The 8th Regiment has an invitation to go to Hagersville on July 2. Although it is claimed that a majority of the aldermen will vote in favor of giving the Hamilton, Waterloo & Guelph Railway the right to use the parks route, not enough members of the board of works and finance committee to make a quorum turned up at the meeting called for this afternoon. An effort will be made to get a meeting early next week.

Candidates in Ward 4. W. J. Clark and Dr. McGillivray have announced themselves as candidates for the honor of succeeding R. H. Foster as representative of ward four on the board of education.

Richard Jones was sent down for six months this morning for stealing six knives from F. H. Skerrett. In his presentation to-day the grand jury found fault because the city had no shelter for children, and because the county has no refuge for aged.

Premier Whitney's Visit. Premier Whitney was in the city this evening, and made an announcement that the government would establish a Normal College to Toronto and establish a Normal school here in its place. The premier came to the city to open the Twentieth Century Club house, J. W. Lamoreux, the honorary president, was in the chair, and presented Mr. Whitney with a golden key to the club. Mr. Whitney reviewed the work of the government, and expressed the hope that it would continue to act so that it would merit the confidence of the people. J. P. Downey, M.L.A., Guelph, eulogized the club members, Hon. J. S. Hendrie, Henry Carscadden, K.C., M.L.A., and J. J. Scott, K.C., also spoke. Mr. Scott said he did not want to be disagreeable, but if the government removed the Normal College, Hamilton would have no government institution, and would occupy a unique position in that respect. Those who occupied seats on the platform were: Mayor Biggar, F. C. Bruce, ex-M.P., G. H. Peabody, president of the club; Henry New, vice-president; Thomas Fanning, treasurer; Richard Jones, secretary. Ald. Sweeney and D'Arcy, M.P., were also present. The club house is a fine building.

The Hamilton Art School, after getting a grant of \$3500 from the city council, wound up the year with an overdraft of only \$555. It was hinted that Andrew Carnegie might be asked to establish a library in Hamilton, so that the present library building could be turned into an art school building. Nothing definite was decided upon. For his work in securing the grant, Rev. Dr. Lyle was elected a life member.

Jim Connell was arrested to-night charged with aggravated assault. Geo. Adam is the complainant.

Gus Gardner, Philadelphia, and Roy Kannel, Buffalo, boxed ten rounds to-night at the arcade, and the go was declared a draw. Joe McMahon and Frank McIntosh went on for the preliminary, and no decision was given.

NEWS NOTES FROM CAMP HEALTH OF IT A FEATURE

Little or No Sickness—Trooper Newton of Light Horse is Kicked by a Horse.

Niagara Camp, June 15.—(Special.)—The feature of the camp is the lack of sickness. The men of the Ambulance Corps have nothing to do like they had in former years.

The drill to-day was decidedly uninteresting. It was simply looking at a lot of men doing what they didn't know how, but were trying to try. They sweated in the sunshine and inwardly cursed the officers, who were just as tired as they were.

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

THE GREAT RECORD OF THE I. O. F.

A Surplus of \$10,000,000 on the 1st of May, 1906.

For the benefit especially of the younger generation of Foresters, this is perhaps an opportune time to give a brief resume of the history of the I. O. F. Of course everybody recognizes that in such a resume justice cannot be done to the subject owing to the limited space at our disposal.

The First Period—1874 to 1881.
The I. O. F. was founded on the 17th June, 1874, at Newark, New Jersey, by members of the Ancient Order of Foresters who were dissatisfied with the management of that Order in the United States by the High Court of England. The name "Independent Order of Foresters" was adopted, and it was thought by the new organization was doubtless due to the "Declaration of Independence," made by the seceders. During the first year of the new Order's life no insurance benefit was provided for its membership.

