on Tour to Arctic. New York, May 20—Capt. Robert Bartlett, sailing master and ice navisator of the Roosevelt, the vessel on which Rear Admiral Peary made his successful dash to the North Pole, will hold the same relative position,—practically second in command,—on the Stefanssen expedition that starts in June for Arctic exploration. Vilhalmar Stefansson, the explorer, made this announcement tonight, He said also that the largest body of scientific men ever assembled for a voyage into Polar regions will accompany him.

Bartlett leaves at once for Ottawa en route to Esquimault where he expects to arrive in a few days to attend to the loading of the stores and supplies for the Karluk, the vessel that will carry the major part of the exploring party north.
