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## REPORT FOR 1882.

THE Report which your Committee have now to submit marks the completion of the 62nd year in the history of this Society-a respectable age for institutions on this side of the Atlantic. During this period great progress has been made by us, as a community, in those things that minister to the increase of wealth, civilisation, and physical wellbeing. And if our position as regards higher and better things than these be compared with what it was at the time when this Society was founded, the hope may be reasonably entertained that here also satisfactory progress has been made, and that the work of our various churches and Religious and Benevolent Societies has produced an enduring influence for good upon our rising national life. Among these such a Society as this must have an honourable and important position, for its great object is the dissemination of truths and principles which alone constitute a solid and abiding foundation for material prosperity and greatness. It is gratifying to your Committee to be able to assure you that this Society still enjoys the confidence and benevolent regard of the community among whom, and for whom, it exists. Amid the manifold changes that have taken place in the conditions of our social, intellectual and religious life, institutions such as this cannot remain unaffected; yet they must not relax their efforts for good, nor yield an inch of the position they have won; for, whilst men run to and fro, with restless activity,

> "Seeking for some great thing to do, Or secret thing to know;"

and whilst books and reading-matter of every sort, and much of a very questionable sort, are increasing, as they never increased before, the duty of "holding forth the Word of Life" was never more imperative than it is at the present time, nor the necessity greater.

Passing on to the field of our own operations, your Committee have to report that the results of the past year have been marked by steady, if uneventful, progress. Our esteemed friend, Mr. Green, now

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in his thirty-second year of service, has been enabled to go through the entire visitation of the Branches, with the exception of two or three, where, owing to the excitement of the General Election, the appointments failed. A full account of Mr. Green's work among the Branches will be found in his report, to which your attention is specially invited. One new Station, Agnes, in the county of Compton, has been established, and one Station, South Georgetown, and one Branch, English River, have been merged into one large and more efficient Branch, which promises much successful work in the future. A new Branch has also been organized at Marsboro, in the county of Compton. Thus the number of Stations and Branches is at present date 205. The financial summary of our operations with the Branches for the year is satisfactory and encouraging. The receipts on Purchase Account have amounted to \$2454, and Free Contributions to \$5086; total, \$7541, showing an increase over the receipts of the previous year of \$1050; of which \$277 are on Purchase Account, and \$723 Free Contributions. This is the best return reported since the year 1874. Some of the Branches deserve honourable mention for their conspicuous liberality, and among these Danville, with its fiery trial of loss and disaster, deserves the first place; Sherbrooke, North-West Glengarry and Lachine deserve notice also. Apart from the actual distribution of copies of the Word of God, the Society's work among the Branches has an influence for good, in that the regular visits of the Travelling Agent, at which public meetings are held, serve to bring together on the same platform ministers and leading members of the various churches, who have then opportunities for addressing mixed audiences on the great work in whose progress all have a common interest.

Your Committee recommend that instead of the designation of Travelling Agent, which Mr. Green has heretofore borne, he receive that of District Secretary, which is in accordance with the usage of the Parent Society.

The business of the Depository and Bible House has been conducted by your General Agent, Mr. Stacey, with his usual punctuality and diligence, and to the satisfaction of your Committee. The receipts on account of cash sales at the Bible House have amounted to \$2564.58, showing an increase of \$53.06 as compared with the receipts of 1881.

The number of copies issued has been:—Bibles, 7266; Testaments, 5452; Portions, 2582; Total, 15,300, as against 15,540, for the previous year; and showing a decrease of 240 for the year now

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reported. It is satisfactory to note that 2755 copies in French have been distributed, making an increase of 281 copies as compared with last year.

The number of copies disposed of by gratuitous distribution has been:—Bibles, 665; Testaments, 595; Portions, 680; Total, 1940, amounting in value to \$374.58, and showing a decrease as compared with the previous year, though not a large one.

The Treasurer's Report shows:—Receipts, including the balance of \$3233.27, on account of 1881, \$22036.42. In these are included the following special items:—

The last-mentioned bequest was made upon the condition that the amount thereof be invested by this Society as a permanent endowment, and that the proceeds of the investment be paid to the Committee of the Ladies' Bible Association, in Montreal, in connection with this Auxiliary, in aid of the Bible Women's effort.

This bequest, together with the \$1500 bequeathed by the late Mr. C. H. Peck, has been placed at a liberal rate of interest for the objects of the several bequests.

The Disbursements for the year have amounted to \$21,516.05; leaving a balance to credit of Current Expense Account of \$3,233.55-

The Colportage operations have been of much the same character as those of the previous year. Five Colporteurs have been employed, for longer or shorter periods, of whom four have been French-speaking. Of the good results of the labours of one of these among his fellow-countrymen your Committee have received gratifying intelligence.

A favourable opportunity presented itself for resuming work during the Summer and Autumn months in one of our important Englishspeaking districts, of which your Committee availed themselves, and with satisfactory results.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Ladies' Bible Association of which a fuller Report will be printed herewith:—

"The Ladies' Auxiliary Bible Association, in this the 57th year of its existence, continues to attract new life and energy, while retaining the fresh, warm interest of many of its friends of earlier years. As a proof of this, the services of three young ladies were obtained to collect in districts in which for some years past the duty had

wholly devolved on one. In more than one instance it was noted that collector and contributor had had opportunities of exchanging thoughts on Bible Truth, which encouraged and strengthened both.

To the list of collectors, the names have been added of young friends who promise to continue their interest in this good work.

The Bible Women continue their work in the Jail, Hospital and different districts.

The faithful friends of the past continue their liberal support of all special objects, Mission Rooms assistance and Hospital Bible Women.

The Ladies' Auxiliary Bible Association find that although many Church denominations and societies have adopted this mode of Christian work since their organization of the Bible Women's effort, twenty-three years ago, that its usefulness seems only to increase. In the jail it has been found that the Bible Class teaching has been so richly blessed in arousing the imprisoned to a desire to live in harmony with God's will, that definite plans and arrangements have been made to receive such in a "Home," where, under Christian influence and teaching, their resolutions for good may be strengthened and confirmed.

For the Hospital it is now found necessary that a second Bible Woman be engaged, that the weary sufferers may have more frequent opportunities of hearing Bible truth.

It is also hoped that a District for some time vacant will soon again have the benefit of the services of a serious, earnest Bible Woman."

An abstract of the last annual report of the Parent Society will be given in Appendix. It is gratifying to learn that the year reported on was prosperous, both in the matter of receipts and of the number of copies sent forth; the latter amounting to 2,938,000, being an increase of 91,971 over the previous year. Your Committee recommend that the sum of £100 stg. be remitted to the Parent Society as a free grant in aid of its general operations, with the cordial thanks of this Auxiliary for the prompt and generous co-operation and sympathy extended to it by the Parent Society during the year now closed.

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#### TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

#### BIBLE-WOMEN'S EFFORT

IN CONNECTION WITH THE

#### LADIES' AUXILIARY BIBLE ASSOCIATION.

In presenting this the Twenty-third Annual Report, your Committee recognize the Divine goodness, that has permitted those actively engaged in it to continue their work, and its friends to increase their liberal support.

Th "Female Prison" Bible Woman's work having engaged special attention during the past year, it has been deemed advisable to review its whole history.

#### FEMALE PRISON.

As the work in the Female Prison has been carried on so quietly for some years, and the present Superintendent has been so reluctant to publish reports, an impression seems to have been unintentionally given that this branch of the work was almost abandoned by the "Bible Women's Effort," in connection with the Ladies' Bible Association. It has therefore been thought advisable both to recall some facts as to the faithful labours of this Society in the past, and to give some report of work more recently done.

In June, 1860, a few Christian ladies in Montreal, after reading the Missing Link, believed that the Lord was calling them to begin in Canada a work similar to that already so blessed in England. After prayerful consideration their "missing link" was found in their first Bible Woman, a Mrs. S., who was superintended most faithfully and lovingly by one of their number.

Her district commenced at Bleury street, and extended eastward to the Jail. Other Bible Women were added from year to year, each with her superintendent, and various branches of work taken up, as well as different districts occupied, but Mrs. S. through the eleven years of her labour seems to have been specially useful in two most difficult branches, the Jail and the numerous improper houses, into which she had a God-given power of gaining access with the Word of life.

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In her report of November 9, 1860, she writes: "Spent four hours in the Jail, spoke to 110 females; several among these prostitutes I have been in the habit of visiting in their previous haunts. Met with two persons who particularly interested me, a widow who had two children in the Ladies Benevolent, and who, but for her besetting sin, drunkenness, could make a respectable living by washing and getting up linen, which I am told she does beautifully. But when her term o imprisonment expires who is to befriend her? who to throw the blessed influence around her which might shield her from temptation, and be the means of setting her feet in the right path? The other a tidy looking young woman, who has promised to go to the Magdalene. I am to call on the morning of liberation and take her there. God bless His work though performed through so feeble an agent."

In the report of the Superintendent for 1862 we find this paragraph:

"Our first Bible Woman's district includes the Jail. In it there are many intemperate and fallen women previously known to her, and in whose welfare she takes a deep interest. She finds the time of their imprisonment the best opportunity for gaining a quiet attention to the reading of the Scriptures, and repeatedly she has induced them at the expiry of their confinement to go direct to the Magdalene Asylum, or to situations she had found for those she thought were to be trusted as truly in earnest to do better. In May last she was refused admission. After much troublesome negotiation, first by the ladies and afterwards by the gentlemen's committee of the Bible Society, admission, clogged by restrictions, has been granted."

This was afterwards more freely given, and from that date both Bible Woman and Superintendent have always been appointed by this Society. We give a few extracts from the Superintendent's report, 1863:—

"A most important work has been going on in the Jail during the past year. Mrs. S. has visited at least once a week, and met the inmates in a large room, where forty or fifty females were usually gathered together. During this time they have all paid the most earnest attention to the Word as it was read and explained to them, asking a great many questions; and the Bible Woman, after closing the meeting with prayer, has spent another hour or more talking to them, and following them to their cells, where she has constantly spoken to them a great deal alone. Her heart has been specially given to this part of her work, and from the very beginning she has been abundantly blessed in it. Seeing the influence of the Word on these poor creatures, she has been encouraged to go on. Even when her weary body pleaded for rest, she felt too interested in the work to be sensible of fatigue, and she has had her reward. Since last May no less than thirty-three of these poor outcasts have through her means been restored to the paths of virtue, and are enjoying the blessings of a happy home, some amongst their friends, the greater number with respectable farmers."

"We may here remark that when their time was expired, these women have been given full liberty to go where they would, or to remain in the Jail until places could be found for them. They every one responded to the trust that was thus placed in them, and chose willingly to continue where they were, until arrangements could be made to dispose of them comfortably in the country."

In 1864 the Superintendent writes:-

"The Jail itself with its neighbourhood, and all that comes of visiting there could almost profitably occupy the time of one Bible Woman." And further

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on:—"In the Jail much has been accomplished by the Bible Woman, in whose district it is. If we were at liberty to speak freely of this work, and of that of improper houses in the neighbourhood, we could tell many sad tales of sin an lits suffering, and of some instances of heartfelt penitence. In all, forty-seven have been restored to their friends, or put to service with respectable farmers. One evidence of their sincere desire to do well is the eagerness they evince to get away from the scene of temptation—anywhere out of Montreal, to make a new start." And again:—

"One girl has been rescued from destruction of whom it was said, 'there is no use in attempting to do her any good.' The keeper in the Jail said that there was only one he had seen that appeared as bad as she was, and that one is now in the Penitentiary. This girl was without any friends, nor has she any now but the Bible Woman. For three years she was one of the worst characters possible. She became very ill, and nearly lost the use of one eye, and it was then that the Bible Woman gained an influence over her, which was the beginning of

her great change."

The report of 1865 notices some change in Mrs. S.'s district, but adds:—"The Bible Woman spends several hours weekly in the Jail, reading to, speaking to, and praying with the inmates. When any female amongst these appears in earnest to turn from her evil ways, she inquires minutely into her history, and, at her liberation, if the Bible Woman has confidence in her sincerity, she supplies her with more or less clothing, the gift of kind friends of the Mission, and send her to a situation in the country. During the past year eleven girls have in this way been rescued, and good accounts have been received of their continuing steady. Much of her time is given to the visiting of houses of improper character, and from these she has restored to fathers, mothers and brothers ten young women, and to one husband his wife. From the same source nine have been sent to the Female Home."

We now quote from the report of 1866:-

"The narratives of some of these poor girls are very touching. One had been enticed away from a distant home by a young man who had deserted her; another had been committed on an accusation which afterwards proved to be groundless, but found in the Prison that spiritual life which she had failed to find elsewhere. Others, new to the degradation of imprisonment, expressed themselves as now for the first time awakened to a view of the evil of their ways, and the sin of past disobedience and neglect of opportunities." Speaking of the Bible Woman's visits to the houses so closely connected with Jail work, the report continues: "It is stated that four such houses have been closed in the course of the year, in part, at least, through the influence of the Bible Woman. Several inmates of such places have been induced to go to the Female Home, and twenty-nine have been restored to friends."