The first annual session of the "Most Worthy High Court," the name given to the new Supreme body, was held at Philadelphia in 1875, at which an insurance benefit was provided, consisting of an assessment of 10c on each member. The amount to be paid to the beneficiary was the proceeds of one assessment, provided the life of the insured was not less than 10 years, and the first full \$1000 was paid on the 15th March, 1878, so that it took four years to secure 10,000 members.

The I. O. F. was introduced into Canada by the institution of Court Hope, No. 1, at London, Ont., on the 28th April, 1878. The Order did not for some time make rapid progress in Canada, as at the close of the second year there were only 40 Courts, with an aggregate membership of about 100. Dr. Oronhyatekha joined the I. O. F. by becoming a Charter Member of Court Dufferin, No. 7, located at London, Ontario, on the 1st February, 1878. In September of the same year he was elected H.C.R. of Ontario, and, with the exception of one month, continued in that office until 1882, when he resigned in order to give all his time to the duties of Supreme Chief Ranger.

In 1887 the then Supreme Treasurer, named Griffin, of Rochester, N.Y., defaulted with the sum of \$17,000 belonging to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. It is unnecessary to say that this nearly caused the death of the Order, as in consequence of this default large secessions from its ranks took place in Massachusetts, New York, Canada and elsewhere. As a matter of fact, in Canada there were only 196 members left in the I. O. F., the rest having seceded to form the Canadian Order of Foresters.

From 1879 to 1881 the I. O. F. was kept alive in Canada only by the most strenuous efforts of the High Court during this period was done by Dr. Oronhyatekha; and for a part of that time he had to discharge the duties of H.C.R. He and the other officers of the I. O. F. subsequently declare that he never had a more harmonious Executive than during this period.

this sum to only \$250,000 while the Temple Building located in the City of Toronto, Canada, which the Order was building, was estimated to cost over \$700,000. To meet this difficulty the Executive Council formed the Ontario Realty Company, which was conveyed an undivided interest in the Temple Building property, by which the holding of the Order in the Temple Building was brought within the provisions of the amended Act, the Executive Council taking a mortgage upon this undivided interest, and paying the balance of amount equal to the interest on the mortgage. To remedy the anomalous position which the Order occupied in respect of its property, the Supreme Court passed a resolution to be found on page 32 of the minutes of its Toronto Session held in 1898, in which the Executive Council held sole title to the Temple Building, if necessary, to \$350,000, or to secure the necessary legislation to enable the Executive Council to hold the property in its entirety. In accordance with these instructions the Executive Council secured the Temple Building down and its cost on a book of 1898, reduced to \$243,373.35. In 1901 the time seemed to the Executive Council opportune to make another appeal for legislation. Accordingly the Executive Council made, both to the Legislature of Ontario and to the Dominion Parliament, to secure concurrent legislation that would enable the Executive Council to secure the Temple Building. When the amendments were passed which gave the Order ample powers to hold the Temple property in its entirety, the Executive Council reconveyed to the I. O. F. its interest in the Temple Building, and shortly after that the Supreme Chief Ranger secured for the Order an independent title to the whole property under the provisions of the "Land Titles Act" of Ontario.

A complication respecting the General Fund arose out of the passing of the amendments to the Act of Incorporation, bringing the Order within the Government supervision. As already stated, the Supreme Court at its London Session enacted that the "interest earned on any accumulated funds" should become a part of the General Fund, and should be used by the Executive Council in the organizing work of the Order.

The action of the amending Act made the Constitution and Laws binding upon the whole Order, but it contained this provision: "Provided also that in case of contradictory or repugnant provisions conflicting with any Statute law in force in Canada, the Treasury Board may direct the Supreme Chief Ranger to amend the Constitution and Laws, and from the date of such amendment the Constitution and Laws so amended shall be binding upon the Society and every member thereof."

