STEAM IN THE PACIFIC.—It is stated in the

United States Gazette, on authority of letters

from the Pacific to November 26, that the

British "Steam Packet Company" had two

of their steam vessels in operation. The

"Peru" arrived at Callao from Valparaiso

on the 7th of November, in 8 days passage,

touching at all the intermediate ports; she

left Lima for Valparaiso on the 15th of No-

vember, with one hundred and thirty-five

passengers; this being her first trip. On

the 24th of November, the "Chile" arrived in 8

days from Valparaiso, with forty-five pas-

sengers, being her first trip. The vessels are

spoken of as being of 750 tons burthen, built

with great regard to strength, that the hull

was the better able to resist the constant

jar of the engines, and maintain its tight-

ness in the strongest gale and heaviest sea.

possible, built stronger than sea vessels nav-
