Found New Gospel

in Ancient Ruins

New York, May 15. - A cable dispatch from London to the Sun says that Drs, Grenfel and Hart, during continued research of the ruins of Oxyrhyncus, whose ancient monasteries some years ago yielded the famous logia of Christ, found a fragment of a supposed lost gospel, which is now in Queen's College, Oxford. It is a tiny scrap of vellum, perforated by worms and yellowed by sixteen centuries, but the writing is perfectly legible. It is written in Greek characters, which are almost migroscopically minute, with scarlet initials. There are about three hundred

It is certainly no part of any extant gospel, but its theological value must be left to theologians. It is unusually well written from a literary viewpoint. It begins in the middle of speech. Jesus and his disciples have entered the temple, and met a pharisee. who rebukes them for omitting some ceremonial of ablution. Jesus asks the pharisee what the latter has done to comply with the ceremonial. The pharisee's reply minutely describes the process of purification, of which no



Upon two occasions only does history tell of a campaign in which the disease death rate was lower than the wound death rate. Of these occasions the first was the Franco-Prussian war of 1870-1871, during which the deaths from disease amounted to 18.6 per 1.000, while the deaths from wounds reached 33.7 per 1,000. This, however, is explained by the author of the essay under notice on the score of the brevity of the campaign, the constant movement of the troops, and the favorable character of the season of the year. None of these benign characteristics marked the second and great exception to the rule, the present army of Japan. 



Child to Choose Which She Will Follow.

BROUGHT UP AS AN ACROBAT

Mother After Ten Years Finds Her With the Famous Nelson Troupe.

New York, May 15. - Whether she shall remain an acrobat or return to her mother, a rich Cuban widow, is the alternative to be decided by Martianna Pirez, 13 years old. She does not know even her mother's tongue, and all the recollections are of the circus and the variety stage. The choice has been left to the child herself, to be decided upon her 14th birthday, six months hence.

Fedirico Perez was a distinguished Cuban patriot. He "went out" with the would-be liberators in the campaign of 1895, leaving his wife, Luisa, and nine children in Havana. The rebellion cost the family all its possessions.

There came to Havana a circus, and with the show was a troupe of acrobats known as the Nelsons. Arthur Hobson, known by the name of Nelson, was at the head of this troupe. He met Mrs. Perez, showed a fondness for the youngest child Martianna, and offered to take charge of the infant, then