When the Executive Council filed the new Constitution and Laws as provided by the amended Act, the fact that the Section giving authority to use the interest of the accumulated funds as part of the General Fund was not in the said Constitution and Laws. It was pointed out that the work during the interim of the Sessions of the Supreme Court had been carried out under contracts made based upon the revenues provided by the Supreme Court in its London Session, and that to reduce the General Fund to the middle of the term, would entail a large overdraft in the General Fund. While holding the opinion that the Supreme Court had no authority to amend the Constitution and Laws, it was pointed out that the work during the interim of the Sessions of the Supreme Court had been carried out under contracts made based upon the revenues provided by the Supreme Court in its London Session, and that to reduce the General Fund to the middle of the term, would entail a large overdraft in the General Fund.

The Order now started as an institution under Government inspection and control. Its membership stood at this time at 102,338 and its "Surplus" had increased to \$2,915,748. At the Session of the Supreme Court held in London, the two amendments to the Constitution and Laws of a far-reaching and radical character were adopted, and it is curious to note that in a full hour and sixteen votes were cast against each of these two most important amendments. The first of these provided for the admission of women into the Order. That no mistake was made in this respect is evidenced by the fact that on April 1, 1898, the number of Companions or lady members within the folds of the I. O. F., and the mortality rate among them was lower than that of the mortality rate among the corresponding number of years. The second amendment related to the premium rates paid by the membership. The amounts to be paid for the different ages were re-adjusted and somewhat increased. This was accomplished by almost a unanimous vote, notwithstanding the fact that on the 30th of June, 1898, the "surplus" had grown to \$2,856,613.68, and was being increased at an average rate of about \$45,000 per month, was simply marvellous, and testified to the intelligence and foresight of the members of The Supreme Court.

Notwithstanding the undoubted wisdom of this act, the Executive Council had an anxious time during the year following, as they were being required to keep the Order from retrograding. The membership on the 1st of January, 1899, when the new rates went into effect, stood at 102,338, on the 1st of July at 149,425, an increase during the six months of only 1000—in spite of the fact that the Executive Council was using the "interest earned on any accumulated funds" to increase the membership.

Orphans' Home scheme, and providing the means for its support by imposing a tax on each member in good standing in the Order of one cent per month. He said to the credit of the membership fund that out of over 5000 Courts only eight Courts have raised any objections to paying this tax, and every one of these, on being reasonably, have paid their contributions to the Orphans. The Orphans' Home is now in active operation, and already eighteen orphans are receiving the benefits of its sheltering care, while applications for many others have been received and are under consideration. These with all others who may hereafter be admitted will be fed, clothed and cared for as they would be in a well-regulated home, and in addition will be given such education as the quality of them so engaged in the practical duties of life and citizenship with advantage to themselves and the countries of which they may become members. Another important matter dealt with by the Supreme Court was with reference to the overdrafts. The subject was submitted by the Supreme Chief Ranger in his report, and reads as follows: "It now devolves upon the General Fund of the Order. You are aware that mainly by reason of the fact that the Supreme Court was making considerable expenditures in new fields and laying the foundations of the Order there, the General Fund was constantly more or less overdrawn. In order to balance the accounts from time to time the Executive Council made loans from the accumulated funds of the Order, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws, and balanced the account. It is now the duty of the Executive Council to see that the time has now come when the Executive Council have been able to meet all the expenses out of the ordinary income of the Order, and no longer need to be regarded as phenomenal and not in accordance with the Order's usual practice. As to the loans already made for the General Fund, I recommend that the

Executive Council be instructed to repay the same from the General Fund. In such annual instalments, with interest at four per cent, as the General Fund will permit. I have made a full investigation of this matter and am able to assure you that we shall be able to do this beginning with the first of January, 1906.

"By the adoption of this policy we shall place these loans almost immediately among the interest-bearing assets of the Order. In my opinion the wise policy for us to pursue is to replace all deductions which have been made in the past from the accumulated funds and for the future to keep the same intact. Accordingly, I recommend that not only the existing loans be repaid as soon as possible, but that the amounts which the Supreme Court voted to the General Fund at our last Session at Los Angeles, be likewise refunded as soon as possible."

