	5 cts. each letter.

These registration fees are, of course, in addition to the postage, and must be prepaid by registration stamp.

All classes of matter may be registered to Postal Union Countries, and the sender may entitle himself to an acknowledgment of delivery from the party addressed by the payment of a fee of 5 cents in addition to the registration fee.

All letters for Registration should be posted 15 minutes before the hour of closing ordinary Mails, and 30 minutes before closing of English Mails.

Registered Letter Stamps have been issued of the denominations of 2, 5 and 8 cents, which may be obtained at the usual places. They can only be used in payment of Registration Fees.

**NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS**

Published regularly at intervals of not more than one calendar month, having a full title, the place, date of publication and the number of the issue printed at the top of the first page, posted by the publishers in the Post Office at the place where they are printed, and addressed to regular subscribers, or newsdealers, resident in Newfoundland, the United States or Canada, except at the place of publication, are transmitted free of postage.

**TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS ADDRESSED TO PLACES  
IN CANADA, NEWFOUNDLAND AND UNITED STATES.**

On all Newspapers and Periodicals other than those from the office of publication, including all newspapers and periodicals published less frequently than once a month, the postage rate is one cent per four ounces, which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly; if prepaid by postage stamp, one-half cent each.

Newspapers from offices of publication posted for city delivery are not delivered by Letter Carriers unless prepaid one cent each by stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals published in the United Kingdom, and re-posted by News Agents to regular subscribers, are not liable to any additional postage.

**PARCEL POST.**

Parcels closed at the end and sides, and not exceeding five pounds in weight, may be posted at any Post Office in Canada for conveyance to any Post Office in the Dominion (with the exception noted below) at the following rates:—

Not exceeding 4 ounces, 6 cents.

Not exceeding 8 ounces, 12 cents.

For each additional 4 ounces, or fraction thereof, 6 cents.

The size of a parcel must not exceed two feet in length, or one foot in breadth or thickness. The postage must be prepaid by stamp, and the parcel should be marked "By PARCEL POST." Parcels may be registered by affixing a 5-cent registration stamp thereto, in addition to the postage.

Parcels cannot be transmitted by Post to any place beyond the limits of Canada, nor can any parcel be forwarded to British Columbia or Manitoba, the route of transit being through the United States, which exceeds 2 lbs. 3 ozs. in weight. Parcels up to 5 lbs. may, however, be mailed for Winnipeg.

**MISCELLANEOUS POSTAL MATTER.**

Books and pamphlets, printed circulars, prices current, hand-bills, book and newspaper manuscript, printers' proofs, maps and prints, engravings, sheet music, photographs, insurance policies, militia and school returns, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, for Canada, Newfoundland and the United States, may be posted, prepaid by stamp, at 1 ct. per 4 ozs., provided they be sent in covers open at the ends or sides, and so put up as to admit of the contents being, if necessary, easily withdrawn for examination; if enclosed with written communications, or in sealed envelopes notched at the end or sides, letter rate of postage will be charged.

The following are excluded from the reduced rate: Legal documents, stamps or forms of prepayment, whether obliterated or not, as well as all printed articles, constituting the representative sign of monetary value.

Packages of miscellaneous matter are limited in size to 24 inches in length and 12 inches in width or depth, and to the weight of 4 lbs. for Newfoundland and Canada, except for Manitoba, British Columbia and the new Western Provinces, for which the limit is 35 oz. However, packages of 4 lbs. may also be sent to Winnipeg. The weight of packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions or grafts for the United States is limited to 8 oz.

Books and packages for Manitoba (except Winnipeg,) British Columbia and the new Western Provinces, must not exceed 35 oz. in weight; the limit of weight for Winnipeg and the other parts of the Dominion is 5 lbs.

Post Bands with an impressed 1 cent stamp for this purpose, may be obtained at any stamp agency, at the rate of four for 5 cents.

The term "printed circulars" is extended to include circulars produced by the electric pen or other mechanical process, easy of recognition by the officers of the Post Office, as well as when printed by the ordinary processes of printing type or lithography.

**USEFUL HINTS.**

Register all valuable letters and use sealing wax for letters containing money.

Transmit money by Money Orders.

Make complaints and inquiries in writing.

