Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 22.—(Special).—The report of the proceedings of the Robinson game law violation case at Newcastle in the morning papers was a big surprise to the people in this city and there were none more surprised than Henry Braithwaite the veteran guide who made the charges.

BOMB EXPLODED IN NEW YORK TENEMENT

New York, Oct. 22.—Another bomb was exploded last night in an east side tenement which has been guarded by the police for weeks to prevent just such outbreaks. The explosive was placed in the hallway of a house in East Eleventh street occupied by eighteen families and owned by Pasquale Desquari, who has been receiving black-hand warnings for nearly a year.

FIVE HUNDRED LIVES LOST DURING FEARFUL TYPHOON

Manila, Oct. 22.—Additional reports of damage wrought in the Cagayan Valley by the typhoon of Oct. 12, indicate that loss of life will reach 500.

At Appari where a thrilling rescue of a hundred natives was effected through the heroism of Lieut. Robert Clark Lieut. Trisway and Postmaster Fow, the survivors say that 300 residents of the submerged fishing village which is located some distance below Appari, were swept away and drowned.

Approaching the shore in a series of short dashes between breakers that threatened at any moment to swamp their frail craft, the rescuers found scores of natives clinging to the poles of their wrecked habitations. AN AWFUL EXPERIENCE WITH THE SOUTHERN RIDERS

Judge Taylor Returns Home Safe and Sound After Being Left for Dead by Men who Shot Him.

Tiptonville, Tenn., Oct. 21.—Unharmful, save numerous scratches received in a thirty hour trip through unfamiliar woods of the fatigue incident to the trip with food and the mental strain, Judge R. Zachary Taylor, reached here today, after a miraculous escape from night riders at Reel Foot Lake, who murdered his partner, Captain Quentin Rankin, night before last.

Col. Taylor made the following statement of his experience: "Monday night last, Captain Rankin and I went to Reel Foot Lake in response to a letter from a Mr. Carpenter of Union City, who wanted to lease some timber lands. On our arrival at the lake we went to the Ward Hotel and early after supper retired. Some time during the night we were aroused by someone knocking at the door and on opening the door a mob of masked men were found standing in the hall. We were ordered to dress and at the leader of the mob said he wanted to talk to us, we put on our clothes and accompanied the men to the back of the house some distance from the hotel.

The leader of the mob told us we were associating too much with Judge Harris and were taking entirely too much interest in the lake. We said that the course of Harris and the West Tennessee Land Company in prohibiting free fishing was causing the starvation of women and children and that something had to be done. "I never dreamed that the mob intended us any harm but just then they threw a rope around Captain Rankin's neck and swung him to a man. He protested, saying, 'Gentlemen, do not kill me' and the reply of the mob was a volley of fifty shots. This was the first sign of any intention to harm us and when the firing began to stop I saw a heavy and mud for a smoken log. Behind this I hid and the mob fired several shots hundred yards into the log. They evidently believed I was dead for I heard one of them say: 'He's dead and let him go' and with that he rode away.

"I remained in the water until after the mob was out of hearing and went to an island in the lake where I remained all day Tuesday. At night I started out and walked all night coming up to a house at six o'clock this morning."

The Grand Trunk Pacific must come to St. John. Terminal facilities on Courtenay Bay must be developed. Dr. Pugsley proposes to go on with this work.

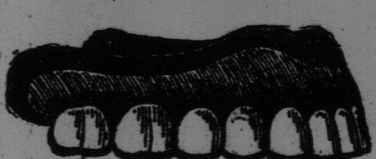
An observant Sussex man, who voted for the Hazen candidates in the provincial campaign, tells the Times that he believes Dr. McAlister will be elected.
