Temperance Meeting in the Academy
of Music.
The seventh lecture of the course in
the Academy of Music was delivered last
evening by the Rev. G. W. M. Carey. The
house was crowded, the second gallery
being open and well filled, and the best
order was maintained after the lecture
commenced. Mr. S. B. Patterson pre-
sided, and announced that this was the
last lecture that would be delivered here,
as the committee could get no other
clergyman to lecture, and on behalf of
those having the matter in hand, he
thanked those ministers who had come
forward to lecture for them. Mr. Carey
founded his lecture on Acts xv. 28, "do
thyself no harm," the words of Paul ad-
dressed to the gaoler, and considered that
this spoke to all in reference to intem-
perance. Drinking had done harm; see
the number of suicides, and the number
who had found untimely graves through
indulgence in bumpered bad whiskey
and worse gin. The lecturer spoke of
his own experience, and of ministers of
the gospel he had seen fall through the
use of liquor. As a frightful example he
mentioned Ben Christmas, who but a few
days since told him the first glass of liquor
he ever took was in a minister's house
after the fatigue of a lecture. In his own
experience, when first entering the min-
istry, after a Sunday's work, when unable
to sleep he had been urged to take an
opiate or Bourbon whiskey, but had re-
fused, and was happy to say that after
seventeen years labor he could stand
without "the work of the beast or brand
of the devil on his body." Young men,
do yourself no harm, nor any one else, by
indulging in a habit that at first draws
then drags, and afterwards drives, and
the lecturer, and illustrated the danger
with numerous instances he had known.
He then spoke of the traffic and those en-
gaged in it, with its immoral effects, and
said "he would rather sweep a street at
a crossing than sell rum." The
lecturer referred to our "wise heads in
Fredericton," their treatment of bills
sent to them, and disregard of principles
they could learn in the common schools.
He told them it was the province of law
to protect all subjects, and that the liquor
traffic injured instead of protecting. Had
he his way he would not only stop the
importation but strike at the root of the
evil by preventing the manufacture. He
concluded by asking all to come for-
ward, "speak out plainly, not to mince
matters," and instruct our legislators
what was required of them. The lecture
was interesting throughout, and at times
the lecturer was eloquent in his de-
scriptions and appeals. The strictest
attention was paid. The benediction
was pronounced by the lecturer. Pre-
vious to closing the chairman thanked
Directors for their kindness in placing
the beautiful building at the service of
the temperance people for the course.

Disastrous Fire—Shaw's Bakery Barred.
An alarm of fire was sounded this morn-
ing about 7.30 a. m. from box 21, in
Waterloo street. The fire broke out in
J. & W. Shaw's bakery, and before it was
extinguished very little of the building
was left.

THE ORIGIN
of the fire is not yet known, but it is sup-
posed to be from some defect above the
oven. The men were working there be-
fore breakfast, and had not been gone
they think, more than ten minutes when
one of the boys looking out of the win-
dow saw smoke coming from the bakery,
and on entering the place was found to
be in flames. The alarm was given, and
those present commenced to save the
property. Attached to the bakery was a
large shed where flour was stored, and a
good deal of the stock was saved, as well
as considerable from the bakery itself.
Bread was taken out by the barrel un-
baked, loaves just ready for the oven
were saved, and considerable other prop-
erty.

FIGHTING THE FIRE.
The engines were on hand in a short
time, but there was considerable delay in
getting any stream of water on the build-
ing. No engine was on Exmouth street
playing two streams on the back of the
building, and preventing the fire from
catching any of the buildings round. No. 3
was almost in front of the bakery in
Waterloo street, also pouring on two
streams of water. No. 2 was lower down
Waterloo street and playing one stream
on the end and one on the front of the
bakery. When the engines were well at
work, and the water from all their pipes
was thrown on the building, the fire was
soon got under control, but the building
is a total wreck.

OTHER BUILDINGS IN DANGER.
The danger to surrounding buildings
was at one time very great, and the fact
of there being no wind, and the bakery
itself being a low building, can be the
only reason why much more damage was
not done. Mr. Wm. Dunlop's house, ad-
joining, was several times on fire from
the melting tar running from the roof of
the bakery. Mr. Shaw's house, which was
immediately in front of the bakery, at one
time was in very great danger, indeed,
part of the porch was burned, though all
the things in it were removed.

THE LOSS.
Messrs. J. & W. Shaw's loss is about
a total one, there being no insurance
either on the building or stock. They
had four hundred barrels of flour in their
warehouse attached and not over two
dozen barrels were saved.

committee.

Beckwith, a bill to amend the Riviere du
Long By-Charter; the Provincial Secretary
a bill to amend the Act relating to the
issuing of executions in Common Pleas
Judgment; the bill to incorporate the
Workmen's Association of Chatham
was agreed to; and anti Schools Act pe-
titions were presented from Bishop Rogers,
Rev. L. A. Roberts, and Rev. J. C.
McDevitt.