One short extract from the report of 1867 will be sufficient. Referring to the Bible Woman's work in the houses before spoken of, it continues:—"The first of the houses referred to was closed in April. It was kept by a married woman, who had her daughter with her. In the beginning of the month she was ill, and the Word, often read at her house before, made a deep impression on her mind. She trembled lest she should be called away before she had time to repent. The deep consciousness of her guilt filled her with the fear that God would take ven-

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geance on her sins. As she expressed it, she had an awful terror of God. This feeling gave way to one of love and gratitude as the work of Christ for her salvation was revealed to her by the Holy Spirit. She and her husband and daughter have gone to the country, where they are strangers; and a short time ago a letter was received from her with good accounts. She trusts that many doors like hers may be closed. The daughter is attending the Minister's Bible class."

The report of 1868 notices, "Cases of children abandoned by their parents, or one or both parents in Jail, and not a door save those of R. C. Institutions open to shelter them."

In 1871 the Bible Woman writes of the Jail work: "Sixteen have been induced to make an effort to reform, and with that intention have gone to the Female Home."

The report of 1872 is a short one, but has this interesting notice of the Jail: "The work in the Montreal Jail has been brought into a more systematic and effective form; one of our experienced Bible Women being now employed under the superintendence of the lady who has for some time attended to this important and somewhat onerous work. The Bible Woman visits the jail weekly, and gives a Bible lesson to the Protestant women. The Lady Superintendent is allowed to visit them in their cells. They endeavor to find homes or situations for any who profess a willingness to lead a more respectable life at the expiry of their imprisonment."

In 1873 the same Superintendent writes: "It is a year this month since Mrs. F. and I began the work together, and I rejoice to say that our efforts have not been in vain. One young woman has died trusting in Jesus: several have been for months in the country, and some of the hard, hard cases have been encouraged to work, and kept out of Jail for weeks at a time." A very interesting account is given of all the different cases cared for that year, and then follows: "This account may be summed up by stating that twenty-nine friendless women have been provided with homes, and otherwise assisted by us during the year. Several more would have been added to this number could we keep them when they come to us from the Jail. At the present time six of these women are in Jail again; eight are in situations in Montreal; four we cannot account for, and two we have not heard from since they were sent away. Five have been for months in their situations in the country, and we have the most satisfactory accounts of them from their mistresses, and encouraging letters from the women themselves. One has been in the country but two weeks, one is married, one is in Beauport Asylum, and one has died in Jail."

The report in 1875 is very full, and deeply interesting, but we have only space or one extract: "Situations have been obtained for seventeen women, seven of whom are still in their places. Ten women and eight children have been provided with homes in the different Institutions. One of these little ones, an unusually bright child, nearly four years of age, was found in the Jail last spring, and taken just as she was to the Protestant Infants' Home, for we dared not wait for the mother to take a second thought after she had once given her consent to the child's removal. Often had we urged the mother to give up this child, and having gained possession of her we are not without hope that we shall yet obtain permission to place her in a comfortable home as an adopted child."

In 1876 the Superintendent states that during the past year eighteen women had

been received from the Jail into the Home for Friendless Women. Speaking of a young girl in Jail for the first time she says: "It was the last visit I made before leaving town for the summer, and, as I turned to leave the ward, said, you will never be able again to say, 'No one has cared for my soul.' I offer you a home and the advice and assistance of Christian friends, to enable you to return to a virtuous life; do not refuse it, for it may never come to you again. About three weeks afterwards the Matron wrote me C- was in the Home, she came there late in the evening, related the conversation I allude to, concluded her statement by saying: 'Those parting words have never left my mind,' and begged to be taken into the Home. In September she was removed by a kindly Christian lady to her own house, to fill the situation of housemaid, and her conduct has in all respects been most satisfactory to her mistress."

In 1877 we read: "The lady superintending our work in the Jail has resigned, in consequence of her removal from the city, and as yet her place has not been supplied. The work in this field has been one full of trial and difficulty, and this has been increased in the past summer by the uncertainties as to the intentions of the Government with respect to the disposal of the Protestant prisoners. These appear at length to be removed; and the committee, being deeply impressed with the importance of the work of the Bible Women in the reformation of these unhappy and misguided women who are inmates of the Jail, will use the utmost exertion to have the work faithfully attended to." Another Superintendent was soon found

and the work continued.

The report of 1878 states: "The jail work during the last year has opened up some new features, the prisoners having been removed to a portion of the new Female Jail on Fullum street." The Superintendent reports as follows:

"It is deplorable that the arrangements are so unsuitable. Two large dormitories receive all the inmates indiscriminately, the worst and most hardened characters overruling and crushing out, if possible, any yearning after a better life which appear in those younger in sin."

The following is from the pen of the lady now superintending the Bible work in the Jail:

In 1878 I was sent for by the Matron of the Protestant Female Prison to visit a young girl over whom I had once had some influence, but who had since led a wild life, and was then in prison. She was very troublesome there, and the Matron wished me to speak to her. A few loving words, recalling the past, melted her to tears, and she promised to try and do better. Then another, and another was spoken to, and when the whole afternoon had passed in blessed service amongst the prisoners, and I was leaving them, the Matron said: " The lady who superintended the Bible Woman here has had to resign on account of her health, and there is no one visiting now. Could you come and help us?" Remembering, however, that she had overstepped her authority, she added that both B ble Woman and Superintendent were always appointed by the Ladies' Bible Association. The prisoners having been much on my heart, I believed that this was a call to the work, and matters were soon arranged. I visited once a week (unless prevented by illness or necessary absence from town), gave a Bible lesson, inquired into the need of those coming out of Prison, and directed the Bible Woman, as well as I could what to do for them. But so many did not come under the rules of the Home for

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Friendless Women that one day, after walking for hours in search of shelter for the very prisoner to whom I was first called, I went to the Female Home, on Seigneurs street, and begged to have her admitted. They were full, but kindly made arrangements by which they received her. In this way I began working in the Home also, and after a time permission was given to pass any prisoners I thought best through it. From that date to the present from forty to fifty have found shelter there, some for a few days, some for a year or more, and many have been received back again and again, when changing places, or not doing well. A good many have also been cared for in the Home for Friendless Women, but as I have not access to their books I cannot give the number.

In 1879 the Bible Woman I first had was removed, and Mrs. N., who has indeed proved my right hand in all labours of love, commenced her work with me. Our efforts have been much hindered by the very bad Prison arrangements mentioned by other Superintendents. The prisoners being so much together in the work-room through the day, and, far worse, all together in the two large dormitories at night, has counteracted much of our teaching and effort for their reformation. This, I rejoice to say, is beginning to be remedied, and I trust the Government will yet secure to the Protestant Female Prisoners a suitable building, with room to carry out the needed reforms. Notwithstanding these, and many other drawbacks, good has constantly been done. This will perhaps be better understood if we give a few narratives:

A woman suffering greatly from a broken arm, the result of a fall when drunk, was constantly conversed with, and at the expiration of her confinement received into the Female Home, provided with necessary clothing (for she had scarcely what would cover her) and, after a trial, engaged as a servant; remained there six months. earned the clothing she required, obtained other situations, and although that was five years ago has never been seen in Jail since.

Another, known to Bible Women and Superintendents as an almost constant inmate of the Prison, year after year, stealing something as soon as she was released to obtain the shelter of the Prison once more, was also taken to the Female Home, and a situation found for her with one who knew her character well, but was willing to "give her one more chance," and with whom she remained a whole year, working well, and looking so neat and respectable that it rejoiced our hearts to see her. I regret to say she has fallen again, and is still sometimes in Prison, yet we trust all is not lost, and it must be remembered that she was one of the most hopeless cases.

One day I noticed a pretty little girl of seventeen, not in the Prison dress, who wept while I was teaching; and on speaking to her learned that she had been induced to come to Montreal by a young man to whom she was engaged to be married, and who promised to marry her as soon as they arrived. She was un kindly treated by a step-mother, and therefore more easily tempted from her home. On their arrival he took her to a strange hotel, and from there the next day, to what he called "a boarding-house." There he remained with her for a week or more, then went out one day, telling her he would return in a little while, but he never came back! She found she was expected to remain as an inmate of this house which was, of course, of an improper character, and she ran out of it. paid her board elsewhere while the very small sum of money he had given her lasted, and then—where could she go? What could she do, a mere child, and a stranger!

She went to a Police Station and gave herself up for protection. Her friends had been written to when I found her, but in the meantime she was in Jail awaiting an answer! I said, "poor child! this is no place for you," and some of the most hardened prisoners begged me. with tears, to take her away, saying, "what she does not know of evil now, she will soon learn here."

After many hours' work on the part of Mrs. N., with what assistance I could give her, permission was kindly granted to remove the girl to the Female Home. From there we corresponded with her friends, and after some weeks succeeded in sending her to an aunt, who received her very kindly. We have every reason to believe that this dear child accepted Christ and His great salvation while in the Home, and the letters received from her afterwards were full of love and hope.

A poor paralyzed woman who suffered month after month, and we feared would die on her Priso bed, was tenderly cared for by Bible Woman, Matron and some of e prisoners, and at length removed to the General Hospital, where she died trusting in the precious Blood that cleanseth from all sin. I shall never forget the pleasure with which she listened to the Word read by her bedside in Prison, and the peace she seemed to feel after prayer was offered for her.

One young girl who was taken to prison when she was cast out of a low "house" where she was no longer wanted, was very ill, and in terrible distress of body and mind when I first saw her in the dormitory. For some time I thought her one of the lowest and least hopeful cases, but Mrs. N. was indefatigable in her efforts for her, and when her term of imprisonment ended we took her to the Home, where, on the whole, her conduct was satisfactory, though occasionally she gave some trouble, for which she always seemed sorry, and would break down and weep bitterly when kindly spoken to. A situation was obtained for her, and she earned some money, which the Matron of the Home put in the Savings Bank at her request. After a time her sister added a small sum to it, and when there was nearly enough to pay her passage to England we supplied what was required, Mrs. N. obtaining from kind friends the necessary clothing for the voyage; and poor Lizzie was returned to her sister.

In one instance we appealed to His Excellency the Governor General on behalf of a girl of sixteen, whose mother had appeared against her and had her imprisoned as a vagrant, to hide the sad condition she was in. The young man who was the father of her child did not know she was in prison until we found him, and he then said he was ready to marry her. Her pardon was granted, she was taken from the prison, married in the Home, and kept there after the birth of her child until she could go to her husband.

These are but a few instances out of the many cared for year by year, but time and space forbid more.

Many and bitter are our disappointments, and it is a difficult and trying work, needing the faith which takes hold of God's strength, and trusts His love at every step; but the deep and earnest attention to the reading of God's Word cannot be without fruit. If we are not permitted to see much that we long for now, yet must we trust the promise that His Word shall not return to Him void: and we firmly believe that when, by God's grace we reach His home above, we shall meet there some of the hard faces and harder hearts (oh, how changed then!) over whom we have wept and mourned, saved by the same limitless grace!

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d trying work, s love at every lord cannot be ag for now, yet void: and we we shall meet ed then!) over When Mrs. N. commenced the Prison work she had also a district in the neighbourhood to visit; but we soon found that it was better to leave this, and give what time could be taken from the Prison, and those coming out, to visit some of the "houses" so often alluded to.

A former inmate of one of these houses died in the General Hospital in 18- I understood that she received life from Him who said, "Him that cometh unto me I will in no wise cast out"—while in the lock ward of the Hospital. first vis ted her there she was a Christian, and many a time we had sweet converse of Christ, and the place He has gone to prepare for His saved ones. One day Mrs. N. asked her what she would do if she could rise from her sick bed. "O, I would go to those houses, and down on my knees I would beg the girls to come away"-was the answer. Alluding to this, shortly before her death, I asked her whether there was anything I could do for her. She told me of one, a companion of hers, still an inmate, whom she longed to have saved. She gave me a dying message to her, which I solemnly promised to deliver, if possible. I found the beautiful girl, and not only delivered my message, but also put the Gospel fully before her, remaining with her nearly an hour. She seemed "almost persuaded" to leave such a wretched life, but, alas! as in so many instances, when I returned the door was closed against me. A good deal was done in the way of visiting these poor lost ones, however, until circumstances beyond our control almost entirely debarred us from them for a time. Now I am again hoping and praying for the right Bible Woman to take this up, as her one work, giving her whole time to it, as Mrs. N.'s hands are more than full. These two branches are better under the same superintendence, as the work of the two Bible Women must be so intimately connected.

