CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

I.

The Society shall be called the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.**

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled or altered, except at a Meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said Meeting.

III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Anniversary Meeting of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at such previous Meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment, shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes by the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds, shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a Member of the Society. Provided that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of

twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such Meeting.

VI.

Officers.

1. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such Officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent Meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee, for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

VII.

(Executive Committee.)

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

The Officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound; to be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee, provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected, unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day next following the Annual Meeting, on the first Wednesday in March, on the first Wednesday in June, and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October.

VIII.

(Objects.)

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other, viz. :—

1. Missionary Visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships ; and assistance, when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a Fund towards the augmentation of the stipends of Clergymen who are poor ; and towards the education of the children of such Clergymen, and towards the making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a Fund for receiving Money or Securities as Special Trusts.

IX.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

X.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XI.

(Local Committee.)

1. The Members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee ; and so also the members residing in

any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop), may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day, previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to depute two Lay Members of the Society, to be elected at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

XII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks' notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

XIII.

(The General Committee.)

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following members, viz.: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman, the Vice-Presidents of the Society; in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present, and, if none be present, from other members of the Committee; the Secretary or Secretaries, who shall also serve in that capacity at the Meeting of the General Committee, the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish, or of a Mission comprising two

or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish, (provided that in the absence or sickness of the Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered *pro hac vice* a member of the General Committee), and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committee as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee, to be the certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriations of the funds of the Society; and a report of the proceedings of such Meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

3. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows:—

Firstly. Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly. Secretary's Report to be read, and also a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly. Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly. Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

XIV.

The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion for the general purposes of the Society.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

That in future no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously. (18th Report, page 24.)

That each Missionary, receiving a salary from this Society, be requested to make an annual return to the Secretary, to be handed in by him at the first meeting of the General Committee, as follows, viz.:

The number of Churches under his charge.

The number of weekly or other stated services held in such Churches or stations.

The number of Communicants.

The average number of attendants.

The amount contributed in each Parish towards the support of such Missionary. (19th Report, page 24.)

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion, to pay to him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission. (22d Report, page 33.)

That if any alterations shall be found necessary in the Schedule of Missionary salaries granted by this Committee, by reason of the death, absence, or removal of any Missionary named therein, the same shall be made by the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee.

That all grants by this Committee for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it. (25th Report, page 30.)

That all vouchers for the payment of any sum of money whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

That the Treasurer be directed not to pay any monies after the first day of May in each year, until authorized to do so by the General Committee at their meeting in July.

That the following be the form of draft for a Missionary's salary, to come into effect on the first of October, 1861, and that no draft be paid by the Treasurer, unless presented in person, or endorsed by the person to whom it is made payable, the Treasurer to take a receipt from the party to whom the payment is made on the same.

REPORT.

With great reluctance, the General Committee, a year ago, made appropriations which it was thought would require an outlay from the vested funds. This was done only in extreme necessity, and to avoid the wrong of a withdrawal, without due notice, of any portion of the stipends of the Clergy. By reference to the Treasurer's accounts, it will be seen, that without taking any thing from the Investments, the whole expenditure of the past year has been met. This has been effected by special contributions to the deficiency fund, and to the opportunity of transferring, as an investment, a sum due in the accounts of the late Treasurer. It must be most satisfactory to the Society to learn that the Accounts, made up to the close of the fiscal year, show a small balance to the credit of the Society for its general purposes, while the interest is credited in full to all Funds held as special objects.

From the Report of the Loan Committee, it will be found that the vested funds are now well secured; so that the interest will be punctually paid. These funds will be shortly increased by a legacy of \$800, from the late Mrs. Hall, of the City of St. John. The financial condition of the Society, under all the difficulties of the past year, may well be regarded as a cause of sincere thankfulness, and a motive to encouragement for the future.

Without special efforts, the deficiency in the amount required for the usual expenditure cannot be made for the current year. And in each succeeding year this deficiency will increase, and before long the grant from the Society in England will all be withdrawn; to maintain the staff of Clergy, as at present, requires an annual expenditure of over \$20,000—nearly three times the late average income of this Society. And are there no new Missions to be opened and sustained; no aid afforded in those larger Parishes, the duties of which are beyond the reach of any one incumbent?

It is evident that a new system of appropriations must now be adopted by the Society, and that the several Parishes or Missions must do more than they have hitherto done in the way of local support. Some of the older and better

endowed Parishes may be enabled to relinquish their claim upon the funds of the Society, by a pledge from themselves to make up the required stipends of their Clergy.

The following reports of the Missionaries, and of the Local Committees, will be read with more than usual interest :—

ANDOVER, GRAND FALLS, &c.—Rev. W. Henry Street writes as follows :—
“The contributions from this Mission, thank God, exceed those of the past year—amounting to \$110. This is the more encouraging as many of the subscribers had been called upon in aid of the sufferers from the late fires in the vicinity of Grand Falls. In this Mission, as elsewhere, there is, I trust, a growing interest in the work of the Society; and now that its claims are being pressed upon the notice of each Parish, we would fain hope that the call may be responded to liberally and freely by every earnest member of the Church.

“My Missionary labours of the past year have varied but little from those of the preceding; that much more might be done by a division of the field, and thus more concentration in one's work is scarcely necessary to remark; yet until this is accomplished much must be left undone, and the scattered flock be more or less exposed to the temptations of those who would withdraw them from the fold.

“During the year there have been: Baptisms, 80; marriages, 12; burials, 5.

“In anticipation of some repairs on the Church at Tobique, the ladies of the Parish, with their accustomed zeal, have started, and carried on successfully, a sewing society. By this means, and with the kind aid of friends in Saint John and elsewhere, a sum has been realized which will enable us to make a commencement in the renovation of our little Church, which is at present very much out of repair. In this part of the Mission we have now a promising Sunday School in operation.

“In September last the welcome triennial visit of the Bishop of the Diocese was made to this Mission. Thirty-one candidates received the rite of confirmation. The few, comparatively speaking, of the confirmed who become communicants is a cause for much regret. During the week the Bishop was with us, his Lordship and myself travelled over 220 miles.”

BATHURST.—Rev. W. LeB. McKiel writes as follows :—“In forwarding once more to the Diocesan Church Society the annual returns from this Mission, I would further add that the Report shows an increase in the amount of work done and an increase in results, though apparently deficient, when compared with last year's report. The Church people of Restigouche County having happily succeeded in securing the services of the Rev. J. H. Saturley, the County of Restigouche became a separate Mission. This enabled me to confine my attention to Gloucester County alone, with, I trust, more beneficial results. There has been an increase in the number of services in Bathurst; and the number of baptisms (41) is only two less than the number from both Counties last year. A Bible class has been formed in Bathurst, especially for the young, which was well attended during the winter months, and still continues to meet every Wednesday evening. During Lent we had extra week-day services, and the Wednesday evening service is still continued. As the Sunday School now opens at 10 A. M., I am enabled to attend and take part in instructing and catechising the children. The candidates for confirmation are being instructed and carefully prepared for that solemn and important rite. The number, I believe, will be larger than the last time; but as I have not yet been able to work up the distant portions of the County and the Islands, I cannot even state the probable number.”

Contributions amount to \$103.

CAMPOBELLO.—Rev. J. S. Williams reports contributions to the amount of \$81.87. He has also enclosed the following account of the work in this in-

teresting Mission :—"I have so often sent you nothing from this Mission but a copy of uninteresting resolutions, that I will try to improve upon my past custom by giving you some account of our doings for the past year, though I cannot hope to make it as interesting as those which you receive from the larger Missions.

"When I returned from England, just a year ago, I found the Bishop on the Island, and learnt from his Lordship that he had kindly seen some of the young people, who were desirous of confirmation. Three were confirmed a few days afterwards, and two of them are now communicants. I have now six candidates for confirmation, whom I hope to present to the Bishop this summer. In August the Parish received an accession of strength, by the return of Captain Robinson Owen and his family from England, after an absence of nearly two years. On the Feast of Saint Simon and Saint Jude, being joined by my dear Brother Medley, of Saint Stephen, we had some special services, which were well attended. The morning service was rendered more interesting by an adult baptism; and the person then baptized will, I trust, become a communicant very shortly. We were cheered by the good attendance and hearty services at Christmas, and by having five more communicants than we had ever before had on that Festival. During Lent there was a service at 7.30 p. m. every Wednesday and Friday, consisting of a Hymn, Litany, 2d Lesson, Hymn, Sermon (extempore), Hymn, and Blessing, with an average attendance of about thirty persons. On Easter Day we had four more communicants than on any previous Easter, and a very large morning congregation. The Sunday School, which was discontinued during my absence in England, has been more largely attended than for many years past. Last Christmas the contributions to my salary were considerably in excess of those of most previous years. So that, while there is much indeed that is far otherwise than we could desire, there are yet signs of progress, small and slow though it be. We have lately obtained a good 'Cabinet Organ' for the Church, to replace the old Seraphine, which had been in use for more than thirty years. The gale of last October left many sad marks of its violence on the Island. We have to thank God for the preservation of our little Church; but many of the trees in the Churchyard were destroyed, and the fence overthrown. This has lately been put in order again; so that the surroundings of the Church are seemly, for the most part. We have been hoping to effect some improvements in the interior; but circumstances over which we have no control have hindered our designs so far."

