



Paris, May 5—A gigantic hydro aeroplane has been constructed at Triel-on-Seine, as a destroyer of dirigible balloons of the Zeppelin type. It weighs 8,000 pounds. It covered its first flight of thirty miles with three persons aboard at about the rate of sixty miles an hour. Its radius of action is 600 miles. It is able to carry a load of 2,00 pounds and ten passengers. It has two motors of 220 h. p. each.
