On motion by Bro. Baker, seconded by Bro. Kelly, a vote of thamks was tendered to the Pastor and Trustees of the Methodist Chureh, but deelining to avept the offertory as not being in Reeping with Masonic custom.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, The Proceedings of the Eleventh Annual Commmication were confirmed and accepted as presented in the printed pamphlet form alrealy distributed amongst the members of the Fraternity of this and foreign jurisdictions.

## FRATERNAI، DEAD.

As we look back to the experionees of the past year, it is but matural that we should first recur to the vaemodes which Death has made in our ranks, mad though through the merey of Divine providence our death-roll is short, mombering only eight or nine in this jurisdietion, the names of those to whose merits we have paid the last sad tribute of respect will bong remain green in our memory, notably those of Brother Laing, Vietoria-Cohmbia Lodige, No, 1, and Brother Oasterhout, of Vameonver-Quadra Lodge, No. 2, ohd and resperted brethren amongst us, who, though well striken in vears, ahays set a bright example to their younger brethren, being very enthusastic Masons, and ever attentive to the duties of their Loolge ; alsos that of Bro. Sidney Thomas Framklyn, a member of Victoria-Cohmbia Lodge, No. 1, who finished his earthly hator on the egth of April, deing nobly at the post of duty in the effort to save the lives of his fillow ereatures on the oceasion of the burning of the steamer "(irap)pler". We have also to lament the loss of two Past Grand Otticers of this jurisdiction, viz., Bro. E. Brown, lest Gmud Warden, and Bro. P. J. Hall, Past Grand Tyler. I shouhd therefore revommend that suitable memorial pages be inserted in our printed procedings, and aloo that the Very Worshipful inand sucretary be instructed to prorure a suitable printing block for that purpose, as hitherto our memorial pages have presented mother a mean amb poor apparance.

## VISITATIONS.

Brethren, this I consider one of the most pleasant duties of a Gmad Master, and which I have fultilled to the best of my ability, and though not having reaciled Cariboo Loolge, No. 4, or Mount hermon Lodge, No. 7 , have visited all the others.

On the enth of the same month I had the pleasure of fisiting Vancouver-quadra Lodge, No. $\because$, acompanied her several members of (emand Jorlge, where we witnessed the Blectuon of Oticers for the ensuing Masonie vear. 'Tberecords and acomonts were reported as being very eorreetly kept, and their work is among the best done in the lrovince.

The ammal Re-mion on the lith of Jamary, 1883, was a grame sureessamd will long be remembered as one of the most pleasing Masonic gatherings ever held in our juriselietion.

On the enth of Mareh, 1883 , acempanied by a large momber of Brethren from Vieforia, I had the pleasure of visiting Union Lander, No. 9, New Westminster, where we met with a most cordial and fraternal weleome. 'The aftairs of this Lotge are improving and show signs of great zeal on the part of many of the members. The FellowCratt Dexree was ably eonferverl on a Brother of this Loolge by the Worshipful Master; assisted by Bro. Past Master Hughes, after which we were invited to a banquet such as I have seddom seren equalled amd never surpassed by any Lompe in the province.

The year 188 will long te remembered in the amals of our Prorince with pleasure, on aceount of the visit of His Excellemey the Govermor-(xeneral of Camba, Marguis of Lorne, aceompanied hy Her Royal Highmess the l’rineess Lonise, a danghter of our heloved Quéen, amd as you are well aware the loyalty of the Craft is proverbial, the oreasion was not one to be negle ered, being the first visit of a member of the Royal Family of England to our shores, I therefore at the request of several members of (irand Lodge, on the end of Octoher, 18se, appointed a committee to draft an adrese of welcome to our illustrious visitoms, and to report to the Board of Gencral Purposes at its next regular meeting, full particulars of which will doubtless be laid before you in the report of the Board.

On the 10th of October, agremble to resolution passed at last session of Grand Lodge, I appointed a special committee to eollect all alicts and resolutions having the force and effecet of law, revise the Gand Lodge Register and Constitution, and proform other duties as specified in said resolntion. I min informed the Committee have mot completed their labors, but will doubtless havea report to lay before you during the present session.

And here, Brethren, I should like to extend the fratermal sympathy of this Grand Lodge to our Brethren in some of the neighboring States, vi\%., Ohio, Iadiama, Kentucky and Illinois, where storms and floods have heen unprecedented in the loss of property and many valuable lives, and to assure them it is with deep regret we read of their misfortunes.

## RECOMNITION.

The recognition of this Grand Lodge by the Most Worshipfiul Grand Lodge of Seotland has so far progressed that the Grand Committee have recommended the matter for consideration in their Gramd Lodge, and have also recommended the exchange of Representatives, and named Brother Edward Savage, Provincial Grand Master, Aberdeen City Province, to be our Representative near their Grand Lodgo. I have therefore enused a commission to be issued to Bro. Savage as our Grand Representative near the Grand Lodge of Seothand ; also to Brother H. W. Hutchins as our Grand Representative near the Grand

## HECISIONS.

There have been only two questions reforred to mo during the past Masonic your, and which I have answored, as follows:-

1. Are amendments to notiere of motion printerl on (iramd ladge .simmonses almissible in (irand dodge:' Yes; this ruling was rontimed at the time by vote in (iramd ladire.
2. Are amendments passed in (irand lodige to berome law withont awaiting contimation at next session of Grand Latge:' 'This question I also answered in the athirmative.

