Intellectual and Social.

2. A comfortably furnished parlor in which are the leading illustrated, scientific, and other papers, and a number of secular and religious magazines.

3. A Lending Library, to which large additions are made each year,

4. A course of interesting and instructive lectures.

5. Occasional literary, musical, and social entertainments.

6. Evening classes in such subjects as French, Book-Keeping, Penmanship, Arithmetic and Algebra, Drawing, Shorthand, &c.

Beligious.

A well conducted Bible Class, and weekly religious meetings.

Services are also held weekly in the Hospital and Gaol, and a cottage meeting has been established at Mount Sherwood.

General.

A register of boarding houses is kept. Assistance is afforded in securing employment. Every attention in the Association's power is shewn to sick young men. The Secretary will be glad to be made aware of cases of young men in sickness. When possible, watchers will be provided.

All are cordially invited to visit the rooms of the Association, and to make full enquiries into its operations. JAI W.

REPORT

For the year ended 31st August, 1882.

.INTRODUCTION.

Evolutionists would have us believe that the several bodily faculties which we possess have been added one by one as the necessity for their existence arose. This is a mode of creation of man that it requires special light-or special darkness, as the case may be-to comprehend, but certain it is that many existing practices and institutions have been evolved in just such a way. Especially is this true of the Young Men's Christian Association. Within the last half-century there has been a rapid growth of the feeling that Christian work should not be left entirely to those in official position in the church, but that an incumbent duty is resting upon every individual Christian to do something to show his love for the Redeemer, and for those who as yet know him not, and also to evidence the sincerity of his faith. Thus the broad, evangelical platform of the Young Men's Christian Association was formed, a platform upon which Christians of every name may stand side by side, to cultivate and exercise their spiritual faculties, and to do organized and effective work with a view to bringing others into the enjoyment of the blessings and privileges which are theirs. Christian life will ever remain at a very low point unless there is spiritual activity ; and the many opportunities afforded for this activity in the associations have served to quicken into greater life many whose spiritual faculties might otherwise never have been developed. The wonderful success of the operations of associations has served to show how really begotten of God the movement is. The seed sown has truly, in many cases, brought forth a hundred fold, and not until the last day will it be known how great a harvest has been gathered in from the sowing of Christian laymen, banded together all over the world, under the name of the Young Men's Christian Association, to give of their time, their strength, and their substance to extend the glorious kingdom of our Lord and Saviour.

During the year just ended the old lines have been fully followed up but no new branches of work have been attempted. Under the peculiar circumstances in which the Association found itself at the beginning of the year, owing to the transfer to the Nashville Association of the late General Secretary, Mr. Raymond Rolph, and the consequent want of such a official from November, 1881, to the end of July, 1882, the carrying on of the work has been attended with great difficulty, and its further extension, for the time being, rendered impossible. Now however, that Mr. F. A. Morrow, of Morrisburg, Ontario, and late Assistant Secretary at Albany, N.Y., has assumed the duties of Assistant Secretary, it is hoped that the Association is about to enter upon the most vigorous and useful experience of its existence.

The most difficult matter with which the Association has had to dea has been the appointment of a General Secretary. Under the circumstances, it was thought that the wisest course was to obtain the counsel of other Associations, and especially of the International Committee at New York. It was through the latter that Mr. Morrow was brought to the notice of the Committee, and, after undergoing a course of special training, that gentleman has undertaken the responsible and onerous duties attacking to the office of General Secretary. Your Committee have acted in this matter with the greatest care and with a view to the Association's best interests, and they trust that the ensuing year will demonstrate the wisdom of their action.

SECULAR WORK.

EVENING TALKS.

On one evening, in place of the lecture, an entertainment chiefly of a stereopticon character was given to the boys, who were present in full force.

EVENING CLASSES.

Classes were maintained in the following subjects :--French (two classes), Book-keeping and Penmanship, Drawing, Arithmetic and Algebra, and Short Hand.

BOOK RECEPTION.

A successful Book Reception was held in the Lecture Room of St. Andrew's Church which was kindly placed at the Association's disposal for the occasion by the Temporal Committee of that Church, who have shown a great readiness to facilitate the operations of the Association. An attractive literary and musical programme was successfully carried out, and refreshments for the inner man were supplied by the ladies of the Church, to whom the Association has reason to feel deeply grateful for the great interest they have always manifested in its work. As a result of the Reception about 200 useful and entertaining books were added to the library.

LIBRARY.

