Toronto, Ont., Nov. 12.—The Drury Cabinet will be ready to assume the government of the province on Friday as originally announced.

When on Friday the cabinet is sworn in the members are expected to assume office as follows:—

- Premier and President of Council—E. C. Drury. Attorney General—W. F. Nickle, K.C. Minister of Lands and Forests—Beniah Bowman. Ministers of Mines—Harry Mills. Minister of Health and Labor—Walter Rollo. Minister of Education—H. C. Nixon. Minister of Public Works—F. C. Biggs. Provincial Secretary—R. H. Grant. Provincial Treasurer—Peter Smith. Minister of Agriculture—Manning Doherty. Minister without portfolio—Col. S. Carmichael.

Grant for Education. Toronto, Nov. 11.—Premier Drury announced that H. H. Grant, member of the Ontario Legislative Council, member of the Ontario cabinet now being formed. Mr. Drury also stated that he had wired W. F. Nickle, K.C. of Kingston offering him the portfolio of Attorney-General.

**The Economical Farmer** So far \$6,200,000 has been spent on the new Parliament Buildings at Ottawa. While it is hoped that the new structure will be ready for the next session, there is no doubt that two millions more at least will be expended before the job is completed.

Since the Farmers are thinking of using the costly residence of the Lieut. Governor at Toronto to house soldiers, it may be that if the Farmers obtain power at Ottawa, the elected members will never have the privilege of showing their constituents the gorgeous chambers in which they now expect to do the business of the country.

**Making Divorce Cheaper and Easier** With the exception of Ontario and Quebec, every province in Canada has its own divorce courts, where unfortunately-mated couples may take the necessary steps to get back into a state of single blessedness.

Last session, Mr. Nickle succeeded in getting the assent of the House of Commons to a Divorce Bill, whereby divorce courts would be established in all the provinces. However, the session ended before the bill reached the Senate and now, if ever, the work will have to be done all over again. Mr. Nickle is no longer a member and it may be that the bill will not be re-introduced.

**The Senate a Divorce Court** At present, Ontario and Quebec people must obtain their divorces by bringing their cases before the Senate. The privilege of hearing the evidence is thought to be highly appreciated by the ancient gentlemen of that body. But the whole procedure is very costly. Witnesses must be brought to Ottawa, bills printed and lawyers paid, and usually each case involves an expenditure of not less than a thousand dollars.

**Easy for the Rich Only** Thus divorce is possible only for the wealthy man. In Canada, the law recognizes practically only one valid reason for granting divorce—that of adultery. If there is to be any law at all for the annulment of marriage, the latter should be attainable at reasonable expense, under proper safeguards, through the ordinary courts.

Four or five divorces only were granted at the present session of Parliament, but there is already a waiting list of fifty more for the next session.

**SOFT WORDS OF NO AVAIL**  
 Soft words but no turnips and it would be foolish to be other than frank with regard to certain aspects of the present Victory Loan campaign. It is certain that some disappointment has been experienced by those who have charge of that campaign at the apathy of the farming community in certain sections of Canada. This was markedly true at the end of the first week of the drive, when it appeared that only one farmer out of sixty had on the average subscribed to Bonds. On the other hand the people of the towns and cities who have perhaps less reason to recognize the gains of the existing agricultural prosperity have shown a commendable enthusiasm and foresight.

Disappointment is also mingled with surprise, for the farmer of all men, can least afford to permit the present Loan to end in a partial failure. The overseas market, financed by credits to Great Britain and European countries, has yielded enormous returns to the agricultural interest; and its maintenance is wholly dependent on a

generous over-subscription to the present Loan. If the sum realized is inadequate to permit the maintenance of credits on their present scale the farmer will be the first to suffer. There is no time for excuses or arguments as to the justification for apathy. The time between now and the close of the subscription sheets is too short. Every farmer must make up his mind now what he is going to do to help in this great Loan so clearly framed in his interest.

**TO-DAY'S EVENTS**  
 Ten years ago to-day occurred the great mine disaster at Cherry, Ill., in which more than 300 men lost their lives.  
 Seventeen of the larger typewriter and calculating machine companies of the United States have been cited by the Federal Trade Commission to appear in Washington to-day to answer complaints charging unfair competition.

Important present-day problems, with particular reference to the part that the colored race must bear to their permanent solution, will be discussed by prominent speakers at a readjustment and reconstruction congress which is to meet in Washington to-day under the auspices of Howard University.