Scattered through these houses (I am assured by those who have been inmates) are young girls, new to such degradation and sin, who would gladly be rescued, but who believe that no Christian hand will ever be stretched out to help them; that their case is hopeless; they are lost forever. Shall it be so? O, surely, Christians have not quite forgotten the sweet story of the "woman who was a sinner," or who it was who sat on the well beside another sinner, and in one short hour gave her so deep a draught of the water of life that she became the joyful bearer of that same water to all the thirsting souls of wicked Sychar. Is He not saying to us—"If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them?

#### ST. MARY'S WARD.

The Superintendent's Reports from month to month of the Bible Woman's work in this District give every evidence of the untiring physical energy required, as well as the constant exercise for good of every faculty and disposition of the human heart. The Bible Woman assists and advises in health and sickness, gives Bible instruction to young and old. She must be a true friend to the stranger and a calm comforter at the bed of the dying. It is by her experience and consequent ability to counsel, and her ready active sympathy, that she wins the confidence of those whom she would lead to Christ.

### REPORT OF BIBLE WOMAN FOR ST. MARY'S WARD.

The daily visiting has gone on throughout the year with the usual summer's rest of a fortnight, well-earned and greatly needed. Coming in contact with so much misery and sorrow, and very often sin—its direct and easily traced cause—makes the work a very trying one. The Bible Woman wisely plans her visits so that the dark and the bright may alternate as far as possible. A visit to a wretched home is followed by one to a happy one, and thus she guards against discouragement, and maintains that calm and hopeful spirit so especially required of her. It is not easy to give any adequate account of the good she accomplishes. "A word in season" spoken to the weary so often is only known to the one who hears it, and to Him who sent both messenger and message. In many cases of sickness the visits of the Bible Woman are, it may be, with one or two others, the only opportunity of hearing some Scripture truth read and explained. In the monthly report we read the following:

"In my district there are four mothers, not confined to bed, but unable to attend to their duties through ill-health. How gladly they welcome the words of life given them to trust in Him who doeth what seemeth good in His sight. He is leading their thoughts to see His purposes of love towards their souls, and when suffering they think of Him who suffered and died to redeem them from eternal death."

At another time the account is given of the death of an old man, over 82, who had been a Christian for many years, and often visited in times of sickness and trouble: "A few days before his death, for I visited him daily for a week, he spoke so freely of God's loving providence to him, and how partial his mind was to the 'Book of Psalms.' I repeated many portions out of it to him, when he answered 'All the promises of God are firm. If I die I have a blessed hope through faith in Jesus' blood.' I had prayer; and the hearty blessing he implored of God may it ever be mine! After a prolonged state of unconsciousness, he woke up just to bid farewell to his aged wife and all who stood by him, and soon after closed his eyes forever. He was mercifully taken, that the burden might not be too great upon the loved ones who cared for him."

A glass blower with his wife and three children came to Montreal from the States, and had only been here a few months when he was attacked by sickness, which ended in his death. He had been living a godless life, which he acknowledged to the Bible Woman the first time she saw him. She only paid him three visits. A little book called "The True Sayings of God" was a great comfort to him. The large type made it so easy for him to read, and the conditions of salvation so plainly declared in the salection of verses, it was in every way suited to his need. His wife told the Bible Woman how he prized the book. He himself assured her, after she had prayed with him, "that Jesus saves me, saves me now;" and when unable to speak, the last time she saw him, and the word was repeated to him, "He will keep you in perfect peace," he nodded assent. Two more visits were paid to the widow, who returned to the States with her three children and soon after a fourth was born. Since then nothing has been heard of her.

Such has been a great deal of the work of this year, as of former years. Opportunities occur of getting young g rls into places and children into institutions. One family of orphans who came to this country from Scotland, spent the first year with a married sister. It was too heavy a burden for a delicate woman with

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of former years. en into institutions. and, spent the first clicate woman with her family of small children. The two elder girls were, after repeated efforts, to go into service, where they are doing well. The two youngest were received into the Orphan Asylum, and only one boy remains in the brother-in-aw' house.

Many have been sent to the General Hospital who could not be nursed at home, and have been most thankful for all the kind and skillful attention bestowed on them. One old woman, long visited by the Bible Woman, was taken from the Hospital to the House of Refuge. The Mothers' Meetings continue to be well attended. The work is in the hands of the same lady who kindly undertook it last year, and the Bible teaching is shared with the Superintendent. The women have paid in to the Clothing Fund for the year 1882, \$447.15.

#### HOSPITAL.

The Bible Woman's work carried on in the Hospital differs in many ways from that carried on in the Jail and districts.

In the silence and sufferings of the wards there is a preparedness of feeling for the reception of bliss-bringing, living truth. The Bible must be read to the individual, and every passage carefully selected.

It will be seen that appeals to conscience, softened by personal distress and the frequent presence of death, must be definite, clear, direct, although even such appeals are often not met by responsible desires to learn about "salvation by grace," while singing hymns with strikingly appropriate words. Kind attention or tender sympathy often stirs up resolutions, to live in view of an endless eternity.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT OF HOSPITAL.

Through another year the Bible Woman's work in this most interesting District has steadily continued. During a portion of the year 1881 and the early part of the year 1882, two Bible Women, each on half time (two hours) were engaged in the Hospital work. This was found to be a most suitable and successful division of duty. It was therefore with sincere regret that the Society was obliged to accept the resignation of one of the workers in April last, since which time she has, however, made every effort to visit the Hospital whenever it is practicable for her to do so.

The necessity of having a suitable and permanent place in which each Bible could be kept has been provided for: wire racks were made to order and attached to the tables which are placed between the beds. In order that each rack might contain a copy, the Bible Society, on request, presented twenty-six Bibles and twenty-four Testaments, so that these, in addition to those already in the Hospital, might enable each patient to be the possessor of a copy of God's Word. Of the one hundred and twenty five racks required one hundred were very kindly donated by the manufacturers. The Bible Woman has endeavored to continue her interest in many of the patients who have left the Hospital; some having returned to their homes, others having been provided with situations, others having been taken to various Institutions. The Fund provided has permitted us to supply

food, clothing, etc., to those outgoing patients who are friendless or strangers in the city. Before doing so, however, every effort is made to prove necessity and worthiness. As we recall the names of those with whom we have read and conversed during the past year, and remember the peaceful, happy death-beds beside which we have been privileged to watch, we can say from our hearts, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." We can record many cases of those who have been most indifferent and taciturn, sometimes for weeks, after which time they very gradually have shown a desire to listen to God's word, and then we have been made aware of the great struggle that has existed in the heart of the apparently indifferent ones. Very lately we received a letter, of which the following is an extract :--" I thought it was a great affliction to be laid on a bed of sickness, I now think it has proved to be the greatest blessing that ever happened me, and I thank God hat I have been brought to see the blind state in which I was." As the writer of the above left the Hospital without giving his address, he was lost sight of by those who had taken an interest in him during his illness. The letter was written six or eight weeks after the date of his leaving, therefore we cannot but feel that this voluntary desire to acknowledge that the "chastening" had seemed "grievous." shows that "afterward" it had yielded the "peaceable fruit of righteousness." Only those who visit the Hospital wards can realize the difficulty of recounting, in such a way as to be interesting to others, the details of the work. In it we have had frequently great cause for thankfulness. On several occasions we have rejoiced to hear from those connected with other Christian organizations that from those who had been inmates of the Hospital they had learned that the "message" given, the helpful words said, the simple hymns sung and the offering of the earnest bedside prayer have been richly blessed.

#### GERMAN POPULATION.

During the past year the services of the German Bible Woman have been limited to half time. Her visits number 473. Nine new families have been found—principally immigrants. To the latter the Bible Woman is a friend in need. Information on the requirements of the climate and best schools for children is anxiously sought.

One mother was so satisfied with the advice given in the interest of her children, that she accompanied the Bible Woman to the mothers' meeting, where she engaged for the first time in an evangelical service. The earnest Bible instruction, prayer and praise awakened such interest, that she purchased a Bible, and has attended the meetings regularly ever since.

To the suffering, the Bible Woman reports, "her visits are always welcome, helping them to recall God's mercy and love in the past, and urging them, when health shall have been restored, to keep His commandments, to read more frequently His Holy Word, and follow more closely its divine teachings."

The Bible Woman continues: "An elderly woman, who for years had been an invalid, hastened, on her recovery, to attend the mothers' meetings, that she might gain further knowledge of Him whom she wished to serve."

In her visits the Bible Woman has constant opportunities of insisting on an early Christian education for the young, who are never forgotten. In the loving

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exhortings and teachings of the lady who has met her country women for the past five years, parents are always reminded of the Covenant promise—the rich blessing to be inherited by the children through the parents. The fixed intelligent attention of the group of German women, numbering sometimes fifteen and sixteen, who gather round their devoted mend, seems a response to her ardent desire, that they should all live in harmony with their heavenly Father's will.

Three Bibles have been sold, one a large Family Bible, purchased by the women for one of their number leaving Canada.

The German Frau Verein continues its generous aid to all who are found to be in need.

The Association has been much encouraged by the generous bequest of \$2000 by the late Major Hiram Mills, the interest of which is to be expended in aid of the Bible Women's Effort, and will furnish the means of considerable extension of the work.

The monthly business meetings and meetings of General Superintendents and Bible Women, for reading and instruction, continue to be held as in the past.

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### REPORT OF THE TRAVELLING AGENT FOR THE LAST NINE MONTHS OF 1882.

Dear Friends :-

In the month of April I had, as usual, not much travelling, the roads being too bad. On the 18th I attended the anniversary of the St. Johns and Christieville Branch. The meeting was a fair average gathering for the place. Mr. Montgomery presided in his usual able manner, and I was heartily assisted by the Rev. Messrs. Mills and Lewis, of the Church of England, and Rev. Mr. Crothers, Wesleyan. Death had again thinned the ranks of the first supports of the cause here. We were saddened to miss from our midst Mr. Wm. Coutts, who was long the president of the Branch, and was a true and fast friend of the Bible cause. He had gone to his reward, but his name will long be held in fragrant remembrance.

In the month of May I began my usual tour of the courties of Chateauguay and Huntingdon. My first meeting was at St. Louis, from whence I passed to Ormstown, Huntingdon, River La Guerre, Dundee, Kelso, Athelstan, Franklin, Covey Hill, Russeltown and St. Remi.

The cause throughout was fully maintained, but the work, as a whole, was so much like what I reported last year, I need not particularize. The largest sale of Bibles was at Ormstown, \$83, and the next largest, Huntingdon, \$28. I had hearty assistance in the work from the following ministers: Rev. Mr. Dunbar, St. Louis; Rev. W. D. Morrison, Ormstown; Revs. J. Watson, James Henderson, T. A. Haslem, Huntingdon; Rev. ———, La Guerre; Rev. Mr. Stewart, Kelso; Rev. J. C. Wright, Franklin; Rev. Mr. Smith, Covey Hill and Rev. ———, Russeltown.

Contributions had been taken up at La Guerre, \$15.25; Dundee, \$49.90; Kelso, \$37.05; Covey Hill, \$9.51; Athelstan, \$48.20. Mostly a little in advance of the past year. At Ormstown, Huntingdon, and one or two other Branches, their practice is to take them in the fall or beginning of winter.

My next tour was to the country north of the city, Joliette, Kildare, Rawdon, New Glasgow and St. Thérèse. A meeting was held at each place, and the congregations good. The best one was at Rawdon, a Branch that always musters well, and though, on account of the lateness of the season, and the press of work still upon the farmers, it was not quite as large this year as usual, but full of spirit and good humour. The meeting at New Glasgow was greatly marred by the failure of my notices. I sent a programme to each of the officers and ministers, and not one had been received. Consequently I appeared amongst them unawares, and the meeting was an extemporized one, and as such very good. On this tour the cause was indebted for hearty assistance and able advocacy and support to the Rev. Mr. Coubone, Joliette; Rev. Mr. Allan at Kildare and Rawdon; and Rev. Mr. Boudreau New Glasgow; and Rev. Mr. Hally of St. Thérèse, kindly gave up his pulpit on Sunday morning, June the 4th. The friends at this place this year adopted an improved method. Instead of relying upon the collection at the meeting the young ladies had visited the homes of the people, and the free contri-

bution double that of former years. At this stage of my programme, I had to re-arrange my work, on account of the general election and some other influences which intruded, necessitating a change of plan and a disagreeable cessation for a short time.

On the 17th June I resumed my labours, my first appointment being at South Georgetown, on the 18th. The day was showery and unfavourable, and the congregation much smaller than usual. The same day I had appointments at Howick and English River, but the unfavourable weather told against both to some extent, but not to an equal degree in the afternoon and evening as the morning. The cause appeared to be in a healthy state at all the stations, and plans were made for organizing a regular Branch at South Georgetown to combine all the friends of the Old English River Branch and the parties of the South Georgetown congregation.

