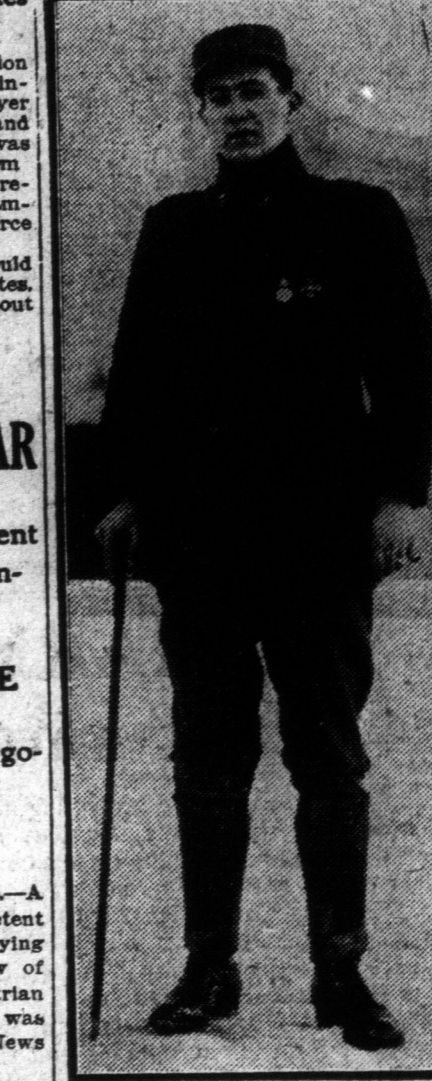

SOLDIER HEROES BACK FROM FRANCE

Of Fifty-Seven Returning, Eighteen Have Lost Limbs.

JACK MUNRO ARRIVES

Brings With Him Dog Mascot of Famous Princess Pats.

Two battalions of invalided soldiers arrived in Toronto yesterday morning, after "doing their bit" on the battlefields of France. The first party, consisting of 18 amputation cases, men who had lost a leg or an arm, or, as in two instances, both legs, arrived at the Union Station at 7 a.m. In the second party, which came in two hours later, were 39 more war heroes, all more or less severely wounded. All the returned soldiers were met at the station by relatives, and members of the Dominion Hospitals Commission and the Voluntary Aid Committee. Three ambulances, a hospital wagon, motor cars and special street cars were provided to transport the soldiers from the depot to the Spadina Military Hospital.

One of the most prominent among yesterday's arrivals was Pte. "Jack" Munro, a heavy-weight boxer, who once fought the G. E. F., was prior to joining the C. E. F., was mayor of Elk River, Minn., Ontario. His once strong right arm was paralyzed by a bullet which struck his should-

FEW MENTIONED IN LATEST LIST

Only Eight Toronto Names Are Included in Casualties.

FOUR ARE WOUNDED

One Now Listed as Killed and Another Presumed Dead.

Eight names of Toronto soldiers are in the latest casualty lists. The total is below the average usually reported. Of the eight casualties four are men wounded. One man previously missing is now listed as killed, one is reported "presumed dead," one missing, and one seriously ill.

Pte. C. H. Silvester, two years ago reported missing, is now officially listed by Ottawa as presumed dead. He was born in Toronto 25 years ago and went overseas as a member of the 3rd Battalion. He was a printer by trade. His home was at 182 Euclid avenue.

Pte. I. M. Berkovitz, 39 Armstrong avenue, missing since last July, is now officially reported killed in action. He was 31 years of age and came to Toronto from England six years ago. He is survived by his widow and three children.

Pte. Charles H. Hambrough is reported wounded for the third time. He is a member of St. Cuthbert's Anglican Church, Leaside. He went away with the 74th Battalion, but was later transferred to the Mounted

Canadian Soldiers Happy in Switzerland's Camps

After visiting her husband, Sgt. Joseph Cameron, who is interned in Switzerland as a prisoner of war, Mrs. Cameron, 156 Blackthorne avenue, has returned to Toronto. Sgt. Cameron, a member of the 15th Battalion, was taken prisoner at St. Julien, April 24, 1915, and was transferred to Murren, Switzerland, last August.

Mrs. Cameron found Canadian prisoners in Switzerland in the best of spirits, and glad to have been exchanged to Switzerland from German camps, where severity of food caused hardships. Sgt. Cameron was in Göttingen, and there six surgeons operated on his car. The hearing was lost, however.

Mrs. Cameron visited the place of her birth in Scotland on her return trip. She said the war's effect was considerably more noticeable there than in Canada. Sgt. Cameron was formerly an employe of the T. Eaton Co.

This brings the membership up to 1,204, of which 218 men, women and adherents have joined the church. Total collections amounted to \$18,000, including \$7,200 to missions, showing an increase of \$1,000 over the contributions to the mission; last year there is a balance in hand of \$1,100 after paying \$1,000 to the church debt.

Rumplemead Church. This church has increased its contributions to missions by fifty per cent, and everything points to the same being in first-class shape.