**IN THE DAY'S NEWS**  
 Aristide Briand, who is looked upon as a probable successor to M. Clemenceau, has already been six times Premier of France. In a country where meteoric careers are the rule, M. Briand's rise to prominence was marked by its swiftness. Two decades ago he was unknown except among the members of his own party, the Revolutionary Socialists. Beginning life as a lawyer in a small provincial town, he later went to Paris and there turned his attention to politics and to journalism rather than to law. His opportunity came when he was appointed reporter of the Church and State Separation bill. ## Letter to News Record

To the Editor:  
 The marvelous growth of the City of Kitchener, during recent years, becomes a problem for interesting contemplation. This progress is not only great but it is varied and substantial, embracing manufacturing plants of all kinds, from collars and cuffs to automobile tires. Between these two extremes there is a large number of concerns, supplying the demand for a vast variety of goods required. It certainly would be an oversight to omit mentioning that Kitchener has in its limits the largest tannery in the Dominion, as well as furniture establishments of the greatest importance. When manufacturing concerns employ from fifteen hundred to two thousand hands constantly (and Kitchener will have more than one of these in the near future), the value of all real estate increases as these institutions multiply. The general drift from a commercial standpoint to-day is the amalgamation of smaller institutions into larger ones. Where a few years ago there were dozens of flourishing towns and villages scattered throughout the country, with various shops and manufacturing establishments, we now find that these have ceased and the workmen together with many of the inhabitants moved into larger places.

What is the cause of the notorious influx of manufacturing institutions and citizens generally into the city of Kitchener? If there were dwelling houses sufficient available the population of the city would immediately increase by a couple of thousand. It is true that the city is not blessed with any navigable stream or other waterway in Canada so that our shipping facilities are of no mean order.

The standard of education in this city has always been high. It may be said, too, that one of this city's attractive features is its faithful, energetic and industrious class of working people. Another feature which must not be lost sight of is the fact that this city differs from nearly every other city, because it has no slums. Of course there are a multitude of other reasons that could be assigned why this city is so attractive to manufacturers and others, but one thing is evident, that in the vast number of manufacturing institutions that are locating here and the immense increase in population, saddle upon the city, a responsibility in proportion to such increase, demanding the best talent available, to fill the municipal offices in up-to-date style consistent with economy and efficiency. 

The Merchants' Column

Edited by Mansfield F. House

**Perseping Customers Buy 1,000 Overcoats**  
Selling 1000 winter overcoats to Palm-Beach and straw-hatted men in early September might sound like trying to "rush" the frigid season a little, but the Hub, of Baltimore, Md., scored such a success with the idea that the entire 1000 coats were disposed of within "three days"—and all through newspaper advertisements almost as unusual as the pre-season sale itself.

"The sale really wasn't planned at all," says Joseph Katz, advertising manager of the Hub. "To be perfectly frank with you, when we bought these 1000 overcoats last February, our original idea was to hold them till the winter of 1919. At that time the market skies were darkening and every live retailer was looking to his ears. Which reminds me that it might not be amiss to get away from the subject a moment, in these days of indiscriminate accusations of profiteering, and remind the dear public that if it wasn't for this far-sightedness on the part of many retailers many things would be selling for much more than they are now."

"But to get back to the overcoat sale, our second thought was 'What a stunt it would be to pull off an overcoat sale in hot weather!' We had some faith in the outcome—but we may as well admit we were not as cocksure about it as we would have been about a sale of women's fur coats. The latter case had been tried before; it was an institution, and then, too, women had the bargain instinct more keenly developed than men."

"We went ahead. The first advertisement was run a day ahead of the big one giving the details. It simply carried the words: **WOULD YOU BUY YOUR OVERCOAT NOW IF WE SAVED YOU MONEY?—THE HUB** 'That's all; no price, no argument. 'The next day the page ad appeared. It occurred to me it would be effective to compare the keen bargain instinct of women with man's indifference to ways of saving money by spending it, and so the ad began."

