**But Decide to Take No Active Part in Election—Up to Citizens.**

At a meeting of the Fire Brigade held in the Rooms on August 6th, it was unanimously decided that the Fire Brigade do no canvassing at the election to be held in connection with a new Fire Station, for if the people of this town do not appreciate the work of our firemen who get out of their beds in the cold winter to go to fires, and ruin clothes, etc., enough to make it their business to go and vote at the next election in connection with this matter, that we resign in a body and let those who are opposed to some place for us to store our hose, keep our horses, and a place to meet and practice etc., form a new Fire Brigade and in the meantime pay about ten times the Fire Insurance they do at present. Rate Payers, stop and think, the first last year cost the town \$123 for fifteen men for each fire last year and we can safely say that it cost thirty men twice that for spoiled clothes and lost time, for your protection.

## PTE. CLEVELAND KILLED ON I.N.R.

**Railway Motor Trolley Collided With Freight Train On International.**

A very sad accident occurred on the International railway Saturday when a returned hero, Pte. Albert Cleveland, son of Mr. A. B. Cleveland of Robinsonville was so severely injured that he died in a few minutes.

The unfortunate soldier, who was overseas for a number of years, being wounded and only returned last February, with two other men were running down the line on a motor car, and were struck before he could get clear, and was thrown against the side of the cutting, striking his head, and dying in a few minutes.

The funeral was held Monday and was very largely attended, interment being in the Presbyterian cemetery, Matapedia.

The family have the sympathy of all in their sudden bereavement.

## SEPTEMBER CLEMENTS DIED SUDDENLY

**Injured At Grand Anse While Swimming and Never Recovered.**

Word was received here Wednesday that Sergeant Jack Clements, champion heavyweight boxer of the Canadian overseas military forces, who recently arrived at the New Brunswick military hospital here with a convulsion of patients from overseas, was brought here at noon from his home at Campbellton (N. B.) a helpless paralytic as the result of a bathing accident and died early tonight. While swimming near Grand Anse, where he had been spending a few days leave with his mother, he dove into shallow water, striking on his head and almost complete paralysis of his whole body followed.

For a time it was thought that his wonderful physique and recuperative powers might be the means of pulling him through but his condition gradually became worse and he died early in the evening. His remains will be sent to Campbellton tomorrow. The G. W. V. A. band will head the funeral procession to the station at Fredericton, and full military honors will be done to the deceased soldier.

Sergeant Clements won the championship of the Canadian forces in a tournament at Whitley Camp, England, and was afterwards injured while boxing with Goddard, then the English champion, in preparation for the bout in which Joe Beckett won the championship of Great Britain.

Many friends here will regret of Sgt. Clements' early death, and the sympathy of all goes out to his bereaved wife and five children. He was one of a family of five brothers, all of whom entered the service of the King.

The body arrived here this morning and was buried with military honors in the R. C. Cemetery.

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## TRANSFER OF THE INTERNATIONAL RY.

**Road from St. Leonard's to Campbellton Taken Over by Federal Authorities.**

An event of more than ordinary importance from a financial standpoint to the province of New Brunswick took place Thursday, when at the office of the Royal Trust Company, Montreal, conveyance was made to the crown, in right of the Dominion Government, of the International railway, extending across the province from St. Leonard's to Campbellton.

Bonds of the railway company to the amount of \$896,000 guaranteed by the province as to principal and interest were cancelled and the province was thereby wholly relieved from liability.

William G. Pugsley, K. C. of Ottawa, represented the International Railway Company, while H. A. Carr, K. C. of Campbellton, represented the Dominion Government.

Workmen's Compensation Act, 1918 NOTICE TO EMPLOYERS OF LABOR

WHEREAS on the 17th day of April, A. D. 1919, His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Council did by Order-in-Council bring, within the scope of Part I of the WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT 1918, from and after August 1st, 1919, the following industries, viz:

'Persons employed in the woods in logging, cutting of timber, pulpwood, firewood, railroad ties or sleepers, river driving, rafting, booming or transportation of logs, timber, pulpwood, firewood or railroad ties or sleepers.'

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that all persons engaged in any of the above mentioned industries are required to file a statement of their estimated payroll from August 1st, 1919, to December 31st, 1919, inclusive, with the said Board, on or before the 1st day of August, 1919.

AND FURTHER NOTICE that any employer neglecting or refusing to furnish estimate or information is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part II of said Act, in respect of injury to any workman in his employ during the period of such default.

NOTE.—Forms for furnishing such information will be supplied on application.

Also please take note of the following regulation passed by the Board, and coming into force on the 1st of August: FIRST AID KIT.

