





Government Ownership of Railways for the U. S.

New York, Dec. 11.—The project of government railroad ownership in the United States was condemned by President Seth Low of the National Civic Pederation in his address today opening the fourteenth annual meeting of that organization. Mr. Low was chairman of the federal board of arbitration which recently decided the controversy over wages between the eastern railroads and their conductors and trainmen.

"The considerations satisfy me," he said, "that the railroad employees are not only better off now, under the private administration of railroads than hey would be likely to be under public administration; but also that under existing conditions, they can hope for a betterment in pay and rules of service which it would be vastly harder to realize from a federal government constituted like ours."