CANTERBURY.—Rev. T. Hartin reports contributions to the amount of \$36.25.

CHATHAM.—Rev. William S. Neales writes as follows :—"The past year, with all its difficulties and anxieties, has tended much to encourage me as to the future welfare of the Church here. We have had increased congregations.

"The 'Bacon Memorial Sunday School' building affords enlarged facilities for meetings connected with Church work.

"Last autumn, I commenced a monthly evening service in a district where no such service had been held before; and in consequence, many persons who had not been at Church for months, perhaps years, before, enjoyed the privilege of sharing in the services of the Church. Several persons brought all their children, and joined heartily in the service.

"I have great reason to be heartily thankful for the unvarying spirit of active interest and co-operation in Church work displayed by many members of the laity, both male and female, without whose aid my duties would have pressed much more heavily upon me. Several persons have been added to our list of communicants.

"On Ash Wednesday I baptized four adult members of one family, hitherto attached to the Baptist denomination; and on the second Sunday after Easter, I baptized three infants of the same family.

"Much interest—of, I trust, more than a passing effect—was produced in Church work and personal religion, by means of a series of Missionary services, held here last September. I would express my grateful thanks to those brethren who so kindly came over to us and helped us."

Contributions amount to \$173.58.

The following resolutions were passed at a meeting of this Local Committee :

1. "That, as the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, in carrying out its just policy of withdrawing aid from the Colonies, has already largely withdrawn its support from this Diocese, thereby throwing the support of the Church on the people themselves, it is the bounden duty of all our members to make more earnest and self-denying efforts in behalf of the funds of the Diocesan Church Society, to enable it to maintain and extend the Missionary work of the Church in this Diocese.

2. "That this Committee feel strongly the essential importance of the Diocesan Church Society to the welfare of the Church in this Diocese and that the great good accomplished by its funds, entitles it to the earnest support of all Church people ; and the Committee will, therefore, use their best endeavours to promote its interests, both in subscribing more largely than heretofore, and in securing increased contributions."

DALHOUSIE.—Rev. J. B. Saturley has enclosed the following resolutions from this Local Committee :—

1. "That this Committee state that the small amount of contributions does not arise from any lack of interest in the work of the Society, but from the inability of the members of the Church to do more this year, as they have to complete their Church, and also at present almost entirely to support their Missionary.

2. "That this Committee respectfully urge upon the Society the great need this Mission has of a grant to increase the present stipend of its Missionary.

3. "That a grant of \$80, for the building of the Church in Dalhousie, having at one time been made, but not drawn, this Committee earnestly solicit that a like sum may again be granted."

Contributions amount to \$46.85.

DERBY, NELSON, &c.—Rev. W. Cruden mentions, in his report, several improvements with reference to the Churches in his Mission ;—a Cabinet Organ has been procured for St. Peter's Church, and a fence has been built around the burial ground of the Church of the Holy Trinity. "I have now," Mr. Cruden writes, "Divine Service twice every Sunday, and once a month I have three services. In my Nelson District, a monthly Sunday service was commenced last fall, and the congregations on every occasion have been large and attentive. I also, a short time ago, began a monthly week-day service at the same Station ; and I intend to add to the number of such services in this Church and elsewhere.

"We are very much indebted to the kind liberality of an enterprising firm lately established in business near the Church ; and, in all probability, their assistance in the future may be depended on.

"I have taken every opportunity to impress upon my parishioners the necessity of increased exertion, both in their contributions to the Society, and in making up the salary of their Missionary in other ways. An effort is now being made to meet these requirements, which promises to be successful."

Contributions amount to \$70.

DOUGLAS AND BRIGHT.—Rev. T. E. Dowling writes as follows : "Our contributions continue, I am thankful to state, to increase. They amount to \$150.

"On Trinity Sunday our hearts were gladdened at being able to worship once more in the Parish Church of this Mission. For more than eight years the Church has been closed for Divine worship ; so that a weekly Sunday evening service, during the summer months, is a change indeed. This arrangement increases the number of Churches regularly served to five, in addition to three Stations and six Sunday Schools.

"Since the last report, three confirmations have taken place in the Mission—one in Douglas, and two in Bright. Among the candidates in Bright, were nine heads of families, who have become communicants.

"During the winter months a Bible class was held every Wednesday evening in Smith's Hall, Upper Keswick. The average attendance was about twenty. The interest was kept up until Lent, when the Class was discontinued for eight months, but replaced by a course of Lectures on the sixth chapter of Saint Matthew's Gospel, which were delivered in the Church by different Clergymen.

"Owing, mainly, to local exertions, with the unsolicited assistance of friends in Saint John and Fredericton, the Rev. L. A. Hoyt having been admitted to the Deaconate, came immediately to work in our midst, at the beginning of the year. Although we may not be able to retain him as assistant minister (much as we should like to do so), we hope to secure the services of another Deacon, towards whose support I do not think it unreasonable to ask the Diocesan Church Society to contribute something, if only for the sake of encouraging *Missionary work* 'in places where is no settled Clergyman.'

"The Church women of Bright have lately formed themselves into a Needlework Society, on behalf of our *Assistant Ministers' Fund*. Their efforts are being rewarded with success; and it has been the means of drawing many of us together—no slight matter in these days of division.

"During the month of May I acted as one of the deputation appointed by the Bishop, as President of the Society, and visited during one week, the Parishes of Gagetown, Sussex and Studholm, Sackville and Dorchester. Nine services were held, and special collections for the 'Deficiency Fund' were taken up on each occasion. The Rectors of the several Parishes will hand over to the Treasurer the amounts raised."

FREDERICTON.—Rev. Charles Lee, on behalf of this Local Committee, reports as follows:—"I have much pleasure in reporting from this Parish amount of subscriptions and collections in all \$928.70. This, in excess of last year, was hardly to be expected, after the contributions from the Parish of \$576 to the Deficiency Fund within the year, making a total of \$1,504.70. This favourable and encouraging result is to be attributed to the zeal of the ladies, who have for several years past undertaken the task of collecting the subscriptions, and have truly 'laboured in the Lord,' to the ready response they have met with from all, to the liberal subscriptions of 'not a few,' and, let me humbly hope, to the good Spirit of God granting the will and the ability. It will be taken, I trust, as a sincere expression of our desire that the ministration of our Church, which we here so fully and regularly enjoy, may be extended freely, and if possible, *more widely* to our brethren in the Diocese, and may not, from the want of temporal means, be withdrawn from any one. At the same time, we hope that *every* Mission will rise to the occasion; and without accepting, before careful examination, the details of any new or revised Missionary Schedule, we would approve of some plan that would render the respective grants to the older Missions, at least, *conditional*, upon the annual payment by each of a definite sum to the support of its own minister, making this sum smaller, or perhaps not immediately imposing the conditions upon, any Mission that might still be called 'new and poor.' Thus, we would extend, *throughout the Diocese*, the principle of the stronger helping the weaker, in our common brotherhood in Christ.

"I must also add, that the opinion and the hope prevail here, that the capital of the Society, derived in a great measure from the past, may be preserved for the future. No heavy calamity has befallen our Church, no cause of sufficient magnitude has arisen to justify the use of that capital, the aid from England is being gradually reduced, we are not thrown suddenly or helplessly upon our own resources, and the operations of the past year warrant the hope, that the larger contributions of our people, when especially appealed to, will fully support the Church in its present need. With those contributions made in faith and love, and capable of a *still larger increase*, we shall, under the blessing of God, leave our Church with its temporal capital undiminished, and its spiritual richer and fuller, for those who succeed us."

MARYLAND.—Rev. J. Pearson reports contributions to the amount of \$35.10.

GAGETOWN.—Rev. Jamer Neales reports contributions to the amount of \$142.58. This includes a contribution to the Deficiency Fund of \$42.78.

GRAND LAKE.—Rev. Benjamin Shaw has sent the following report:—"I can safely guarantee \$100 as the contributions for the present year, and I hope to make it larger.

"Regarding my own labours, I have reason to be thankful for the moderate success which is visible in this Mission. We have very good congregations, and our communicants are steadily on the increase. We have three Sunday Schools in working order; and through the kindness of the Bishop, an addition of over thirty volumes have been made to one of our Sunday School libraries.

"The new Church at Mill Cove is nearly completed. The offer of the Bishop to give \$50, on condition that the people raised \$100, has been the means of providing seats and a new floor for the Church; which, it is hoped, will soon be ready for consecration.

"These are, of course, outward tokens; but I have the hope my people are not lacking in interest concerning the inner truths of our holy religion; nay, I am sure that many are walking in the narrow road that leads to God.

"We also trust that there will be no deficiency in the funds this year; but if so, let the whole Church suffer, and then we shall all work for better things with renewed efforts. There ought to be no sacrifice of individual Missionaries or Clergymen, but whatever amount is wanting, make an average reduction on the whole body that are dependent on the Society, and an annual statement of reduction to the people will become a reality.

"In conjunction with Mr. Dowling, I spent some time in May and June, of the present year, in the several Missions of Sussex, Sackville, Dorchester, and Moncton. The sum of \$118 was collected for the Deficiency Fund, and we were encouraged to believe that the subscriptions to the Society would be increased by the services we held.

