Workmen's Compensation Act, 1918 NOTICE TO EMPLOYERS OF LABOR

WHEREAS on the 17th day of April, A. D. 1919, His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Council did by Order-in-Council bring, within the scope of Part I of the 'WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT 1918', from and after August 1st, 1919, the following industries, viz:

'Persons employed in the woods in logging, cutting of timber, pulpwood, firewood, railroad ties or sleepers, river driving, rafting, booming or transportation of logs, timber, pulpwood, firewood or railroad ties or sleepers.'

NOTE IS HEREBY GIVEN that all persons engaged in any of the above mentioned industries are required to file a statement of their estimated payroll from August 1st, 1919, to December 31st, 1919, inclusive, with the said Board, on or before the 1st day of August, 1919.

AND FURTHER NOTICE that any employer neglecting or refusing to furnish estimate or information is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part II of said Act, in respect of injury to any workman in his employ during the period of such default.

NOTE.—Forms for furnishing such information will be supplied on application.

Also please take note of the following regulation passed by the Board, and coming into force on the 1st of August:

FIRST AID KIT.

In an industry where ten or more persons are employed, it shall be the duty of the employer to provide a suitable FIRST AID KIT approved of by the Board and in charge of a suitable person.

FOCH PAYS TRIBUTE TO EMPIRE'S ARMIES

Their Dash and Bravery Unsurpassable, He Said—High Praise for Field Marshal Haig.

London, July 30.—(Reuter's)—At a banquet given in honor of the Field Marshal Haig, the British Commander-in-Chief, the Field Marshal Haig paid eloquent tribute to the moral and material resources and to the magnificent qualities of the British and Dominion armies in the early days of the war, he said.

Referring to Field Marshal Haig, the Field Marshal Haig said: "He spared more than any other the lives of his men. What interviews he had during those three to the Meuse or the Rhine last six months, he from the north and I from the south, despite great distances and fatigue sought each other like two big brothers in order to live in closest intimacy and ensure by absolute community of ideas the more and more rapid march of our armies. He had to do so to force events. On November 9th, I sent Field Marshal Haig the following telegram feeling certain I should be followed by him and his armies:

"The disorganized enemy, owing to repeated attacks, is giving way along the whole front. It is essential to maintain and accelerate our operations. I call upon the energy and initiative of the commander-in-chief and their armies in order to secure and render decisive the results obtained."

Field Marshal Haig concluded: "Let us salute the glorious dead who sleep in France. Faithfully, piously and zealously we shall guard them and keep to their memory alive, because to us they are a testimony and a pledge."

COLONIES PART IN THE WORLD WAR LARGE RESERVE WILL BE NEEDED

Lieut.-Colonel Amery Emphasizes Immensity of War Time Patriotic Efforts.

LONDON, July 31.—(Reuter's)—Lieut.-Colonel L. E. G. Amery, Under-Secretary for the Colonies, speaking on the Colonies Office estimates in the House of Commons yesterday, emphasized the immensity of the war time patriotic efforts of fellow subjects overseas. It might be gauged by noting the sum total of military efforts in the field before armistice day, either measuring by the number of lives sacrificed, the number of the enemy killed or captured, or the total number of hours spent in the trenches, both Canada and Australia individually contributed greater military effort than the United States with a population of over one hundred million people. Moreover, the efforts of the Crown Colonies were far greater than usually realized. In every part of the Empire the whites contributed as high a quota as any community in the world. Over two-thirds of the males of East Africa and Rhodesia also took the field.

Best in the World.

All the Colonies substantially contributed to the cost of the war from revenue, declared Lieut.-Colonel Amery, incurring liability larger than the production allowed. Therefore, he hoped this would be remembered when reconstructing and reconstructing in the Colonies was being considered.

Colonel Amery declared that British Colonial Administration was the best in the world before the war, and stated that in future it was going to be greatly improved, especially as regards large territories assigned to Great Britain as mandatory.

