**Why Old Dick Was Not up to Time.**

TO THE ADVOCATE.New York, Jan. 16th, a.m.  
Gold, 121 1/2; B. 80.

London, 15th.  
A strike is in progress among colliers of Dean Forest, and the strikers have become riotous. Messengers have been despatched asking that the military be sent to quell the disturbance.

Madrid, 15th.  
The King will leave the capital probably on Monday for the head quarters of the north.

New York, 15th.  
Jackson and Jarvis, the Oyster Bay men, were executed to-day. Both were composed and cool. The former died from strangulation, but the rope with which Jarvis was suspended broke and fell without injuring him. A fire delay of ten minutes he was drawn up again.

Montreal, 15th.  
It is stated that Mr. Dausan of the *Miner*, will be the Conservative candidate for Chambly county, in the coming local elections.

Ottawa, 15th.  
It is understood that Mr. Fleming's Staff of engineers and draughtsmen are busy engaged in preparing plans and estimates for the early calling of tenders for the construction of the Pembina Railroad, branch of the Red River and Thunder Bay Railway.

Quebec, 15th.  
Weather very bright and cold. Thermometer at 8 a.m. 20 below zero. During the past 30 hours the thermometer has ranged between 16 and 22 below zero.

London, 15th, 5.30 a.m.  
An official bulletin announces that Prince Leopold, who was recovering from fever, has had an attack of hemorrhage, which has greatly weakened him.

Mr. Gladstone has written an article on speeches of Pope Pius the Ninth, which appears in the *Quarterly Review*. He sketches the history of the Pope's reign, and points out the increased subservience of the Roman Catholic clergy, and concludes that the mass of the British nation will now repudiate the pretensions of the Papacy more eagerly and resolutely than former generations.

Bayonne, 15th.  
A report that the German corvette "Nautilus" landed a party at Yarus, is pronounced false. The *Carlist* declare they would vigorously resist any such attempt. They persistently deny that the "Lustave" was fired on, and assert that her crew thanked the *Carlist* officers for assistance rendered.

Quebec, 15th.  
The Tanneries Committee met on Saturday, and sat all day. A number of witnesses were examined with reference to the relative value of the Tanneries property and the Leduc farm. Nothing of any importance was elicited. In the afternoon Patrick Dunn, of Cote St. Paul, valued the Tanneries property at \$1500 per acre, a price he would not be willing to give, and the Leduc farm at \$900 to \$1000.

London, 15th.  
To-day's *Times* in its leading editorial says—"In the gloom surrounding, one thing is perceptible, all men are arming. Germany is arming *en masse*, and the surrounding nations, including the best part of the world, cannot do otherwise. Moneyed dreams of peace have fled away. Germany recognizes the necessity of what she won by her arms she can only hold by arms, and while arms are in her hands, the *Times* confesses that Germany cannot raise a third army, her hopes are in her navy.

Santander, 15th.  
The Spanish squadron has arrived at Saragosa, and is making preparations for vigorous action. Its commanders have been instructed to exact from the *Carlists* indemnities for the owners and crew of the *Guatara*, and the punishment of her assassins. Germany is entirely satisfied with the steps taken by Spain to procure reparation for the outrage.

Seventy-one elections for the Provincial Legislature took place in Ontario yesterday.

Matters in Caranquah, Jan. 19th.  
A very disturbed state, and many are in apprehension of further trouble.

In Petite Rocher the separate school party took charge of the meeting on Thursday, and refused to entertain motion for assessment. The school house door was broken open the evening before in case it would be locked against those who had not paid their rates. A great deal of bad feeling prevails in this district and many conflicting rumors are afloat.

Gaspé, Jan. 19th.  
Gaspé Election case came before his Honor Judge McCord, for final decision, at Force this forenoon. Election was declared null and void through disqualification of respondent Harper, and corrupt practices on the part of appellant LeBouillier, both parties paying their own costs.

The Division of money for School Houses in thirty settled districts will probably be as follows: Albert County \$1170; Carleton County, (part) \$1100; Charlotte County, \$2,200; Gloucester County, \$465; Kent County, \$1740; King's County, \$3110; Northumberland County, \$2,400; Queen's County, \$1,500; Re-ligouche County, \$570; St. John County, \$1,500; Victoria County, (part) \$200; Westmorland County, \$3,030; York County, \$2,300; Sanitary County, \$1,225.

Novia Scotia and New Brunswick jointly appoint Emigration officers in London. The former to have the office during the first two years, the latter remaining three years.—*News*.

WHEREAS, by Order in Council of the 7th day of June, 1871, it is directed that sworn declarations and machinists certificates be in all cases required preliminary to the admission free of duty, of machinery not manufactured in the Dominion for use in Canadian manufactures, and whereas by the Act 37 Vic. chap. 6, the same machinery is made subject to an ad valorem duty of ten per cent. to take effect on the first day of January next, and whereas it is desirable to simplify the practice of the Customs in such cases,—due regard being had to the interests of the revenue.

His Excellency the Governor General in Council on the recommendation of the Hon. Minister of Customs and under the provisions of the 125th section of the Act 31 Vic. chap. 6, has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the first day of January next, the said Order in Council be and the same is hereby re-ordered, and that collectors of Customs be, and they are hereby authorized and instructed to accept entry of such machinery on and after that date at ten per cent. duty ad valorem, requiring the following affidavit, to be filed in each case and a copy thereof to be attached to the entry.