Colquhoun, June 21st. This visit was at an unusual season, the appointment at the customary time in winter having failed through floods and impassable roads. The meeting was good, and the work of the year very commendable.

North Williamsburg. The meeting was in the Scotch Church, and I had able assistance from the Rev. Mr. Davidson. I had an appointment at North Matilda on the 23rd, but from some oversight or other it had not been announced.

On Sunday, the 25th, I had three appointments: in the morning at Algonquin, the afternoon at Fairfield, and the evening at Lyn. I found the cause well sustained. The congregation at Algonquin was large and spirited, and I had able and hearty assistance from the Rev. Mr. Emerson, Baptist, and Rev. Mr. Chown, C. Methodist.

During the next week I took in rotation, Yonge, Mallorytown, Escott Mills, Lansdowne, Front of Lansdowne, South Lake and Maple Grove, where I found the work in a fair state, all the friends commendably active, and the Ministers ready to assist and encourage the work, but nothing of an extraordinary nature to report.

Gananoque, July 3rd. Though the night was uncomfortably hot the attendance was better than usual. 'The meeting was held in the M. E. Church, and we had hearty and cheerful assistance from the Minister of the place and the Rev. Mr. Bond. The worthy Secretary made an able report, which see.

On the 9th I was at Laprairie in the morning; there we had a good congregation in the Presbyterian church, and good countenance and assistance from the Rev. Mr. Dart and Rev. Mr. ——. In the evening at St. Edouard I met another congregation, very good for the small place. The people are few in number, but commendably well disposed to the Bible cause.

The 16th I spent at Russelltown and Chrysostome; had a good hearing and fair amount of subscriptions for the cause. On the 23rd I was at Chateauguay and Beauharnois. The congregations and collections rather better than usual, and I was much indebted to the new Minister, Rev. Mr. Boyd.

On the 10th day of August I began my long Eastern Townships tour, my first appointment was at *Lacolle*. The annual meeting was held in the Wesleyan Church, and was very fairly attended, all things considered. Dr. Haynes, the President, was in his place, and discharged well the duties of the chair. The speakers, Rev. R. Acton, of the Church of England, and Rev. John Holmes, Wesleyan, and your Agent. Some changes were made in the officers, one especially was to me a sad one: A. Force, Esq., who has been a tower of strength to the Bible Society

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s tour, my first the Wesleyan aynes, the Presi-The speakers, Wesleyan, and ally was to me a the Bible Society in one capacity and another ever since I began my rounds, felt it needful to resign the office of Secretary on account of poor health. A good man was appointed in his place, for this is a Branch that has material in itself to supply that which fails, but still we could not but feel sorry at relinquishing the services of one who had been so useful for such a long time. The appointment at Clarenceville failed, the notices not having come in time. St. Armands.—The annual meeting in the C. Methodist Church, on the 12th of August, was ably conducted by the President, Rev. H. Montgomery. Devotions were conducted by the Rev. S. Teeson, who also warmly and ably pleaded the Bible cause. The name of the Branch was changed for postal conveniences to East Phillipsburg.

On Sunday, 13th August, I had three appointments, viz., Pike River, New London and Mystic. The congregations were all good, and the interest seemed correspondingly so. At Pike River the collections had been taken up, and Mrs. Blakely the indefatigable collector, had met with her usual success, and the cause was fully maintained. At New London and Mystic the work was to be done after the meeting.

Bedford. The annual meeting in the Town Hall on the 14th August was small, but pervaded by an excellent spirit. Rev. Mr. Rogers and Rev. Mr. Nye were both hearty helpers and rendered cheerful and hearty service to the cause.

Union Branch. The annual meeting held in the Adventist Church was a fair average for the place, and was well managed by the able and respected President, Rev. J. Sounborger. The worthy Secretary, Mr. J. Vaughn, presented a fair report.

East Stanbridge, on the 16th, had a good and cheering meeting, which was admirably conducted by the Kev. S. Jackson. The officers had been commendably active, and the lady collectors had done their part well, and the result was a free contribution more than double that of past years. Mr. E. J. Briggs, who, as Depositary, had served the Society more than thirty years, faithfully and well, retired; and the Scriptures were moved to the store of Messrs. Jackson & Hodge.

The meeting at *Dunham*, on the 17th, though small, was one of a very pleasing nature. The Rev. Mr. Kerr opened with a speech full of kindliness and good will to the cause and its workers, and the Rev. Mr. Crozier followed with full endorsation of the previous speaker, and the atmosphere of the meeting, under the genial influence of the two, was one of the happiest. All felt and acknowledged it. The worthy Secretary, Rev. J. Gear, reported the work incomplete, but arrangements were made for perfecting it. The duties of the chair were ably discharged by the President, Dr. Stevens.

The meeting at Frelighsburg was postponed. At Abbotts Corners, on the 18th, we had a good annual meeting in the Baptist Church, Mr. H. Smith, the President, in the chair. Rev. Mr. Clipsham had accompanied me from Frelighsburg, and gave the cause able and hearty support in a cheerful and pleasing speech, pointed and short. The annual meeting at Abercorn was appointed for 2 p. m.; and as the harvest was at its busiest the men were mostly occupied in the field, and the congregation was largely made up of ladies, not very many in all. I did not think best to take up a collection, and after I had concluded the meeting I went out to prepare to start for my next place, but the ladies were not to be put off in that way. They stopped after I had gone, and took up the collection without me, and handed it in just as I took my departure.

Sutton. The annual meeting held in the C. Methodist Church as usual was a good one. Col. G. C. Dyer, Esq., the President, ably discharged the duties of the chair, and the able and active Secretary, Dr. Cutter, presented the report which showed work indicating commendable activity, on the part of both officers and lady collectors, equal to its most prosperous years.

Sunday, 20th. In the morning at *Brome* congregation small, but the Branch commendably active, and the collections and sale of Bibles nearly an average. Afternoon, *West Brome* is doing well. The meeting was good and the free contribution maintained at the improved standard. At *Cowansville* in the evening we had the largest meeting I have seen for some years, and many said the best also. Our old friend G. E. Jacques, Esq., presided, and the Rev. Mr. Sparling and Mr. Austin both rendered good service to the cause. Miss Edith Jacques and Miss Stiner, the lady collectors, had done their part well, and the free contribution was much in advance of the past. The appointment at W. Farnham on the 21st was postponed to procure a better attendance. I returned home for a few days.

On the 2nd of September I started out again. I reached Cowansville in the afternoon, and after attending to some little business went down to Brigham, where I found the Depositary had sold out, and after several fruitless enquiries about the Bibles I was constrained to pass on to Farnham Centre without learning anything. I have long tried to get the officers to see the necessity of informing me at once when such changes take place, and though it could be done at the expense of one cent for a postal card and a very little labour in some instances, it is not yet attended to, and thus the Society runs the risk of much loss, and puts your Agent to much inconvenience and n edless labour. I have long ago concluded that where there is not interest enough for such small attentions, the best way for all parties is to withdraw the books. Our depositories are now so numerous this course subjects to no special privation further than this, they have to go a little further to get supplied.

Farnham Centre. The Branch is active and doing its work well. The congregation was good, and I had hearty assistance from Rev. Mr. McFarlane. Brigham, Rain came on just before the meeting and the gathering was small. East Farnham maintains its position, though it has lost some of its friends and supporters of late by removal and death. A year or two ago Mrs. Vilas, the partner in life of our President, was called away, and the past year Mrs. (Ruben) Man-field. These were both godly women and good fr.ends of the Bible Society, and did much by their influence and good example to sustain it. They are gone to the Christian's joy and reward. Adamsville had no meeting, the notices having failed somewhere in the Post Office. West Shefford. A small but pleasant meeting. D. C. Horner, Esq., presided, and Rev. Mr. Saunders gave cheerful and hearty assistance. The free contribution about an average one. Fulford was slack this year; both the meeting and free contributions were small, but the sale of Bibles rather larger. Knowlton. The annual meeting was held in the "Academy," L. M. Knowlton, Esq., in the chair. The Rev. Mr. Thick ably and heartily supported the cause. John McFarlane, Esq., the efficient Secretary, as usual had everything in good order. The sale of Scriptures under the careful management of Mr. Rufus England was rather in advance of the past. Potton. The annual meeting was held in the C. M. Church at Mansonville, and I received much valuable assistance from the Minister of the place, Rev. F. Delong. The careful and trusty Depositary, Mr. N. Boright, paid me for Bibles sold, and I have nothing more very special to report. East Bolton present President, contant my old and

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Magog is doing well. The annual meeting held in the C. M. Church on the Ioth was the best I have seen for some time. I was ably assisted by the Rev. Mr. Flanders, and the Rev. Mr. Hepburn shewed his good will to the cause by changing his appointments at Georgeville and Magog so as not to collide. Georgeville. The anual meeting was the best gathering I have seen for some time, and I was assisted by my friend and neighbour, Rev. Mr. Warden. The lady collectors had done their part well, and we had an improved free contribution. Here I was again forcibly reminded of the vicissitudes of life. Mrs. Mitchel and her daughter had sold their house and moved away. For about 25 years the Rev. E. Mitchel was one of the staunchest friends and ablest advocates of the B. S. I ever met, and again his warm friendship and able support in his lifetime cheered your Agent, and since his death his daughter, Miss Mitchel, has in various ways helped on the good work, but now all are gone and there is a great blank. The reward of the righteous will follow them.

Fitch Bay. The meeting was held in the Congregational Church, and my old and much respected friend, Rev. L. P. Adams, presided with his usual ability. The Rev. D. Morrill conducted devotions, and one of the best trained choirs in the Townships made the meeting pleasant. The lady collectors, Misses Dolloff and Ladd, by much praiseworthy labour and persevering effort procured the creditable sum of \$25.13 free contribution, and Mr. Wm. Dolloff, the executor to the estate of the late Adaline Dolloff, paid me \$25 more, which together with the collection made up \$51.43.

Beebe Plain, Sept. 12th. The meeting held in the Union Church was small. I was much indebted to the Rev. S. J. Hughes. Mrs. John Lorimer, a warm friend of the cause, had rendered efficient service as collector, and the sale of Bibles had been carefully and efficiently conducted by Mr. B. Lorimer. Stanstead, Sept. 13th. The 56th annual meeting was held in the C. M. Church, Dr. Cowles, the President, in the chair, and the Rev. Lee Holmes and Rev. S. J. Hughes giving good countenance and assistance to the cause. The sale of Bibles under the careful management of Miss Hubbard was the largest of many years. Massawippi had an unfavourable night on the 14th. It was wet, muddy and dark, following cattle show day, still we had a few, and a good and pleasing meeting. The subscription was the best of many years, thanks to the industry and care of Mr. E. H. LeBarron, the able Secretary. Cassville, on the 15th, was a little unfortunate in that some of its leading members being absent from home and others detained from the meeting by unavoidable causes, and some I fear who might have been there not taking sufficient interest, but I trust it will redeem its former good name before the end of the year. A laudable interest was shewn by those present.

Hatley, Sept. 15th. Here again we were placed at disadvantage by a wet, dark. muddy night, but the attendance was fair, good for such a night. The officers and the collector, Mr. Boyes, were commendably active, and the free contribution was a little in advance of the past year. Barnston, Sept. 16th. The meeting was held in the C. M. Church, A. Parker, Esq., the able President, in the chair. Rev. Mr. Wilkinson gave good countenance and valued assistance, and a good choir improved

the occasion. Sales in the careful hands of M. T. Cushing, Esq., good, and the free contribution an improvement.

Compton, on the 17th, had the best congregation of many years, and I had cheerful and able assistance from my old and valued friend, Rev. Mr. Shorts, who also accompanied me to Martinville. The able Secretary, Mr. Farnsworth, and his staff of lady collectors had done their part well; free contribution an improvement on the past. Martinville is doing well. The President, Mr. Hitchcock, by much activity and zeal has placed the Branch on a goot footing, which by the same management I trust may be maintained. Moe's River. The first annual meeting held in the Baptist Church on the 17th was good, and the report of the first year's work commendable. It is in the hands of able and efficient officers, and bids fair to make a useful Branch. Waterville, Sept. 17th. The meeting assembled in the neat and comfortable new Congregational Church was large and well ordered. Mrs. Freeland at the organ, accompanied by a good choir, added much to the tone and devotion of the meeting. The collections had not been taken up, but will be in due time. Barford, Sept. 21st. A small meeting, at which I was ably assisted by the Rev. J. Chandler. Free contributions a little better than last year. Coaticooke, 22nd. Raining torrents. Meeting postponed. Sunday, Sept. 23rd, was a fine day, a rare thing this autumn. I had three appointments. In the morning at Bulwer the congregation was small, but the work of the Branch was a little in advance of the past year. In the afternoon at Cookshire I had a fair congregation, and found the officers alive and active. In the evening at Eaton the congregation was good, and I was ably assisted by a new helper in these parts, but an old friend and fellow helper of the Society in other parts, the Rev. Francis James. The Branch is doing well.

