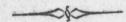

ignorant and imprudent?

A. No: for at the same time that it recommends the simplicity of doves, it adds the prudent cunning of serpents. By simplicity of mind is meant uprightness, and the precept of the Gospel is that of nature.

The first of their Emperor's privilege is that of sending his Calendar to his vassals and neighbours; their refusal of which would be considered as a bravado, and war would forthwith be made upon them, as it used to be made in Europe on feudal lords who refused their homage.

"I have much less faith than you in the superstitions," replied the Emperor; only make me a good calendar, and leave it for my learned men to fill up the book with their foolery."
