TRUE BILL

Against Dr Preston on charge
Of Manslaughter

CAMP DISCHARGED

And will be a Witness
Against Preston.
Trial Today

(St John Globe, 3rd)

At four o'clock on Tuesday afternoon the Grand Jury, through Charles D Jones, foreman, reported no bill against Howard D. Camp, held on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Miss Clark.

About half a dozen members of the Grand Jury were absent Tuesday, and his honor the chief justice commented on this, stating he had found that a grand jurymen could get a doctor's certificate or some reasonable excuse for not attending. It was his present intention to fine the absentees unless they could furnish a valid reason for absenting themselves.

This forenoon the Grand Jury returned a true bill in the case of the King vs. Dr Edward A. Preston, on the charge of manslaughter. The prisoner was arraigned and asked if he was willing to be tried Thursday (to-morrow). After consultation with his counsel, Mr. C. N. Skinner, he said "Yes." The court set eleven o'clock as the hour when the trial will begin. Dr Preston did not look well, and was said to be quite ill with a cold.

Howard Camp was discharged and his bail released. The chief justice announced that Camp would be subpoenaed as a witness against Dr Preston.

LIQUOT ACT ENQUIRY

One Witness said an Inspector or was Often Drunk, but not a Confirmed toper

Bathurst, N. B., Dec 29. —The investigation into the working of the license act went on all day yesterday before Hon Mr Commissioner Jones, and some twenty witnesses gave testimony. It was made clear that wholesale places had been run as retail saloons, and there appeared to be some evidence that this was with the knowledge of the members of the license commission or of the inspector.

Mr Mott and Mr Harrington, for the defence, examined the various witnesses very closely, and brought out from most of them that the members of the board of commissioners and the inspector bore good characters and were held in good reputation.

During the investigation one woman witness testified that her son was a drunkard, and that he was supplied with liquor, but whence she could not tell. Yesterday afternoon it was brought out in the examination of Percy Wilbur, who formerly kept a hotel here, that he had been warned by the inspector not to sell to the young man in question.

Most of the witnesses gave it as their opinion that the inspector was not a confirmed drunkard, as is alleged in one of the charges, and some of them said "he took his drink like the rest of us."

The most important witness for the complainants was Samuel E. Bishop, who is secretary of the temperance organization here. He said that the chairman of the license board told him that he would not proceed on an information unless a deposit of \$20 was made, to be returned if a conviction resulted, and forfeited if three was a dismissal. He told of an interview at his father's house between the chairman, the inspector and Rev J H Hooper and himself, and said that the inspector was under the influence of liquor. The interview was unsatisfactory, he said. He said the inspector was under the influence "most of the times he had seen him, but on cross-examination, said he had only seen him in all four times, once he was sober and the other times he could not walk. He admitted that convictions had resulted from information laid against sellers by the inspector, while in some cases where he was informant, there had been dismissals.

One witness was asked how the general enforcement of the act appeared compared to that in other places where he had resided, and he answered that he thought matters were about as well here as elsewhere.

An amusing feature of the inquiry was that it was conclusively proved that playing cards for geese or other poultry was a custom particularly in vogue in Gloucester county, and more especially about Bathurst. There has been very little evidence, if any, of playing cards for money in barrooms so far. — Transcript.

CREDITORS' MEETING

Permanent Liquidators of J. W. Dumas Co., Gloucester County Appointed.

In the matter of the winding up of the J W Dumas Company, of Gloucester county, there was a meeting of creditors yesterday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. The report of the provisional liquidator, W H Harrison, was read and His Honor Chief Justice Tuck appointed Mr Harrison and Thomas Bell permanent liquidators. They will give bonds of \$2,000 each and supply two sureties on Saturday, the 6th inst. There will be a thorough investigation into the affairs of the Company and to that end J W Dumas, president of the company, will be examined.

The Provisional liquidator's report showed that he had visited Grand Anse and Shippegan and taken possession of the company's books, papers, etc., and brought them to St John, where he deposited them in a vault. He also got \$140 in cash, which he deposited in the Bank of British North America. Stock taking is now going on and the Shippegan effects are estimated as worth less than \$4,000 and those at Grand Anse are about \$9,000. The entire book debts amount to about \$2,000 making assets of \$15,000. — Telegraph, 3rd.

TARIFF ENQUIRY

Evidence given at Newcastle Yesterday

BY SEVERAL WITNESSES

The Commission goes to
Fredericton this
Morning

NEWCASTLE, N. B. Jan 3.—The Tariff Commission arrived here on the Maritime Express at 8 o'clock this morning in a private car. The members are Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance; Hon. Wm. Patterson, minister of customs; Hon. L. P. Brodeur, minister of inland revenue, and John Bain, secretary.

A session was held at the town hall at 11.30 o'clock this morning and a fairly large number was present to meet the commissioners. Among those present were Hon J P Burchill and W S Loggie, M. P. of Chatham.