Sawyerville is prospering. The meeting in the C. M. Church on the 24th was a good and spirited gathering, and I had able and hearty assistance from Rev. Mr. Robinson, an old friend. The report of the able and active Secretary, Wm. Sawyer, Esq., M.P.P., was as usual a cheering one. The free contribution and sales were a fair average. Mr. Massett, and arrangements were made for more efficient work in future. On Sunday, the 8th October, I had three meetings. In the morning with Kingsey Branch at Trenholm. The officers and lady collectors are faithful and active. The meeting was good, and the work of the Branch about an average. In the afternoon with the Durham and Wickham Branch, which I found flourishing. The meeting held in the Congregational Church was full and interesting, and the work, under the guidance of able and active officers, in advance. In the evening at South Durham, where the congregation filled the spacious C. M. Church, and I had good countenance and able assistance from the Rev. Mr. Smith. The President, Mr. A. Leighton, reported "this a progressive Branch," with a yearly increasing contribution.

Bethel, 9th October. The meeting held at 2 p.m. was all that could be expected for such a busy time. The officers are commendably active, and the work of the Branch about the same. Lawrenceville is holding on. The meeting on the evening of the 9th was the best of many years. The President, Mr. J. M. Brown, conducted the meeting pleasingly and well. I was ably assisted by the Rev. Mr. Delong, and a good choir rendered good service.

South Stukely is gaining. The meeting on the 10th was an improvement every way. The comfortable and commodious new Wesleyan Church was a great gain as a place to meet in, and the congregation was also much larger, and so was the free contribution. Rev. Mr. Garland of the Church of England discharged well the duties of the chair, and Rev. H. Fowler as usual gave the cause cheerful and hearty support. The Depositary, Mr. G. Reed, is painstaking and careful.

Waterloo, 11th Oct. The twenty-third annual meeting was held in the lecture room of the Church of England, L. H. Robinson, Esq., in the chair, and a good

congregation. Rev. Archdeacon Lindsay, Rev. Mr. Whiting and Rev. F. R. Smith, all rendered able and cheerful assistance in good speeches and hearty commendation of the cause. The energetic and able Secretary and his efficient staff of lady collectors gave a good account of their work, and the free contribution was in advance of the past.

Granby. I can always anticipate my visits to this Branch with pleasure, sure of a hearty reception and general hearty co-operation both from the officers and friends generally. The fortieth annual meeting, held in the Wesleyan Church on the 12th Oct., was not behind its predecessors. We had the Chairmen, W. H. Robinson, Esq., the retiring one, and J. A. Tomkins, Esq., the newly elected, and both did their part well. We had also a numerous and able staff of ministers, Rev. Mr. English, Rev. R. K. Black, Rev. W. B. Longhurst and Rev. James Richardson, who one and all gave good and hearty help. Some of the speeches were the best I heard in my autumn tour. Finances well sustained. Abbotsford is still a little Branch I can highly commend for heartiness, zeal and constancy in the work. This year the meeting was the largest for a long time. James Gibb, Esq., a long-tried and faithful friend of the cause, was in the chair, and a good choir with choice selections well executed did good service. The finances a little in advance.

On the 14th I started for home. The weather, which had been continuously fine for three weeks past, partially broke. It began to rain before I had proceeded two miles, but about 11 o'clock it cleared up again and was fine the remainder of the way. The tour of the Townships had lasted from 10th August to the 14th October, and had been satisfactory upon the whole. The unfavourable weather, however, which prevailed through August and to the 22nd of September marred some of the meetings. Thus I can make no correct summary and comparison of the work with former years, as it is incomplete. I shall have to return to about six places, but in the end I trust it will be fully as good as in past years.

On the 20th October I left home again for the West. My first appointment was at Wales on the 21st, but the meeting had not been announced and but few came,

and we thought best not to go on with it.

Woodlands, Sunday, 23rd. A good and an attentive congregation and a good collection placed to the Farran's Point Branch. In the afternoon at Farran's Point I had the pleasure of addressing another good congregation. This Branch is doing well. Sales larger. Free contributions rather short.

Aultsville is doing well. The annual meeting in the Wesleyan Church on the 22nd was a fine gathering. We had the pleasing service of a fine choir giving fervour and life to the occasion by some appropriate selections well executed. The worthy Treasurer, Mr. Barnhart, reported improved finances. The meeting at Matilda was postponed as usual, this time on account of a concert.

Prescott. The annual meeting held in the C. M. Church on the 24th was fairly attended, and ably and pleasingly conducted by the Chairman, Mr. McPherson, but of all the ministers of the town, "no one stood by me;" one was unwell, another had an appointment, and the third one something else, and the fourth one claims to have a Bible Society of his own Church. We should like to see a report of it. The report of the industrious Secretary showed a falling off in sales, and the subscriptions not completed. When complete, it is expected the free contributions will reach an average.

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Edwardsburg, October 26th. The annual meeting was held in the C. Presbyterian Church, and was pleasingly and well conducted by the Rev. Mr. McKibbon. Rev. Mr. Perley gave the meeting, and the Bible cause good and hearty assistance. The report by the able and long-tried Secretary, K. McPherson, Esq., showed a pleasing improvement. The finances were quite in advance.

Morrisburg is doing well. The sales keep up well, and the depository, under the painstaking and careful management of John Meikle, Esq., is in a commendable state. The free contribution was the largest in the existence of the Branch. The annual meeting in the C. M. Church was fairly attended, but might have been better in so large a town, and considering the comfort and pleasure to which they were invited to come to the new and elegant church, with its beauties rivalling the churches of Toronto or Montreal, and a choir that discoursed sweet music, far worse than which the dwellers in these and other cities often at concerts and other gatherings pay a high price for. Altogether it was a pleasing meeting, and made profitable by good speeches from Rev. Mr. Kines and Rev. Mr. Kinard. It was a fitting sequel to a prosperous year, for which the new President and Secretary may feel proud.

Cornwall. This excellent Branch still continues in the hands of interested and faithful officers who conduct its affairs well, and the last year was the best of many past. The lady collectors too do their parts well, and this year better than common. The annual meeting was held in the C. M. Church on the 28th, and I had the privilege of preaching twice the following day, in the morning in the Scotch Church, and in the evening at Mr. Binny's church, and both services were well attended for a wet day.

Moulinette is doing well. It has an able President in Mr. Thomson, and an efficient Secretary in Mr. Winters, and the lady collectors, Miss Maggie Moss and Miss Lydia Raymond, discharged their duties with commendable zeal and success. The finances were quite in advance of the past.

On the 4th of November I started on another short tour up the Ottawa. I had three appointments, Cushing, Grenville and Lachute, but the circulars I had sent two weeks before had failed to reach their intended destination at Grenville and Lachute. In consequence no appointments had been made at Lachute, and disappointment was only prevented at Grenville by the thoughtfulness of the Rev. James Fraser, who made the announcement of my coming from a circular he had received. I have had more trouble of this sort the past few months than for many years past, and from its occurrence in widely separated parts of the country, I am inclined to think the difficulty is in some central office.

The annual meeting at Cushing was well attended, and I had the cheerful and efficient help of the Rev. James Fraser. The collection taken at the meeting was cred table, but being a little sooner in the season than my visits in the past, the subscriptions had not been taken up. Grenville is holding on, and if not making much progress is not retrogarding. The meeting and free contribution were about the same. Mr. John Wilson, who has done well by the depository, as did his excellent same long years before him, had relinquished his business, and it had to pass into other hands. However, a good man, Mr. Woodly, received the depository.

Three Rivers. The annual meeting was held in the C. Presbyterian Church on the 7th, the President, Mr. Alexander Houliston, in the chair. Rev. Mr. Bell and Rev. Mr. Amaron took a helping part therein. Some difficulty had been experienced in finding collectors, and G. B. Houliston, Esq., had overcome this by doing it himself. However, at the time of my visit his effort was not complete, but promised well to be in advance of the past.

On the 20th I started out East on a short supplementary tour, along the line of the G. T. R. My first appointment was at *Upton*. We met in the Church of England, and the attendance was good, so also was the singing and the general interest. Here are a few warm generous friends it is always a pleasure to meet.

Sherbrooke. This excellent Branch is doing well. The annual meeting was held in the lecture hall of St. Peter's Church. In the absence of the President, Rev. J. C. Cattenach, the Rev. Dr. Reid presided, and to those who are acquainted with him I need not say he did his part well. Rev. Dr. Duff and Rev. Mr. Sherman were the only speakers besides the Chairman and your Agent, but they were as good as a host. All were much pleased with their speeches, which were certainly of a high order.

The report made by the interested and industrious Secretary, Mr. John McNicol, shews that Mr. George Bottom, the collector, had been very faithful and thorough in his work, and that the amount of Bibles sold was \$102, and the free contribution \$209—the best year's work the Branch ever made. Mr. Bottom, the collector, speaks of being generally very well received, but also speaks of one or two who thought the Society's visible property in Montreal might be better managed, that the financial statement of our annual report might be clearer, and the expenses less. I mention these things to you as a committee on whom is the responsibility of management, as in duty bound. However, when the parties are informed that we have no "visible property in the city" except the Bible Flouse, the front store of the young men's building, to own and possess which the President, the Committee and other friends subscribed a good many thousand dollars, they may think differently They have evidently been under some delusion, for this, as I assured them, is all we have, and this we fully occupy. What more? I was also able to inform Mr. Bottom and the officers that our financial accounts were all examined and audited by a professional accountant, and whatever suggestion he could make to have the statement made clearer would be attended to, but it is doubtful if any society on this continent makes so full and so clear a statement, and certainly no Bible Society gets so much work from all its servants for the same amount of compensation. Some of the religious societies in the United States pay double the salaries or did so some little time ago.

Coaticooke. The annual meeting held in the C. Methodist Church on the 22nd scarcely reached my anticipations, which had been raised somewhat high at the

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time of the postponement on the 22nd September. John Thornton, Esq., presided, and the Rev. Mr. McKillop rendered good assistance. The free contribution was not up to the past.

Lennoxville is doing well. The annual meeting on the 23rd in the lecture room of the Wesleyan church was very fairly attended. E. W. Abbott, Esq., presided, and my respected friend, Rev. Mr. Timberlake (whom the printer last year persisted in making me call a respectable friend), again rendered efficient aid. The free contribution was the best of many years. From this point I took the midnight train and returned home, as the next day I had to be at Lachute. Lachute. The annual meeting in the C. Presbyterian church on the 24th was not so largely attended as some we have seen. The able President, Dr. Thomas Christie, was in the chair, and Rev. John Mackie, as usual, rendered cheerful and hearty assistance. The report presented by the Secretary, Thos. Barron, Esq., was an encouraging one. The sale of Bibles was good, and the free contribution the best ever made. On Sunday, the 26th, I was at Cote St. Paul and St. Henry in the afternoon and evening respectively. In the afternoon my coming had not been announced, and the friends were unprepared, but collections will be taken up and remitted. In the evening we met in the comfortable and pleasing new Wesleyan church, cor St. Antoine street and Metcalf Avenue, and the gathering was good. I had able assistance from the Rev. Mr. Lawrence and the active officers, who had once again faithfully discharged their duties, and were able to make a good report of an active and efficient Branch. On Monday, the 27th, I started for South Georgetown, but, through a change in the R. R. time and the stage, I was too late, and seeing I could not possibly reach the meeting in time I proceeded no further than St. Martin. However, the Rev. Mr. McBain and Rev. Mr. McKeracher proceeded with the meeting, and organized the new English River and Georgetown Branch, with Rev. J. A. F. McBain, President; Rev. C. M. McKerachar, Secretary; Messrs. William Miller, Archibald Cameron, William McKell, James Brodie, James Carmichael, James Kerr, Vice-Presidents; and Messrs. George McClenaghan and Robert McLeod, Treasurers.

Point St. Charles. A very pleasing and successful annual meeting of this Branch was held in the Presbyterian church on the 29th Nov., Mr. N. M. Darwent in the chair, and most charming and excellent music by the choir. The speakers were the pastor of the church, Rev. Mr. Cruikshank, Rev. Mr. Belcher and Rev. Mr. Lucas, who one and all contributed much to the interest of the occasion. Contribution not taken up.