The Supreme Court adopted these recommendations of the Supreme Chief Ranger, and the Executive Council has already made the requisite financial arrangements to carry the wishes of the Supreme Court in reference to this matter into effect.

On the 1st May, 1906, the "Surplus" of the I. O. F. was \$10,000,758.33. When it is noted that during the time it was accumulating this enormous "Surplus" the Order paid all the large management expenses and in addition thereby, it paid in benefits to the widows and orphans of the Order, and to its sick and disabled members, \$19,614,400.68, the success of the I. O. F. must be regarded as phenomenal and no apology is needed for its having exceeded.

The following table exhibits the growth of the "Surplus" and the membership of the Order during the past quarter of a century:

Nothing can better demonstrate the increasing strength of the Order than the figures in the foregoing table. It shows that it took the I. O. F. 13 years and one month, or 157 months to gain the first million dollars and nine months to accumulate the tenth million dollars of "Surplus."

It will be noted with satisfaction by all Foresters, that the surplus has grown not only in millions, but the rate per capita has been increasing steadily since 1881, when it stood at one cent per capita, while to-day it stands at \$41.62 per capita.

This success has been attained in spite of the fact that no Society has ever entered upon its career under such adverse conditions as the I. O. F. has had to contend with. Its reorganization and certainly no Society has been so constantly assailed by

fair and by foul means as the I. O. F. has been during the whole quarter of a century which has elapsed since 1881. Yet through it all, the Executive Council has had the confidence and the cordial support of the Supreme Court as well as that of the membership at large. Through good and through evil report its hands have been loyally upheld and its acts not only endorsed, but commended, and there never was more harmony in the Order than there is to-day. That the I. O. F. still holds the confidence of the Insuring public is demonstrated by its record during the first five months of 1906 no less than 20,108 have made application for membership in the Order, of whom 18,869 have been accepted and 2521 declined. On the 1st June, 1906, the "Surplus" stood at \$10,126,009.83.

ports of Hon. Dr. Montague when there The introduction of the I. O. F. into Australia was reported to The Supreme Court at Los Angeles, and met with its entire approval. The Order in Australia was somewhat checked owing to some complications which arose shortly after in that distant jurisdiction. One of these was an absurd charge that the I. O. F. was involved in a charge of having bribed the Premier to endorse the I. O. F. from his seat in Parliament. The Royal Commission was appointed to enquire into the matter, and in due course it reported that the I. O. F. representative was guilty; but the Premier was innocent in the matter. It is not necessary to add that while all Australia laughed over this verdict, the I. O. F. got thousands of dollars worth of free advertising over this "State affair."

But we must hurry on, as this article is getting already much too long. At the Toronto Session of the Supreme Court a full report respecting the overdrafts in the General Fund, and The Supreme Court signed its order in relation to the overdrafts of this matter, by not only ordering the overdrafts to be written off but also by adding to the credit of the General Fund. The record of this action is to be found on page 45 of the Minutes of the Los Angeles Session held in 1902. It reads as follows: "The Finance Committee presented their third report which was unanimously adopted and reads as follows: 'The Finance Committee recommends that the amount of holding this Supreme Court meeting be paid out of the Contingency Fund of the Supreme Court, and that the amount as the expenditure incurred in connection with the extension of the Order during the past few years has resulted in a great increase in the membership of the Order, the Executive Council be instructed to credit the General Fund with the amount so expended and borrow the same from the Contingency Fund, and that the loan from the S. and F. Fund for the same purpose be repaid out of the Contingency Fund, as needed by the S. and F. Fund.'"

This report was adopted without a dissenting vote. The action of the Supreme Court relating to the General Fund is to be found in Section 40, sub-section 11, of the Constitution and Laws of the Order, and the Executive Council, decided towards the end of the year not to use the additional revenues for the General Fund provided by the Executive Council, but to use the same for the purpose of carrying out the action of the Executive Council. His contention was that if the Executive Council were to use the additional revenues it had provided, the Order to-day would be financially afloat and would have had in its ranks at least 50,000 members.