A new and commodious book-case was obtained early in the season and is now well filled. It has been gratifying to find how great has been the number of books given out. A greater variety of interesting reading matter should be obtained as soon as possible, and those having books that they themselves have read are accordingly urged not to shut up those books in a case, but to send them to the Association where the pleasure and profit derived from their perusal by the original readers may be enjoyed by many others. In addition to the books obtained at the Book Reception, a considerable number have been sent in. Mr. J. McMillan, M.A., sent six volumes, and Mr. W. Howe, Sr., twelve volumes. The library has also been enriched by the addition of "The Intellectual Development of the Canadjan People," which was presented with the compliments of the author, Mr. J. D. Geo. Bourinot.

READING ROOM AND PARLOR.

No effort was made to keep a full record of the number attending the various meetings, nor of the number of visitors to the Reading Boom and Parlor during the year. The new Magazines and Illustrated papers, &c., added on the 1st January, have been appreciated, and will no doubt be more so when a greater number become aware of how great a variety of good reading matter is supplied by the Association. A number of the magazines and papers have been sold at half price after remaining a reasonable length of time on file.

ALTERATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

A number of alterations and improvements have been made in the rooms, both at the beginning and at the latter part of the year. To one of the oldest and most faithful of its members the Association is indebted for the room recently partitioned off for the General Secretary. A new Brussells carpet has been obtained for the parlor, and several special subscriptions to this object are gratefully acknowledged.

It is to be regretted that on account of the difficulty experienced in obtaining money, it has been impossible to make the rooms as attractive as could be desired. It is imperatively necessary that the interest of the members and of the general public should be stirred up in regard to this matter, for if the Association is to compete successfully with the powers of evil it must not fail to make its surroundings such that young men will be attracted and held. The rooms must be made homelike and pleasant, and it is therefore hoped that the succeeding Committee will devote much time and attention to the consideration of this question.

RELICIOUS WORK.

YOUNG MEN'S MEETING.

Early in the year it was decided to re¹ open the Sunday night meeting and to intermit the meeting on Saturday night. Owing however chiefly to the fact of the hall being on the third flat, and also to the fact that the meeting was announced for young men specially, instead of for the general public as formerly, the attendance was not encouraging enough to justify its being continued. Saturday night, however, was not considered a good time for a meeting, and at the time of the visit of Messrs. Crombie and Budge, it was decided to try Friday. Meetings have accordingly been held on that night with a varying attendance and considerable profit.

HOSTITAL.

Services are regularly maintained at this Institution on Sunday nights at six, and during a portion of the year on Thursday at the same hour. It is gratifying to know that these meetings are appreciated, and that the seed there sown is not entirely lost. Members of the Association have had many opportunities of speaking privately to patients and of telling them of the Great Healer,

GAOL.

On Sunday mornings at 9:45 services are held at this point in the men's corridor. Work at the gaol is not of a very encouraging character, but it is hard to say what good at some future day may come from the words about the Saviour which seem at the time to fall into deaf ears.

TRACT DISTRIBUTION,

A number of tracts have been distributed at the Hospital and Gaol, and also at the Cottage Meeting on Primrose Hill, formerly maintained under the Association's auspices. A grant of 5000 tracts was recently made to the Association by the Upper Canada Tract Society, at Toronto, for use by any in the City who may wish to obtain supplies for distribution.

WEEK OF PRAYER.

The week of prayer in November for young men and Young Men's Christian Associations was duly observed here. The City Pastors together with the Rev. Canon Johnstone, of Hull, and the Rev. Jcs. Whyte, of Rochesterville, gave addresses. These meetings were of great profit, and were much appreciated by those who attended.

BIBLE CLASS.

The Bible Class has been kept up regularly under the leadership, during the early part of the year, of Mr. Jas. Gibson, and, during the latter part, of the Rev. R. Gavin. The attendance and the interest manifested have been very satisfactory. Early in the summer the then teacher of the class, Mr. Gavin, provided a social entertainment for the class, and also for the non-resident students of the Normal School, Collegiate Institute, and Business College. A bountiful supper was provided, followed by singing and addresses. A most enjoyable and profitable evening was spent.

UNION EVANGELISTIC MEETINGS.

Partly through the instrumentality of this Association the City was favoured with a visit from Mr. Oscar Owers, an agent of the English Evangelistic Society. The Afternoon Bible Readings and the Evening Meetings conducted by Mr. Owers were calculated to quicken the spiritual zeal of Christians, and to arouse the unconverted.

