Local shippers have agreed to rack and bag, free of charge, all potatoes brought in and also to take them off the committee's hands at more than the market price. The money will then be forwarded to the fund to be expended for clothing and non-perishable goods.

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POLITICAL NEWS

The St. John Globe has an established record for accuracy in its political forecasts, and at this time it seems to know the real gist of the Royal Commission report on the Dugal charges, even though Acting Premier Clark and his friends deny the knowledge of it. From an editorial published in the Globe of Monday we quote: "While there has been unexpected secrecy about the report it is generally admitted that the findings of the commissioners with reference to the Valley Railway construction work are so direct that it will be impossible for the Lieutenant Governor to longer recognize the present head of the government. In view of the early publication of the report, there is much speculation as to the future of the man most directly interested, the Premier of New Brunswick. It is quite within the bounds of possibility that the Lieutenant Governor, when he submits the Dugal commission report to the government, will also make public some statement from Premier Flemming which will disclose his intentions. An interesting political rumor mentions Hon. J. K. Flemming's name as a possible successor to the late Mr. A. Bowdler, as New Brunswick Agent in England. There is no question about the ability of Hon. Mr. Flemming to fill such a position, but the wisdom of any such appointment will best be discussed after the finding of the commission on the recent charges is made known."

Losses are reported almost daily and it is carried to such a point that it looks as though some people residing not far from the village were going to be pinched before very long. LUMBER CUT WILL BE BIG

To those who anticipated a business depression in consequence of the war the news will come as a pleasant surprise that the lumber industry, New Brunswick's basic source of wealth, will probably be as prosperous as in past seasons. At the outbreak of war lumber merchants planned a curtailment of their operations and indications were that the season would be a slack one. With the closing of the Baltic ports, however, and the difficulty of obtaining lumber from the usual European sources local merchants have found that the market is as good if not better than ever. Large crews of men will be sent into the woods all over the province this fall, and the cut this year will be well up to the average, if not greater. As the lumber industry is one of the utmost importance in New Brunswick, news that it will not be curtailed this year indicates that the coming winter will be a prosperous one. Besides the employment arising from the cutting and preparation of the lumber, the work of shipping it forms an important part of the business of St. John.—St. John Globe.

German Wireless Operators on Mars Hill?

During the past few days rumours have been circulating in effect that it is believed the German sympathizers in the United States have established a wireless telegraph station on Mars Hill for the purpose of giving information to ships at sea. This story may not be true—it probably is not—but the following despatch from Washington is interesting: Washington authorities have decided to begin a search for secret wireless apparatus alleged to be in use by Germans on American territory.

There is no evidence under the attention of the government here that any of the belligerents have violated American neutrality, but in letters to the British embassy and vague published statements, Germany has been charged with having a wireless station in the Maine woods, through which communication was conducted with German ships.