Those giving evidence at this morning's session were O G Anderson, of Woodstock, Ontario, who is starting a furniture factory here, D Morrison, general merchant, J. D Creighton, dry-goods merchant, and P Hennessy, general dealer, all of this town.

Mr Anderson asked for the removal of duty on some raw materials used in the manufacture of furniture. Mr Morrison protested against the over-valuation of Canadian canned fish by the American custom officials. Mr. Creighton wanted an even duty on woolen goods and Mr Hennessy, who is president of the town board of trade, asked that the duty on refined sugar be lowered. John Betts, fish exporter, of this town, and W S Loggie spoke on fish referring to the over-valuation of smelts by the Americans.

Adjournment was made at one o'clock. They will leave for Fredericton on the maritime express tomorrow morning.

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I. C. R. DEATH RECORD

29 Parsons Killed on Road
During the past
Year

The fatalities on the Intercolonial during the year just closed numbered twenty-nine as follows:
Jan. 5—William Hachey, section man at Bathurst, struck by locomotive in Newcastle yard, skull crushed; left widow and five children.

Jan. 16—Amos Lirette, laborer in I. C. R. shops, Moncton, killed by shunting engine while walking on the track to work.

Jan. 25—Deaf mail carrier run down on track at Dalhousie and fatally injured.

Jan. 29—Edward Melanson, snow shoveller, run down by a train in Moncton and fatally injured.

Feb. 4—John Neeley, ex-soldier killed on track near London-derry (N. S.) Was engaged peddling through the country and is supposed to have been walking on the track when struck.

Feb. 11—James Black, instantly killed by falling off snow train at Campbellton. Left wife and three children.

Gordon Somers, fireman, killed at Tracadie (N. B.) by snow plow and engine going off the track.

March 12—Brakeman Percy Ferguson, Harcourt, killed while shunting cars at Chatham Junction.

March 14—John Murphy, snow shoveller, aged 19, ground to pieces while attempting to board a locomotive in the yard at Richmond, Halifax.

March 19—Brakeman Sydney McEachern killed in Richmond yard. Thrown off car by sudden jolt while shunting.

April 4—Phileas Belliveau, a workman in the Rhodes Curry factory, jammed to death while attempting to pass between cars that were being shunted in Amherst yard.

April 12—Chester Boomer, caught between cars while shunting at Hilden. Badly crushed in back and died within a few hours.

April 23—John Pyne, sailor, was found on I. C. R. track near Dorchester. Had been drinking and is supposed to have fallen asleep on the track and run over.

April 26—Two-year-old child of Emile Ray, while lying on the track at Hadlow (Que.), run over by shunting engine and crushed to death.

May 26—Fred Blanchet, mendicant, 80 years of age and deaf, run over and killed by train at St. Louise (Que.)

May 31—Fred Hicks, brakeman, while attempting to get on a moving freight car which was being shunted in Moncton yard, slipped and fell under the wheels; right shoulder and thigh crushed and internal injuries, from the effects of which he died.

June 16—James Smith, killed while attempting to drive across the track in front of approaching locomotive at Hopewell (N. S.)

May 31—Edward Cavery, colored man, found lying dead alongside the track near Halifax. Skull fractured and neck dislocated; probably struck by passing train.

July 28—Daniel Cameron, yardmaster, killed at Point Tupper while shunting cars.

August 6—Man named Austin, about 50 years of age, found dead on track at Hadlow; body badly mangled; supposed to have been struck by passing train.

Aug. 7—Leo Harriman, I. C. R. fireman on working train, struck by Maritime express while lying alongside the track at Gloucester Junction. Had fallen asleep, it is supposed, while waiting on siding for express to pass. Was 24 years of age, unmarried.

Aug. 22—Joseph Stamour, laborer, belonging to Montreal, fell off front end of baggage car while stealing a ride and was fatally injured. He had been working on the railway at Shelburne (N. S.) but was dissatisfied with his pay and was beating his way back home.

Sept. 30—Corey and Stanley Floyd, brothers, aged 20 and 17, killed by being struck by express

train while crossing the track in farm wagon at Bloomfield station. Corey was killed instantly and his brother lived a few hours.

Oct. 22—Martin Foley, policeman of Chatham, while riding on trolley was struck by Maritime express near Barnaby River and literally cut to pieces.

Oct. 26—Walter Sharpe, employed on a working train near Halifax, slipped and fell under car when leaving for his home and instantly killed.

Nov. 7—Patrick Houlihan, trackman, struck by train on Windsor Branch and killed.

Dec. 9—Jas Taylor, carpenter, crushed to death while doing some work under car at Truro station. Danger signal was not up and shunter struck car, starting it suddenly, catching Taylor under the wheels, cutting his body in two. He left a widow and six children.