"I must again call the attention of the General Committee to the great need of a Clergyman on the Western side of Grand Lake. It is an old mission, where three Clergymen of our Society have laboured. It has been neglected for ten years, with the exception of occasional services by Mr. Jaffrey and myself. There is a Glebe and Parsonage House, and the people will guarantee \$200 annually for the support of a Clergyman.

"Should there be an advance made in our Missionary work, and should no Clergyman be sent to Albert County, I trust that a grant of \$400 may be made for the Parishes of Canning and Chipman."

GREENWICH AND WICKHAM.—Rev. D. W. Pickett writes as follows:—"Since my last report we have had an interesting visit from the Bishop, for the purpose of holding confirmation. Several of the candidates, who had been receiving instruction, were unable to be present; but ten solemnly ratified their baptismal vows, and received the 'laying on of hands,' with earnest prayer for their future growth in holiness. Seven have since been added to the number of communicants, and the Holy Communion is now administered more frequently than before. I trust they, as well as others, will heartily embrace the increased opportunities they enjoy of 'showing forth the Lord's death till he come.'

There have been only eight baptisms in the year; an unusually small number—one of these being an adult. The services in the several Churches and Stations have, with one exception, been regularly sustained, and generally well attended. The Station at the Shannon Settlement has been abandoned for the present, so far as the regular monthly service is concerned; the partially finished building in which we met for worship during the summer months was entirely destroyed by the 'Saxby gale,' and the few members of the Church in the Settlement are quite unable of themselves to attempt the erection of another.

"A Sunday evening service, at 7 P. M., has been opened at Greenwich Hill,—

the use of a commodious Meeting House being allowed us for the purpose; the attendance is large, and the services seem to be a source of comfort to some who cannot go to a more distant place of worship. I am thankful to be able to add that there are evidences of an increased zeal and love for the Church, shown in various ways, not least distinctly by a willingness to contribute to the funds of the Diocesan Church Society; yet, in addition to £20 given to the Deficiency Fund, I cannot promise more than the sum raised last year—namely, \$85.

HAMPTON.—Rev. W. Walker reports contributions amounting to \$164.63.

HARDWICKE, NEWCASTLE, &c.—Rev. J. Hudson, Visiting Missionary, informs the Society, that in the Parishes of Hardwicke, Newcastle, and Ludlow, meetings were lately held, at which the members thereof pledged themselves to renewed exertion on behalf of the Diocesan Church Society, not only that the present deficiency in the Society's income may be met, but also that the Missions may be extended, until 'the preaching of the Word of God,' and 'the ministration of the holy Sacraments of the Church' be brought within the reach of all our fellow-churchmen, now 'scattered abroad, as sheep having no shepherd.'

"The Visiting Missionary adds, that since September 21st, 1869, sums as follows (including a special remittance of £8 for the 'Deficiency Fund') have been forwarded to the Society's Treasurer: Hardwicke, £18 5s. 8d.; Newcastle, £29 5s. 3d.; Ludlow, £5 8s. 9d.; Boiestown, 19s. 9d.; Northesk, 12s. 6d.,—total, £54 11s. 6d., \$218.30."

HAVELOCK, PORTAGE, AND PETITCODIAC.—Rev. Cuthbert Willis writes as follows:—"Having been appointed by the Bishop to the new mission of Havelock, Petitcodiac, and Sussex Portage, which has formerly been under the charge of the Rector of Salisbury and Sussex, I send my report accordingly. At present, there is a Church at Havelock, which I visit every alternate Sunday; a Church at Sussex Portage, which I visit every fortnight, or alternate Sunday; and a new Church is in course of erection at Petitcodiac, in the Parish of Salisbury. At this latter place, Divine service, for six months, from October (when I was ordained) to May, 1870, was held in the Town Hall every Sunday, where a good congregation assembled, chiefly made up of Dissenters. The Church-people at this place are few in number, and rather scattered, but are very earnest, and highly appreciate the opportunities which they now have of serving God in their own way.

"Since May, 1870, I have given up one Sunday in the month at the Petitcodiac Station; and, at the request of a number of people of the Church (as well as Baptists), at a place called North River, and in the same Parish (Salisbury), I now hold a monthly Sunday service. I also hold at this Station a fortnightly Tuesday evening service; and purpose doing so till the end of the year. At Havelock, where the services have always been few, and more or less irregular, I find the congregation is steadily increasing. At Portage the congregation remains about the same. This Church has been more regularly served. At Petitcodiac, where our service to very many was almost unknown, when Mr. Boyer and Mr. Medley first visited us, there is good cause for hope of better things.

"Our great want here is the want of a Church to worship in. We are, I regret to say, much in need of money to complete the building, which is externally completed, but not as yet touched inside. An exchange is made by me with the Rev. Charles Medley, so that the Holy Communion is administered at each of the Churches, once in three months. He is also always ready at my call to come for the same purpose, when the sick or the aged need him.

"Since October I have baptized (19) nineteen infants and children, and have now on my list a number more, as also some adults. There is a very great deal of work to be done here. May God bless it in my hands, and give me strength to do it."

Contributions amount to \$33.

KINGSCLEAR.—Rev. J. Black reports contributions to the amount of \$59.31.

KINGSTON.—Rev. W. E. Scovil reports \$171 as the contributions for this Mission.

LANCASTER.—Rev. W. S. Covert, in enclosing his report, states that three services are held on almost every Sunday, and about thirty miles travelled. Of the four Churches, three are in a fair state; the other may, perhaps, be repaired this summer. The Stations are of some importance, and their number might perhaps be increased with advantage, were there time for this purpose at the disposal of the Missionary.

Contributions amount to \$35.

MAUGERVILLE AND BURTON.—Rev. Richard Simonds reports contributions from Maugerville, \$44; and from Burton, \$80.50—in all \$124.50.

MONCTON.—Rev. W. N. Boyer has enclosed his returns as usual. He writes that the congregation has recently contributed \$35 towards matting and lamps for the Church. He can vouch for their good-will, and liberality, and hearty good feeling.

Contributions amount to \$77.47.

NORTON.—Rev. E. A. Warnford reports contributions to the amount of \$70.

PETERSVILLE.—Rev. Chas. R. Matthews regrets that he cannot report a larger contribution than last year. "We are," he writes, "engaged in the erection of a new Parish Church, which will be a severe tax upon our resources during this and the ensuing season. The building will cost, when completed, \$2,400. The present contract, which includes every thing but Chancel furniture and window glass, is for \$2,200. Of this, between \$1,600 and \$1,700 have been subscribed in the vicinity of the Church; and the first payment (\$550) has been made. We hope (D. V.) to enter our new place of worship next summer.

"The attendance upon the means of grace still keep up, though the exceedingly inclement Sunday weather last fall and winter rendered it somewhat below the average. In one of my out-Stations I lately changed the day of service from Wednesday to Sunday evening, and the average attendance immediately sprung from twenty-two to sixty,—crowding the little way-side School House. This is the great need of our scattered country districts—Sunday services. Weekly services, though they may serve as a partial and temporary expedient, never can fully satisfy the wants of the people. They can ill afford to spend the time which the work on their farms demands. On Sunday, the day set apart for this purpose, they have the leisure to attend; and they need the ordinance of Divine worship at least once on that day.

"In the new and far-off Station of Clarendon, the monthly services are still kept up; and I hope to give this people a Sunday service once or twice during the summer months. They meet for Divine worship as well as could be expected, considering the scattered nature of the Settlement, and the dreadful state of the roads. Out of their deep poverty they have contributed some little towards the support of gospel ministrations among them.

"I may add that I have married four couples, officiated at seven funerals, and made five hundred and eighty sick and pastoral visits during the year. Of the fruits of this labour, it scarcely becomes me to speak. I humbly hope it has been not 'in vain in the Lord.'

"At the Confirmation, last season, held by his Lordship, six young people came forward to assume for themselves the vows of their baptism. Although extremely pained at the fewness of those who offered themselves, I could not but think it better thus than that multitudes should unhesitatingly press forward to promise that which they had no serious intention to carry out.

"The Sunday School at Welsford is still sustained, with the average complement of teachers and scholars. Once a month, during the milder half of the year, I have a sermon peculiarly addressed to the children, and in a way

Contributions amount to \$42.

PORTLAND.—Rev. Canon Harrison reports contributions to the amount of \$35.41.

PRINCE WILLIAM AND DUMFRIES.—Rev. E. A. W. Hanington writes as follows:—"The past year has been full both of interest and trial to the Church in this Mission.

"'All Saints' Church, Magagnadavic, has been brought so near a completion as to be consecrated and opened for service, on the 7th of September last, by our Reverend Father in God; and I now purpose giving a brief history of this Church, and the means used in its erection.