In an industry where ten or more persons are employed, it shall be the duty of the employer to provide a suitable FIRST AID KIT approved by the Board and in charge of a suitable person.

FOCH PAYS TRIBUTE TO EMPIRE'S ARMIES

Their Dash and Bravery Unsurpassable, He Said—High Praise for Field Marshal Haig.

London, July 30.—(Reuter's)—At the award of honor yesterday they consecrate without reserve their moral and material resources and all to the magnificent qualities of the British and Dominion armies in the early great counter-attacks after August 1918, and sorely that their dash and bravery were unsurpassable. They never stopped smashing the German war machine and would have gone through to the Meuse or the Rhine (cheers).

Who Could Doubt. After describing how France, bleeding sorely and tired, struggled with similar energy. "After that who could doubt the outcome of the war? Once again the justice of history was given its own unquestionable judgment, namely that nations are clear-

COLONIES PART IN THE WORLD WAR

Lieut.-Colonel Amery Emphasizes Immensity of War Time Patriotic Efforts.

LONDON, July 31.—(Reuter's)—Lieut.-Colonel L. E. G. Amery, Under-Secretary for the Colonies, speaking on the Colonial Office, estimates in the House of Commons yesterday, emphasized the immensity of the war-time patriotic efforts of fellow subjects overseas. It might be gauged by noting the sum total of military efforts in the field before armistice day, either measured by the number of lives sacrificed, the numbers of men killed or captured, or the total number of hours spent in the trenches, both Canada and Australia individually contributed greater military effort than the United States with a population of over one hundred million people. Moreover, the efforts of the Crown Colonies were far greater than is usually realized. In every part of the Empire the whites contributed as high a quota as any community in the world. Over two-thirds of the males of East Africa and Rhodesia also took the field.

Best in the World.

All the Colonies substantially contributed to the cost of the war from revenue, declared Colonel Amery, incurring liability larger than the prudence allowed. Therefore, he hoped this would be remembered when reconstructing the world in the Colonies was being considered.

Colonel Amery declared that British Colonial Administration was the best in the world before the war, and stated that in future it was going to be greatly improved, especially as regards large territories assigned to Great Britain as mandatory.

There was a prima facie case for a great programme of railway construction. Colonel Amery was of the opinion that every sovereign spent in developing the Colonies would bring manifold return in a very short time. In concluding, Colonel Amery drew attention to the remarkable development in relations with the Dominions. A fact which most impressed the outside world was that at the Peace Conference the full equality of the Dominions with the Motherland as nations had been recognized, not only by Great Britain, but also by other governments. He was convinced this new departure would go to the greatest lengths in effectively cementing forever more imperial unity.

### PTE. DICKSON GETS THREE YEARS

Sentenced Recently for Participation in the Rhyll Riots.

In a letter from Pte. Allan A. Dixon, who was recently found guilty of participating in the Rhyll riots, he says that he has been sentenced to three years in prison.

Upon the word of Hon. Mr. Kemp he was assured that if sentenced he would not be sent to a prison, but would be kept in a detention barracks and later would be transferred to Canada.

Notwithstanding this Pte. Dixon is now confined with criminals in Walton penitentiary.

A Bathurst man who picked up a red flag, was sentenced to ten years for this act.

Some strong effort should be made to have these Canadians brought back to Canada and pardoned.

### SPECULATION AS TO CHOICE OF LEADER.

Ottawa, Aug. 6.—A couple of hundred additional delegates arrived this morning to attend the Liberal convention, and more are expected in time to participate in the vote for the leadership which will take place on Thursday.

There is still much speculation as to who is likely to be the successful candidate, but this morning there appears to be a swing in the direction of Hon. W. S. Fielding. This is largely due to a report that Hon. W. S. Martin, the Saskatchewan premier, will definitely decline to allow his name to go before the convention.

**PROFITEERS MAY HAVE TO DISGORG**

Action is Being Considered by the British Government.



Amsterdam, Aug. 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—The International Trades Union Congress, resuming its session Thursday discussed plans for the new international, the constitution of a bureau, the appointment of officers and the question of proportional representation of the different countries appear likely to arouse a lively debate, an endeavor to take the control out of the hands of Germany, which hitherto dominated the international, being in the making. The draft of the new rules contains a provision giving one vote for every quarter million workers represented, as against one for each million, as heretofore. The same nations would have a representative for any fraction of a quarter million workers.

Sanchez, president of the American Federation of Labor in his address claimed to represent the Pan-American Federation of twenty-one republics. He declared he felt constrained to say that it was inadvisable, owing to the events of recent years to group Spain with the Spanish speaking South American states, as Danish delegates had proposed.