A woman will buy a fur coat in August because she can save money. In man made of the same stuff. "Then the advertisement continued: **1000 WINTER OVERCOATS—Bought in February and Put Away as an Investment Will Go on Sale at \$33.50** Anybody is entitled to change his mind. Last February we bought a thousand overcoats with the idea of putting them away; clothes were going up; looked like extra money for us. They did go up—but we've changed our mind about holding them. There was a chance to pull off a big stunt to make a thousand new friends for the store. So here we are with a January sale of overcoats in September; a sale of winter overcoats of known worth—a sale that will save the men of this town a lot of money. When we tell you that—

**WE'D PAY AS MUCH AT WHOLESALE TO-DAY** you know there's a good reason why you should get your winter overcoat several months ahead of time. "The 1000 overcoats were gone in three days. We don't know how many more we could have sold if we had had the sale ended. **New Business at 40; Leads at 54**

Starting in the retail milk business fourteen years ago at the age of forty, after spending twenty-five years in butcher shops as a meat cutter, Edward D. Snyder, of Hazelton, Pa., has attained such a degree of success that he has been given the title of the "Milk King" throughout the Lehigh field, and men go there from all over the state to study his methods.

His recipe is brief and to the point: "Keep your wagons, cans, bottles and help spotlessly clean; pasteurize all milk sold, and don't keep your light under a bushel basket, but tell the public the precautions you take for their safety and health."

While the above is Mr. Snyder's idea of what has been the vehicle which bore him from a mediocre salary to comparative affluence, his friends and associates add a few more contributing causes to explain how their model dairyman, who took out 130 quarts of milk and sold only eighty his first day in business, can now handle from 3500 to 4000 quarts a day, as well as other dairy products.

Chief among them they class his methods of publicity. The Snyder wagons and trucks all have the name, "E. D. Snyder," on them, and a wooden milk bottle enameled to resemble a bottle filled with the lactated product, as their sold sign. Covering the whole Lehigh field, no one can see a milk bottle but that instantly the name "Snyder" is associated with it.

**Lemonade from "Well"**  
A Wichita, Kan., druggist recently doubled his sales on lemonade by having a stonecutter make a top of sandstone which he placed on a section of his counter. Beneath this he placed a stone jug in a box lined with ice. A sign, reading "Ice-cold lemonade direct from the old stone well," completed the arrangement.

Each person who secured a check drew his own dipper of ice-cold lemonade from the stone well which, after a few days' advertising, was thronged all day long.

**FIRST CONVENTION OF LABOR PARTY**  
Cleveland, O., Nov. 13.—The promoters of the new American Labor party declare they find grounds for such encouragement in the recent election results, particularly in the

gains made by the Socialists in New York City and elsewhere. In the public mind the new party is certain to be associated with the Socialist party, so the results of the election which are taken as an indication that the Socialists no longer provoked the bitter public opposition which they encountered during the war, are naturally gratifying to the promoters of the new movement. The latter, in reality is an offshoot of the Socialist party, but in one particular the new party expects to encounter none of the popular opposition with which the Socialists have met. The new Labor party, it is declared will be 100 per cent American.

The American Labor party, with given birth at a conference held in Chicago some months ago, aims to be in the presidential campaign next year. With this object in view it is planning to open its first national convention in this city one week from next Saturday. The convention was first called

to assemble in Chicago, but later it was decided to hold the gathering in Cleveland. The change in the meeting place was due to the efforts of Max S. Hays, the chairman of the executive committee, and a resident of this city. Eighteen hundred delegates are expected at the convention with representatives among them from all the States except, perhaps, a few in the South.

**OF INTEREST TO WOMEN**

Outdoor Culture of Hardy Spring Flowering Bulbs.

An Open Situation Desirable and Reasonable Care in Planting With Protection During the First Winter—Fall Pasture for Stock.

HERE is probably no class of plants that gives more satisfaction and are more thoroughly appreciated by the flower lover than a collection of spring flowering bulbs. Flowering as they do from quite early in spring, even before the winter covering of snow has entirely left us, until well on into the early months of summer before but very few of the other border plants are in flower. Their bright flowers are doubly acceptable on this account.

Location.—Bulbs are best planted where there is good drainage and where no surface water lies in water or early spring. When planted in masses or beds, it is best to have the soil in the centre of the bed a few inches higher than the margin, so as to pitch the water off readily.

Soil.—The best kind of soil for bulbs is a moderately rich, light, loamy soil. They will succeed fairly well in a sandy soil, but do not give as fine blooms as in soil of a loamy nature. If the soil is of a clayey nature, dig in some sand or black soil from the bush, or both, to lighten it.

When to Plant Bulbs.—The best time for planting outdoor bulbs is about the second or third week in October, although bulbs may be planted until the ground is frozen over for the winter, even as late as the end of November or early in December.