"When we laid the foundation stone (August 13, 1868), we had no promise or expectation of a grant, or a donation, outside ourselves. We commenced working at the frame during the first week in September, 1868, with the same prospects; but the heartiness with which the work was begun, by the people themselves, was (to me) a better security than the promise of a grant from the Society. While the work was going on, I received a number of kind letters, enclosing offerings from many faithful, in reply to a circular asking for aid; and assisted thus, by the liberality of the brethren, we re-commenced the work with hopeful hearts in the following spring. The people again contributed all they were able, and again entered into the work with such earnestness and willingness that difficulties and doubts vanished like mist before the wind. The unexpected grant of £10, from the Christian Knowledge Society—the liberal gifts of money and furniture (including a set of Communion plate by the children of Ecclesfield, England), all unasked, and given as freewill offerings to God—many words of encouragement from friends when almost ready to give up—ready and willing hands to work day after day—cheerful faces and cheerful words while the work was going on—the greatest expressions of delight when the day of Consecration approached—a Church filled with those who had never expected (until little more than a year before) to have a house of God in the settlement—a large number of reverent communicants—a liberal offertory, amounting to about \$60—the delight with which the Bishop's visit was received on all sides: these are some of the pleasant recollections which cause me to forget the numerous troubles, anxieties, and days of hard and trying labour, more or less connected with every good work. The people love their Church, and so do I. They have worked hard and given liberally, and it has been an offering to Almighty God which cost something. All the seats are free; and the whole settlement meet there for worship upon equal terms. It is literally 'God's house.' We expect to finish the outside of the building this summer, and hope to have a piece of land, surrounding the Church, consecrated for the dead, when we next have the pleasure of a visit from the Bishop. . . . I have now to record an event which gave us rather more work than we would willingly have undertaken in one year. On the 13th July, and while engaged at 'All Saints,' the Parsonage house was destroyed by fire. My personal loss in furniture was not very great; but the inconvenience of *no house* was unpleasant; and the constant worry since that time has not been effaced by a month's enjoyment of a good, comfortable, and commodious house which now replaces the old one. We have asked for *no* external aid in building the house, but are not yet able to say we are quite clear of debt. . . . The regular work of the Parish (that belonging to the Priest's office) has been little different from former years, though I often fear that too great demands have been made upon my time, by the cares of building and providing the necessary funds. For the Diocesan Church Society this Mission has done what was in its power. Our subscriptions and offertory collections this year (including \$20 given by the Rector as a special offering) will amount to somewhere near \$140. This is a much larger sum than we

ever raised before, and is indeed more than double the amount contributed four years ago! A good part of this amount has been given in the Offertory, several dollars by children, and the balance in regular subscriptions. About \$13 of the amount collected in the Offertory was given for a special object, as shown in the Treasurer's books. A very large part of the collecting has been done by Thomas Jones, Esquire, who is ever more and more ready to work for Christ's Church, in whatever way he may be called upon to do so. In working at the new Mission house, his zeal and energy put to shame many younger and stronger men. In obtaining statistics for the Secretary of the Church Society, he thinks no amount of driving tiresome; and though beyond threescore and ten, he can make over forty calls for subscriptions for the Diocesan Church Society in a day, over bad roads, and be less fatigued at night than the young Missionary who accompanies him. May God long spare him to the Church on earth, and raise up many to walk in his steps. My tabular report will show the number of services, &c., &c., held during the year. The Sunday Schools are in a flourishing condition, particularly that at Magundy, under the guidance of James Henry, Esquire, who is teaching the children to respond capably, and leading them on to 'self support,' by commencing with a cent each week for the Diocesan Church Society."

QUEENSBURY.—Rev. H. W. Tippet writes as follows:—

"The subscriptions are not all gathered; but I believe they will exceed by a few dollars those of last year, and this amount added to the collections, with a small legacy of *twenty-four* dollars, left by an excellent parishioner, lately gone to his rest, and which will shortly be paid, will bring up the amount for the year from this Mission, to \$111.25. During the year, I have also had the pleasure of handing to the Treasurer, \$4.00 towards the Deficiency Fund of last year; making the gross contributions within the year, \$155.57. When I remember that this Mission is 'the least among the thousands in Israel,' I am pleased and thankful.

"The contributions, however, to myself on the other hand, have been below the average, and have not reached \$40; yet the good will and kindly regard of my Parishioners to their old parson, have never been more manifest. I sent a very full report of the resources of this Mission to the *Raising* Committee some time ago; but I think it not superfluous to say to the Executive Committee, that there is not the slightest probability of this Mission becoming self-supporting; it must be sustained as a *poor Mission*, and be a heavy charge upon the Society's funds, or be abandoned. No sane man, familiar with the number and resources of Church of England people in the Parish, could think otherwise. A self-supporting Parish must have numbers or wealth, or both—*THIS HAS NEITHER*. I found six-sevenths of the population Dissenters when I was sent here, with organized churches, and they remain so. There was also deep and wide-spread prejudices against the Church; and although these prejudices are not so strong as they were, and Dissenters (particularly the younger), mingle more with us in worship than formerly, and will contribute a quarter or half a dollar to our Diocesan Church Society when asked, and do a kind turn for the clergyman—they will do no more. Some years ago, and in the absence of any Presbyterian minister, I made an earnest effort to unite the small body of Presbyterians here with us, and they did unite for worship for some time, and combined in an effort to build a church; but *visits from ministers broke up our coalition*, and I was obliged to get money from friends at home, to complete my church, and they are weaker than ourselves now; yet, I remain, personally, on the best terms with them all. There seemed a prospect also, about twelve years ago, of our numbers being permanently increased by the immigration of several English families of the factory class, belonging to our Communion, from the United States. They took up land, and were included in our last census; but when the civil war was over, and trade revived, they all went back (with one exception).

"Since my residence here, there has been a large emigration, but not from abroad. Large numbers have come from King's County, chiefly, and settled; but, with scarcely any exception, they have been Freewill Baptists of the *hottest variety*.

"From these causes, I cannot report to the Society any probability of the Mission becoming self-supporting, or of any great increase to its funds from this source: *it must be a charge or be abandoned*.

"Permit me to say, however, that whatever you do, I hope you won't leave the Missionary who has nearly worn himself out in the Missionary work in a

poor field, to which he was sent by his superior, without any personal choice and, in which (whatever his faults), he has done his best, to spend the rest of his days with crippled means.

"During the year, my work has been done much in the same way, and has been much of the same character as in former years. Sunday services have been taken at one, two, sometimes at three places, each Sunday, according as the roads and weather have permitted, and about every other Sunday morning the Holy Communion has been administered.

"I am not favorably situated for week day services. Daytime services don't suit the people, and my churches are so distant, and the people so scattered, that I cannot have them after dark; but, in a school house, near the parsonage, I had weekly services through Lent, and have had for many years; this year they were very well attended.

"In my last Report, I mentioned the formation of a Bible class. This was continued every week for several months, and at first was well attended, but it gradually diminished in numbers, and, for the present, is discontinued.

"During the winter I had also several religious readings, with prayer, in different cottages, for the benefit of mothers with families who could not come to church on Sundays because of their domestic ties. They began at 8, and lasted for about an hour, and were, I trust, useful.

"In October, I had the pleasure of presenting a small, though very hopeful class of eight young people for confirmation, at one of my churches; after which, they all communicated, and with two exceptions, have continued to do so as opportunity served. I regret to say, that my Sunday Schools languish: when I sent my last Report, I had an excellent fellow-helper in Miss Smith, of St. Andrews, a school teacher, who took entire charge of one; but, after deeply valued services for nearly two years, she went away, and I have had no one to take her place.

"The Sunday School at the Parsonage, also is suffering; partly from greater attractions elsewhere, and partly because children of an age, needing instruction, or thinking so, are fewer.

"I have baptized two adults and seven infants, married two couples, and buried five. Amongst the last, an excellent member of the church, who, though distressingly afflicted in body, was blessed in his last illness with that Divine peace which the world cannot give. The Mission and Missionary has also suffered a very sensible loss from the removal of a long resident and respectable family, whose attachment to the church of their fathers, was tested and proved through many a trial."

RICHMOND.—Rev. J. Dinzey, reports contributions to the amount of \$30, and he writes as follows:—

"Whilst it was not expedient for me to call a special meeting of my Parishioners in aid of the funds of the Society, I am glad to be able to report contributions in excess of those for last year.

"As particulars additional to those in the 'Annual Returns,' I give the following statement:

"Burials, 5; Marriages, 6; confirmed by the Lord Bishop in September last, 28. Of those baptized, 3 were adults; and the increase in the number of baptisms this year over the last, 18. I have now to report 40 communicants as compared with 81 in returns for 1868-9.

"Of those buried, 2 were communicants—one a lady member of my congregation—and only 19 years of age—a most amiable person, and consistent church-woman, and who gave promise of great usefulness in the church. The other, a man on the borders of fifty years—one, who though baptized and confirmed in the old country, until within a couple of months of his death, utterly ignored his religious obligations. On my first visiting him, he expressed to others the inutility of my ministrations—in his own words, 'Could not see what good any clergyman could do a sick man;' but by the grace of God he was soon made to realize his condition as a dying, unpardoned sinner, and from that moment unceasing were his prayers for pardon through the merits of the adorable Redeemer.

"At his own request (after due instruction), I celebrated the Holy Communion, and administered to him the sacred memorials. He died truly penitent—full of hope—yet without presumption; an instance, I verily believe, of the Saviour's redeeming love.

"Whilst the apostolic and scriptural teachings of the church have much to contend against in the indifference of certain professed church people, and the

ignorant politico-religious bigotry of many others, I am not without comfort in the steadfastness of the *faith* manifested by not a few, and the consequent striving after holiness displayed by them in their daily life and conversation. Stress of work compelled me, some ten months since, to have an early celebration of the Holy Communion every alternate time of celebrating. I am pleased to state, that the best results have followed. The people really seem to like attending the 8.30 A. M. service; and, at no time have I had less than 15 recipients, and not unfrequently, twenty-two or three, besides others, non-communicants, who love to be there.

