## A PERSONAL AFFAIR

(Orphanage Fair Daily Newsletter)

St. John, N. B., Oct. 19, 1921.

To the Protestants of N. B.,

Greetings—

This letter today may not bear your name, but it is intended for you. For three weeks past we have been writing you daily and have so far failed to get satisfactory results. This is to be a big affair and we need your co-operation. If you have not been answering, we trust you will from now on, not for their literary value, but for the sake of the helpless orphan children in whose interest alone they are written.

Many people turn aside and fail to see that appeal of this kind is just as worthy of their consideration and support as if given by word of mouth. Almost every Protestant of reasoning age must realize how utterly inadequate our Protestant orphanages are to take care of the children needing institutional care, and that others have been and are still being called on to feed and clothe our homeless children. This is a shameful state of affairs, but nevertheless true. Worse still, one of our local institutions is about to close its doors through lack of support, and the remaining ones are all going behind financially.

The fraternal societies of St. John (ladies and gentlemen) have organized a committee to run a ten day fair from October 17 to 27 in aid of this work. We need all the support that we can secure from all parts of the province. There are few who cannot help a little if they will. Donations of any class or kind acceptable. It is estimated the wheat crop will be about 295,000,000 bushels, or nearly 30,000,000 greater than in 1920.

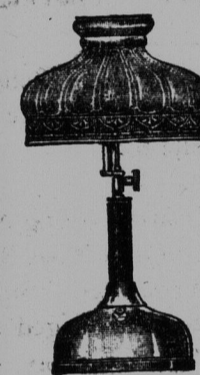

**KEEP ARMED TILL SAFETY SECURED**

Important Speech by Premier of France.

Briand States Policy of His Country at Washington Conference—France Wants Peace—Faith in German Government.

St. Nazaire, France, Oct. 10.—"France must remain armed as long as her security has not been assured" was the statement made Sunday by Aristide Briand, French premier, in an address outlining the French government's foreign policy.

M. Briand was surrounded by six of the ministers of his cabinet and four under-secretaries.

"My voice must carry high and far," said M. Briand. "Tomorrow beyond seas, we are invited to examine into certain problems. I have had the honor to Washington first in order to fulfill a duty of gratitude and to see in their homes those noble and brave soldiers whom we have seen in France. We will go also to accomplish a duty toward France.

"France has carried the right to reparations and security. At no time shall the French government yield on these points. I will refute the accusations of imperialism which have been made against France. Our allies know that we demand our rights—nothing more.

At Washington I will prove that France wants peace.

"We will discuss the great problems of the day coolly and impartially. If guarantees of security are granted France, she will be among the first nations to enter into the policy of disarmament, for France loathes war and perils.

"This government has confidence in the government of Dr. Wirth (the German chancellor). The undertakings entered upon by the present German government have been fulfilled. France's attitude in these difficult moments is no aggressiveness, but no timidity."

M. Briand touched lightly during his speech on the critics of the Versailles treaty and its execution by his government, saying a poor instrument had

