London, Feb. 12.—While the press generally approves of Premier Lloyd George's labor program, it fails to satisfy the parliamentary Labor party, which has prepared an amendment to the reply to the speech from the throne, regretting the absence of definite proposals dealing with "the present cases of industrial unrest and for securing, as regards wages and working hours, conditions of labor which will establish a higher standard of life and social well being for the people."

#### FOUR RUSSIAN FACTIONS TO ATTEND PRINKIPO CONFERENCE

Paris, Feb. 12.-Prospects are brightening for the assembling at least four of the Russian factions at the conference to be held on the Princes Islands.

Word has come from the Ukraine that the Government of former part of Russia will participate in the conference and it is reported that the indecision of the Government of General Denekine has given way to a desire to join the conference. The Government of the Crimea already has accepted the Invitation as has the Russian Bolshevik Government.

It is beginning to appear that a sufficient number of other factions will be in evidence to meet the Bolshevik and the Entente and American representatives to assure the success of the conference plan.

"I am informed that British Columbia saw mills have practically no orders for lumber and that unless orders can be secured nearly all mills will be closed down inside of three weeks. If this done the result will be very disastrous.

"From information which I have received I am led to believe hat the British timber controller is calling for tenders from American brokers on the Pacific coast, Should the brokers succeed obtaining this contract, we shall feel that this result will have peen caused by lack of persistent effort on the part of your Government to secure the necessary tonnage. We have a difficult situation facing us here, and we feel that it would be an abominable shame if, through lack of effort on the part of your Government, British Columbia fails to secure this business.

Toronto, Feb. 12.—R. Home Smith has submitted a proposal to the local advisory board under the soldiers settlement act, which may result in the establishment of a community of soldiers on some 50 farms in the Niagara. Peninsula. All of these would be fruit farms, Mr. Smith is owner of 1,200 acres of fruit farm land near Niagara-on-the-Lake. It is alregdy planted with peaches, plums, cherries, apples, and other fruits. The radial runs through this land, which is ten minutes' ride from Niagara, and 25 minutes from St.

Catharines, Yesterday Mr. Smith visited the Ontario advisory board and suggested dividing this into farms to be sold exclusively to soldiers. He asked for the approval of the board, who said that they would investigate reasonable they thought there would, be no objection.

"It will be all revalued," said Mr. Smith. "I will get it down to a firm and solid basis." The price to be asked for the land would be under \$5,000, which is the maximum amount which the Government will advance for the purchase of farm lands under the act.

Bakery Regulations. The new regulations governing bakeries were submitted and approved, these recommending the wrapping of bread, but not making it compulsory.

The statement was made by Dr. W. S. Downham, M. O. H., that he had been informed that wrapped bread would cost a cent a loaf more. The larger bakeries favored it, but the smaller ones considered that it involved too great difficulties.

difficulties.

The added cost of wrapping was the point which carried most weight with the board re refusing to make wrapping ompulsory.
The regulations provide for absolute-y sanitary conditions in bakeries, which will be under the eye of in-

spectors;
One point to which Mrs. W. S. Part-ridge drew attention was the section:
"No person who has any communicable disease or any communicable skin dis-ease shall work in any bakery, and no ease shall work in any bakery, and no owner, manager or person in charge of any bakery shall knowingly require, permit or suffer such person to be em-ployed in his bakery." Mrs. Partridee wanted to know if employees were inwanted to know it employees were inspected. There was much more menace to the public, she said, from employees in bakeries suffering from communicable diseases, than from unwrapped bread. Dr. Downham stated that up to the present there has not been such in-

bread. Dr. Downham stated that up to the present there has not been such inspection.

Copies of the new regulations will be sent to all the bakers in the city.

Tuberculosis Leads.

The report of contagious diseases presented by Dr. Downham showed that tuberculosis had a big lead in the communicable diseases reported during January. 32 cases in all. Diphtheria came second with 24 cases, and chickenpox followed up with 19 cases. Suspected diphtheria and scarlet fever broke even, 8-cases each. Only one case of smallpox appeared and since that was some ten days ago. Dr. Downham expressed the opinion that it wasn't likely to spread any farther.

Commenting in her report upon the frequent misleading characters of reports owing to tardy registration of deaths, etc. Miss Jennie Fidlar, assistant in vital statistics at the Institute of Public Health asked sanction of the board for keeping cheek on deaths and biths, with newspaper notices and other reports of deaths, sickness, etc., and to give a part of one day a week to this work, the time to be principally spent at the city hail. Advantages pointed out were that welfare nurses could be notified of births at once and famigations necessary be promptly reported, etc. It was decided to leave decision over until the next meeting.







NED SOLDIER. Q .-- 1. Does the law state that picture theatres may collect war tax from a returned soldier who was badly wounded while serving overseas, and wears a war service badge?

2. If a man has a government position in a customs office, is he entitled to run a theatre and work there during office hours with his uniform on? 3. Is there any means by which a needy returned soldier may obtain such a position in the customs

house?

A.—l. Yes. Only soldiers in uniform are exempted from paying this tax.

3. Yes, provided that he holds the proper qualifications for same. He should have his branch of the Great War Veterans' Association take the matter up and arrange if possible for him to obtain a position in the customs department. Complaints such as outlined in query 2 should also be brought to the attention of the Great War Veterans' Association, and if confirmed will likely be remedied immediately.

VOLUNTEER 1916. Q.-What is being done with reference to the dis-charge of men from the Western Ontario Regiment who were granted leave of absence until further orders?

rders?

3. Is a man with six months' service prior to being granted leave and who turned in his uniform and kit, entitled to the \$35 civilian clothing allowance on discharge? 4. Will you please quote your authority for answers to these ques-

authority for answers to these questions?

A.-1. Military forms are sent to them to be filled out and returned to the military authorities before discharge is carried out, thus eliminating the necessity of these soldiers reporting in person at 10 mdon for discharge. They all receive a demobilization discharge.

2. No. Of course, period of service as stated on discharge would vary according to facts of each individual case.

3. These cases are dealt with up their individual merits, according to a definite routine outlined by the authorities. Some soldiers will raceive the clothing allowance, while others will not, according to facts of the case, such as period of service, etc. Further than this no definite ruling can be laid down for precedent, according to information received at this office from local military headquarters.