"Of the two churches in course of erection in my Parish, one—that at South Richmond is nearly finished; the other, at Richmond proper, has only the exterior completed; but I hope fresh efforts will soon be made to go on with the good work.

"Subscriptions are now being made in order to erect a new fence around the grave yard; and, I trust, in very few weeks to see 'God's acre' presenting a more creditable appearance.

"The work which I have thus recorded, may seem very much less than might be effected, and in a certain way, it is far short of what could have been done; but it must be remembered, that in addition to Richmond, I have the charge of a congregation in the town of Houlton, Maine; where, during the past year, 52 Sunday and 18 week day services have been given by me.

"Two months since, I wrote to the Bishop of this Diocese, requesting his Lordship to accept my resignation (stating of course, my reasons for so doing). His Lordship fully concurred with me, and gave his consent—expressing at the same time, his regret at the course I was compelled to take, and kindly intimated his approval of the work, which, by God's blessing, I have been instrumental in accomplishing in Richmond."

RICHIBUCTO.—Rev. N. A. Coster writes as follows:—

"It is with no little satisfaction that I report a considerable increase in the contributions for the Church Society over the last year; although we are here suffering from the suspension of the lumbering business, which, hitherto, has afforded employment to almost all my people. This will account (in some degree), for the smallness of the sums given; but I am sorry to say, that a few of those who should set a good example, have declined to give anything.

"A gift from the Sunday School children is a new thing at Richibucto; but there seems to be more activity in young blood than in old; for, besides this effort, our Sunday School children have, by the work of their own hands, had nearly six hundred feet of nice new fence put up in front of the Rectory."

Contributions are \$51.34, exclusive of the sum of \$84.21 paid to the Treasurer towards the Deficiency Fund.

ROTHESAY.—Mr. C. H. Fairweather reports contributions to the amount of \$38.

SACKVILLE AND DORCHESTER.—Rev. G. Goodridge Roberts reports contributions to the amount of \$290, including \$90 for the Deficiency Fund.

St. ANDREWS.—Geo. D. Street, Esquire, reports contributions as follows:—St. Andrews, \$149.65; Chamcook, \$33.81; City Camp, \$8—total, \$191.46.

Rev. F. Partridge, Assistant Minister at Chamcook, reports as follows:—"The services at Saint John's Chapel have been regularly kept up during the past year. The congregations have, as a rule, been very good. The average attendance at the Holy Communion has been twenty-three. The whole number of communicants in the Mission is forty.

"A Bible Class was held every week during last summer and fall, and until the difficulty of travelling became great in winter; some one of the members drove me in, and another brought me back. This gave the young people an interest in the Class which was very beneficial.

"By the kind efforts of G. S. Grimmer, Esquire, and other members of the congregation, many of whom gave their labour, a new fence has been erected, entirely enclosing the Church-yard. Mr. Grimmer has had the Church newly coloured inside, and kneeling boards put up; so that we now seldom see the slovenly habit of standing during prayer.

"Altogether we have great reason to be very much encouraged by the results of our work in this Mission, and trust that the Holy Spirit has furthered our humble efforts, though we may not see their fruits.

"It may be interesting to the Society to learn that, under the permission of

the Lord Bishop, it is intended to continue to hold services at 'City Camp',—an important Station on the N. B. & C. Railway, and also at a point further down the line. A Sunday School has been established at 'City Camp,' under teachers formerly instructed in the School at St. Andrews. At a service held early in the season, four children were baptized. Several sick people were visited, and after another service lately held, a collection was made in aid of the funds of the Society, which, with subscriptions received, are included in the contributions from St. Andrews."

ST. DAVID AND ST. PATRICK.—Rev. J. S. Thomson reports that the usual services have been held at the several Churches and Stations throughout the past year, with the usual regularity, and trusts that his labour has not been in vain. The baptisms in the Mission have been 23; marriages, 7; burials, 5; communicants, 45.

The contributions to the funds of the Society will much exceed the amount of any past year; and the Missionary has much pleasure in stating that he has paid into the hands of the Treasurer \$40 sent by Mr. Charles Carson, of St. Patrick, for the purpose of making him a life member in the Society, the interests of which he has ever desired to promote."

ST. GEORGE AND PENNFIELD.—Rev. R. E. Smith writes as follows:—"I have nothing of special note to report. As a rule, I have held three services on Sunday, a Friday evening service every week, besides attending to three Stations on week-days. Sick visitations, especially during the spring, have been of very frequent occurrence. I have had the privilege, many times during the year, of comforting the hearts of the sick and the aged, who were unable to come to Church, by administering to them the emblems of the body and blood of our dear Redeemer.

"The Rectory, a very handsome building, is now near completion; collecting for this has conflicted with contributions for the Diocesan Church Society.

"The Offertory system has worked admirably. This will form the most efficient means in supplying the deficiency in the Clergyman's salary, caused by the gradual withdrawal of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. My Parishioners are staunch upholders of the Diocesan Church Society, and ask for corresponding consideration in the arranging of the Missionary Schedule. Our contributions will amount to at least \$150, and I hope more. I am still collecting.

"Our Sunday School at St. George is doing a good work. For the past two years one has been established in Pennfield during the summer months.

"In Pennfield we have procured a new font, and hope to have the internal arrangements of the Church entirely changed. His Lordship was kind enough to present the Church, in this place, with a pair of Alms' Basins, and also contributed generously towards the font.

"Number of baptisms, 40; burials, 24; marriages, 5; average number attending Holy Communion, 45."

ST. JAMES.—Rev. W. Armstrong reports contributions to the amount of \$150.

ST. MARK.—Mr. C. H. Fairweather reports contributions to the amount of \$349.36.*

ST. MARY'S, &C.—Rev. W. Jaffrey reports contributions to the amount of \$70.02, besides \$40 in aid of the Deficiency Fund.

SHEDIAC.—Rev. G. S. Jarvis, D. D., reports contributions, including those from Dundas and Wellington, amounting to \$75.35; which, he writes, is considerably beyond the amount contributed in any previous year.

ST. PAUL'S, PORTLAND.—Rev. W. H. DeVeber reports contributions to the amount of \$559.55.

SIMONDS.—Rev. Geo. Schofield has enclosed the following report:—"During the last year I have been enabled to attend all my services without being hindered (except on one or two Sundays) by weather or sickness. The congregations have been good, and I trust the Divine blessing has been bestowed.

"Last autumn I commenced a fortnightly service at Drury's Cove, about four miles from St. John. The Rev. W. H. DeVeber has kindly engaged to officiate on each alternate Sunday, so that we have service there every Sunday afternoon.

* To this is to be added the contribution of "A Member of the Congregation" of \$100, after the Anniversary Meeting.

"H. W. Frith, Esq., having gone to reside in the neighbourhood, commenced a Sunday School, and invited my help. There are about one hundred people in the Settlement, but nearly half of these are Roman Catholics. They are all employed by E. D. Jewett, Esquire, of St. John. Messrs. Streak & Wetmore are in charge of the establishment; and they are Churchmen. Already a School House has been built, and paid for. It is used for a Day School during the week; and on Sunday afternoon, Mr. Frith, assisted by three teachers, occupies it with his Sunday School.

"Next year I hope this congregation will do their duty to the Church Society. I am sure it is not only their duty, but their privilege, to give of their own proper goods towards the support of the Church, in all its operations. And if all our people will give according to their ability, God will give His blessing."

Contributions reported by Mr. Schofield as amounting to \$112.51, including the sum of \$16.32 for the Deficiency Fund.

ST. STEPHEN.—Rev. E. S. Medley reports contributions to the amount of \$20. He writes as follows:—"The late Rector of this Parish (Dr. Thomson), received £156 stg. from Society for Propagation of the Gospel; and for many years, up to the time of his death, his assistant was supported by a grant of \$200 from the Diocesan Church Society. The expenses of services, &c., in the Parish Church were defrayed by pew-rents, and about \$100 per annum subscribed voluntarily towards the Curate's salary. For the five years since his death (in 1865) no grant has been made to his successor, and the usual aid towards a Curate withdrawn. The present Rector, during these five years, has received on an average \$500 per annum from the Glebe rents, and about \$300 per annum in voluntary offerings from the Parishioners. For one year the Rector, obtaining the assistance of the Rev. J. H. Saturley, paid him \$400 out of his own salary of \$800. Three services on the Lord's Day, and training of the Sunday School, besides celebration on the Holy Days, have been kept up without interruption, except when the Rector was absent on sick leave from overwork. Occasional services and ministrations were also given to the adjoining unserved Parish of St. James, and other distant parts of the Parish of St. Stephen.

"Fifty persons have been confirmed during these five years. The Holy Eucharist is celebrated weekly at the Parish Church and on the Holy Days; and the number of communicants has steadily increased.

"A new Church was built, with free sittings, before Dr. Thomson's death, and a debt of \$5,000 contracted. During the last five years nearly one half of this debt has been paid off. Besides the quarterly offertories for the Rector's salary, the ordinary expenses of the Church have been defrayed by the weekly offertory. Last autumn the heavy gale destroyed the Bell tower of the Church, and otherwise seriously injured the fabric. The necessary repairs have been made, and paid for, amounting to upwards of \$200, and the bell re-erected in a suitable Bell cot; new Altar Plate has also been provided; \$200 has been paid towards a new furnace in the Church.