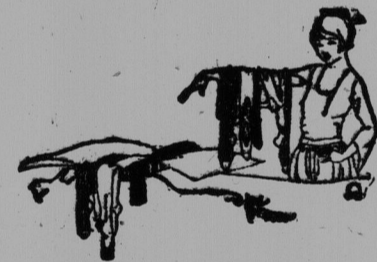

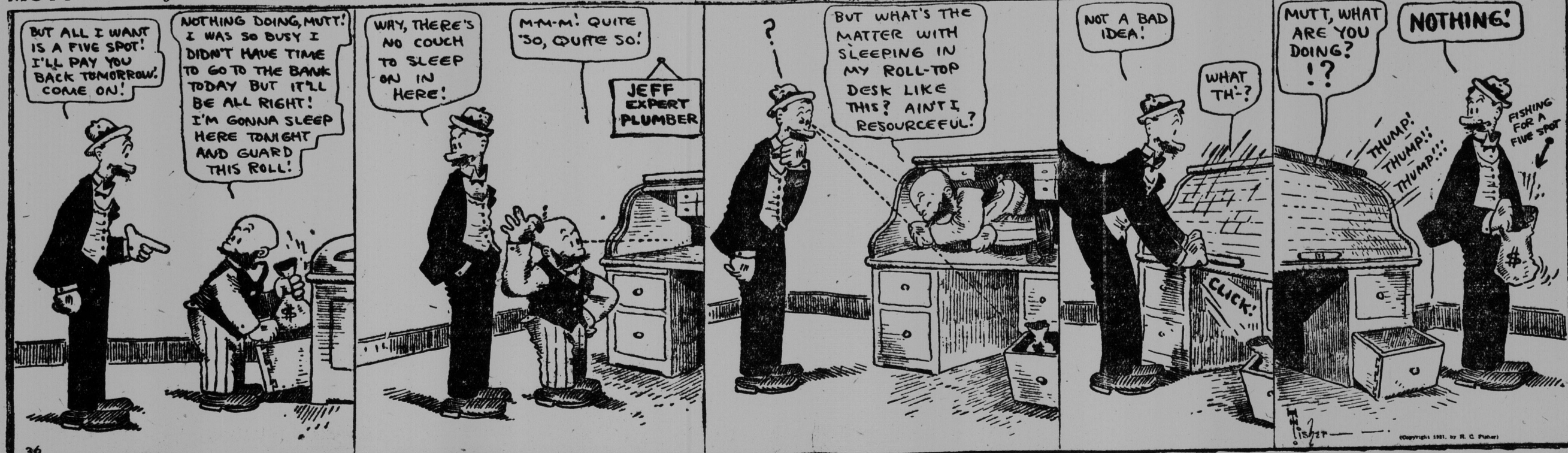

### WORLD FINANCES

#### Views of the President of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce.

London, Oct. 10.—(Canadian Press) Sir Edward Stockton, president of the Manchester chamber of commerce, speaking on the financial state of the world said he was convinced that the present position had been made much worse by the exaggerated feeling of depression among commercial men. "We are not suffering organic troubles but our system is temporarily out of gear through abnormal necessities," he said. "The suggestion that the government should lift the stocks off the market and finance them for an indefinite period was impracticable and worthless, he said. A much more likely solution would be for the British government to press for the cancellation of the war debts among the Allies."

#### Snow in Adirondacks.

Glens Falls, N. Y., Oct. 10.—The first freezing temperature of the season was reported last night from the Adirondacks and snow was reported to have fallen to a depth of three inches on the mountains near Port Henry.

### IMPROVEMENT IN CONDITIONS

#### Canadian Trade Commissioners Write of Matters in Italy and Belgium.

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—(Canadian Press) A very marked improvement in conditions in Italy and in Belgium is reported by the respective Canadian trade commissioners, in the forthcoming bulletin of the department of trade and commerce.

### FORGERS PLANNED BIG BUSINESS

#### Arrests in Plot Alleged to Have Forty Millions in View.

Budapest, Oct. 10.—A page of forgers who planned to float \$40,000,000 of counterfeit U. S. currency in the states of Central Europe have been arrested here. They specialized in a twenty dollar bill, several hundred of which had been in circulation.

They are believed to have had accomplices among the Budapest police and to have had agents in Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Roumania. The police believe a large quantity of the forged bank notes were sent to Belgrade and Sofia.

In Brussels, writes Trade Commissioner A. S. Blaney, the general commercial and industrial situation shows substantial progress. The metallurgical industry and the cotton trade, as well as the diamond and glass industries, are on the up-grade, and a better tone is noted on the financial exchange.

There is a strong demand, he said, for Canadian canned goods in Belgium. The demand for Canadian goods, including salmon, pears, apricots and apples, meats and condensed milk; also for fresh apples, honey, cheese, butter and generally all food products. The tendency is towards higher prices.

W. McI. Clarke, Canadian trade commissioner at Milan, notes as an encouraging feature in the Italian situation an improvement in the political-social condition, a marked reduction in strikes, an increasing investment of capital, a rising tone in the share market, a notable improvement in public life with a considerable withdrawal of paper currency. He also refers to a continued heavy tourist trade, and a bumper wheat crop for this harvest. Italy's imports show a heavy increase in goods bought from Germany during the first four months of the year.

## TRADE MATTERS

**Local Board Notes - Competition for Junior Trade Commissioner Posts Disappointing.**

The Board of Trade has received from the Maritime Law Committee of the International Law Association, London, England, copies of the Hague Rules of 1921 in relation to bills of lading, which rules, it is expected, will be brought into force not later than January 31, 1922. Some of these rules, particularly those relating to the carriage of timber cargoes, have an important bearing upon New Brunswick overseas export trade. For example, clause 4 of Article III, relating to responsibilities and liabilities, says: "Upon any claim against the carrier in the case of goods carried in bulk or whole cargoes of timber, the claimant shall be bound notwithstanding the bill of lading, to prove the number, quantity or weight actually delivered to the carrier."  
 In connection with the Brazilian Centenary Exhibition held at Rio de Janeiro in September, 1922, a business man in that city has written the board of trade that if there are any firms in this province desirous of participating in the exhibition he will be pleased to look after their exhibits.

**Junior Trade Commissioners Wanted.**  
 The Weekly Bulletin of the Trade and Commerce Department for Oct. 10, has a letter from the secretary of Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, in which he says that the results of the competition for the position of Junior Commissioner of Canada have been disappointing. Not only was the number of competitors small, but the greatest disappointment, he says, was in the remarkably small number who qualified as eligible for appointment. Only sufficient were secured to fill four vacancies. The papers submitted showed "a really lamentable ignorance" of such subjects as Canadian trade and commerce, exports and imports and information regarding exchange and other trade matters that applicants for the position of trade commissioner should be familiar with. Says Secretary Foran: "It would appear that education in Canada, on which we are wont to pride ourselves, does not as yet fully equip the individual with that general knowledge so necessary to success in the commercial world." He suggests that a campaign of propaganda be instituted among Canadian educational bodies with a view of informing them and giving the students instruction as to the objects and requirements of Canada's Commercial Intelligence Service."  
 It is proposed to hold another junior trade commission competition soon, says the bulletin.