Depth to Plant.—All of these smaller growing bulbs should be planted from two to three inches under the soil and quite thickly together, an inch and a half or two inches apart, to give a good effect. The Tulips, Dutch Hyacinths and Narcissus grow about twelve to eighteen inches in height and can be dotted in masses or blocks in flower beds, or in groups more towards the back of a perennial border.

Protecting Bulbs in Winter.—All bulbs, especially late planted ones, are best protected during the first winter, as it prevents the bulbs from heaving and lifting. Bulbs that have become well established in the border require very little if any protection in winter.

Hardy Kinds to Plant.—Tall growing, 1 to 2 feet: Narcissus—Emperor, Empress, Bicolor Victoria, Golden Spur, Festus, Poeticus ornatus, Barri sonapiens, Mrs. Langtry, Stella, Poeticus Elvira. Tulips—Darwin, Cottage Garden and Early Flowering in variety.

Pasture Necessary for Stock in Fall. One of the essential factors in keeping live stock in good condition through the fall and early winter which is highly important, is good fall pasture, says Andrew Boss, vice-director of the Minnesota Experiment Station.

## THE JUNIOR COOK

**CHESTNUT STUFFING**

If you are allowed to help stuff the Thanksgiving turkey, you must watch the cupboard for a few days before to see that every single scrap of bread is saved for the dressing.

On the day before Thanksgiving, crumb all the bread scraps very fine. You should have enough to measure about two and one-half quarts (19 cups). When the bread is crumbed, set it in a dry place till Thanksgiving morning.

Put the crumbs into a big bowl, arrange a hollow in the top of the pile of crumbs and put all seasons in this hollow.


Shell and blanch 1 pint of chestnuts. Cut them or grind and put on the crumbs, with

1 teaspoonful celery salt,  
1/2 teaspoonful sage (if this flavor is liked),  
3 tablespoonful meat drippings (bacon fat is best),  
Four into a saucepan 1 pint (2 cups) milk and bring to a boil.  
Pour scalding milk right over the seasonings that are on the crumbs. Let it stand 3 minutes, take a big fork and gently mix the dressing till seasonings are all through the moistened crumbs.

The dressing is now ready to be packed into the turkey. If there is too much, mold it into a ball and bake it in the oven along with the turkey. It will be fine to eat with gravy.

This same recipe is fine for stuffing the Christmas goose.

## TOYS AND USEFUL ARTICLES THAT A BOY CAN MAKE. BY FRANK I. SOLAR. INSTRUCTOR, DEPT. OF FINANCIAL TRAINING, PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF DETROIT.



**A WOODEN DOLL**

Its arms in many positions without falling over. It can also sit on the floor, stand on its head, or hands and be placed in many other amusing positions. There is no reason why it should be a boy doll if you prefer a girl, as a skirt and a bonnet will quickly transform it into a beautiful girl baby doll.

The same tools you have used for making other toys will do for this one, there are no new tool operations. Select wood that is easy to work. It is to be painted so it is not necessary that all parts be made of the same kind of wood, any scraps can be used.

For the head and body get out a piece according to dimensions and after it is planed and sawed square, from a center line lay out the pattern. Then saw to line with a common saw wherever straight cuts are to be made and use a turning or coping saw for the curve.

Now make the legs as indicated by the leg pattern, rounding the end with a chisel and sandpaper. Bore holes for the screws a little larger than the shank of the screw and countersink for the head. If the screws is too tight the movement of the leg will soon turn it out of the body. Fasten legs to the body and see that they fit well before going farther.

The arms are practically the same as the legs except that the layout work on them is not so difficult. They should fit well also, so the doll will properly balance when placed in a desired position. The drawing at the left shows that the screws will not have to be countersunk in the arms. Remove screws and sand all parts breaking the sharp edges with the sandpaper.

Layout with a pencil the features, etc., or if you are not very expert at drawing have someone do it for you.

Little children who play with toys of this kind like bright colors so any combination of these colors that look well will be desirable. The pants might be blue, the shirt red, the face white, hair and features, black, the shoes black or brown, the stockings and tie green and the cuffs and collar yellow. Two coats will be necessary. Do not try to paint to a certain line with one color and continue from there on with a different color, while the first is still wet. If you do, the colors will run together spoiling the looks of the toy. Let one color dry thoroughly before applying the next. The painting will either spoil or improve the toy depending on the neatness with which it is done.

"After it has been baked the first time it comes out hard, but not shiny. It has a dull finish and is called bisque ware. ## WOULD LIKE TO EXPLAIN CASES

"While the O. H.