"Under these serious obligations our Churchmen feel that, in the absence of any aid from the Society, they are unable to assist other Missions in the Diocese, through the Diocesan Church Society. A few persons, however, desire to give something towards its funds, and \$20 are forwarded—\$18 of which are from the Rector, \$1 from the Curate, and the balance the proceeds of an Offertory in the Church."

SUSSEX.—Rev. C. S. Medley has forwarded the following report:—"The past year began somewhat gloomily to this Mission, in common with every country Mission in the Diocese; but I am deeply thankful to say the cloud, as far as we are concerned, has proved to be merely the temporary obscurer of warmth and sunshine. In October last the Bishop ordained Deacon, at St. Paul's Church, Havelock, the Rev. Cuthbert Willis, who has since that time been labouring under no slight difficulties, with much zeal, energy, and discretion. The removal of a portion, the most distant portion, of a Mission which was altogether too large for one man to look after, has been to me a great relief, and to the people a blessing which they fully appreciate. Mr. Willis will, I have no doubt, tell his own tale, and therefore I need not trouble you with any account of work done in this new Mission. The Parish of Studholm has been placed under my charge, and with a little strain of strength I find I am able to give them three Sunday services in every four weeks, and one week-day service in the week following the Sunday on which the Church is closed. The congregation at Studholm is remarkable steady, although it does not increase as rapidly

as I expected. Church people in this large Parish are few and far between; but the zeal of the few was shown at our Easter meeting, when a proposition was made to replace the Church, which is much out of repair, by a new one; and I hope very shortly we shall set about this work in earnest. A Sunday School was opened in Studholm a short time ago, under the superintendence of Mr. W. T. Peters, which will I trust do good. The returns for the Diocesan Church Society this year will, I think, at least double those of last.

At the Parish Church, Sussex, and at Dutch Valley, the services are the same as last year, except an occasional week-day service at Dutch Valley. The congregations at the Parish Church are increasing, and the collections in Church, which are now given to me, amounted last year to \$190, which is more than double the subscriptions paid during the previous year. The collections in Church for the Diocesan Church Society, I am thankful to say, have also been largely increased, and I take this as a hopeful sign; for I generally find when people can be persuaded to give in return for spiritual blessings, they value the blessings more highly. We have lately had a visit from a deputation on behalf of the Diocesan Church Society, whose addresses were earnest and full of information. I regret exceedingly, however, that the season of the year chosen for their visit was not more opportune. Our meetings were called in the midst of the planting of potatoes, and in consequence very few people could be gathered together. Some fruit, however, appeared at the time—the collections amounting to \$15.17, and more fruit is being yielded now in the annual subscriptions, which I trust will be doubled this year.

"I would suggest that a mixed deputation of Clergy and laity should be appointed yearly by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, whose duty it should be to make a general tour of the Diocese during the autumn and winter seasons. A large increase would be gained to the funds of the Society by this means, and much necessary information might be given about the workings of the Society. I enclose an abstract of my work, from June 1st, 1869, to June 1st, 1870."

Contributions amount to \$292.14; to this is to be added \$20 from the Rector in aid of the Deficiency Fund.

SPRINGFIELD AND JOHNSTON.—Rev. G. Rogers reports contributions to the amount of \$138.75. During the last seven years, the contributions from this Mission have steadily increased from \$80 to the present amount: "A pretty sure index," Mr. Rogers adds, "of the growth of interest in our Diocesan Church Society."

TRINITY.—Mr. H. Lawrance Sturdee, Secretary of this Committee, reports that the contributions amount at present to \$250.

UPHAM, HAMMOND, AND ST. MARTINS.—Rev. S. Jones Hanford writes:—"I am thankful to be able to report that the total annual contributions from this Mission will be greater than those of last year; notwithstanding the \$43.25 paid in last autumn towards the Deficiency Fund."

"While, of course, we must acknowledge that we might generally do more for the Church than we have hitherto done, yet I cannot hold out any strong hopes that we shall soon get much, if any, beyond our present year's contributions, or thereabouts. As will be seen, our total is made up of small sums, gathered from many persons, scattered over a wide field, and requiring considerable time for its collection. Nevertheless, we must work on in faith, as diligent labourers in the Lord's vineyard, and ever looking for His blessing, whereby alone we shall set forth His glory, and set forward the salvation of those committed to our charge."

The contributions amount to \$148.84; which, in addition to the \$43.25 to the Deficiency Fund last autumn, makes a total of \$192.09 for the year.

WELLINGTON AND DUNDAS.—Rev. A. H. Weeks reports contributions to the amount of \$28.50, which are included in the returns from Shediac.

"Several communicants," Mr. Weeks writes, "have, since my last report, been lost by removal or death; five have been added to our number. There has been a considerable expenditure in putting a fence around the Church-yard in Cocaigne, for the purchase of a Melodeon, and necessary furniture for the interior of the Church."

WESTFIELD.—Rev. E. S. Woodman reports contributions amounting to \$90.

WESTMORLAND.—Rev. D. M. Bliss fears that the contributions will not be as much as last year. "The people," Mr. Bliss adds, "sustained heavy loss in the destruction of the dykes last fall, which will retard the building of the new Church."

WOODSTOCK.—Rev. S. D. Leo Street writes as follows:—"But little has occurred in this Mission, since the last meeting of the Diocesan Church Society of much interest to the Society, beyond the usual routine of parochial work, which has been regularly carried on by the Curate and myself; and I am thankful to say, that by the blessing of God, I have been enabled to take my usual share of the Sunday work. But a large portion of the parochial work necessarily falls upon the Curate, Rev. Thomas Neales, who, I am pleased to say, is proving himself a most efficient laborer in the Lord's Vineyard; he has undertaken some additional work in two of the adjoining settlements, where he is doing good service; of this, no doubt, he will give a satisfactory report to the Society. Mrs. Neales still continues to give her valuable aid in the Sunday School, and has assisted also in obtaining contributions to the Diocesan Church Society."

"I have, with the valuable assistance of the Church Warden, Charles W. Raymond, Esq., been engaged in accomplishing an object which has long engaged my thoughts; that is, to have the Pew System abandoned, and the seats in St. Luke's Church made free and open to all, as they ever ought to be in God's House. All but one of the Pew owners have given their written assent to this arrangement, and we hope to commence with the Free Seat System on the first Sunday in July. I trust, by this means, the congregation will be much larger, and the revenue of the Church greater than under the Pew System."

"The contributions to the Diocesan Church Society, from this Mission, will exceed those of last year, though they will fall far short of what I earnestly wished them to be. We have, I am sorry to say, lost the usual liberal contribution from Norris Best, Esq., who has been obliged to close the Iron Works and leave Woodstock. His failure is sincerely regretted, and a serious loss to the Church; as he has been ever forward in her aid and support. The Church Society, not only loses his liberal contribution, but also the smaller amounts from many of those who were in his employ."

"I may be excused in naming a few members of my congregation who have largely added to the usual amount of their annual contributions: Charles W. Raymond, Esq., \$20; Messrs. George and John Ketchum, \$14; James Grover, Esq., \$15. Many others have added something to their last year's subscription, but none to the extent that these gentlemen have done. I may remark also, that they are among the most liberal contributors to the local wants of the Church. I mention these instances as proofs of what can be done, where the heart and will are rightly engaged in the cause of Christ's Church; and, I feel confident, that were the members of the Church throughout the Diocese, actuated by the same spirit, ample means would easily be provided to meet all the requirements of the Church."

"During the year ending 1st July, 1870, there have been—Baptisms, 35; Marriages, 12; Burials, 8—by the Curate and myself."

"The amount contributed by the parishioners during the past year, for Church purposes, was \$900; contributions reported, \$315.75."

"Rev. Thomas Neales, Curate of Woodstock, has forwarded a return of the work done by him in this important Mission. He writes as follows:—"I keep a horse, which, though it entails no little expense, enables me to accomplish a greater amount of Missionary work than I could without it. This expense, during the past season, has been much reduced by the kindness of some members of the congregation who presented me with a good supply of oats. This, together with household provisions, formed a New Year's Donation, amounting to nearly \$50, which was as kind as it was unexpected."

"With regard to Jacksontown, owing to various circumstances, the work of the Missionary is subject to much disappointment."

"At Oak Mountain Settlement, in order to procure as much as possible for the Society, with the help of C. H. Bull, Esq., I collected subscriptions in oats, which amounted to \$16.50 instead of \$3.60, for the previous year. At this place, which is near the N. B. & Canada Railway, about twelve miles from Woodstock, I have had Monthly services as regularly as the weather permitted."

"In November last, I held my first services at the McEllroy Settlement, about 13 miles from Woodstock, near the McAdam Mills, and have kept my monthly appointments as regularly as possible."

From the foregoing Reports, it may be seen on what the Society has to rely for the present year, in the way of contributions to its various objects.

The amount at present reported, is \$6,956.40* ; to which is expected considerable additions will yet be made. This is at least, \$1500 more than the amount reported on a similar occasion last year, and, with a few exceptions, it does not include the sum of \$2145.77, specially raised for the Deficiency Fund. But that which may be gathered in some degree, from these Reports, of far more importance than the pecuniary offerings, is this,—the labor which is being carried on—a very dim outline of which can be given in any Report. For every day, and week, and year, through the agency of this Society, by its devoted Missionaries, and the means which they originate and carry on, there is a work being done for Christ, and for his Church ; and the payment of the actual expenses incurred, and in many instances, scarcely that, is the only earthly visible remuneration.