GENERAL WORK, &c., &c.

NON-RESIDENT STUDENTS.

In accordance with the practice of the Association, complimentary tickets were issued to the non-resident students of the Normal School and Collegiate Institute, entitling them to all the privileges of the Association. Advantage was taken of this privilege by many, and the attention thus shown to the welfare of these strangers has been in several cases gratefully acknowledged.

BRIGADE CAMP.

Although the Association work carried on at the Military Camp at Brockville cannot properly be included in this Report, having been begun just after the close of the past year, mention may properly be made of it, and gratification expressed that the Association's previous work in this direction was so much appreciated as to lead Col. Maunsell, Dep. Adjutant General for this District, to ask that similar work should be undertaken at Brockville. Mr. Little of this Association was in charge of the work, which was carried on in conjunction with the Montreal Association, and which was successful in the fullest sense of the term.

CORRESPONDENCE.

^d The correspondence of the Association has been regularly kept up, but no record has been kept of the number of letters received or written.

LETTERS OF INTRODUCTION.

In several cases letters have been given to young men leaving the city, introducing them to the Associations of the places of destination, and thus enabling them to obtain at once direction to boarding houses, and also to secure an interest in their welfare that they might otherwise loose.

BOARDING HOUSE DIRECTORY.

A considerable number have applied for direction to boarding houses, and in the majority of cases have, through the information given them, been able to receive satisfactory accommodation.

EMPLOYMENT AND RELIEF.

The number of applications for employment has not been so great as in previous years. The obtaining of employment for those seeking it is a very difficult part of the work, and one requiring the greatest of care. In many cases the applicants are entirely unworthy of any consideration, and this fact is apt to lead to the neglect of those who may be worthy. In several cases employment has been obtained, and with one exception with good results.

In several cases temporal relief has been given, but anything done in this direction must necessarily be by individual members, as the Association has no fund for the purpose. In one case, largely through the offorts of the Association, one young man was sent to Winnipeg to begin in a new country what it is hoped will be a new life.

The want of a Refuge is very much felt, as the only place to which needy applicants can now be sent is the Police Station. The necessity for such an institution should be publicly agitated.

VISIT OF MESSRS. CROMBIE AND BUDGE.

In the spring of this year we were fayoured with a short visit from the Dominion Travelling Secretary, Mr. W. P. Crombie, and from Mr. D. A. Budge, General Secretary of the Montreal Young Men's Christian Association. A conference of members, held by these gentlemen in the Congregational Church, was fairly attended, and was calculated to greatly benefit the Association. The Sunday Afternoon Temperance Meeting of the W. C. T. U., was addressed by them, and on Sunday night they held an Evangelistic Meeting in Knox Church. An Evangelistic Meeting was also conducted by them in the Baptist Church on Tuesday night. The thanks of the Association are due to the Provincial Committee at Toronto for the visit of Mr. Crombie, and to the Montreal Association for that of Mr. Budge. To these gentlemen personally we are deeply grateful.

OTHER SOCIETIES.

The Association desires to render any assistance in its power to other and kindred societies, and has been very glad to be allowed to co-operate with the W. C. T. U., in carrying on its good work. By request, the Association took part in the entertainment given by that Union to the news-boys in December last, and helped to carry out the programme. The rooms of the Association were also placed at the disposal of the Union for the purpose of organizing a News-boys' Band of Hope. The ladies engaged in this good work of temperance are heartily welcome to any assistance it may be in our power to offer, and to the use of the Committee and Lecture Rooms when not required for Association purposes.

DEPARTURE OF MESSRS. GORDON AND CAMERON.

The Association has suffered a great loss in the removal to Winnipeg of two of its members, the Revs. D. M. Gordon and A. A. Cameron. In each case a public farewell meeting was held, at which expression was given to the Association's regret at their removal, and its wishes that every needed blessing might attend then in their new sphere of labour. Mr. Gordon was a life member, and Mr. Cameron an honorary member, so that we will still have the privilege of having their names associated with our future operations.

MEMBERSHIP.

During the year 46 new members have been added, 12 active and 34 associate. By request and through death and removal 18 names have been dropped from the Roll. At the present time the total membership is 891, 201 active and 190 associate.

FINANCES.

Owing to the illness of the Treasurer and to the want of a General Secretary, as well as to other circumstances, it has been found impossible to canvass all from whom subscriptions have been received in former years, and there has consequently been a very appreciable falling off in the income of the year. The Association, however, still holds its own, and its financial standing in a business sense is good.