Dec. 14—David S. Melanson, car inspector, was run over by locomotive in Moncton yard. He had both legs cut off and other injuries, resulting fatally. Was aged 29 years, leaving a wife and five children.

I. C. R. ACCIDENT

Locomotive, Plough and flat
Cars left Rails at
Penniac

An open switch caused a rather serious accident on the Canada Eastern branch of the I. C. R. on Thursday at Penniac.

A snow plough special left Gibson at 7.30 a. m. for Loggieville in charge of Conductor Long. The train was made up of a locomotive, in charge of Engineer John Cameron, snowplough, two flat cars and a van.

Everything went along all right until they ran into an open switch at Penniac, about five miles above Marysville. The engine, plough and all the cars of the train, except the van, left the rails.

Luckily nobody was hurt and the damage to the rolling stock was also light.

An auxiliary train in charge of Conductor Sterling was sent out and the track was cleared by the time the express came along at about 12.30 o'clock.

Yesterday afternoon Superintendent Evan Price came here from Campbellton and last evening an investigation into the above accident was conducted. The result of the investigation could not be learned today, but it is stated that one of the conductors has been laid off for a few days, it being alleged that he was in charge of the train crew which left the switch open.—Gleaner, Dec. 30th.

writing that he was born in the

town of Dalhousie, which is in

this province. So it is recorded

in the Parliamentary Companion,

Parliamentary Guides and other

books of reference. One would

suppose that Mr. Labillois would

know where he was born. More-

over it would appear that his

father was born in this province,

as his grandfather was a resident

of Tracadie. It seems that Mr.

Labillois is descended from one of

Napoleon's officers, but his an-

cestors have resided in this pro-

vince for nearly a century. It is

a peculiar feature of the argu-

ment against Mr. Labillois that it

is supposed to have been present-

ed by Mr. Turgeon, M. P. for

Gloucester, who was born, brought

up and educated in Quebec, and

does not appear to be quite so

much of an Acadian as Mr. La-

billois. We have this further

anomaly that Mr. Labillois claims

to be the representative of the

Acadians in the provincial cabinet,

while his political supporters, if

we may so describe Mr. Turgeon

and Mr. LeBlanc, are repudiating

his Acadian origin. It would

appear to be time to refer the fine

question of race to a competent

commission. -Sun.

Rothschild will send 200 Families to Canada

LONDON, Dec. 29.—Lord Rothschild has offered to send two hundred families of St. John's parish, Tottenham Court, London to Canada entirely at his own expense. Lord Rothschild's interest has been aroused by a newspaper article describing their poverty. He consulted the vicar, Rev. Mr. Davidst and at once gave him a check for \$500. He examined into the question further and decided that emigration to Canada was the best means of relief.

He makes no stipulation as to conditions, and it is of no benefit to his own race, as it is said there are not half dozen Jewish families in the parish. Visar Davidst has assisted others to come to Canada and they are doing well. Plans are being organized at once, and it is hoped that the first immigrants, which number a thousand in all, will start at once. This is hailed as glorious news in overcrowded districts.

In his pastoral mandement which inaugurates a crusade against intemperance Mgr. Bruchesi of Montreal says that without establishing a comparison between the Province of Quebec and the other provinces of Canada, or between the Dominion and the other states of America and Europe, it is an undeniable fact that we are suffering from the evil of alcoholism. His grace believes that temperance would abolish pauperism, stoppage of work would be unknown and strikes would hardly exist.

"A lively picture some would say," heads, "but no, let the drinking close and all these will be realities. Our watchword will be to found temperance societies in all localities, without exception. These local societies will form together a holy league endowed with precious indulgences. The cross, the old, black bare wooden cross, still to be seen in the old families, will be the new rallying sign."

His grace recommends limitation in the number of hotels, restaurants, saloons and all retail liquor shops and both high taxes and licenses taxes with a very strict enforcement.

"We have decided, his grace says, 1st.—The clergy shall be the first to set an example of the temperance they must preach.

2nd.—We request all families to do the same thing and entirely give up the deplorable habit of offering and of taking spirituous liquors, such as brandy, gin, rum, whiskeys, on the occasion of gatherings, soirees, dinners, visits and especially on New Year's Day. Let all kinds of alcohol disappear from our homes.

3rd.—We employ young men and fathers of families not to enter saloons except for serious reasons.

4th.—We request priests, principals of colleges and teachers in general to frequently refer to intemperance in the class room.

5th.—We order that all the parishes, commence at once to establish temperance leagues and societies for children, young men and heads of families. Saint John the Baptist shall be the patron of these leagues and the members shall pledge themselves not to use spirituous liquors except in cases of sickness and of real need.

6th.—We particularly entrust the preaching of temperance to the Rev. Franciscan Kalken, whom we hereby appoint apostle of this great work in our diocese.

7th.—It is also our wish that those temperance societies be founded in our colleges and the universities.