In carrying out its holy objects by this Society, mistakes incident to all human agencies, may have been made. Imperfections may be found when they are diligently looked for. Still, amid many difficulties, and trials, and labors of past years, this Society has very good reason to comfort itself with the assurance, that its work has been acknowledged and blessed by the great Head of the Church.

A full account of all its dealings and transactions is yearly published in the Reports. There is nothing to conceal. The fullest investigation is invited, as well as any suggestion for changes and improvement, open to any member of the Society, to make in accordance with its constitution.

The question will then be asked, till it reaches the ears and conscience of every member of the Church in this Diocese,—why cannot this Society receive in every Parish, that full, hearty support, to which, before God, it is clearly entitled ? Difference of opinion may exist in many matters of importance, but no such difference need surely interfere with united action among the members of the Church for its maintenance, and its extension, and the spread of the knowledge of the salvation of Christ to a dying world.

* To this is to be added amount of collections at Anniversary Meeting, \$94.50, and the sum of \$20 by "A Friend," through the Secretary ; making in all \$7,970.90. Some additions to this may still be expected.

AUDITORS' REPORT.

The Auditors beg to report that they have examined the Accounts of the Treasurer, for the year ending 31st May, comprising—

- 1st. A General Account of total Receipts and Expenditure.
- 2nd. An Account of Income and Expenditure, excluding transactions relating to Loans and Investments; and a statement of amount received on the Deficiency Fund.
- 3rd. A General Account of monies received and held for investment.
- 4th. Treasurer's Account of monies received for investment during the year.
- 5th. A statement of Special Funds.
- 6th. A statement of S. J. Scovil's Account.

All of which have been found correct.

The cash-receipts for the year from all sources, as appears by the first account, are \$27,241 00
The total payments in all accounts, have been 26,142 37

Leaving a balance in the Treasurer's hands of \$1,098 62

Of this balance a portion has arisen from difference between monies received for investments, during the year, and actual re-investments made, as appears by Account No. 4, \$633 23

A further portion belongs to Special Funds, as per Account No. 5, 448 14

Remainder belongs to Income and Expenditure Account, 19 28
\$1,098 62

The Auditors believe it would simplify the Accounts (as far as Special Funds are concerned), either to expend the income arising from investments for special purposes, or to re-invest it for the several objects.

At the time of the resignation of the late Treasurer, S. J. Scovil, Esq., he was in debt to the Society the sum of \$3,078 27
During the year ending 31st May, 1869, he paid on account, 867 50

Leaving balance due, \$2,210 77

Of this amount the sum of \$1,429.10 was difference between amounts of mortgages and other securities paid into his hands, and re-investments made by him; and consequently belonged to Loan and Investment Account. The balance, \$1,281.67, was due to Ordinary Income and Expenditure Account. In the present year's Accounts, this debt, \$1,281.67, has been transferred from Income and Expenditure Account, to Loan and Investment Account; and the whole of Mr. Scovil's indebtedness is treated as an investment. It bears interest, and is in course of liquidation.

The Secretary read certain applications for grants to this Committee.

On motion of Mr. W. M. Jarvis, the following Resolution was proposed:

Resolved, 1. That it is desirable that the Missionary Schedule of this Society should be remodelled upon principles which may encourage the established Missions to become gradually self-supporting; and that, to attain this object, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including grants for Missionary services strictly as such, or stipends secured to any of the elder Clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth, after such reasonable time as the General Committee may think proper, be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the Missionary's stipend.

To this it was moved in amendment, by Mr. R. F. Hazen, that the Resolutions prepared by Mr. Jarvis, be received, and entered upon the Minutes, and be referred to a Committee to report thereon, at the next meeting of this Committee.

This amendment was lost, and the original Resolution was carried in the affirmative.

It was also, on motion of Mr. W. M. Jarvis—

Resolved, 2. That it is desirable that, as has been heretofore accustomed, the distribution of the funds at the disposal of this Society should be made by the General Committee on the report of a sub-Committee acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop; and that such Committee be known as the Schedule Committee, and do consist of the Treasurer and Secretary of the Society, *ex-officio*, and of three Clergymen and five lay members of the General Committee, to be chosen on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member, by two members of the General Committee.

Several members of the Committee were then duly nominated and the vote was taken by ballot.

On motion, the Committee adjourned, to meet to-morrow, at 2 o'clock, P. M.; and it was resolved that the Schedule Committee do then present their Report.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, July 6th, 1870.

The Committee met at 2 o'clock.

Read Minutes of the last meeting.

The Secretary read some further reports from certain Local Committees.

The Hon. Mr. Justice Allen, from the Schedule Committee, presented a Report, which he read, embracing the following statement of available funds for the current year:—

Grant Society for the Propagation of the Gospel,	:	\$11,800 00 cy.
Interest on Investments for general purposes,	:	1,000 00
Estimated income of the Society,	:	6,700 00
		<u>\$19,500 00</u>

It was recommended that the stipends be now granted for three quarters, ending the 1st January next, nearly the same as last year, and that the fourth quarter be granted agreeably to the terms of the Resolutions submitted by the Committee. Grants to certain new Missions were recommended.

The Committee regretted that, from the state of the funds of the Society, they could not recommend the applications for aid to the building of Churches.

On motion of the Rev. W. Cruden, it was resolved that the Report be received.

On motion of Mr. W. M. Jarvis the following Resolutions were passed, and the annexed Scheme and Regulations were proposed and adopted.

An amendment in clause C, Resolution 4, was moved by the Rev. J. Pearson, seconded by the Hon. Capt. Robinson Owen, to substitute at B. the following words: "B. Of withdrawal of the stipend paid through the Society the 1st January next, unless the engagement be meantime completed."

This amendment was decided by the meeting in the negative.

the several Missions for the first three quarters of the ensuing year, (i. e., 1st July, 1st October, and 1st January) shall be made, so nearly as may be, on the general principle heretofore followed, but for the remaining quarter of the year shall be conditional on the contribution by the Mission of a stated sum towards the Missionary's stipend, according to such classification as may be adopted by the Executive Committee, on the report of such Schedule Committee.

And that the Schedule Committee be directed to return specially to the Executive Committee all Missions in which are stationed any Clergymen whose salaries may, in the opinion of the Committee, be secured to them on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life, specifying at the same time into what class the Mission should pass in the case of the death of any such Clergymen within the year.

Resolved, 4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing Resolutions, and subject to the following regulations:

(a.) The several Missionaries shall draw for the quarter's stipend falling due 1st July, 1st October, and 1st January, as heretofore, the amount so as aforesaid granted for such quarters' stipends.

(b.) The Schedule Committee (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop) shall forthwith, after this meeting, communicate with the Wardens or other lay members of the Church in each Mission, requiring them to enter into engagement (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Mission.

(c.) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Schedule Committee before the 1st of September next, they shall report the case to the Executive Committee, and communicate with the Missionary, requiring him, upon the order of the Lord Bishop, to give each of his congregations notice (B) of withdrawal of services as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Society on 1st January next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(d.) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Committee before the 1st of January

next, the services supported in the Mission by the grant through this Society shall, by order of the Lord Bishop, be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof: provided, that should the Missionary see fit to resign his cure, he may be stationed for the remainder of the year by the Lord Bishop in any vacant Mission which may be willing to comply with the terms required of the defaulting Mission, and shall be entitled in respect of the services to be rendered in such new Mission to such stipend as may be agreed upon between such Missionary and the Schedule Committee, not exceeding that provided for the continuation of his services in his former Mission, and upon the like terms and conditions. Provided also, that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Executive Committee, on special application, to draw on 1st April for a sum in their discretion; but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(e.) Where such engagement is entered into, the Committee shall forthwith notify the Missionary, who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society, on the 1st April, for the full amount of salary in the class in which his Mission is placed, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission itself.

(f.) The sum required of the Mission shall in such case be remitted by the Wardens quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, and may consist either of money or written receipts of the Missionary, for produce furnished to him at the market rates: provided that two months grace (but no more) may be allowed the Mission to make up such sum; that is to say, the sum required for the quarter of the ensuing year, ending 1st April, shall be remitted before the 1st March, and for the following quarter before the 1st June, 1871.

(g.) Should the Missionary give any such written receipts for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him, after he shall be debited with such receipts in the Treasurer's books.

(h.) Should the sum required from the Parish not be remitted, as aforesaid, the Treasurer shall forthwith, on the expiration of the two months' grace, by the order of the

Lord Bishop, give notice (C) to the Missionary, requiring him to give notice (D) of withdrawal of services as such Missionary, and all such services at the Mission shall be thereupon withdrawn, pursuant to such notice; and unless the sum agreed to be paid for the quarter shall be forthwith remitted, no stipend shall be payable for such expired quarter beyond the amount agreed to be contributed on the part of the Society; and none whatsoever for the succeeding quarter; and the Committee shall appoint a deputation to enquire into the causes of such default, and shall report thereon at the next meeting of the General Committee: provided that in any case, on a Mission ceasing to be in default, though after the period for withdrawal of services shall have arrived, such Mission may be re-instated by the Schedule Committee, if they shall see fit to do so, under the regulations and conditions herein contained; and provided also, that nothing herein is intended to affect or interfere with the duties of any Rector in the performance of the services as required of him by law.

