JAMES P. NASE DIES
SUDDENLY, WAS OUT
ONLY LAST EVENING

Prominent North End Business Man was Sixty-two Years Old.
OF LOYALIST FAMILY
Was Long Connected Closely With St. John River Business.

James Philip Nase, manager of the grocery and general produce business at 140 Main street, North End, passed away suddenly at 7 o'clock this morning, at the home of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Susan Nase, widow of Leonard P. Nase, 140 Main street. He was 62 years of age, and unmarried. He had been in poor health for a considerable period, but well enough to attend to his business and walk about. Indeed, Mr. Nase took a short stroll last evening and felt refreshed for the day. Therefore news of his death was a sorrowful surprise to relatives, business associates and friends in general.

Of Loyalist Family.
Mr. Nase was a son of the well-known Loyalist Nase family and son of the late Philip Nase, one of the chief branches of this fruitful tree of the St. John, as well as a leading enterprise in a local sense. The family retains its original significance, P. Nase & Son, was for the modern cooperative affix "LAD."

Had Many Friends.
When Leonard T. Nase died seven years ago, James P. Nase succeeded to the management of the estate, an steady, industrious and courteous attention to its details. "Jim" Nase was a familiar figure with city residents and up-river dwellers. His connection with out-of-town residents was fully retained when he took up the reins of the business. Mr. Nase's immediate surviving relatives are: Mrs. R. B. Peterson, a sister, and Otto Nase, also of this city, half-brother. Brothers living outside the city are: M. T. Nase of Ridgefield, Conn., at present; Wallace Smith, cook, Nase of Wauwatosa, Wis., and Frank of Cleveland, O.

LAND RESCUED CREW
Captain, Mate and Four Others of Abandoned Nfd. Schooner Reach Boston.

OSTON, Jan. 7.—The captain, and four members of the crew of the British schooner Esther Hankins, which was abandoned after being wrecked and becoming unseaworthy during a storm in South American waters on Nov. 18, arrived here yesterday afternoon as passengers aboard the steamer Thelus. The men, who were rescued just as they were about to abandon their ship, were taken to Montevideo by the Greek steamer Charalambos are: Capt. Ernest Patrick Yates, and seamen, Chas. Dicks, Martin Peddie and James Moore. The three-master, having from Newfoundland, was bound from Cadiz, Spain, to St. John's, Newfoundland, when struck by the storm. During the gale the ship's boat was swept overboard and drowned. The British Consul is arranging for the transportation of the survivors to Newfoundland.

the title of the company to the land as set out but did dispute the title to the beds of the rivers and lakes. Gilbert H. Prince.

Gilbert H. Prince, acting Deputy Minister of the Crown Lands Department of the province, was the first witness called by the company. He produced certified copies of the titles to the land in dispute and these were placed in evidence. Following Mr. Prince's testimony, Mr. Murdoch was called and on cross-examination, Dr. Pugsley called Miss A. R. Carter, secretary of the N. B. Electric Power Commission. Dr. Pugsley was not present and Mr. Lewin asked Dr. Pugsley what documents he required.

Dr. Pugsley replied he wanted all the records of the commission, reports, contracts, etc. Anything he said, that would tend to show the market for electricity through the Musquash development, and its commercial value. Asked specifically to enumerate these, Dr. Pugsley said he wanted the report made in 1922 by C. O. Foss, then chief engineer as published in The Times-Star; the original reports of the Power Commission to the Provincial Government; the contracts made by the commission with St. John, Moncton, Sussex, Apolquo, and other centres; detailed statements of the cost of development at Musquash and the reports of the consulting engineers.

Dr. Pugsley said their aim was not to detract from the Musquash but to confirm their own claims. "We think it is one of the greatest projects this province has ever undertaken," he remarked. He said he must place this matter in evidence before calling other witnesses. At this point, court adjourned.

Basis of Claim.
The following are the particulars of the claim re lands and property of the Inglewood Pulp and Paper Company, Limited, expropriated by the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, before Mr. Justice LeBlanc, arbitrator.