This article would not be complete without the exhibit of the premium rates of the I. O. F. In the table which follows giving various premium rates will be found for the principal ages not only the Ontario rates, but also the tables of the Order, the Ontario rates, and the rates of the Dominion Government. In comparing the rates in these three tables it will be seen that the rates of the I. O. F. must be borne in mind that no credit is given in the three tables on account of the gains due to the Order's surplus. The Ontario rates are substantially different from the amount available for this purpose in Old Line Companies."

(Note.—The difference in Hunter's Rates and Blackadar's Rates is due to the fact that the former's rates are based on the average of the first five years' experience was not taken into account, while in Mr. Blackadar's Rates it was included. In the original table on which the former's Rates are based the minimum age for admission to the Order, in making the comparisons deduct 1 per cent. from the I. O. F. Rates, the amount taken for expenses.)

There is another factor which materially affects the rates of the I. O. F., and that is the "Safety" clause of the Constitution and Laws of the Order. No intelligent estimate of the rates of the I. O. F. can be made without taking into consideration the safety clause contained in Section 157 of the Constitution and Laws, which the Supreme Chief Ranger calls the "Citadel of the Order." It reads in part as follows: "If, (1) Whenever and so often as the available benefit funds in the Insurance or Mortuary Benefit Department, or in the Sick and Funeral Benefit Department, shall become reduced to less than the total amount of benefit claims duly passed by the Supreme Chief Ranger of the Executive Council, in either of the said Departments, the Executive Council within the then preceding sixty days, the Executive Council shall order an extra assessment which shall be paid by every Beneficiary member to the Financial Secretary of his own Court within thirty days from the date of the call."

THREE LIVES WERE LOST IN A SYRACUSE FIRE

Syracuse, N. Y., June 15.—Joseph LeRoy, Richard Hinch and Lewis Holden of Fulton lost their lives to-day in a fire at the Allen Excelsior and Butter Tub Works in that city. The men were not missed until noon, the fire having raged fiercely for five hours. It is supposed that they were overcome by the dense smoke of burning excelsior.

LOCK TYPE IS CHOSEN

Washington, June 15.—The house has adopted the lock type for the Panama Canal by a vote of 110 to 36. The provision was made a part of the Sundry Civil Appropriation Bill, which appropriated \$25,000,000 to continue work on the canal.

Russian Speaker in Toronto

Kingston, Ont., June 14.—The suggested federation of Trinity University with Toronto University was sent to a committee in the Diocese of Ontario to-day, Provost Macklem seeking an opinion. Lieut.-Col. MEALS FOR KESTREL'S CREW

COST CANADA \$1.15 A MAN

Some of the Dainties Provided for Fishery Protection Cruiser on Pacific.

Victoria, B.C., June 15.—(Special.)—While in Eastern Canada strict enquiry is being made as to the desirability of equipping the government steamer Arctic with champagne and pate de foie for a business voyage into Hudson Bay, here in the west the parallel methods evidenced in the purchase of stores for the fishery protection cruiser Kestrel is exciting comment.

A life on the ocean wave loses half of its terrors when one examines the bill of fare provided for the common sailor, who is so fortunate as to catch a berth on this rowing warship of the Canadian navy—armed with quick-fires, but never yet supplied with ammunition.

The ostensible mission of the Kestrel, Captain Newcomb commanding, is to safeguard Canadian fishery interests on the Pacific coast. Chiefly she is in service for purposes of official junketing. Originally she was intended to keep the American cousin from taking hallelujahs in Canadian waters. Several times she has spoken American fishing craft and requested them not to be seen within the three-mile limit when official duty has compelled the Kestrel to be abroad. This request has been most obligingly complied with.