Preserve and request correspondents to preserve envelopes of mis-sent or delayed letters.

Send to the Postmaster envelopes of letters about which you seek information or make complaint.

Business men should be careful to authorize but a limited number of persons to receive their letters, and only those in whom they have full confidence.

A letter or packet once posted becomes the property of the person to whom addressed, and must be forwarded to its destination. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer. Business men are requested not to ask for the return of letters posted by mistake or otherwise.

Letters addressed to initials or fictitious names cannot be delivered, but will be returned to the writer through the Dead Letter Office, unless the address contains a designated place of delivery: thus, a letter addressed to A. B., Post Office, Montreal, would be returned to the writer, but a letter addressed to A. B., care of John Jones, box 871, or No. 1500 St. Catherine Street, would be delivered at the address designated.

**MONEY ORDER AND SAVINGS BANK.**

In sending money by mail it is always best to transmit by Money Order, if possible. If sent by letter, it should always be registered.

Money Orders, for a sum not exceeding \$50 each, are issued on the United Kingdom, Newfoundland, the United States, Germany, Italy, Switzerland, Norway, Denmark (including Iceland,) Holland, Belgium, Sweden, Roumania, Barbadoes, Jamaica, W. I., the Australian Colonies, Victoria, New South Wales, New Zealand and Tasmania, and British India. The Commission on Orders payable in the above mentioned countries is:—

Money sent to Austria-Hungary and Roumania by means of Money Orders, will be remitted through the intermediate agency of the Swiss Post Office, and will be subject to a reduction on payment at the rate of 25 centimes for each 25 francs, being commission due to the Swiss Administration. The abatement on a single order will in no case be less than 50 centimes.

Deposits from \$1 upwards, on which 4 per cent. interest is allowed, will be received. Information and Pass Books given on application.

PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

*Canada.*—Patterns and samples of merchandise, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, when posted in Canada for places within Canada must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of 1 cent per 4 ounces weight, and put up in such manner as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, not being actually Trade Patterns or Samples, are not admissible as such.

*United States.*—Patterns and samples of merchandise, and packages of seeds and bulbs posted for places in the United States will continue to be subject to the special rate of 10 cents each, prepaid by postage stamp, and must not exceed 8 ounces in weight.

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*List A.*—On books and printed matter generally, the rate of postage is 1 cent per 2 oz.; and on commercial papers, legal and other documents, etc., 5 cents for the first 10 oz., and 1 cent for each additional 2 oz. On samples and patterns the postage is 2 cents for the first 4 oz., and 1 cent for each additional 2 oz.

*List B.*—On books and printed matter generally, the postage is 2 cents per 2 oz. On commercial papers the postage is 5 cents for the first 4 oz. and 2 cents for each additional 2 oz. On samples and patterns the postage is 2 cents for the first 4 oz. and 2 cents for each additional 2 oz.

*D.*—The limit of the weight of books, printed matter, commercial papers, documents, etc., *as well as for newspapers*, is 4 lbs. avoirdupois, and of samples and patterns 8 oz.; and the size of a package of samples and patterns is limited to 8 inches in length, 4 inches in breadth, and 2 inches in depth; these apply to all Postal Union destinations. Except for France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Greece for which the Limits are 12 inches in length 8 inches in width and 4 in depth. The limit of weight, however, for book packets, etc., to the United Kingdom is 5 lbs. Matter exceeding the limit of weight cannot be forwarded.

It will be observed that all classes of matter can be registered to the United States and all Postal Union countries. Correspondence, however, addressed to the United States (and Newfoundland) must, as at present, be fully prepaid.

## MONTREAL WATER WORKS.

*Extract from By-Laws Nos. 65, 66, 82, enacted April 20, 1873.*

**Sec. 5.** It is expressly forbidden to any occupant of a house or building or any part thereof, supplied with water from the said water works, to furnish water to others or to use it otherwise than for his own use, or to increase the supply of water agreed for, or to waste it or to practice any fraud upon the said Corporation with regard to the water so supplied.

**Sec. 6.** All persons taking the water shall keep the distribution pipe within their premises in good repair and protected from frost, at their own expense; and they shall be held liable to the Corporation for all damages that may result from their failure to do so.

