How to Clean Crape.

A crape veil can be renovated by putting it out for a few minutes in a drizzling rain until well dampened. Then fold and put under a mattress over night. It will be wonderfully improved in the morning.

Again Into Work in Spring.

After a season of comparative rest and idleness during the winter, the farm horse should be brought gradually into full work in the spring. Do not put the horses at a hard day's plowing at first, but rather let them do lighter work for the first few days. Their shoulders will need watching, to see that the collars fit well, that they do not gall. Loose collars are the most frequent cause of sore shoulders. Sponge the shoulders night and morning with a strong decoction of white oak bark their dollars at noon, but I think it would well repay the trouble in added comfort to the horse. It is like taking off your hat when you come in at noon, tired and heated by your work.

The east abutment is 64 ft. leng, the west 46 ft. The centre span is 83 feet and the 2 shore spans 34 ft each. The side spans are girders and the centre is truss work in six panels, the height of which is 17 feet. The rails are of wood, and are 31 feet high.

The cost of the work will be about \$7,000. The designer is Mr. A. R. Wetmore, Chief Engineer of the Public Works Depart-ment, Fredericton Much credit is due to our representatives for securing the construction so permanent and valuable a work at this important point. Soap Suds for Calming Waves.

The remarkable action of oil upon wave is well known. This phenomenon led the officers of the steamship Scandia, of Hamburg, to make an experiment upon the same principle that was very successful, and that while in mid-ocean, was attacked by a very heavy storm. It then occured to the officers to dissolve a large quantity of soap in tubs of water. Having thus obtained several hundred gallons of soap suds in a very short time, they threw it overboard in front of the ship. The effect was almost instantaneous, and the vessel soon began to navigate without difficulty. Her officers at once addressed a long report to the Hydrographic Bureau of the United States, giving an account of their voyage, the storm, and the means that they employed to still the waves. They conclude by saying that although soap suds does not produce absolutely all the effects upon water that oil does, it at least suffices to break the force of waves in most cases.