Davenport Road Church. With a membership of about 500, this church paid off \$1,800 on the mortgage last year, and it is anticipated there will be still a balance in hand. There are now 159 names on the honor roll.

Dovercourt Road Church. The total raised to meet the current expenses of the church was about \$14,000, of which amount about \$8,500 was applied to the mortgage, leaving a balance in hand of about \$200. About \$5,000 was raised for missions, of which \$1,100 goes towards the Ross fund of the church, this being used to assist the 200 boys on active service. The membership is now between 1,400 and 1,500. The record on the honor roll is twelve killed, three prisoners of war, and two missing for about six months.

Kew Beach Church. This church reports the best year in its history. The church debt has been decreased by almost \$400, and the church has sent 150 men to the front.

Eglinton Church. Eglinton Presbyterian Church shows an increase in its membership of nearly eighty, and the honor roll now contains 175 names.

West Presbyterian Church. The managers of this church report the best year in the history of its congregation, the revenue having increased this year by over \$400. The contributions for the maintenance are \$7,500 and the year closed with a balance in hand of \$225. The total membership is now 850, and the honor roll contains 124 names.

Wychwood Church. The Rev. W. A. McTaggart states that the church has increased its revenue this year by \$5,000, an increase over that of last year of \$700. The membership has grown by 150 names, and 160 names now figure on the honor roll. During the year \$500 has been raised for Red Cross work.

Riversdale Church. For the first time in its history, the congregation has reached four figures. The membership now totals 1,200, and \$1,200 has been paid off the church debt during the year. Total revenue contributed for ordinary purposes amounted to about \$10,000, and shows a good balance in hand. The church has an honor roll of 250 names.

High Park Church. The receipts for 1916 amounted to about \$12,000, and there is a balance in hand of about \$2,200. At yesterday's meeting of the police commissioners in the city hall, Chief of Police Grasset stated that the question of an increase of pay for the Toronto police force would not be considered by the board until the estimates were taken up in February. He pointed out that as the force was reduced by 90 men since the outbreak of war something might be done. Col. Grasset also stated that the offices vacated by the medical health department would not be used by the police.

Reports against certain license holders of refreshment rooms resulted in several licenses being refused. Six of these were in No. 2 division. Others were given their licenses with a warning.

The bond required by jitney owners was reduced from \$1000 to \$200. Policeman Small was awarded a merit mark for saving the life of a man overcome thru inhaling illuminating gas. Three policemen, McCarroll (180), Humphries (400) and Neff (14) have resigned.

It was decided to grant the father of Policeman Johnston, who was recently killed at the front, half-pay from the time the officer left the force.

SALE IS SET ASIDE BY ORDER OF COURT

Action Involving Essex Farm Decided at Osgoode Hall.

Mr. Justice Britton gave judgment at Osgoode Hall yesterday in an action between Annie J. Angus and her daughter, Mary J. Maitre, over the deed to a valuable farm in Malden, Essex County. After placing a mortgage on the farm for \$5,000 Mrs. Angus was obliged to give up the farm, deeded it to her daughter on condition that she take over the mortgage and pay her \$200 a year for maintenance.

She later started action to annul the deed, on the ground that undue influence was used, but his lordship did not find this to be so, but thought she acted under fear of losing the farm and ordered the deed cancelled and the bill of sale of the chattels set aside. In conclusion his lordship says, "The truth is this painful case between mother and daughter has in great part arisen from the fact that the husband does not care for farm life, and does not agree with his daughter."

T. R. Ferguson appeared before Mr. Justice Clute and secured judgment against E. Press, on behalf of the Maple Leaf Milling Company, for the sum of \$225.25 upon the admissions of Mr. Press in his examination. Mr. Press is a Brnoebridge baker, and alleged that the flour for which the claim was made was shipped to him faster than he could use it, and counter-claimed for \$2,000 damages.

Defendants Consent to Judgment for One Thousand Dollars Without Costs.

After a short consultation yesterday morning the counsel for both parties in the libel action of Controller Foster against W. F. Maclean, M.P., Hugh J. Maclean and Albert E. Smythe agreed to a settlement by which the defendants consented to a judgment for \$1,000, without costs, in the application of counsel, Mr. Justice Latchford directed judgment accordingly.

In October, 1915, he was invalided home and received a captaincy in the 11th Battalion. Resigning, he returned to the 3rd Battalion at the front, but has

been returned home again because of shell shock. He says the Canadian troops at the front are much better equipped now than ever before, both in regard to working, fighting and living conditions.

