

LIBERTY AND LICENSE.

The industrial commission recommends the restoration of the fullest liberty of speech and press in Canada. At first thought this appears to be just, but it should be made clear that there is a difference between liberty and license. They have made that discovery in the United States, where the end of the war has been followed by a new German drive States, where the end of the war has been followed by a new German drive to preserve the German language and German kultur. There has been organized a Germanamerican Citizens' League for that purpose. Note the name. In the opinion of this league the word German should have a capital letter and America a small one. The American constitution provides that "Congress shall make no law abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances." These Germans take advantage of a law made to safeguard individual liberty and convert liberty into license. They are setting out erty into license. They are setting out to do what the framers of the constitution did not regard as even a possibility in the United States. It is used to make safe the activities of real enemies of the republic. "The disturbances being created in Twelve Steamers Have Loaded 2,242,705 Bushels Wheat — 2,000 Tons this country by un-American elements are, in their essence, just as truly war against the United States government as anything that Germany did to United States shipping on the high seas during the last three years, or as anything she did to the American soldiers at Chateau Thierry or in the Argonne. They are merely war in a subtler, less tangible form, and therefore more difficult to deal with, more worthy of a long and arduous preparedness. 



It is also planned to have the prince unveil the tablet to the returned soldiers in the post office, as well as the tablet in the General Public Hospital in honor of the late Nursing Sister Stamers and the late Captain (Dr.) Duval.

The far-famed Reversing falls will be visited by the prince and his party as well as the St. John military hospital in Lancaster. At 4 o'clock in the afternoon his royal highness will be driven to Rothesay, where he will be a guest of honor at a garden party at the residence of Lieutenant-Governor Pugsley. Jute twine in coarse grades is also up one cent and finer grades two cents a pound. Coal oil has gone up one cent as gallon. No change is reported on gasoline, which Holds at recent decline.

BACON GOING UP.

(Toronto Globe.)

After a while bacon will be quite dear, unless the packers lose on their transactions. For months past Toronto packers have been paying more money for hogs than actually necessary, the Ontario guotations being anywhere from a dollar to three dollars per hundredweight above the Chicago and Buffalo prices. Now the American markets are developing strength and the Canadian prices are following suit. Prices at country points now range up to \$23.50, and higher in some cases. It costs a little more than a dollar per hundredweight to snip hogs from the average country point to the Toronto abattoirs. The live pook is, therefore, costing the packers are und \$25 per hundredweight, and by the time it is dressed, passed through the wholesale and retail profit-taking stages it will reach the hungry consumer a rather high prices, especially in view of the fact that Canadian bacon has won a greet name for itself in England and is demanding all sorts of prices on all overseas markets. (Toronto Globe.)

The report was received and its recommendations ordered to be carried out.

The report of the finance committee which, on the motion of Mr. Nagle, seconded by Mr. Smith, was confirmed, said that the deduction of government grants to the amount of \$2,697.20 had been added to the teachers' salary for non-teaching days, and that the total insurance for the amount of \$374,775 to be divided among all local agencies. It was stated that the rate is \$1.60 and that the estimate of \$4,500, for premiums had been exceeded, some increases having been made, Mr. Day and Mr. Lewin both advocated carrying more insurance on the buildings.