## AI'l'IAIA.

There has been only one case of appeal to me ats Gramd Master during my term of oflice, mamely, that of Ashlar Ladige, No. 3, catiing attention to the fact that Victoria-Cohmbia Ladge, No. 1, bad made a certain camdidate a Mason, who they claimed bedongerl to the juriseliction of Ashar Lodge, and asking that all fees for Initiation, Passing and laising be handed over to them. On receipt of their commmication I requested the Very Worshipful Grand Secretary to write to them asking if they had tried to settle the disputed question with Victoria-Colmmbia Lorge, if not, recommemding them to do so, and calling attention to clanse $($, page 89 of the Constitution. This suggestion was acted upom, but withont success, as I was again addrosised on the subject on the $28 t h$ of May, and then referred the mattor to the Committee on Grievances for full investigation and to report to the Board of General Purposes.

## ALTERATION TO BY-LAWS.

On the 14 th of $A$ pril I sanctioned certain alterations to the $13 y$ laws of Vancouver-Quadra Lodge, No. 2, they being in aceordance with our Constitution. Also on May 2sth the By-Laws of Cariboo Lodge, No. 4, were amended so as to change the date of their anmal communication and election of officers from December to St. John's Day in June, which was also assented to.

From persomal inspertion and the reports of bredhen who have ared as my Deputies in visiting, I believe the torges are in better eondition than they were one your ago. There is an increase in the membership though not hage, and I trust Brethren, that with the general prosperity which is now being felt throughont the lrovince, We as Masoms may prosper, and that our beloved Order may gradually, amd if slowly, surely extemel its hramehes.

## ('Ast'ADE LODGE,

In regard to the chater of this Lodine, which wats survendered, I must inform you there hats been no application for its re-issue, which was provided for at last session of Gand Loolge. I should therefore recemmend that the time be extended for another year so as to enable the Brethren to whom the charter was granted to take it up again without further expense, if they should find thenselves in a position to do so.

## chanity.

I amproad tosay every applation for relict made during the past year to the Fund of bencrolence has been cheerfully entertained and the desired relief granted, and while on this sulyeet let me remind vou brethen, that the giving of peemiaty assistance is not the omly. form of eharity which we we ealled upon to exereise, but that there are varions and manifold ways of practising that most inestimable virtue, such as visiting a sick Brother, lemding a helping hand to our who has fallen and is anxions to rise up again, throwing the mande of Masonice charity over the fanlts of an erring Brother, for shombl one err ninety and nine times we should ever be ready to forgive and assist him hack into the paths of rectitude. Brethren, we all profes this virtue, let us try to practise it.

## CONCLDSION.

Before closing my address I should like on behalf of the Gramb Lodge to thank Brothers G. Rudlin, J. Spratt, R. P. Rithet and J. Irving for their kindness and liberality in convering members of Grand Lodge and visiting Brethren to Nanamo and New Westminster at reduced rates, and for all courtesies extended to the fraternity. ## REPORT OF (GRANI) SECRETARY.

M. $\because$ W. $\because$ Sir and Brother :-So rapidly does time pase that it only appears to me a few weeks since we were last in session, and yot I mom more than reminded that another your has rolled away from the fiact of having before me the usmal six shects of "Anmual Retums" from my brother secretaries in the various portions of the province where Freemasonry hats long held, and still holds, its own. Considering how widety separated our "little Masonic homes" are from one mother, how many disadvantages we labor muder as regardes expeditions communication by sea and by land within our own Province, and how widely severed from such portions of the world where the Masonic banner is spread to the breeze of more prosperons commmities, and has the benefit of bringing together the masses at stoort notice, it is a matter of some little satistaction to notice that we still manage to maintain our numerical s,trength.

It will be observed from the returns which I shall shortly read to you that we have only 293 members on our roll as compared with 99. last year-an apparent decrease of two-and yot in reality our strength is really greater than it has been for the last two yours, as it will possibly be remembered that in last year's returns were induled some 1 i) members on the roll of Cascade Lodge, No. 10, and which Lodge I regret to say surrendered its charter, not formy reprehemsible reason, hut simply from the fact that those ardent Masons who so mobly entered into the laudable canse were unable to effectuate its working in keeping with original anticipations and conserpently by ill luck and various ad verse circumstances were reluctantly compelled to acept the only alternative. I do regret, however, to state that out of those 15 only 2 have aftiliated with other Lodges, and consequently, although 11 have been added to our members in the past year 10 have dropped out or rather failed to come in with us-if it were not for this we might have had reason to congratulate ourselves upon the onward mareh of Masonry ; as it is we must content ourselves by recording that "Brotherly Love" has been extended, "Relief" afforded to those in need, and "Truth" that Masonry is in a state of " in statu quo."