**Sec. 7.** No person shall fraudulently connect any pipe with the water pipes of the Corporation, or with any pipe, cistern, or apparatus connected therewith, or to or into which the water from the said water works shall flow or proceed; or shall fraudulently use or otherwise misappropriate the water supplied by the city, or knowingly permit the same to be fraudulently used or misappropriated.

**Sec. 8.** If any person supplied with water by the Corporation do, or permit to be done, anything in contravention of this by-law, or fail to do anything prescribed by this by-law, the superintendent, or his deputy, may cut off the water supply, and cease to supply such person with water so long as the cause or complaint remains, or is not remedied.

**Sec. 9.** No person shall wrongfully cause or suffer any pipe, valve, cock, cistern, bath, soil-pan, water closet, or other apparatus or receptacle to be out of repair, or to be so used or contrived that the water supplied to him is, or is likely to be wasted, misused, or unduly consumed.

**Sec. 10.** No alteration shall be made in any of the pipes or fixtures inserted by the city, except by its agent or officers.

**Sec. 11.** No person supplied with water from the said water works by meter, shall be allowed to connect, or cause to be connected, any pipe or other fixture between the Corporation's service pipe and the meter.

**Sec. 12.** No person, unless duly authorized by the water committee, shall open any hydrant in the said city, or lift or remove the cover off, or draw water from the same.

WATER TARIFF.

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Sec. 13. No person shall turn on or turn off the water in any manner, or interfere with any of the water pipes or valves belonging to the city, without the license of the water committee, or of the said superintendent.

Sec. 14. No person shall pass the railing enclosing the reservoir of the said city, or shall defile or deposit any filth or offensive matter in the said reservoirs, or on the bank or ground adjacent thereto, belonging to the said city, or shall allow any dog or other animal to jump into the said reservoirs, or upon the said bank or ground, or shall pass or remain upon the said bank or ground after 10 o'clock in the evening; or shall do or cause anything to be done tending to defile or corrupt, to disturb or agitate the waters of the said reservoir.

Sec. 15. No person shall draw or use water from the River St. Lawrence, or elsewhere, for the purpose of selling the same, to any part of the city.

Sec. 16. No person shall draw or use water from the water works in the said city for private fountains, or for hand hose for watering purposes, or for building or manufacturing purposes, unless such person shall have previously obtained from the superintendent of the said works a written permission to that effect, and paid the respective rates charged in the subjoined tariff for the supply of water in such cases; and in no case shall the said hose be used for sprinkling or watering the streets between 9 o'clock in the forenoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

Sec. 17. No person shall use a hand hose of a larger size or nozzle than one fourth of an inch orifice or use any hand-hose for the purpose of washing horses, coaches, omnibuses or other vehicles.

Sec. 18. No meter shall be used for determining the quantity of water supplied by the said works, unless the same shall have been previously submitted to and approved by the said superintendent.

Sec. 19. The several rates enumerated and specified in the tariff contained in the subjoined schedule, shall be, and the same are hereby imposed for water to be supplied from the water works of the said city.

Sec. 20. The said rates shall be due and payable to the city treasurer, in advance, on the 15th day of August, every year, by the occupant or lessee, or occupants or lessees, of all buildings, part of buildings or tenements in the said city, supplied with water from the said works, as well by those who shall consent as by those who shall refuse to receive the water pipe to supply the said water, or to use the same.

Sec. 21. All charges for specific supplies or for fractional parts of the year, shall be payable in advance and before the water is let on.

**Sec. 22.** In buildings occupied as offices, where there are water closets in the building, each tenant of an office or suite of offices, will be charged, in addition to the tariff rate, a water closet tax.

**Sec. 24.** In all cases of non-payment of the rates imposed by the present by-law, for thirty days after the same are due, the said Council or any duly authorized officer charged with the management of the said works, may cut off the supply of water from any building upon which the said rates shall be due, or from any one in default to pay the said rates, which shall not prevent the said rates from running as before, and the water shall not be let on for the use of any such defaulter, except upon payment of all arrears due.