Meanwhile the Kestrel has been extremely beneficial to the commercial interests as a purchaser of choice provisions and repairs. Last year the repair bill ran to \$2400 and \$1000 was expended for provisions for the crew of ten men during the ten months' commission ending April 30. The wage bill in the same period was \$7400. The government is entitled to congratulation for the very thorough manner in which it provides for the creature comforts of its servants at sea, for among the items of necessities provided for the crew are plentiful supplies of cocoa, cream, green gages, oysters, peaches, assorted fruits, chickens, chickens and turkeys galore, blueberries, cherries, strawberries, honey by the case, jam, lobster (by the case), pineapples, shrimps, lunch tongue, chick, soup, blackberries, maple syrup, asparagus, olives, anchovies, nuts, preserves, pickles, catsups, etc., thru a long long list. Most of these are supplied by the sailormen, without the allowance of any profit such as hotels or boarding-houses would figure upon, is good living even for a sailor.

Board of Control Hear Deputation About Preserving Old Fort.

Several important matters were gone into by the controllers at a short meeting yesterday morning.

Complaints were read from the residents on Abbott-avenue re the asphalt pavement recently laid there, which is now very badly cut up.

Three hundred and seventy-five dollars was authorized to be spent for 688 copies of the report of the Municipal Electric Power Commission.

The following sales of tax lands recommended by the assessment commission, were ratified by the board:

40x120 feet north side Albemarle-avenue, assessed at \$2 per foot; taxes amount to \$1.15 per foot.

15x120 feet on Palmerston-avenue, west side, north of Bloor-street, assessed at \$7 per foot; taxes amount to \$1.98 per foot.

A deputation, consisting of Wm. Rennie and members of the York Pioneers and Historical Society, waited on the board regarding the preservation of the old fort.

Gas Oil is Preventive. Many yachtsmen that have been complaining about the gas oil on the bay will be interested in the following letter from J. J. Wright, manager of Toronto Electric Light Co., to City Engineer, Rust:

"I note the usual complaints re the gas oil on the bay. I hold a somewhat different view in regard to this from the majority, and think it would be a misfortune if stopped. While I concede the nuisance it is to the yachtsmen, and suffer that way as much as any of them, I believe that the presence of the oil during the summer months has been the only thing that has prevented an epidemic of fever that would otherwise have inevitably occurred. This mosquito-barry product, is a powerful disinfectant, and spread over the surface as it is must neutralize the decomposing elements in the sewage.

Appeals in Don Improvement. The city is appealing in Judge Winchester's court against the action of the court of revision in relieving certain property owners from assessment affected by the Don improvement.

COMPANY MUST PAY.

Verdict for Full Policy and Costs Against Toronto Life.

Sandwich, June 15.—In the case of Hartford v. the Toronto Life Insurance Company, the jury returned a verdict for the full amount of policy, \$500 and costs.

PRESBYTERIANS ON UNION PROSPECTS OF THE FUTURE

London, June 15.—(Special.)—Summarizing the work of the Presbyterian assembly, Dr. Quill says:

The supreme court of the Presbyterian Church has just thresholded the "preliminaries" of a union act with the Methodists and Congregationalists.

The general assembly did two things. In the first place, it brought out, by individual and united testimony, that there was a spirit abroad, bringing a closer unity, not only of heart, but of thought and purpose.

Then the assembly agreed, by a vote of 179 to 22, to go forward. That means that the next step to be taken is this: The committees have met in various ways and considered the question on all its bearings.





I have known him for the past three years, during which time he attended this church. Only at such times was he out of the city, and I knew it. In attending the church he had nothing to gain. His presence simply indicated that he was to be a loyal member of the Catholic Church and one of us. I attended him during his last hours, and allowed him to have all the last rites and privileges of the Catholic Church given on such occasions. Personally, I admired him for his honest straightforwardness. I say this in justice to the dead, and because, like him, and to us one of his favorite expressions, 'I don't like a mean cuss.'"