Hemmingford. This long-tried and faithful Branch had a good annual meeting in the Wesleyan church on the 30th. Dr. Glover, the President, was at his post, full of life and interest as usual, and a good choir did its part well. I had able assistance and the cause had cheerful and hearty countenance from my much respected friend, Rev. B. Longley, but he was the only minister this year who stood by me. Rev. James Patterson, who for about 20 years has been a constant and ever faithful advocate of the cause and a true personal friend, has left, and we missed him sadly. We missed others also with a feeling of much sadness and sorrow. Mrs. Col. John Scriver was no more upon earth. She was the last of a family to whom I have been very long and much indebted; the parents are now both dead and the children scattered—one only remains in the village, but the homestead is vacated. Thirty-one years ago last August I came to Hemmingford the first time; I was a

stranger, but they took me in, and with the family of Col. John Scriver I found a cheerful home and a hearty welcome, as all did who came in the Master's name. It has been my stopping-place ever since, but they are both now gone home. "Thus friend after friend departs." The only consolation we have in this dying world is that God's work goes on; though its friends die, the cause lives.

Gote des Neiges is doing well. It has suffered somewhat by the removal of friends and supporters, but these seem to be made good by the increased liberality of others, for the free contribution is about the same. The annual meeting was held on the 3rd December, at which I had the hearty and cheerful countenance of the Rev. P. R. Ross.

Lachine. The annual meeting was held in the lecture-room of St. Andrew's church, Dec. 4th, Rev. D. Ross in the chair. Rev. Mr. Knowles was present, and, though suffering much pain, made a good speech, which was heartily applauded. The lady collectors, as usual, had done their part well, and the result was a free contribution in excess of the past, and the past was liberal. A good choir helped us much. This finished my public labours for the year, with the exception of St. Lambert, where the meeting was postponed several times till it was too near Christmas, and could not be held.

### CONCLUSION.

### DECEMBER 31ST.

God in His great mercy has spared me in health and strength to go through the entire visitation of another year, with the exception of St. Lambert, mentioned above, and Clayton and Boyd's Settlement, at which my appointments in June were interrupted by the general election, and, being far away, I found no convenient opportunity to reach them afterwards. However both places have remitted handsome contributions.

I have few changes to report: one new station has been taken up, viz., Agnes, in the eastern part of the county of Compton, and one station, South Georgetown, and one Branch, English River, have merged into one large Branch for more effective work, and the effort bids fair to be well directed, for already the new Branch, "English River and Georgetown," has remitted the handsome sum of \$103, free contribution, nearly double what the station and Branch together did aforetime. A new Branch has also been organized at Marsboro, in the county of Compton, but it has scarcely got to work yet, thus we have the same number of stations as we had at the beginning of this year, and one more Branch, bringing the whole number at present up to 205.

Finances.—Notwithstanding the delinquency of some few of the Branches of which I had hoped for better things, the finances present a fairly encouraging summary. I have received on purchase account \$2,454.44, and free contributions \$5,086.66. Total \$7,541.10. The total increase over last year is \$1,050.28, of which \$277.04 is on purchase account, and \$723.24 free. It is the best we have had since 1874. Some of our Branches set a noble example. Of these, I think DANVILLE this year must take the first place. Last Spring the scourge of fire afflicted the place greatly, and a large part of the buildings were destroyed. The

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people, with a public-spiritedness seldom met with, set to work to build it again, and that without asking help from abroad. In addition to this, they do not seem disposed to curtail their benevolence nor restrict their donations to good work, rather to increase them. Last year they sent a free contribution to the Bible Society of \$90; this year, after the fire, \$104. Moreover this is not to make up for the loss the Bible Society suffered by the fire, for there was none. The fire burned all round the house in which the Bibles were kept and left it untouched. Sherbrooke is another of our Branches which this year has taken a large stride in advance. North West Glengarry and Lachine have also done nobly, and some others also deserve honourable mention, but I dare not continue, for I fear I have already taken up my share of the report.

Last year I wrote that the Society had passed "through a year of uneventful steady work," and I have often said I had nothing very special to report, but when I compare the present with the time I was first connected with the Society, now nearly 32 years ago, I find all is special, all is changed, but the change is not one that should induce us to relax our efforts. In the increased activity and bustle of the present day; in the great increase of meetings of all sorts, some good and many very indifferent; in the multiplicity of objects engaging men's attention; in the vast increase of reading matter, a large part of which makes light of the teachings and doctrines of the New Testament, the duty of holding forth the Word of God was never more imperative and solemn than at present. Though the work for which our Society was mostly first started—that of "supplying the prevailing destitution of our English-speaking Protestant people—has in a great measure been accomplished, the time to relax our efforts has not yet come. The nearly 300 public meetings which have been held; scattered over the large tract of country constituting our field, attended in all by several hundred ministers and other speakers, embracing the best talent of the country, must have had an influence for good that cannot be estimated. Were these meetings to cease there is nothing to take their place, nothing that would so forcibly and directly appeal to the community, on the duty, importance and advantage of giving heed to the MESSAGE OF GOD to man. Moreover, there are thousands and tens of thousands yet destitute, and if our efforts are less needed with our own people it only proves that the time has come to do more for those who are still perishing for lack of knowledge.

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## II. REGULATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR AGENTS AND COLPORTEURS.

### (A)-THE DISTRICT SECRETARY.

1. The District Secretary is charged with the oversight of the various Branches, Depositories and Agencies of this Auxil.ary.

2. He has to make periodic visits, and once a year, if practicable, to the Branches, for the purpose, in conjunction with the Office-Bearers of the same, of holding public services, at which services special information touching the operations of the Parent Society and of this Auxiliary is given by him; and any necessary public business between the branches and this Auxiliary is despatched. On such occasionshe is also expected, in such ways as he may deem proper, to encourage and stimulate the people to greater zeal and effort in the work of Bible circulation.

3. He has to make annual visits to the several Depositories and Agencies connected with this Auxiliary, for the Jurpose of inspecting the books or stock therein contained, and of taking account of the same with the Depositaries.

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4. He is authorized to receive, and to give receipt for the same, any moneys due to this Auxiliary on purchase account, or offered as free contributions.

5. He may take orders for supplies of Scriptures, should such be tendered him-

6. All receipts of money and orders for Scriptures are to be duly recorded by him, and reported to the General Agent.

7. Timely notice must be given by him to the General Agent of his intended visits to Branches or Agencies, in order to the preparation by the latter of the necessary statement of accounts for stock-taking and settlement with the Depositaries.

8. Any omissions or discrepancies that may be found in the statements so furnished, and the books of the Depositaries, must be reported in writing to the General Agent, with a view to the immediate rectification of the same.

9. A Monthly Report is to be prepared and sent by him to the General Committee, of the Branches and Depositories visited by him, of the public services held, and of moneys received, and also of Colportage operations, should these in his judgment call for special notice.

Io. He is charged with the preparation of an Annual Report to the Committee, giving an account of the work and condition, during the year, of the various Branches, Depositories or Agencies that are comprised within the Society's field of operations; and also with preparation for publication in the Society's Annual Report, of the list of Brancles, &c., with their Office-Bearers, together with the Subscription Lists of the same.

11. New Branches or Depositories may be organized or opened by him in or for such districts as may be found desirable to occupy, as new centres of operation.

### (B)-THE GENERAL AGENT.

1. The General Agent is charged with the management of the business of the Society, as conducted in and from the Bible House in Montreal.

2. He has under his care the Stock of Scriptures and other property belonging to the Society in the Bil le House, and is held responsible for the safe-keeping and good condition of the same.

3. It is his province to attend to the retail sales of Bibles at the Bible House, and to keep account of the same.

4. A Monthly Report must be prepared by him and submitted to the General

Committee at its regular Monthly Meeting of:—(a) the condition and amount of stock on hand, or required; of the number of copies sold during the month at the Bible House, with an account of cash received for the same, together with a statement of the same items in the corresponding month in the previous year; of the state of accounts between this Auxiliary and the Parent Society, or other parties; of applications for grants of Scriptures; and generally of any other matters he may deem it of importance to bring under the notice of the Committee; (b) of receipts and disbursements made at the Bible House during the month.

5. Special Reports may be called for from him by the General Committee or any of the Sub-Committees.

6. Notices of all Meetings, whether of the General Committee or of the Sub-Committees, are issued by him; and he has charge of the place of meeting of the same.

7. On the receipt from the District Secretary of the programme of his intended visits to the Branches or Depositories, the General Agent is required to furnish him with the accounts of the several Branches set down on the programme, at least one week previous to his, the District Secretary's, departure on his tour of visitation, in order that time may be afforded for examination of these accounts by both Agents together, if found necessary.

8. Copies of the Monthly Report and of the Abstract of the Annual Report of the Parent Society, as also copies of all other publications sent to the General Agent, which may contain information useful to the District Secretary in his visits among the Branches, are to be promptly and regularly sent forth from the Bible House to such places as he, the District Secretary, may designate.

9. All mistakes, omissions, or irregularities that may be reported by the District Secretary as existing in the books or statements of accounts appertaining to any Branch or Depository, are required to be placed on file and promptly attended to; and such file may be called for at any meeting of the General Committee or Agency Committee.

10. Orders for supplies of Scriptures from the Branches, the District Secretary or Colporteurs, are to be carefully entered, and promptly executed; and in case of any unavoidable delay occurring, of the kind of books ordered not being in stock, notification of the same must at once be made to the persons sending the order, and further instructions sought from them.

11. An account current with each Colporteur employed by the Society is required to be kept, of all books sent to his order, of cash received from him, of time spent in the service of this Society reported by him, and of payments on account of stipend made to him.

12. The General Agent has to prepare for the Corresponding Secretary all statistics, or other details appertaining to the department of the General Agent, that may be called for in the preparation of the Annual Report of the Society, or of any Special Report.

13. On the publication of the Annual Report, the General Agent is required to distribute, without unnecessary delay, copies of the same to subscribers entitled to receive them, both in the city and country districts.

14. The General Agent has the oversight of such Assistant or Assistants as may, with the sanction of the Committee, be employed in the Bible House.

### (C)—THE COLPORTEURS.

1. The territory covered by the operations of the M. A. B. S. is divided into twelve districts, as set forth upon page 51.

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2. Applicants for the work of Colportage must produce satisfactory testimonials as to their Christian character and fitness for the work.

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3. Approved applicants are employed for a probationary period in districts elected by the Committee.

4. Approved probationers are employed as Colporteurs in the permanent service of the Society; except in case of immoral conduct, three months' notice is required on either side to terminate the engagement.

5. Colporteurs in the full pay and service of the Society are required to keep and use in the prosecution of their work, at their own charges, a horse and vehicle, and to bear all their own personal travelling expenses.

6. Colporteurs are required to carefully keep within the limits of the District or Districts assigned to them as their field of operations, and not to labour beyond them without the sanction or instructions of the Committee.

7. They are expected to visit, as far as practicable, every family within the limits of their field, in order to ascertain whether or not they are supplied with copies of the Scriptures, and, when these are found, to supply them at such prices, or on such terms, as may from time to time be ordered by the Committee.

8. In the case of poor families or persons, Colporteurs may, in the exercise of due care, supply copies, either at reduced price, or by loan, or by gift; but all such transactions must be recorded and reported to the Committee.

9. Sales on credit are made without the sanction of the Committee and at the sole risk of the Colporteur making them.

the number of copies sold, and of the moneys received for the same; and, further, that a *monthly report* of these and other matters properly belonging to their work be made by each Colporteur. For this purpose blank forms are supplied, which the Committee expect each Colporteur to carefully study and fill up.

11. All Monthly reports should be made up to the 25th of each month, and on that date mailed to the Corresponding Secretary for presentation to the ensuing Monthly Meeting of the General Committee.

12. All days that are not reported as spent in the service of the Society, due allowance being made for sickness or bad weather, will be deducted in the payment of the monthly stipend, unless leave of absence has been before obtained from the Committee.

13. When in the neighborhood of Branch Societies, Colporteurs are required to report themselves to the officers of the same, in order to receive from them such co-operation and advice as they may be able to give; and, also, to report themselves to the District Secretary whenever he may visit any part of their district, that they may have the benefit of his suggestions, and may assist him in his public meetings, etc., should he need assistance.

14. Colporteurs when on duty for the Society are required to abstain from taking part in public political meetings or discussions, and also to avoid, as far as practicable, points of controversy between different Christian denominations or Churches.

15. The general work and duties of Colporteurs are, to circulate the Word of God among all classes and creeds of the community, and, as opportunity offers, to read the Scriptures, hold religious converse and prayer with families or individuals. When the great object of the Society can be promoted by religious services and addresses to public assemblies, these may be held. But in proceedings of this character, the Committee specially desire that Colporteurs seek the countenance and co-operation of Ministers of the Gospel, without distinction of denomination.

### RULES RECOMMENDED FOR BRANCH SOCIETIES AND BIBLE ASSOCIATIONS.

The following Constitution of a Branch Society and Bible Association is inserted for the purpose of facilitating the formation of those useful institutions. Persons in the country are particularly invited to form themselves into Auxiliary Societies. Besides discharging the duty of assisting in disseminating the Word of God (which is incumbent on every Christian), they would consult their private advantage, and thereby be enabled to obtain Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, whereas, at present, they purchase from country merchants at a high rate.