There was a prima facie case for a great programme of railway construction, Lieut.-Colonel Amery was of the opinion that every sovereign spent in developing the Colonies would bring manifold return in a very short time.

In concluding, Lieut.-Colonel Amery drew attention to the remarkable development in relations with the Dominions. A fact which most impressed the outside world was that at the Peace Conference the full equality of the Dominions with the Motherland as nations had been recognized, not only by Great Britain, but also by other governments. He was convinced this new departure would go to the greatest lengths in effectively cementing forever more imperial unity.

There has been a proposition offered by the members of the Episcopal Church of the Holy Trinity of Paris that their church be made the permanent official memorial for all Americans who have participated in the European war.

Sentenced Recently for Participation in the Rhyll Riots.

In a letter from Pte. Allan A. Dixon, who was recently found guilty of participating in the Rhyll riots, he says that he has been sentenced to three years in prison.

Upon the word of Hon. Mr. Kemp he was assured that if sentenced he would not be sent to a prison, but would be kept in a detention barracks and later would be transferred to Canada.

Notwithstanding this Pte. Dickson is now confined with criminals in Walton penitentiary.

A Bathurst man who picked up a red flag, was sentenced to ten years for this act.

SPECULATION AS TO CHOICE OF LEADER.

Ottawa, Aug. 6.—A couple of hundred additional delegates arrived this morning to attend the Liberal convention, and more are expected in time to participate in the vote for the leadership which will take place on Thursday.

There is still much speculation as to who is likely to be the successful candidate, but this morning there appears to be a swing in the direction of Hon. W. S. Fielding. This is largely due to a report that Hon. W. S. Martin, the Saskatchewan premier, will definitely decline to allow his name to go before the convention.

Miss Lusia Watt has accepted a position as teacher at Shawbridge. Mr. and Mrs. Sharp and nephew Jackie of Montreal, who have been the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Mayo for the past month, have returned to their home.

LONDON POLICE OUT ON STRIKE.

London, July 31.—The Daily Herald, a Labor organ, in a late edition says that something like 65,000 policemen and prison officials throughout the country have gone on strike. The newspaper declares that the London men struck with drastic suddenness and startling unanimity, implying that the whole force responded to the call. This is contrary to all other newspaper reports which concur, whatever the source holds, that the call was generally ignored and up to the present the strike has been a failure.

General Sir Neville Macready, chief commissioner of police, is quoted as saying at midnight that less than 250 men had struck and that these will be dismissed and never reinstated.

Marston, chairman of the policemen's union, was among these men. Scotland Yard authorities informed the Associated Press that up to eight o'clock this morning only 536 of the entire metropolitan force had failed to report for duty, and only one member of the city police.

No reports have yet been received as to the effect of the strike on the provincial cities, but the belief is confidently expressed in official circles that the strike will prove abortive throughout the country.

An official of one of the principal west end police stations said there were less than five per cent of absentees from the morning roll call and that the conditions were normal throughout London. At a meeting of the striking policemen here this morning, chairman Marston, of the union, read the following communication from the Liverpool branch:

"Liverpool out solid; stripped docks at midnight; fire brigade as well." The announcement was received with cheers.

General Secretary Hayes of the policemen's union, in a statement issued this morning said:

"The situation generally is highly satisfactory, seeing that the decision of the executive committee came as a bombshell to the mass meetings and that the news has not yet reached the whole of the metropolis."

Union men claim the undivided support of organized labor.

The Star says it is reported that the electrical workers have threatened in certain contingencies to cut off London's lighting in support of the police and extreme action is also threatened by the officials of the locomotive engineers' union.

The authorities think the strength of the strike movement has already been indicated, though it is probable that a few more contingents may walk out when the 12-hour shift reports.

The Evening News says that all the strikers have been suspended and will be definitely dismissed to-day.

