OPENING DAY AT HAMILTON

Fine Weather, Small Fields, and Favorites Win Four of the Six Races

BARLEY SUGAR BEAT KASLO.

Kentworth, at 1 to 25, Walked Home in Opening Angus-Won Steeplechase.

The Hamilton Jockey Club was favored with the weather for the opening day. Six races were on the card, which was none too strong, and was reduced to tame proportions by scratches. Four favorites won, Barley Sugar beating Kaslo in the third race, and the event at the bottom going to the only outsider of the day, Tyrus, at 5 to 1. Fourteen looks did business in the ring, and it could hardly have been a poorer day.

The steeplechase started the jumpers to the limit, the Mexican entry leading by a mile and a half, and the horse sometimes up to their knees. Quickilver was 20 lengths ahead to stay up to win. Cory was in second place, but the going was too heavy, and he was passed him, day fell off at the last jump in the field, but remounted, and Angus retained his position. Jack Carey was well supported, while Cory and Quickilver were also backed to win.

PAPER MAKERS' CONDUCT

Royal Commission Investigating the Condition of the Trade in Session in Toronto.

JUDGE TASCHEREAU PRESIDING.

Several Witnesses Examined Yesterday—Hard and Fast Agreement Showed—Want Duty Removed.

Judge Taschereau of Quebec is conducting an investigation into the alleged paper combine in court room No. 1 at the City Hall. W. J. White of Montreal is representing the Canadian paper manufacturers, and Walter Barwick, K. C., is looking after the interests of the Canadian Press Association.

Several witnesses were examined yesterday. Edward Young of the Consolidated Paper and Paper Company was the first witness, and said his firm became a member of the Canadian Paper Makers' Association in January of this year.

Mr. Barwick's line of questioning was to bring out the nature of the bylaws and constitution of the Paper Makers' Association, but Mr. White signified his assent to produce contracts showing that the price of paper was fixed by the association.

The secretary of the association, James Harty, produced a copy of the agreement made in February, 1900, in which 20 firms and companies formed themselves into an association. The agreement is an obligation to maintain the price fixed by the association, and penalties for breach of the contract are provided for.

Mr. White said that the association is a bona fide association, and that there were to be no outside concessions or deals with customers. Each company put up \$500 guarantee to the association, and this was to be forfeited if they broke any of them.

Mr. Barwick asked if the association was a trust, and if so, whether it was a trust in violation of the law. Mr. White said that the association was a bona fide association, and that it was not a trust.