1. That the object and Constitution of the British and Foreign Bible Society

have the cordial approbation of this meeting.

" Branch Bible 2. That a Society be formed, to be called, "The Society for the purpose of co-operating with the British and Foreign Bible Society. through the medium of the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society, in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scriptures, both at home and abroad.

3. That, conformably to the principles of the British and Foreign Bible Society. the Bibles and Testaments to be circulated by this Society shall be without note or comment, and those in the language of the United Kingdom of the authorized version only.

4. That all persons subscribing one dollar per annum or upwards, or ten dollars or upwards at one time, shall be members of this Society.

5. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee consisting of not less than three other members; and that three members of the Committee constitute a quorum.

6. That every clergyman or other minister who is a member of the Society shall be entitled to attend and vote at the meetings of the Committee.

7. That the Committee shall meet once a quarter, or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

8. That the Committee divide this neighborhood into districts, and appoint collectors for each district, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations and collecting the annual fees of the members.

9. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by the Society shall be remitted yearly, after deducting incidental expenses, to the Auxiliary Bible Society of Montreal, on condition of the Society granting to this the same privileges which the Parent Institution grants, in such cases, to the Auxiliary Societies.

10. That the Committee shall make it their business to enquire what families or individuals, residing within the several districts, are in want of Bibles or Testaments, and unable to procure them; and that it will be the duty of the Committee to furnish them therewith at prime cost, reduced prices, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

II. That a general Meeting of the subscribers be held at each year, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a new Committee elected.

12. That these resolutions be published in such manner as the Committee may direct; and a copy of them, signed by the Chairman, transmitted to the President of the Auxiliary Bible Society at Montreal.

### NOTE.

Branches or Depositories selling Scriptures on credit do so at their own risk and responsibility, as it is contrary to the rules of the Society. There is no need for it, as other provision is made for supplying the poor.

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### REPORTS OF BRANCHES.

### DANVILLE.

Three years have passed since the Danville Branch Bible Society met in this Church to hold its Annual Meeting. Last year it was held in the Congregational Church. Then we reported our stock on hand, 147 Bibles, Testaments and Psalms, worth \$90.33. Since, we have received from the Montreal Depos tory 15 Bibles and Testaments, marked at \$6.45, making 162, worth \$96.78. Of these we have sold 59, worth \$19.07, leaving 103, valued at \$77.71. Quite a coincidence occurred last May, perhaps well to record. Having read in the last Report that an insurance was to be effected upon the stock, I wrote the Bible Agent in Montreal, and received a reply, May 13th, from Mr. Stacey to insure. The next day our great fire swept through the village, encircling our house where the Bibles are kept, and although the policy was not taken the Bibles were saved, however, no time was lost after the fire until the stock was insured. The lady collectors last year were so faithful in their efforts that \$90.00 was collected and remitted from the seven districts to the Society in Montreal. We can but hope that the Bible may hold its rightful place in every heart and home.

### LAWRENCEVILLE.

The Annual Meeting of the Lawrenceville Branch of the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society was held in the vestry of the Lawrenceville Methodist Church on Saturday, October 1st, 1881.

### RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The work done by this Branch of the Society during the past year, as compared with that of previous years, is very encouraging. ### BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

Abstract of the Seventy-eighth Annual Report, presented May 3, 1882.

Your Committee close their work for the year and give in their Report with the thankful and cheering conviction that the blessing of God has again been abundantly resting upon your Society at home and abroad.

They judge of this, and they ask their supporters to judge of it, in many ways. Able and dear fellow workers have gone, but others have been given them, and brotherly love continues. Hindrances have here and there arisen, but they are dwarfed by difficulties solved and by new lands opening. And as to circulation, considering the intense eagerness with which the Revised New Testament in English was expected and welcomed, it would not have been surprising, if your Committee had had to announce a considerable falling off in their circulation of the 'Authorised Version.' The fact is, however, that the home issues of Holy Scripture by your Society have been 9,200, and the foreign issues have been 83,300, more than last year. The *Testaments* called for at home have been only 38,000 fewer, those called for abroad have been 39,000 more this year than last. And the whole demand for Testaments in every tongue has again not fallen far short of a million. Could there be more wonderful testimony to the vitality of the Book itself in whatever version?

Understanding by *copies* Bibles, Testaments, and Portions taken together, the total issues at home have been 1,509,000, and those abroad 1,429,000, in all 2,938,000 copies, or nearly 10,000 a day for the working days of a year. These figures bring up the Bibles, Testaments, and Portions supplied by your Society since its formation to 93,953,000 copies.

True the income looks somewhat less than it did last year, but it has been generous and large. It has enabled your Committee to listen to every important appeal, and to start some new undertakings, and yet to end the year with a surplus. The free income has been £104,837, which is less than that of the previous year by £9,500. But this diminution means nothing more serious than the temporary absence of a few of those princely donations, which come wonderfully often, but not in every year to just the same amount. Of the decrease the sum of £7,200 occurs in such donations, and the falling off in ordinary contributions is only £1,300. The sum received for Scriptures sold is £94.842, or only £173 less than in the year before. And, adding the Roxburgh Fund for colportage in North India, the total receipts came to £199,785.

The total expenditure has been £190,738, or nearly £700 in excess of that announced a year ago. Your Committee are as careful as possible to keep within their income, but they would beg their supporters not to allow that fact to have any other effect than to increase the confidence and liberality with which funds are entrusted to their care. Your Committee are ready to go forward, provided their friends put it in their power, and keep it in their power to do so without anxiety as to funds.

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There are large fields still to be occupied. There are others in which the spread of education, or the melting of prejudice, or the extension of missions will each year bring fresh calls to advance, to which your Committee will, if able, gladly respond. They have already during the year taken steps considerably to extend their liabilities in India, and China, and Persia, and Japan. They have added two new Agencies-one for North Africa and one for Malaysia-to their list. They still ask for an Agent for Siberia. They are arranging for work in Cuba, and elsewhere. A colporteur has again entered Turkestan. Onward steps like these will have made themselves felt a year hence more than at present. Meantime your Committee ask attention to the work already being done. For they believe that the more the breadth and the depth of it are known, the more hearty will be the support given to it in money and in prayer, and the less will it lose through ignorance and misconception. Besides all that it does at home, and through others, your Society has a missionary host of its own. It spreads about 300 colporteurs over Europe, and sends 200 more to other parts of the world. The sales of Scriptures by these men are more than 600,000 copies a year. Other societies have their own work for Christ, and they do it widely and well. But most of them, wherever their sphere, generously own that they could do it neither so widely, nor so well, without your help. That help is daily sought at home in Christian efforts of endless variety. And it precedes, or it attends, or it follows, the missionary abroad.

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ir ty The history of an enterprise so vast must perforce be chequered. There will be clouds as well as sunshine. But the feeling which the year leaves paramount in the minds of your Committee is that they have abundant cause once more humbly to thank God and to take courage.

It is but a fragment of this world wide work which can be mentioned in this Abstract; a little of the light, a little of a shade; a few of the workers, and a few of the lands wherein they work.

France.—France changes fast. Fifty years ago the French Government called the New Testament 'the first and most salutary of books,' and paid your Committee £400 for £20,000 copies for elementary schools. Now the Bible is proscribed in all schools.

On the other hand, the new law of colportage has removed vexatious restrictions. The men can sell their books in the streets of Paris, whence they were formerly chased like dogs by the police, and a policeman is an active promoter of the circulation of Bibles. An authorisation is no longer required. The colporteur has only to declare his will to colport, and the maire is bound to give him a written acknowledgment of his declaration. One maire, who four times refused such an acknowledgment, was summoned, and was not only ordered by the Court to affix his signature forthwith, but also to pay 20 francs as costs to the colporteur. He had argued in his defence that he had only been obeying the priest. This was accepted, and they shook hands cordially on parting.

Two colporteurs who were employed twenty years ago have lately returned to the work. They say that formerly every one fled at their approach, as if they were infected with the plague. Now people want to know what the colporteurs believe, and whether they are Christians.

No Christian can watch these changes without interest. The present liberty calls for prompt action, for perhaps it may not be lasting. Fear mingles with hope. The old dominant Romanism strives to reassert itself, and in some parts it still stabs a colporteur in the arm with a knife, or throws his books into the fire. Elsewhere the rebound from credulity has brought complete unbelief. A Councillor-General said in an official speech, 'We learned men can believe no longer in things from above. As there is no God from whom we may expect help, we will place our belief only on the earth. If heaven is shut, earth remains.'

But the outlook is by no means dark. You have sixty colporteurs in France, and they have sold 76,300 books, large or small, within the year. The copies issued by your Agency through all channels have been 19,000 more than the year before. They were over 131,000, or 420 a day. On one occasion a colporteur distributed 6,000 Gospels to troops embarking for the war in Africa. Not one was torn up or thrown away. 'The country is ripe,' says Lord Radstock.' Enlightenment is progressing and France needs the Scriptures,' says your Agent.

Belgium.—The battle between superstition on the one hand and worldliness and atheism on the other continues. Between these conflicting extremes it is the blessed office of your Society and of others to step in and ask a hearing for God's own words to man.

The country is not twice the size of Yorkshire. Its population is about five millions and a half. You have now supplied it with 674,000 Bibles, Testaments, or Portions, and you employ in it eight colporteurs. The fruit of their work sometimes comes to light.

Germany and Switzerland.—A year ago a sudden and heavy bereavement cast its shadow over your Agency for Germany and Switzerland. The warm heart which had sped the work had been taken away, and none could forget that they should see the workman's face no more. The memory and the name of the Rev. George Palmer Davies remain, and in the record of another year a chastened expression of how much he is missed occurs again and again.

No one quite his counterpart could be looked for in his place. Your Committee felt it best only to make a provisional appointment at first. For that appointment many circumstances seemed to point to Mr. James Watt as the best man. He had conducted your Agency in South Russia for fourteen years with marked ability and success. And your Committee have felt at the close of a year's trial, that they could not do better for the prosperity of the German Agency than make Mr. Watt's appointment to it permanent, and relieve him as soon as possible of the extra charge in Russia.

Setting aside figures connected with the Dusseldorf Exhibition of 1880, the circulation of Scriptures in Germany by itself, the receipts for sales, and the contributions of friends, all show a gratifying increase. The total issues, including sales to other societies, were 321,800 copies. The systematic supply of Scriptures to the Prussian army has reached its jubilee. From the first it has had Royal favour and assistance. In fifty years the troops have bought nearly three-quarters of a million of Bibles and Testaments.

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One feature of the year has been the completion of the standard edition of the New Testament translated into Hebrew by the venerable Dr. Delitzch. Perhaps no version in any language was ever translated, revised, and printed with so much care, lest one jot or one tittle should be superfluous, or wanting, or misplaced. Your Committee have expressed to the learned Professor their warm congratulations on this crowning result of so many years of consecrated toil.

As one of your colporteurs stood by the grave of his children a woman came up and said, 'I have a Bible which I bought from you two years ago. You then said to me that the Word of God can be a source of comfort in every trial of life. Last winter my boy of nine years died, and I fret about it very much. I have often said, "If the man with the Bibles would only come round, he would know how to comfort us." Pointing to the grave, the colporteur said, 'I have only the same Word of God which you have, but has not our Lordsaid, "Because I live ye shall live also"? She asked him to call at her house, and this he did after a time. He found that the Holy Spirit had done His work in the soul, and he calls this "harvesting to the glory of God."

In Switzerland your Committee had the melancholy satisfaction of expressing their sympathy with the survivors of the terrible landslip at Elm, and of joining the Young Men's Christian Association of St. Gall in providing them with Scriptures. The number of books required for those who had lost everything but their lives was impressively small.

Austria.—In the autumn serious illness endangered Mr. Millard's valuable life. Your Committee add their thanksgivings to his own for the renewed health now given to him for his thirty-sixth'year of service. They also humbly but thankfully record the entire preservation of a very large stock of Scriptures during the terrible burning of the Ring Theatre next door.

A fierce struggle is going on between light and darkness. Ignorance, indifference, intemperance, and hatred of the Scriptures by turns make the colporteurs' work one of difficulty and danger. Yet sunshine pierces the darkest clouds, and hope for the future brightens. Mr. Millard's report is rich in examples of the power of God's Word. His experience is that of the parable, "So is the kingdom of God, as if a man should cast seed into the ground, and should sleep and rise, night and day, and the seed should spring up, he knoweth not how." The circulation of the year shows an increase of 8,000 copies, and 6,000 of them are in the sales by colporteurs.