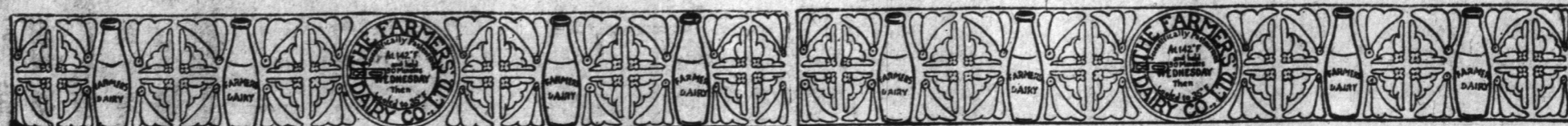
REINHARDT BREWERY MAY BE WOUND UP

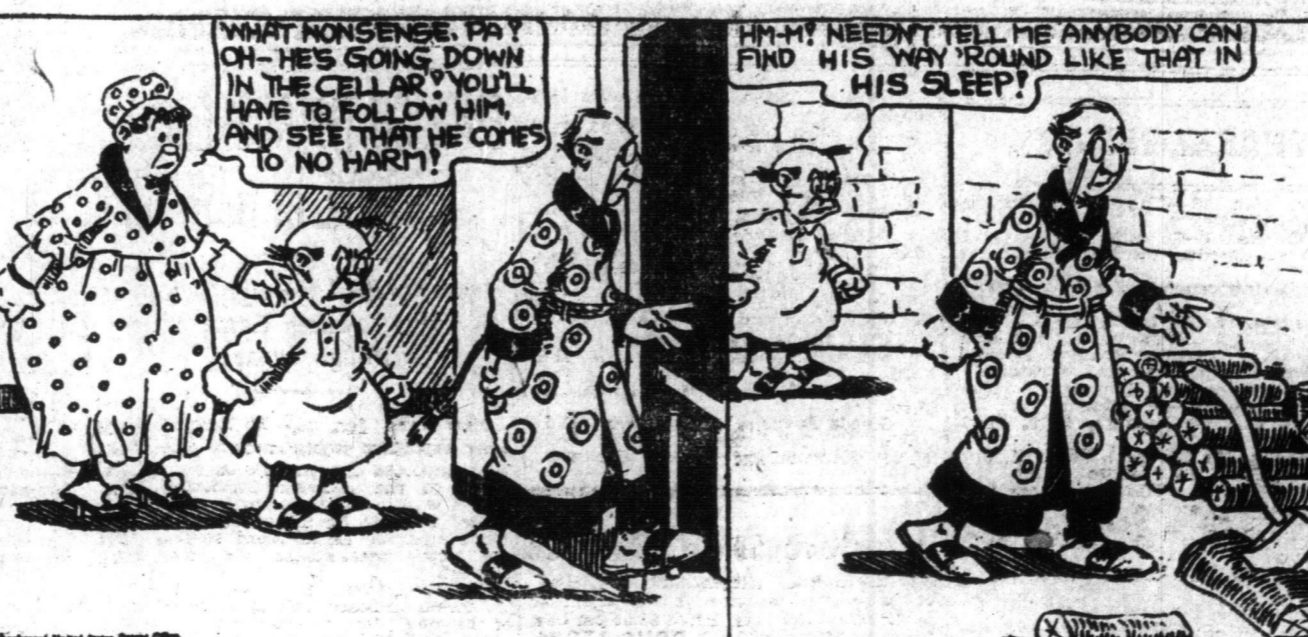

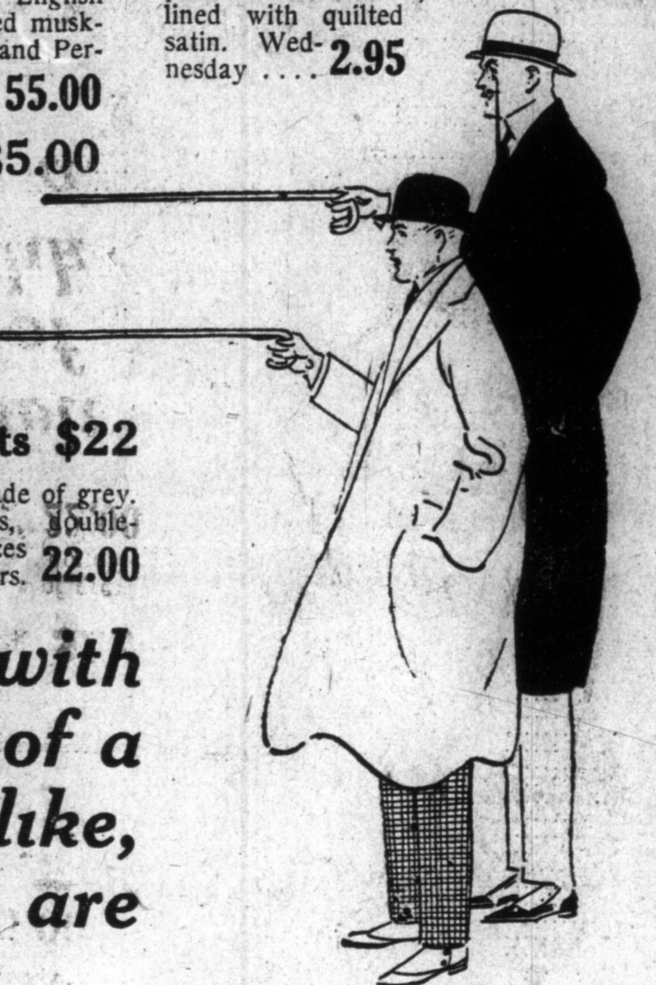