1. The Inglewood Pulp and Paper Company, Limited, was incorporated by Act of the Legislature of New Brunswick, being Chapter VII, Paragraph 10, with power by Sec. 1, Paragraph 10, among other things, to lease, hire or sell any surplus property, or otherwise, which the company may develop, to any person, firm, corporation, town or village, and for the further carrying out of and for the carrying out of the purchase, lease, construct and maintain, conduits, poles, wires and pole lines. This power is given without limitation as to time or otherwise.

After the great war, the company, for the Government inaugurating its policy of public hydro development, and compulsorily taking over this company's property in 1920, would have established an industry as operated by it by electricity and carried its distribution wires to the City of St. John, and sold the surplus electrical energy on a commercial basis. The company acquired the Inglewood Manor and the property of the Musquash Lumber Company, so that their total property contained about 46,000 acres, which includes about 4,000 acres covered by the waters of the various lakes and streams, including water power rights and dam sites, and the beds of the various lakes and streams within its tract.

It was asserted today that the position of the oil tanker Sarnolite, which is anchored in the harbor about opposite the Refinery wharf, is causing trouble to the pilots in moving vessels about the harbor and in handling inward and outward steamers. The pilots declare that the steamer is held by a single anchor and is swinging on 75 fathoms of chain and that this gives her much play.

Several of the pilots expressed the opinion that the steamer was taking up two of the best anchoring berths and that either she should be compelled to go to a wharf or be forced to put down two anchors and shorten her chain. O. K. There Says Harbor Master. F. D. Alward, the harbor master, said this afternoon that he considered the tanker was anchored in a very satisfactory place. He said he had heard the pilots complaining about the vessel's position and added that he had attributed their grievance largely to the fact that the steamer does not have to take a pilot.

Referring to the length of chain the pilots said she was using he declared it was only yesterday that he had heard of this side of the complaint and he added that he was investigating the matter. Mr. Alward stated that 75 fathoms was a little too long a swing for a vessel to have there and he declared that the matter would be rectified at once. No complaints had been received from any of the shipping companies, he said, and he considered that the vessel could remain where she was at present.







TANKER IN HARBOR GIVES CITY HALL MEETING SUBJECT

Oil Vessel in Fairway and Used as a Fuel Depot. FEES ABOUT \$30 South End League Grant Asked For—Change in Ferry Charges.

The right of a firm to use the harbor of St. John as a storage depot was discussed at the City Council meeting yesterday afternoon and it was stated by Commissioner Bullock that the existing by-laws this was possible.

The discussion arose over the question of Commissioner Frink concerning a large oil steamer anchored in the fairway of the harbor and being used as a depot for the distribution of fuel oil to steamers.

The steamer belonged to the Imperial Oil Company, and Mr. McAvilly, manager of the Canadian Independent Oil Companies, had objected to her lying in the harbor.

The commissioner said he would like to get more revenue from this business but did not see how it was to be done.

Mayor Potts said there was nothing to hinder the harbor master from placing the steamer at a wharf and then she would have to pay more.

An application from the South End Improvement League for a grant of \$600 for the year 1925 was also on the table to be considered with the other grants.

On motion of Commissioner Bullock the offer of the St. John Real Estate Company to pay \$800 for the fee simple in Lot 661, Queens ward, was accepted.



SNOWDEN HAS FLING AT SOVIETS Says Zinovieff Wrote Famous Election Letter to Defeat Labor Government. FREDERICTON, Jan. 6.—That the Russian Government was an evil Government and the greatest tyranny on earth when she visited the country four years ago, and remains so, but that economically the country was slowly making progress, was stated here tonight in her first public address in Canada under the auspices of the National Council of Education by Mrs. Philip Snowden, wife of the Chancellor of the Exchequer in the late British Labor Government. Every reasonable aid should be given the 150 million of Russian people in the struggle upward out of the results of centuries of tyranny, she thought, but she knew that at least on the part of the late Chancellor of the Exchequer there had been no intention that Russia should have any halfpenny of English money without absolute security. Mrs. Snowden referred to the fact that the Let's were now in ascendancy in Russia with Trotsky on the right and in practical retirement. Zinovieff, author of the letter which was largely responsible for the fall of the British Labor Government, was a terrorist, and she was inclined to believe that the letter was written with the object in view which it helped to accomplish, for it was the wish of Zinovieff and his confederates to have an accessory government as possible a power in other countries, the better to prepare the ground for Bolshevik teachings.

