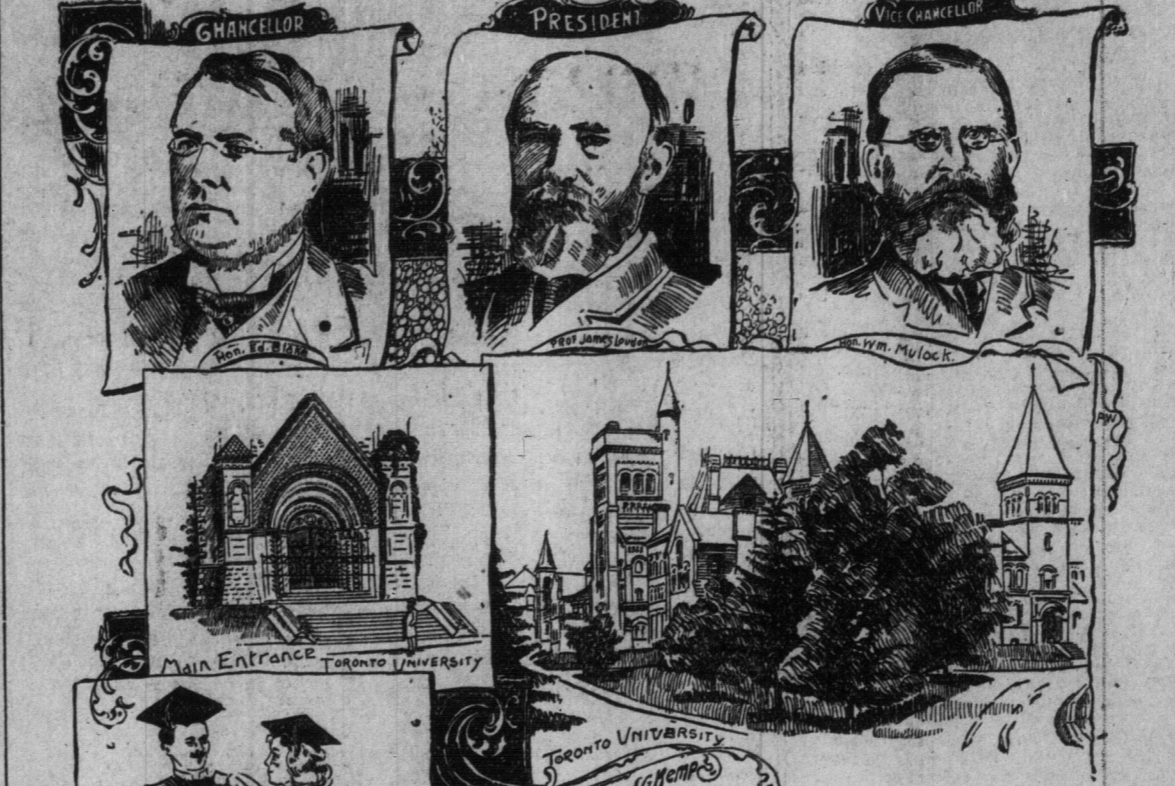

DISCOVERIES

Getting on the Fact That British Columbia is Full of Gold.

The London Mining Journal and other papers bring the attention of capitalists to Canada-Sloven Dividends-A Hamilton Man Makes a Strike-Luck in Prospecting-Algoma's Great Boom-The Latest Mining News.

There is now no question that British Columbia is awaking to the fact that British Columbia is full of gold. Such public prints as The London Mining Journal, The Pall Mall Gazette and The Morning Post, which reflect public opinion, are devoting a lot of space to our western mines.

One of the latest big English concerns to be attracted to prospecting is the famous Oceana (Transvaal) Land Co., the shares in which rose from 25 to 2110 some time ago.

Fred W. Worth and E. S. Govan, the agents for another large London syndicate, have secured no less than thirty British Columbia mines, which they are going right ahead to develop.

Real estate seems to be scarce in Rosland. Through contributions from public-spirited citizens the people of Rosland have the pleasure of playing baseball on a baseball field and general sporting area a section of land on Corbin Heights. The ground is divided into Baseball Flats, and recently some strangers arrived in town and appropriated the area as a site for their dwellings.

Rich Find at Forty-Nine Creek. J. Nettleton, J. Brown and L. B. Leitch, three Rosland prospectors, have discovered valuable gold deposits on Forty-nine Creek, about ten miles from Nelson and about five miles from the Robson and Nelson branch of the C. P. R. The ore is free-milled and the leads are several feet wide, and can be traced for 4000 feet.

The Idaho mines in the Sloan and expected to divide \$200,000 and to expect to divide regularly the dividend of \$150,000 to \$200,000 a month from now.

Rosland is situated in British Columbia, eight miles from the international boundary line between Canada and the United States. It is reached from the north via the Canadian Pacific River; from the south by the Columbia and Western Railway; from the west, via Spokane, Washington; from the east, via the Northern and Northport, and from there to Trail by steamer.

ANARCHY IN MADAGASCAR.

The French Authorities Powerless to Reach the Rebels and the Government is Only Official.

Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 29.—A correspondent of the South American and West Indian Correspondence Bureau, who happens to be out in Madagascar at present, writes to the chief of the bureau at this centre as follows: "The social and political condition of Madagascar at present is far from being in the state that the indifference of the last files of newspapers have represented would indicate. On the contrary, except where the French garrisons are quartered, the island is in a perfect state of anarchy, and forgers who have gone up the country from Majunga are having a lively time and are being shot at by the French authorities. The same is true of the other parts of the island, and the French authorities are powerless to reach the rebels, and the government is only official."

There is a widespread impression that Ontario's gold fields will hold out for some time longer. The portion of Ontario lying north and west of the head waters of the Ottawa, now peopled by 60,000 inhabitants, yet have a population of 1,000,000.

H. K. Picard, the English engineer, imported to Hastings Co. by the Canadian Gold Fields Co., says the Delora ore will assay about \$30 to the ton. Buildings are being raised up, and 50 men are now developing the mine.

Another Big Strike Up North. A deal is now on foot that will probably result in transferring the Lucky Coon property to the Lucky Coon Property Gold Mines Company of London, which has just placed two big gold mines of New Zealand on the British market at 1000 shares and now proposes to put the Lucky Coon on the same market. The gentlemen representing the company are William Dunton and Dr. John Hunter, who is mining engineer and consulting engineer, both of Edinburgh, Scotland, and Duncan McLaren of Creston, Ont., who is to be the resident engineer and manager of the interests of the company.

The water front had a decidedly deserted appearance yesterday afternoon. Only three steamers arrived, the Macassa, Lakeside and Chicora. Passengers are few, but freight is very plentiful. Mariners have been notified that the Welland Canal will be kept open till Sunday for the passage of boats for the rest of the season.

ANARCHY IN MADAGASCAR.

The French Authorities Powerless to Reach the Rebels and the Government is Only Official.

Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 29.—A correspondent of the South American and West Indian Correspondence Bureau, who happens to be out in Madagascar at present, writes to the chief of the bureau at this centre as follows: "The social and political condition of Madagascar at present is far from being in the state that the indifference of the last files of newspapers have represented would indicate. On the contrary, except where the French garrisons are quartered, the island is in a perfect state of anarchy, and forgers who have gone up the country from Majunga are having a lively time and are being shot at by the French authorities. The same is true of the other parts of the island, and the French authorities are powerless to reach the rebels, and the government is only official."