The high esteem in which the late Inspector Murray was held throughout this country and the United States is manifested in the many letters and telegrams which have come to the family. Personal friends and state officials express themselves alike in terms of sincerest regard and deep regret. The floral tributes are numerous and beautiful. FIELDING'S FAIR WARNING BILLS SUBJECT TO CHANGE

Legislation Which Will Follow Insurance Commission Report Must Be Reckoned on.

Ottawa, June 15--When the committee on banking and commerce met to-day to consider an act to incorporate the Sterling Life Assurance Company, Hon. W. S. Fielding made an announcement in regard to the policy of the government as affecting insurance bills. The finance minister said that owing to the enquiry which was now being made into insurance he intended asking parliament to make whatever bills were passed this session subject to any general legislation that may be found necessary as a result of the investigation.

The committee also reported the bills empowering the British America and the Western Assurance Companies to increase their capital stock, in the case of the former by one million, and in the case of the latter by three millions. It was explained by Mr. G. McCarthy, who had charge of the bills, that this money was needed by reason of the large losses they had sustained in the San Francisco disaster. Both are fire companies.

LOCALS LESS INFLUENCED BY WALL ST. WEAKNESS

But Trading is Restricted—Further Declines in Specialties in New York Market.

World Office. Friday Evening, June 15. The Toronto market showed more regard for the slump on Wall-street than it did yesterday, but more by way of curtailment in transactions than declines in the quotations. It effectively killed any attempt at buoyancy in Canadian shares for the time, traders preferring to remain uncommitted until the outlook assumed a brighter aspect.

An advance in Dominion Coal was thought to have been scheduled for today, but outside happenings disarranged the program at the last moment and the decision of the inside operators was modified. After yesterday's initial movement it was not thought advisable to show the white feather, however, and under the circumstances transactions were put thru without exhibiting sympathetic weakness with the rest of the speculative issues.

From Montreal President Plummer announced that his company had no rail or ship should have an influence on the Dominion Steel shares it is hard to decipher. Neither the company nor preferred shares which are quoted out of range of any active iron investors are wanted, and some slip is so much waste effort under the circumstances. The French demand for Toronto rails appears to have been satisfied and stock is still offered here without loss at near the quoted price. Twin City, Sao Paulo, N.S. steel and Mexican are covered under the influence of adverse conditions and well advanced acquired concessions. B.C. Packers preferred braved the depression, and in the Montreal market the stock advanced about three points, but was not wanted here except at twelve points lower than quoted sales on the eastern exchange. The Mackay issues sold ex-dividend to-day and through the sessions maintained a steady upward at a small decline. There was but little enquiry for bank shares, which were quoted about steady.

N.Y.—It is reported that an arrangement of transfer of the Hill ore properties to U.S. Steel Corporation under lease will be made shortly after adjournment of congress.

The known movement of money for the week ended with the close of business shows a gain by the local banks of \$888,000. The banks gained from the sub-treasury \$2,000,000, which nearly the whole was gained yesterday, and net to the interior \$1,000,000, while the banks lost to the sub-treasury, but gained from the interior.

Philadelphia—Your correspondent is informed on trustworthy authority that the sharp break in the price of Reading stock was due principally to a breach of faith by a number of one of the minor pools, formed in that issue since the San Francisco disaster. The person referred to was detected by the other members of the pool in secretly liquidating his holdings. When this was confirmed the entire holdings of the pool were thrown upon the market.

A Montreal despatch this morning said: "J. H. Plummer, president of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, denied emphatically this morning the story that a \$5,000,000 steel rail contract had been made between his company and the Grand Trunk Pacific. There is no contract of any kind between the two companies."

GOOD RESULTS AT OTTAWA FROM PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

SENT MESSAGES BY MAIL INSTEAD OF TELEGRAPH

First Report of Electric Commission Claims Increased Use and a Profit.

