

Martin—still take an active interest in its affairs. On the let of July last the society's new grounds in Ilderton were formally opened with appropriate ceremony. Yesterday they were put to a more practical use, when the annual fall show of the L. T. A. S. was held. The site comprises about ten acres of suitable land, directly in the village, well fenced, and provided with a good race track, besides other facilities which reflect great credit on the industry of the management, when the short time they have had to get the grounds into shape is considered. Ilderton is centrally located, possessing railroad and telegraph facilities, and the decision of the directors in making it the site of the Township Fair was evidently judicious. The fall show of 1890 was certainly a great success, both in point of attendance and the amount and quality of the exhibits. With fine weather came large crowds of the yeomen of London township, accompanied, of course, by the ladies, and early in the afternoon the grounds were filled in a way that must have been very satisfactory to the officers of the society. The number of entries also compared very invorably with that of last year, Secretary E. Ironside being kept pretty busy collecting fees from exhibitors and handing them the necessary tickets.

The regular prize list was liberal, and in addition over 50 special prizes were offered by prominent farmers in the township and interested residents of the city. Two handsome silver cups were contributed by the representatives—Messra, Jos. Marshall, M.P., and R. Tooley, M.P.P.,—for the best herd of dairy cows giving milk, not less than six, and the best span of heavy draft horses, 3,000 pounds or over. The number and quality of the horses exhibited was pronounced by the judges to be exceedingly fine, all the classes being well represented, especially the carriage horses and roadsters.

FIRM IN THEIR FAITH.

Futile Attempt to Dissuade Young Girls from Becoming Mormon Prose-lytes—Arrival of a Large Party from England.

Party from England.

New York, Oct. 2.—The authorities at the barge office this morning used an immense amount of persuasion on the 22 young Mormons that arrived yesterday on the steamer Wyoming to induce them to forego their intentions of becoming proselytes to the Mormon faith. The girls were separated from other passengers as they landed and placed in a room by themselves. Three female missionaries from the Emigrant Girls' Home went among them and tried to convince them of the folly of the course they proposed to follow. One of the girls, Karen Sylvestein by name, who acted as spokeswoman for the party, frankly acknowledged that they were all willing to be one of seven or eight wives and were fully aware of the principles of Mormonism. The girls are all young and some of them remarkably pretty.

The attempt of the missionaries to influence them proved an utter failure, and as all the large efficers can do is to use persuasion, the party will proceed on their journey to-morrow. The party comprises 203 souls, of whom 32 are children. Among the lot is a married English woman, who left her husband in England to take up the Mormon faith. 