(j.) In the case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Committee shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

(k.) It shall be optional with the Schedule Committee to permit any Mission to make a quarterly, half-yearly, or yearly payment, at any period in advance, and also to permit any Mission to adopt the classification established for the last quarter of the ensuing year at any earlier quarter on satisfactory engagements being made for the payment of the sum required from such Mission; and these regulations, *mutatis mutandis*, shall thereupon apply, generally, to any such Mission.

(l.) The action of the Schedule Committee shall be under the supervision of the Executive Committee of the Society, who shall have power to make further regulations for their guidance.

DEPUTATIONS.

Resolved, 5. That the Schedule Committee, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, shall appoint deputations of Clergymen and laymen for each Deanery, which each depu-

tation shall visit, for the purpose of holding Missionary meetings in the several Missions, and taking up collections thereat (not interfering, however, with the usual semi-annual collections, and annual canvass of the Mission on behalf of the Society); and further, of making enquiries as to the power of the Mission to contribute towards the Clergyman's support; such deputations reporting to the Schedule Committee, and through them to the General Committee of the Society.

PERMANENT SCHEME, ETC.

Resolved, 6. That the Schedule Committee, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, may further appoint special deputations to enquire into the causes of any deficiency of contributions or other pecuniary difficulties in any Mission, and shall have power to call for any returns they may think proper from any of the Parishes receiving aid from or through the Society; and do report at the next Annual Meeting of the General Committee of the Society a Scheme and Missionary Schedule for permanent adoption; and be requested to publish such their Report, and transmit by post a copy addressed to each Missionary and the Church Wardens of each Mission to be affected thereby before the first day of April next; it being expressly understood that these Resolutions are to continue in force only until the adoption of a permanent system by the General Committee, upon receiving the Report of such Committee.

Resolved, 7. That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these Resolutions to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, requesting their concurrence therein.

Notice is hereby given of the following proposed alterations in the Constitution of the Diocesan Church Society, to be moved at the next meeting of the General Committee:

1. That there be a new article VIII as follows:

(SCHEDULE COMMITTEE.)

There shall also be a Schedule Committee to be composed of the following members, viz:

The President, Treasurer and Secretary, or Secretaries of the Society *ex officio*.

1. Three Clerical and five lay members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member by two members of the General Committee.

2. The Schedule Committee shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect; and the appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Resolution, Bye-Laws or Regulations of the General Committee.

3. Five members of the Schedule Committee, three of whom shall be laymen, shall be a quorum.

4. The Schedule Committee shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

(The numbers of the present articles, VIII to XIV, to be altered in accordance with the insertion of the foregoing.)

2. Also the following addition to article VII:

4. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or, in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but so far as may be, alternately at Saint John and Fredericton.

3. Also the following addition to article XIII:

4. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meetings for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two thirds of the members present; and to determine by like vote, the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held. Provided that in every such case, a report of such adjournment and the causes therefor shall be made at the Anniversary meeting.

Mr. Sidney Smith, gives notice that at the next Annual Meeting of the General Committee, he, or some person for him, will move to alter Article III., of the Constitution of the Society, so that notice of any alteration or amendment in the Constitution of the Society, may be given either at the next previous Annual Meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary Meeting.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 1870.

The Minutes of this Committee, the Meeting of which was held at Fredericton on the 2nd of July, 1869, will be found in the 34th Report, page 52.

Its next Meeting was held in St. John on the 5th October, when the Chairman of the Loan Committee reported as follows:—

That the Miller Mortgage had not been paid, and was not likely to be at present, being a second Mortgage on property scarcely of sufficient value for both; that Mr. Mryshraill, of Fredericton—a third Mortgagee—offered to buy the Society's Mortgage, on which there was about \$745 due, for \$700, and the Loan Committee recommended the sale. It was ordered that if the sale be completed to the satisfaction of the Loan Committee, the Society's Mortgage be assigned under the seal of the Society.

The Treasurer submitted a memorandum of his account.

It was ordered that the account of Messrs. Barnes & Co., amounting to \$161 for printing the annual Report be paid, and also a bill of \$1.60 for notices.

The Committee met at Fredericton on the 5th January, 1870, when it was ordered that Mr. Cropley's bill for Circulars amounting to \$2.60, be paid.

The Treasurer's Account made up to 31st Dec., 1869, was submitted.

It was resolved that the Treasurer be requested to publish in the *Church Chronicle* and *Church Witness*, an abstract statement of the finances of the Society, showing the amount of the Deficiency Fund, the amount to be withdrawn by the Society for Propagation of the Gospel, and the sum required for 1870; and it was further resolved that 1,000 copies of such abstracts be distributed throughout the Diocese, under the direction of the Secretary.

The following Resolution was adopted:—

Whereas, The present state of the funds of the Society, and unoccupied fields in the Diocese, demand increased exertions,—the Lord Bishop, as President of the Society, be respectfully requested to appoint and authorize a deputation to co-operate with the Parochial Clergy, in order to

promote the interests of the Society for the work of the Church in this Diocese.

On the 2d March, 1870, the Committee met in St. John.

An abstract of the Treasurer's Accounts was submitted.

The Loan Committee was authorized to obtain in advance such a loan as may be required to pay the appropriations due on the 1st April, 1870.

The Secretary reported to the Committee that the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge are willing to dispose of Prayer Books, at a reduced rate, to any Agent appointed by this Committee, and that Messrs. J. & A. McMillan are willing to import the books to be disposed of to the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese; it was therefore resolved that Messrs. McMillan be approved of as suitable persons to undertake such importation, and be recommended to the said Society for that purpose.

The following accounts were ordered to be paid:—

The Secretary for incidental expenses from July, 1869, to this date, \$11.95.

Messrs. J. & A. McMillan's account for blank forms, papers, account books, &c., furnished for the use of the Treasurer, \$41.23.

It was also resolved that the following gentlemen do form a Committee to make arrangements, with the concurrence of the Lord Bishop, for the General Meetings of the Society in July next:—Mr. W. M. Jarvis, Rev. W. H. Tilley, Messrs. T. W. Daniel, Hurd Peters, and G. A. Schofield, together with the Treasurer and Secretary.

At a meeting of this Committee at Fredericton, on the 1st June, this present report was read, and it was ordered to be laid before the General Committee.

The Treasurer submitted a statement of his Accounts, made up to the close of the fiscal year, shewing a balance in hand for all purposes of \$1,098.63.

Mr. Jarvis presented the following report from the Loan Committee:—

It is proposed to invest this balance, with some other monies, amounting in
 all to about \$800, now lying in the Bank of New Brunswick, in a Debenture, as
 soon as a suitable one can be had. There are now only three mortgages re-
 maining, held by the Society. Of these, two—Maclauchlan's and Douglass —
 are excellent securities, and the interest on them is paid regularly; the third,
 Plant's, your Committee recommend should be collected as promptly as possi-
 ble, there being a large arrear of interest due on it.

The Committee have also received from the Executors of James Wheten, de-
 ceased, late of Richibucto, at different times, during the past year, on account
 of the legacy left by him for the use and benefit of the Rector of Richibucto,
 &c., the sum of \$1,520, of which \$1,200 was invested in November last in County
 "Gaol" Debentures, at 2 per cent. premium,—making \$1,224; and the remain-
 ing \$296 is in the Bank of New Brunswick, waiting a suitable investment.

The Society's investments now amount to \$18,416; to which, if the balance
 of Mr. Scovil's debt—\$2,452 87—be added, the total is \$20,868 87.

The Treasurer was requested to prepare, and have printed, for the use of the General Committee, 100 copies of an abstract of his Account, and to add thereto an abstract statement of the returns made by the Clergy to the Chairman of the Schedule Committee, appointed in July, 1868, with names of those Parishes from which no returns were received.

The Secretary was requested to send a Circular to every Clergyman and to the Church Wardens of every Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the Diocesan Church Society, requesting a statement of the local resources of such Parishes, to be sent in before the 24th June inst.

The Lord Bishop informed the Committee that the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel will grant in aid of the Missions in this Diocese, for 1871, £2,430 stg., and that in the case of the death of any of the older Missionaries, his stipend would be reduced to at least one half the present amount.

The Committee met at Saint John, the day after the Anniversary Meeting, July 8th, 1870.

It was resolved that 3,000 copies of the Annual Report be printed, and that the Rev. W. H. DeVeber, the Rev. Dr. Lee, Mr. G. S. Smith, Mr. W. Carman, and the Secretary be a Committee to attend to that duty.

It was resolved that a Special Committee, consisting of the Lord Bishop, Mr. G. S. Smith, Mr. B. L. Peters, and Mr. W. M. Jarvis, be appointed to superintend the publication of the Judgment of the Court in the case of Saint George's Church *vs.* Congle, or such portions of it as may refer to the Status of the Church in this Diocese.

It was resolved that the Rev. W. Scovil, Mr. W. M. Jarvis, Mr. B. L. Peters, Mr. G. Sidney Smith, Mr. W. Carman, and the Treasurer, do form the Loan Committee for the ensuing year.

It was, on motion, resolved that the Committee on Arrangement for the meetings be authorized to draw on the Treasurer for the amount of the expense incurred at the late meetings.

An account of the Secretary for postage and other expenses, up to this date, amounting to \$5.65, was ordered to be paid.