## MR. FRINK BRINGS UP PORT MATTERS

Courtenay Bay and Negro-town Breakwater.

Other Matters Referred to in Address at Commissioners' Meeting - Piling Tenders - The City's Broad Street Property.

A lengthy speech on the matter of construction of the harbor works at Courtenay Bay and failure of the government to live up to the 1911 agreement regarding the development of the works department, at a committee meeting at city hall this morning.  
 Dr. Frink said that yesterday there was a fresh southwest breeze blowing in Courtenay Bay and the difficulty with which dredges and other craft were able to move inside the breakwater struck him forcibly. Whether the extension of the Negro Point breakwater would assist matters he could not say, as even experts had differed on the matter.  
 He said that in the winter of 1912 he was of a delegation which went to Ottawa to urge the extension of the Negro Point breakwater and to endeavor to have some changes made in the Courtenay Bay plans. The evidence of pilots and master mariners, which the delegation took to Ottawa, apparently did not affect Mr. Lafleur, the chief engineer for the dominion. Dredging had been carried on in Courtenay Bay for the last two years, he said, but so far the city council had not been advised by the government what its objective at Courtenay Bay was. He thought that the city should have this information.  
 He said that when Hon. Robert Rogers was minister of public works, \$100,000 had been promised for the Negro Point breakwater extension and he would like to see this obligation carried out. He said it had been promised that the 1911 agreement would also be carried out but so far nothing has been done. He asked if the council was going to ask for a new bill on the matter of harbor commission or ask the government to carry out the agreement which was made under the seal of the dominion. The city has deeded its property from Sand Point to the Negro Point breakwater and had the agreement been carried out the question of harbor commission would never have been raised. He said it was time for the city council to adopt a stand.  
 After Hon. Mr. Pugsley had spent \$4,000,000 on the harbor, Hon. Mr. Haslam followed with another \$4,000,000, but it stopped at that. Underlying the whole matter, but not expressed in the agreement, was the idea of a breakwater across the harbor at Navy Island so that the C. N. R. could handle traffic directly to the wharves port terminals. He thought now was the time for the council to take a definite stand on the matters he had mentioned.  
 Mayor Schofield said that he, too, had been considering the matters referred to and he likewise thought that the time was most opportune to take them up.  
 Commissioner Bullock, of the harbor department, remarked that no department promises regarding the harbor and not carried out, a candidate making no promises at all was more likely to get stronger support. He understood that a small start had been made in filling in the gap between the Negro Point breakwater and Partridge Island, but the material used he thought would not stand any very heavy seas.  
 In response to a request from the mayor, Commissioner Bullock promised to get some information on the work being carried out at Toronto.  
 Dr. Frink also said that the council should be kept in touch with the progress of the work at Courtenay Bay.  
 Alexander Wilson applied for the purchase of lots 968 and 969, Rodney street, West St. John, at present leased to him, at \$450 each. On motion of Commissioner Bullock, it was decided to recommend their sale.  
 Reporting on the matter of Brydon street surface, Dr. Frink said that instructions had been given the street superintendent to comply with the request of H. B. Binson to put some material on the street surface.  
 Commissioner Frink reported on the claim of Mrs. Rose Gaudet that her daughter was injured by falling in Chapel street, cutting her hand, on September 23. The girl, who is fifteen years old, was employed in the McCready vinegar factory. The sidewalk had since been repaired. He moved that the matter of claim be referred to the recorder for report.  
 Commissioner Frink presented a petition from the residents of Germain street between St. James and Britain streets for the pavement of that block under the abutment plan. The rateable frontage represented by those who signed was \$13,300 and those who did not sign \$7,500. The commissioner moved that tenders be called for the work. Carried.  
 Referring to Commissioner Bullock, Dr. Frink said the area owned by the city in Broad street would be an ideal one for the erection of a substantial structure to house the city equipment and stables. Its proximity to railway sidings was an advantage. The site would always be available for an industrial site if it was required.  
 To the mayor, Commissioner Frink said that a more central location was desirable for an incinerator.  
 Commissioner Jones asked if the hours of committee meetings on Monday and Thursday mornings could be changed from 11.30 to 11 o'clock. He was asked to bring in a recommendation to that effect.  
 Tenders for the supply and driving of thirty pieces of oak piling on the east side ferry approach were opened and referred to the commissioner of harbors and city engineer for report. They were as follows: Stephen Construction Co., \$12,946.35; H. R. Lee, \$13,297.40.  
 On motion of Commissioner Frink, it was decided to have the city engineer cause a survey to be made of the city property at the eastern end of Broad street, occupied by the public works department, and fences erected and all encroachments removed, and that the commissioner of public works submit plans of a construction suitable for the needs of the public works and other departments.