Secretary Hayes, addressing a meeting of the strikers, said that the authorities had sent a telegram to every depot sergeant intimating that if the strikers would return by noon to-day they would be reinstated. Ironical laughter greeted the announcement.

Hayes made a strong appeal to the men to remain firm, asserting that their number would be increased tenfold by to-morrow. He said arrangements would be made to-day that the police strike had failed both in London and the provinces. He said Liverpool was the only city where strikers would return by noon to-day, failing to report for duty there.

EXPORT OF HIDES IS PROHIBITED.
Order-in-Council has been passed at Ottawa.

Ottawa, Aug. 3.—The Minister of Trade and Commerce announces that owing to the abnormal situation of the hide and leather market, which seriously affects the interests of both consumers and producers of boots and shoes in Canada, the Government has called a conference of the parties interested to consider and advise as to the best course to be pursued.

In the meantime it is deemed wise as a preliminary measure to place the export of hides, skins and leather under control. An order-in-council has therefore been passed and is now operative to the effect that, pending consideration of other necessary action, the exportation from Canada of raw hides, skins and leather for the manufacture of boots and shoes shall be prohibited, except under license.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT MEETS ON LABOR DAY
Ottawa, Aug. 4.—Parliament meets on Monday, September first (Labor Day). The same day the Prince of Wales will lay the corner stone of the parliament buildings.

There will thus be a double ceremony in Ottawa on the first of September. The gathering of members of parliament on that date, it is felt, will be very appropriate for the laying of the corner stone by the Prince of Wales. Members further be afforded an opportunity of being present.

Paris, Aug. 11.—The weekly statement of the bank of France shows the following changes:—

Gold in hand, increased 647,001 francs; notes in circulation, increased 93,124,255 francs; treasury deposits decreased 55,047,470 francs; general deposits decreased 31,680,008 francs; bills discounted increased 85,028,255 francs; advances decreased 4,509,083 francs.

THREATENING EXTERMINATION
Turks and Tartars are Moving Upon Armenians.

Paris, July 30.—Turks and Tartars are moving upon the Armenians from three sides. They have cut off the Armenian relief supplies and threaten all the remaining Armenians with extermination, unless additional military protection is afforded, according to dispatches to Major Joseph C. Green, of Cincinnati, who is directing the American relief administration's work from Tiflis.

APPOINTMENT OF P. G. McFARLANE.
Lt.-Col. Geo. W. Mersereau of Doaktown has been named as inspector of schools for District No. 1, and Mr. P. G. McFarlane acting inspector, has been appointed in his place. Impaired health is the reason of Col Mersereau's retirement. A resolution respecting his retirement was passed at a recent meeting of the Board of Education.

A. rooms, Thursday evening, it was unanimously decided that the fair should be closed on the evening of the 14th so that all returnees' men will have an opportunity to participate in the entertainment provided by the commercial travellers that evening. It was decided to have two floats in the parade.

A meeting of the city public employees' union, 16,576, held Thursday evening, decided that the union would turn out in force in the August 14 parade. A committee was appointed to interview the city council to see if they would grant the union financial aid. P. Nice was in the chair.

TO TAKE CONTROL FROM GERMANY
Plans in the Making at Trade Union Congress.

Amsterdam, Aug. 1.—(By the Associated Press).—The International Trades Union Congress, resuming its session Thursday discussed plans for the new international, the constitution of a bureau, the appointment of officers and the question of proportional representation of the different countries appear likely to arouse a lively debate, an endeavor to take the control out of the hands of Germany, which hitherto dominated the international, being in the making. The draft of the new rules contains a provision giving one vote for every quarter million workers represented, as against one for each million, as heretofore. The smaller nations would have a representative for any fraction of a quarter million workers.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor in his address claimed to represent the Pan-American Federation of twenty-one republics. He declared he felt constrained to say that it was inadvisable, owing to the events of recent years to group Spain with the Spanish speaking South American states, as Danish delegates had proposed.
