Hold a Large Meeting in the Canadian Institute.

Mrs. Curzon (S.A.) presided yesterday evening at a densely crowded institute over a large number of those interested in the work of the Women's Historical Society...

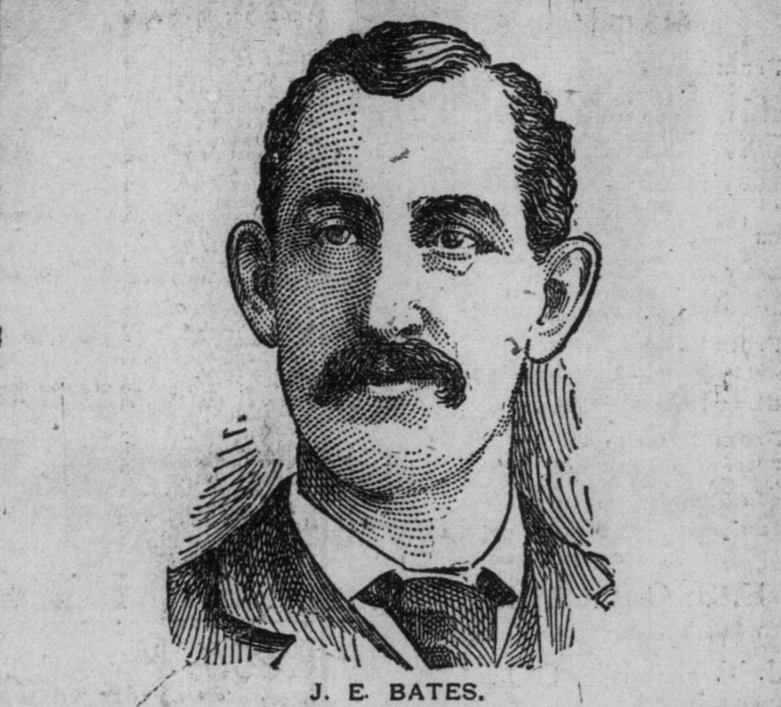

RECTOR OF ST. JAMES' PICTURES THE TOUCHING SCENE.

Most Pathetic Address of the Rector—The Poor Wanderer's Resolution, Reception and Provision—Recital from the Bonnie Brier Bush—Feeling Illustration of the Great Pitying Father.

Canon DuMoulin concluded his series of addresses on the parable of the Prodigal Son at the noonday service in St. James' Cathedral yesterday. In appealing to his father the prodigal stands on sure ground.

A Teaching Illustration.—Jan MacLaren in his beautiful story "Beside the Bonnie Brier Bush," has depicted a father's love in a way we should remember. It was the story of the older son who had left his home and wandered off to London and was lost. Despite his words against her and his request to have her removed from the family Bible, the "father" was within him, and at night when alone he wept bitterly over his lost child and prayed Almighty God to hear him. He believed that his daughter would return, and so he placed the lamp in the window from night to night where she might see its light. When at last the one old came back, she fell upon his neck, and holding her to his heart he spoke the words: "This my daughter was not before. This my daughter was not before, and is alive again; she was lost and is found."

Industrial Fair Association and the City—Discussing Arrangements—Send Stamp at Last.

President Withrow and Manager Hill had another conference with the Executive Committee of the City Council yesterday and renewed their request for a grant of \$24,000 for the erection of new buildings, or in lieu of that they asked the city to relieve them of \$6000, the annual interest on \$150,000 debentures issued in 1892. For this they offer to turn over 12-1/2 acres of land which Assessment Commissioner Maughan values at \$24,850 and which if rented would bring in \$3750.

Mr. Hill claims that Mr. Maughan is in error as to the number of acres, and that 17 acres would be nearer the mark.
Chairman Leslie and Mr. Hill will prepare a statement showing further particulars, which will be considered at a future meeting.

Arranging for the Subway Widening.—Ald. Scott and Engineer Keating had a conference with Engineer Hobson of the Grand Trunk Railway over the street-subway plan. The differences existing between the city and company were practically wiped out, and the city will soon be in a position to get down to work.

Sand Pump and Stone Crusher.—The Board of Control opened tenders for the new sand pump, Medley & Arnott was the lucky firm at \$13,627. The highest offer was \$17,000. A. R. Williams was awarded the tender for a stone crusher at \$350.

Allowances for Vacancies.—The statement of allowances for vacancies has been completed by assistant City Clerk Littlejohn and is as follows: Ward 1, \$1,495.25; Ward 2, \$5,075.50; Ward 3, \$2815.85; Ward 4, \$3,428.27; Ward 5, \$2833.96; Ward 6, \$3,301.43; total, \$23,865.19.

Improved System of Train Despatching.
