STILL IN FORCE.

Winning the Fight.

Running Today But People are Not Using Them Largely.

NEW YORK, March 8, - The secon day of the strike on the subway and elevated lines began with little change from yesterday's conditions. Trains were running in the subway and there was some improvement shown in the service on the elevated, but the trains carried comparatively few passengers and the greater part of the down-town traffice was handled by the surface lines. The Metropolitan Street Railway Company put every trolley car available into service and did its best to handle the great crowds. There seemed to be nothing for the public to do but to get about as haphazardly during today as they did yesterday All through the night the Second and Ninth avenue branches were tied up almost completely and the running of the third avenue of the elevated was irregular. The Sixth avenue line, however, made a good record and the subway ran trains with considerable