I shall not weary you, Brethren, with a lengthy report upon the annual work and efficiency of the Subordinate Lodges of this jurisdiction, but follow the course pursued last year and leave it in the more able hands of the M. $\cdot . W . \therefore$ Grand and IR $\cdot$.W. $\because$ Deputy Grand Masters, though I may be excused for taking this opportmity of stating that althongh ready and willing to participate in all reasonato extrint in matters affecting the Craft in this Provine I was only able to pay a fraternal visit to Ashlar Lodge, No. 3, at Nanaimo, being
prevented by sickness in December and Janmary, (which nesurly rewalted In my being entitled to anmall cormer in the obltumy sheet of this session's procecelings) from attending at my usmal station with the (irmad Master at the installation of oflleers in the two Vhetoria Ladges.

From 20th Jamuary until the 6 th of the present month I was absent from the Province on other husiness connected with its interests, and which I trust whll, when adhed to the former, suflefently exonorate me from what might appear to some to be apathy or indifference in matters Manonic, "and pallinte in some degree any offence, real or imagimary, at the presentation by me of such a short statistical report, and allow me to proceed with facts and flgures.

A., their Excellencies were reluctantly compelled to decline the formal acceptance of the Address on the plea of having had to decline all similar addresses save those of the Lient. Governor and the Mayor of the Capital.
10. The Committees appointed to report upon matters in connection with the Grand Lodges (real or inmginary) of Morocco and Arizona, as also matter referred to a Committee for a report re. Grand Lodge of Utah will probably do so this session.
11. Circular communications have been received from the Grand Orient of France and Grand Lodge of Peru on matter not affecting this jurisdiction in any essential, and can be read if the brethren deem it expedient.

The M. $\cdot$ W. $\therefore$ Grand Master stated that as the letter contaned questions of great importance it would be inadvisable to renter a hasty decision, and he would therefore defer the matter for consideration after the business of the present session was completed.

Bro. Baker suggested an expression of opinion from the representatives of the manlind Lodges in regard to this matter. Bro. Hughes declined to express an opinion, not hating been present all the time the same was under consideration. Bro. Kelly expressed his views in regard to the diffienlty, and it was his opinion that Victoria-Colmbia Lodge, No. 1, had acted rightly and in conformity with the Constitution. Bro. Howay dissented from the opinion of Bro. Kelly, and considered that both of the Lodges had acted wrongfully and not in accordance with the true intent and meaning of the provisions of the Constitution, as laid down for the government of private Lodges.

Kelly, That after a carcful consideration of the matter in dispute between Vic-toria-Columbia Lodge, No. 1, and Ashlar Lodge, No. 3, this Grand Lodge is of opinion that the same has had all due consideration at the hands of Gaund Lodge, and that whether Victoria-Columbia Lodge, No. 1, acted in keeping with the Constitution or not-and this point does not arise-Ashlar Lodge, No. 3, has no just ground of complitint against Vic-toria-Columbia Lodge, No. 1. Carried.

The eye has a lofty plate in the borly ; but it has to gride the hand in its humble task and the foot in its. lowly path. The thing itself is easy of comprehension. Two men are at work in the forest, a log lies in the way, one puts his shoulder to it and exerts his strength in vain his companion joins him in the eflort and it is forced aside with ease. Herem lies the philosophy of united eflort in business, govermment and relision. Whits water is diflusedin vapor throngh the atmosphere it is powerless, when it is condensed in the shower it becomes one of the mightient agents in nature. The electrie fluid, latent in matter, is hammess, but when precipitater from the eloud it shatters the oak and whits the rook in fragments. Great ideas inspiring individuai minds are only elements of power: it is when organized that they form public opinion and become living forcer, working the common gool. Fet how many climb on the fence and watch indiflerently the movements shaping around them. Idle drones in the social hechive enjoy the shelter and sip the honey created by the busy throng around them. Like a great boy who sits by the hearth on a winter's evening, he aborbos to the full the cheerful heat, and luxuriates in the abounding enjoyment ; but he will not provide a stiok for the fire, his sisters may do that.

We have now to consider the end of this associated life. Surely: mutual helpfuhess. In Philosophic Greece during one period of its history, it was permitted to allow weakly or deformed infants to expire, and to put out of the way the hopelessiyy siek and infirm as being elements of weakness in the state. Our Holy Lav teaches differently. In the words of an Apostle, "when I an weak then am I strong." How helpless is the child in the cradle; yet the father's power of hain.

How do we regard such comduct?' Its atrociomshess appalls us. What then shall he satid of those who would build up their repatation upon the ruins of a neighbor's grod name ; of those who amass wealth at the expense of the sinews and blom, the loves and bopes of their fellow men ; or of those who gain momentary gratitication through the lifelong throes of murdered virtue.

Lastly, this state of interdemendence should be viewed as a preparation for fellowship hereafter. Earth's greatest teacher has said : "In my Fiather's house are many mansions." Were the gates ajar so that we might catch a glimpe of the life within what a seene would gaet our gaze. Here we are chanish.
