

Mr. Lourier received his visitors in the drawing room, and they were presented to him by Messrs. McPherson and Ferguson. They got down to business at once. Rev. J. R. Gundy, chairman of the deputation, said that they were present representing the London Conference of the Methodist Church, which had the spiritual oversight of 130,000 people. In fact, he said, they might speak for the whole Methodist Church, for at the last General Conference, held in London in 1894, a very pronounced stand had been taken or the question about which they had come to interview the Liberal leaderthe question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic. The General Conference, representing about a million people, had passed a resolution to the effect "that the liquor traffic cannot be legalized without sin, and it is the duty of the Civil Government to prevent the trade in intoxicating liquors." members of the deputation were happy to note that the Liberal party proposed to take a plebiscite on the question if they came into power. Still, they want-ed to hear the leader's views, and they would report to conference. In the opinion of the conference the question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic was the greatest question before the country, because so much crime was due to the traffic. Mr. Wm. Bowman, of London, also

spoke. He said that Mr. Gundy had gone well over the ground, especially in making clear the official view of the Methodist Church. But it was not a question into which any sectar anism entered. He knew, for example, that many Roman Catholics were as strongly in favor of prohibition as any Protestant could be, and he himself. in old days, had fought side by side with Father Mathew, the great Catho-

lic apostle of temperance.

Mr. Laurier, in reply, said he felt very much honored by the visit of the deputation. Everybody knew, and none better than himself, that the question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic was agitating the people. It was a question which would agitate and agitate until it was settled one way or the other. He was aware that the great Methodist Church, which was a great meriodist children, which was a great moral power, looked upon the legalization of the liquor traffic as a sin, but, of course, they were aware