**Sec. 25.** Any person offending against any of the provisions of this by-law or of the said tariff, shall for each and every such infraction, be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars, and costs of prosecution, and in default of immediate payment of the said fine and costs, to an imprisonment in the common gaol for a period not to exceed two months, the said imprisonment to cease upon payment of the said fine and costs.

Chap. 45, 37 Vic., 1874.—The inspector shall charge the sum of 10 cents for every hundred pounds of pot or pearl ashes inspected by him; 25 cents for each new head furnished; 18 cents for repairs and cooperage on each barrel.—said cooperage to include nails and end hoops of barrel; 25 cents for putting in a barrel, partly filled, the additional quantity thereof necessary to fill the same, whenever duly required to do so; 25 cents per barrel in all cases where lime, raw ashes, damaged ashes or other trash have been packed or mixed with pot or pearl ashes, for extracting or separating the same.

*Flour.*—L. A. Boyer, inspector, 88 Common street. Fees, 2 cents per barrel for inspecting and branding (exclusive of cooperage), "when any less quantity than 100 barrels of flour are offered for inspection, the inspector shall be entitled to receive the full fees that would accrue to him on 100 barrels. When the inspector in his judgment deems it necessary to strip or empty out the flour to find out if there is the proper weight of flour in any cask, he shall be entitled to 2 cents for each barrel so stripped or emptied (if it prove to be short weight), in addition to the 2 cents per barrel for inspection and branding."

*Grain.*—T. Bickerstaff, 100 St. James street.

*Beef and Pork.*—J. Doheny, Government inspector, 125 Grand Trunk street. "For such inspection and branding, the inspector shall be entitled to receive, of and from the person submitting the same for inspection, for each and every barrel and half-barrel, tierce or half-tierce of beef or pork so inspected, salted, packed, pickled and branded, 25 cents for each barrel, 15 cents for each half-barrel, 35 cents for each tierce, and 15 cents for each half-tierce, exclusive of cooperage and repairs—the charge for which cooperage and repairs shall not exceed 15 cents per barrel, tierce, or half-tierces; in consideration of which charges all barrels or half-barrels, tierces or half-tierces shall be delivered in good shipping order."

*Fish.*—L. E. Morin, corner St. Sacrament and St. Nicholas streets. "Every inspector or deputy inspector who shall inspect or brand or mark any cask or package of pickled fish, or in bulk, in accordance with the provisions of this Act, shall be entitled to fees at the following rates, which shall be paid by the original owner or the person who employed him in the first instance:—for each tierce of salmon, salmon trout or sea trout, 15 cents; each

half-tierce, 10 cents; each barrel 15 cents; each half-barrel, 10 cents. For each barrel of mackerel, 10 cents; each half-barrel, 5 cents. For each barrel of herring, 5 cents; each half-barrel, 4 cents. For each barrel of shad, 10 cents; each half-barrel, 3 cents. For each barrel of whitefish, 10 cents; each half-barrel, 7 cents. For each barrel of pickled codfish, hake, haddock or catfish, 5 cents; each half-barrel, 3 cents. For each barrel of dry-salted codfish, hake, haddock, catfish, ling or pollock, 5 cents; for each half-barrel, 3 cents. For each barrel of bass, 10 cents; each half-barrel, 7 cents. For each barrel of cod-tongues, cod-sounds, halibut or eels, 10 cents; for each half-barrel, 7 cents. The foregoing rates shall be reckoned exclusive of salt, pickle, cooperage, storage, and labor employed in washing, rinsing, cleaning, nailing, screwing, or repacking any fish. "Every inspector shall be entitled, for the inspection of such hides, to a fee of 5 cents for each hide in lots under 100 in number, and 4 cents for each hide in lots over 100 in number. The inspector may inspect and measure all kinds of leather which are sold by superficial measure or by weight, and shall be entitled to charge 2 cents for each side or piece of such leather inspected and measured by him."

Penalty \$30 to \$50. Snaring, trapping, &c., prohibited, penalty  
\$1 to \$10. Not more than 2 Moose, 3 Deer or 2 Caribou to be taken  
or killed by any person in any one season, penalty \$30 to \$50.

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Penalty \$2 to \$5. Snaring, trapping, &c., forbidden, penalty  
\$2 to \$5. Any person may destroy Nets, Traps, Snares, Cages,