BORAH AND HUGHES ARE NEAR TO CLASH

Fight in U. S. Senate Over Isle of Pines Promises to be Spectacular.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The spectacular treaty fight which is about to break in the Senate will determine in part who is to control the administration's foreign policy for the next four years.

When the Muscle Shoals is disposed of, the 20-year-old Isle of Pines treaty will be called up and the first test of strength between Charles E. Hughes and Senator William E. Borah will begin.

Matter of Sovereignty. Relatively unimportant in itself, this long unratified treaty recognizing Cuban sovereignty over the little island 80 miles off Havana will give Borah, the new chairman of the powerful Senate Foreign Relations Committee, his first opportunity to challenge the hit-

erto undisputed dominance of the Secretary of State. Advocate of Russian recognition and severe critic of alleged imperialism of the United States in the Caribbean and Latin America, the progressive Senator stands at one pole of the Republican party and Hughes at the other on the question. Borah has picked his ground and, in attempting to defeat the treaty, is expected to win. Four times in twenty years the pact has been reported out of committee, favorably, and each time sent back by the Senate. Opponents of the treaty, which recognizes Cuban sovereignty over the island, contend that it is part of the territory of the United States. Whether Borah will go that far is not yet clear. But he will at least insist that the State Department draw up another treaty giving better safeguards to U. S. rights.

MUST BE UNIFORM AND HOLD A QUART

Berry Box Regulations Announced—Boys' Industrial Home Work Affected.

New regulations with regard to the kind of berry boxes which may be used in New Brunswick have been issued by the Industrial Home of one of the lucrative forms of employment which the boys formerly were taught. All berry boxes used this coming season must be of one size and pattern, the old square shaped boxes made by crossing two thin pieces of wood and binding off the top with a narrow strip of wood. The thin wood used for these boxes must be made on special machinery and practically all this material for the boxes will be imported.

The new boxes will be uniform in size, all having a one-quart capacity, but their use will involve some extra work for the producers. It will be necessary to have thin layers of wood placed in the crates to separate one row of boxes from another. Berry growers in New Brunswick who have shipped their produce to special markets have been obliged to use these boxes in other years, but the producers who shipped to the local market have favored the eight-sided box, made with a bottom raised slightly so that one box could be set on top of another in the crate without fear of crushing the fruit in the lower box.

It was boxes of this latter variety that the boys of the Industrial Home have manufactured. The boxes were made of thin poplar usually and were in great demand. ALMANAC FOR ST. JOHN, JAN. 7. A.M. POSSIBILITIES OF INCREASED TRADE WITH WEST INDIES

Timely Suggestions by the Managing Director of Barbadoes Co.

PRESENTS 3 IDEAS

Cold Storage on Ships, Trade Agreements and More Work.

E. L. Mitchell, managing director of the Barbadoes Standard Molasses Co., Ltd., in an interview last night offered three suggestions leading to the greater development of trade between Canada and the British West Indies. The first was that the Canadian Government Merchant Marine should equip one third of each of their ships with West Indian trade with cold storage facilities, which would immediately result in direct shipment of fruit from the islands into Canada.

Trade Agreement. The second was that Canada should enter into a trade agreement with each individual island making up the West Indian group whereby a certain set amount of products of that island might enter Canada free of duty and that in return a similar amount of Canadian goods might enter the island free of duty, and the third was that Canadians generally should do more work and less talking and adapt themselves to taking a chance that the result of their endeavor will be profitable and not wait until they can see the dividend before they invest.

Cold Storage Needed. In addition to that Mr. Mitchell said that the shippers of the West Indies were very partial to the Canadian Government Merchant Marine and that if that corporation gave them notice that at a certain time they would have ships partially equipped with cold storage then the West Indian shippers would have the fruit freight to keep them moving and moving fast. Until the ships were thus equipped it was useless to make direct fruit importation to Canada from the West Indies, for it was impossible, he said.
