

Canadians have an aggregate amount of savings of over \$650,000,000 in the savings banks throughout the Dominion. Of this amount over \$490,000,000 is deposited in the banks on notice, carrying on an average a three per cent return to the people. Of this sum an annual disbursement of nearly fifteen million dollars is required to meet the interest charges. A table is published on the financial page today whereby it can be seen where the bulk of the savings are deposited. The thirty-six chartered banks control about \$404,000.000 of the entire amount deposited on notice, and of this volume seventeen banks are responsible for \$351,567,000, or over out of the entre amount deposited in he tice, and of this volume seventeen banks are responsible for \$351,567,000, or over eighty per cent of the chartered bank holdings. 