Last Autumn the Protestants of Austria kept the centenary of that Edict of Toleration which first permitted them to worship according to their convictions. By a small grant of Testaments to each your Committee marked their sympathy with the 230 Protestant congregations, and gladdened their hearts. A wider toleration is still needed in Austria Proper; for in almost every part local authorities forbid real Bible colportage, and in the Tyrol even orders for Bibles may not be taken. But in spite of all troublesome restrictions one colporteur has sold 2,946 books, another 3,120. Six books were sold in a priest's house with his approval, and a hundred New Testaments were bought in a monastery.

Italy.—Very soon after your last anniversary there came the sad news from Italy that your Society had lost the Agent who had won himself such esteem there by twenty-one years of large-hearted Bible work. In 1870, Mr. Thomas H. Bruce took care that on the very day on which the King's troops entered Rome, the Bible should be carried within it, too, by your colporteurs. On the first Sunday after the entry, he read aloud to the bystanders in the Coliseum a passage from St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans.

It was very much owing to the generous aid of the Committee of the Religious Tracts Society, and its late Secretary, the Rev. Dr. Manning, that your Committee were provided with such an able and suitable successor to Mr. Bruce as the Rev. Auguste Meille. Italy has thus become one of the countries in which your Society is represented by a native; and there is a special charm in the fact that the Bible Agent for Italy is a Waldensian. Within the year your forty colporteurs have sold 39,000 copies, which is considerably more than in the previous year. The Exhibition at Milan and the purchases of other Societies have also increased the circulation. And your Committee have undertaken an outlay of several hundreds of pounds to provide Italy with a cheap Bible of far better type and quality than it has ever yet had.

Spain.—The serious illness of Mr. Corfield has been one of those sad episodes which have made the past year one of peculiar anxiety to your Committee. When recovery began to come, it was at first only partial, and your veteran Agent asked permission to resign his post next June. But so much improvement has since taken place that your Committee now thankfully hope that no change in the Agency will be necessary.

The sales of your twenty-three colporteurs have increased by 1,000 copies, but the advance of nearly 12,000 copies in the whole circulation is due to increased purchases by the Scotch Bible Society. Two new districts have received resident colporteurs.

The Government have not yet amended any article in the Constitution, but their more liberal interpretation of the one upon religion has been productive of good. A colporteur was summoned one night to a private house. He found the mayor, the magistrate, and others assembled. They stood up to receive him, and asked him to tell them something of what Protestants believe. He based his reply upon the Apostles' Creed. They were pleased, promised him protection, and provided a room where a neighbouring pastor might minister to all who chose to assemble for worship.

Denmark.—The land which sent out the first Protestant missions to the heathen of India in the East and Greenland in the West was itself till recently denied more than a very scanty supply of God's Word. It was a monopoly of the Royal Orphan House; and not ten years ago your Society was more hampered in printing the Scriptures in Denmark than in Spain or in Rome. Now all is changed. Anti-Biblical influences lift their heads boldly, even in high places; but they seem powerless to stay the spread of God's Word. Last year, notwithstanding a terribly severe winter and a scanty harvest in the summer, your sales were the highest on record. In a population of only two millions you have within the last twenty-six years circulated more than half a million copies of Scripture, large or small.

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Norway.—The recent mild winter has reduced the Norwegian farmers and woodmen to a worse position than ever. For ice and snow are essential to their welfare. The tide of emigration has not turned, and the circulation has decreased by above 5,000 copies. At Stavanger your Society has lost an old and warm friend by the death of Mr. Svendsen. Earnest efforts are being made to extend colportage.

Sweden.—The Rev. R. H. Weakley has conducted the affairs of the Agency in a way that has left nothing to be desired. For he feels it blessed even to hew wood and draw water in the Master's service. The event of the year is the publication of the Gospel of St. Matthew in Swedish Lapp, prepared by Pastor Laestadius. A consulting and auditing Committee has been formed to assist your Agent. The issues have been 76,000 copies.

Russia (North).—The Rev. W. Nicolson reports that he has reason to thank God for much blessing during 1881. With all the evil elements that are at work in the Russian Empire, culminating in the Nihilistic conspiracies and the anti-Jewish riots, there are other and blessed agencies at work. 'There is every reason to believe that there is a quiet growth and deepening of spiritual life amongst the common people, combined with increased attention to the Scriptures.' Since the year closed, permission has been granted to your Society to circulate the whole Bible in Russ in five sections without the Apocrypha.

A Jew called a colporteur into his house, and bought a Hebrew-Russ Bible, and a Hebrew New Testament. He asked his workman, a Russian, what he would buy. The man said he liked the books, but could not afford to buy any. The Jew said, 'Choose what you will, and I will pay for them.' The man chose a New Testament and a Psalter. The Jew paid for them, and said, 'This book opens up to us the relation between man and God. We shall read them together, for I also understand Russ.'

The circulation in North Russia was 225,300 copies, which shows an increase of 6,000 on the previous year.

Something is being done for SIBERIA by your Society, as well as by some others. But it is altogether inadequate to the size and population of that vast region, and your Committee pray that a suitable Agent may soon be given them to enter the field with zeal, and self-denial, and faith.

Russia (South).—The circulation shows an increase of 5,670 copies, notwithstanding the bad harvest. The regulations respecting the permits for colportage have been altered in a way which increases the liberty with which your men can move about the whole empire. The show of Hebrew Scriptures in the window of the Kieff depôt led the populace to believe it was a Jewish house of business, and it was three times threatened with destruction by the mob. But when the ringleader was convinced that it was a depôt for the sale of Scriptures he kept his band of ruffians off.

Turkey.—Your Turkish Agency comprises several countries in which it is especially difficult to find men with the qualifications and character so essential to a Christian colporteur. Moreover, whole districts are still so overrun with

brigands that colportage can only be prosecuted in them at the risk of life and property. In other parts the people are steeped in poverty, and are subjected to so many petty exactions that they cannot afford to purchase anything larger than a Portion. It is therefore a cheering fact that the circulation by your Society's own direct agency within the Turkish Empire has increased by 21,300 copies in the year, besides an increase in the number supplied by it to the American Bible Society. The amount received for books sold by your colporteurs and depôts was £1,368, which is £280 more than in 1880.

The colporteurs employed during the whole or a part of the year were, in Constantinople, 9; in Bulgaria, 3; in Macedonia, 1; in Albania, 1; in Bithynia, 2; in Ionia and the Islands of the Archipelago, 5; in Cyprus, 1; in Crete, 1; in Greece, 5; in Syria and Palestine, 1; in Egypt, 4; total 33 men. Sales are also effected through depôts, booksellers, correspondents, and missionaries at various centres. The preparatory work of the past is beginning to show itself in the frequent appearance of persons who take the part of your colporteurs in defending the teaching of the Bible, and the correctness of the text in your editions. But infidelity and violent opposition are also met with.

Space will not permit a detailed reference to the numerous and diversified countries included in this Agency. In Palestine 11,000 single Gospels in various languages were granted by your Committee for a distribution to the pilgrims at Jerusalem, intended to have been carried out under the direction of the late Bishop Barclay. Port Said is now occupied by a resident colporteur of your Society, who has laboured with much diligence and success, especially among the immense population which passes through the place on shipboard. In three months he sold over 600 copies. In Greece a young man bought a Bible, saying to the Colporteur, 'Sir, I am very poor, and this money I give you I have borrowed. To repay I shall have to take something from my daily food, but I do it cheerfully that I may study the Word of God.'

Through the courtesy of the Palestine Exploration Fund arrangements have been made which will bring the maps inserted in your Society's Bibles abreast of the latest discoveries in Palestine and the East.

India.—This country has such paramount claims upon Englishmen and Englishwomen, that your Committee are anxious to do more than has yet been possible in the effective diffusion of the Scriptures among its 250,000,000 of people. Their efforts are, however, necessarily restricted by the small proportion of persons who can read, and who care to possess the Christian Book. They are dependent on missionaries and scholars for the translations required in a land where more than a hundred languages and dialects are spoken. And they cannot work without Christian agents available as channels of distribution in each part of the country.

The care of your Bible work in India is at present divided between six Auxiliaries—those of Calcutta, North India, the Punjab, Bombay, Bangalore, and Madras. Ceylon has Auxiliaries of its own. All of these are assisted by grants in Scriptures, in printing paper, and in money towards the cost of translations and revisions, of printing, colportage, and general expenses. They also raise and expend money in the country themselves. Your Committee have again urged the

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judicious distribution of Scriptures by missionaries on tours as one of the most promissing means for enlarging the circulation in India, and they have again expressed their readiness to aid in such tours both by books and money. They have also made offers of assistance wherever any circulation can be effected among females by the ladies who teach in zenanas, or in girls' schools. About 140 colporteurs are employed by the Indian and Ceylon Auxiliaries, and their sales are some 120,000 copies, large or small, in a year. Colportage is also accomplished through such agencies as the Christian Vernacular Education Society. Several important translations are undergoing careful revision, and a beginning has been made of providing the Scriptures for the first time in such languages as Brahui, Pahari, and Koi. The largest Auxiliary is that in Madras. Its sales were 15,000 last year, or 3,300 more than in the year before, and the demand for the Word of God in the Vernaculars of South India increases year by year.

China.—The year has been one of large issues from the various depots in China, 223,543 volumes having been sent out from Shanghai alone, as against 146,012 in the year before. The actual sales have in many cases not been reported, but they must have been large, though considerably less than the total issues. During the year 233,586 books have been received from the press, and many thousands more were in process of printing at its close.

A large number of native colporteurs are superintended by local committees, or individual missionaries. The staff of European colporteurs has been raised from one to four, and more of the missionaries of the China Inland Mission have been engaged to give much of their time to the sale of the Scriptures on their tours, The testimony is general to the marked difference in the attitude of the people towards the 'foreign devils,' and native colporteurs, who se'1 the Scriptures. Opposition, abuse, pelting with stones and mud, and the like are comparatively rare. Persons who have bought books in former years, and who have evidently read them with care, are met with from time to time. 'I am more convinced every year,' says the Rev. L. Lloyd, of Fuchau, 'that the distribution of the Bible in China is a work of the highest value, and that the result in God's time from this precious seed-sowing will be far beyond everything our weak faith expects.' A medical missionary has taken with him a Bible colporteur, and begun work in the island of Hainan. His skill draws crowds around him. In one place, within a few hours, thirty came with bad teeth to be drawn. In another, the relief given to one man by a blister brought nearly the whole village begging to be blistered. They were offered the Gospel instead.

Japan.—The Rev. Isaac J. Taylor, your first resident Agent in Japan, landed in Yokohama on March 4, 1881. He received a cordial welcome from the Corresponding Committee, which had so successfully worked for your Society as to make the need of an Agent on the spot urgent. And a large increase in your circulation has followed his arrival, besides many other benefits. The circulation, which in 1879 was 1,718, and in 1880, 4,706 copies, has in 1881 been 7,909 copies. Your Society has published, in conjunction with the National Bible Society of Scotland, the first Japanese New Testament with References. The References to the number of about 12,000, were prepared with much care by the Rev. John Piper of the Church Missionary Society. Three editions of several

thousand copies were called for in a few months. Among the Free Grants of the year were 30 copies of the parable of the Prodigal Son in Japanese raised type for the Blind. Four books of the Old Testament, translated by English missionaries, are now in circulation.

Bible Women.—In 1881 the London Bible and Domestic Female Mission employed 179 Bible women at home, and 43 abroad, viz., 12 in India, 10 in Syria, 6 in Madagascar, 3 in Burmah, 3 in Berlin, 2 in Madrid, 2 in Bordeaux, and one each in China, Cairo, Smyrna, Milan, and Rome; the one at Athens died. In the last 24 years the Bible women in London have collected £25,417 15s. 4d. in small sums for 205,360 copies of Scripture. Your Society's grant towards their support last year was £434 17s.

But the multiplicity and the variety of Home agencies for Christian work, which it has been your Committee's joy to assist by grants of Scriptures, defy enumeration. Suffice it to add their gratitude to all the Auxiliaries, Associations, Branches, and devoted friends, to whom they owe it, that it has been in their power to make those grants.

Other Bible Societies.—Your Committee rejoice in the circulation of the Holy Scriptures effected in all parts of the world by many other societies. They are especially cheered when a common object brings them into intimate and friendly co-operation with the Bible Societies of America and Scotland, and they offer to the Hibernian Bible Society their warm sympathy in its noble endeavour to stem disorder and disaffection by a wider diffusion of God's Word.

Appointments.—Your Committee have much pleasure in announcing that the office of Vice-President has been accepted by the Right Hon. Earl Cairns; the Very Rev. the Dean of Peterborough; J. Hampden Fordham, Esq.; William McArthur, Esq., M.P.; the Rev. Dr. Lewis Edwards, of Bala; the Rev. Dr. Owen Thomas, of Liverpool; and the Rev. C. H. Spurgeon.