Ottawa, June 15.—The initial report of the City of Ottawa electric commission was issued today. On July 17 last, to prevent the amalgamation of electric companies, which proposed to put up the rates, the city expropriated, by virtue of its charter, the Consumers' Electric Company, the working in the face of strong and vigorous competition.

The civic plant has ended the first year and a half months of its existence with a balance of \$326,58. The customers have increased 40 per cent., and this despite the fact that for months past the plant practically ran itself, while the city council argued as to the best method of management. The all-gardeners are much gratified with their initial move in municipal ownership.

In the absence of His Grace, Archbishop Bégin, Mgr. Marois, V. G., officiated. The remains were interred in the Hotel Dieu Chapel.

Deer Park.

A lively meeting was held at the schoolhouse, St. Clair-avenue, last night, when some 50 ratepayers discussed the advisability of annexation with Toronto. Ben Sinclair was voted to the chair. He thought it about time the ratepayers should be stirred themselves and become part of the city, so as to get something in return for the taxes paid. Those principally opposed to the scheme were people who already enjoy city water and other conveniences. The secretary of the meeting, Mr. Clark, thought that everyone with a family should make an effort to have Deer Park annexed, as the district was in absolute need of a sewerage system, waterworks system, police protection, modern roads, etc. E. D. W. Butler asked for the boundaries of the district after annexation, to which reply was made that it is the district which advocated annexation years ago, viz., the ravines in the east, North Toronto in the north, and the present boundary of the city to the west, and as far north as Upper Canada College.

Dr. Meyers produced tax papers for two years on his property in Westdale-street. One was a York Township bill, and called for \$20.14; the other was a city bill, and called for \$30.40, on which he had paid \$10.00. He asked how that if Deer Park became part of the city, the taxes would multiply by six, but Rev. Mr. Hockett could not say how it would be by the samples produced.

Mr. Ford, who moved into the district a year ago, proposed a sewerage system to overcome sewage troubles. He gets a water service from the city on the local improvement plan, and said every ratepayer could have it if desired.

Mr. Breton made a strong speech for annexation.

Mr. Stewart had forty years' experience in Toronto and two years in the township. "My taxes," he said, "are as large in Deer Park as in Toronto, and here I get nothing for my money."

A motion was carried that a committee of seven be appointed to confer with the city council as to whether the terms Deer Park could become part of the city. Those appointed are Messrs. Bredin, Barrett, Sinclair, Coates, McEwen, Duncanson and Clarke. The committee will report at another meeting.

County Council.

Friday's meeting of the York County council was fruitful of more legislation and progress than any of its predecessors. The General Hospital grant was postponed until fall. Councillor Evans strongly objected to a grant of any nature, preferring rather to give the money to the Industrial School.

Councillor Baird brought in a resolution favoring the discontinuance

of a police magistrate over the southern portion of the city.

Magistrate Ellis was heard and declared his willingness to abide by the decision of the council. East Toronto, in the opinion of Mr. Ellis, was the storm centre from whence came all the trouble, the officers seeking to make all the trouble possible. A committee, composed of Councillors Baird, Evans and Lunday, will enquire.

The report of the equalization committee commented somewhat severely on the manner in which the clerks of the several municipalities prepared reports. In some cases the assessors had completed the work, according to the new act on new forms. Others under the old act under old forms, and yet others on old forms in an effort to conform to the new act. The total increased assessment was over \$2,000,000. The report advised a conference of all the municipal clerks in York County.

W. A. Clarke, clerk and assessment commissioner of York Township, appeared to secure special legislation empowering assessors to hand in their rolls once in every three years. Instead of annually. In the intervening two years a general summary only would be submitted. Council were favorably impressed, and the opinion of the solicitor will be obtained.

Contrary to general expectation the assessor, Inspector B. Davidson was settled without discussion. Acting Solicitor Baird reported that Mr. Milloy was duly appointed, and pending charges against him, which must be substantiated, he could not be removed. The incident then closed.


