DISASTROUS FIRE

Blaze Sweeps the West Bank of the River Rouge-Heavy Loss With Small Insurance

Detroit, Mich, May 12.-Fanned by a 35-mile-an-hour wind, fire this af4 ternoon swept the west bank of the Rouge River, in Delray, a suburb of the south of Detroit, for threequarters of a mile, and destroyed over \$800,000 worth of property. Following are the losses :- Salliotte & Furgeson, lumber mill, \$50,000; covered by insurance, Brownlee & Co's. mill , salt block, and part of their stock of lumber, \$45,000; insurance, \$15,000. The Western Union Telegraph office, loss on cedar poles stored in a yard which was swept by the flames, about \$600,insurance unknown; and Carkin, Stickney & Cram, loss on dredge which was tied up at Salliotte & Furgeson's dock, \$70,000; insurance un-known; Maltby Lumber Company, cedar poles, \$50,000; insurance \$25,000. The fire originated on the roof of the Salliotte & Furgeson lumber mill. The fire spread into the large yard which the Western Union Telegraph Co. used as a storage point for cedar tele-graph poles. The yard is the distri-buting point for ten States, and over 100,000 poles were stored there. The fire swept through the great yard which comprises about eight acres, in less than two hours, but the poles blazed until far into the night. Th lumber yard of G. A. Rauppe & Co., in Ecourse, about a mile from Delray, was set on fire by sparks from a passing engine, and 500,000 feet of lumber was destroyed. The loss is about

JAPAN, CHINA AND RUSSIA.

Canada has more than a sentimental interest in all these three countries just now. There will soon be increased openings for trade with them and wide expansion of commerce, of the Chinese imbraglio be quieted and peace retained.

We are sometimes unduly discouraged by the overwhelming wealth and population of the United States. It seems hopeless to contend with them, but the example of Belgium-a mere dot on the map by acreage, not so very much exceeding us in population, and surrounded by the competition of mighty nations-should cheer and spur us, since that little Kingdom has so forged ahead that Antwerp in spite of the drawback of tedious river navigation, is crowding rapidly up to Liverpool in the list of the world's

four greatest seaports. British Columbia is most favorably situated with respect to Asiatic trade, having advantage over the Pacific States of the Union, in nearness, and admirably served by the C. P. R. boats. It has also advantage over Ontario in freights. Beans are in large demand in Japan and there is no reason why our Pacific Province can not compete with Manchuria in the export of this cereal to the Japanese market, which in '96 imported a total of \$94,802,667 of all products. To it, we already ship coal, fish and fish products, butter, cheese, spirits and wines, tobacco, sugar and planks and boards. The value of these exports which was \$29,801 in '87, jumped to \$140,706° in '97 and \$148,728 in '98 Canned goods give a British Col-

umbian item of promise. In China, furs are eagerly bought by the Mandaries and among the wealthier classes and openings exist for food products. 

AMERICAN TOWNS

That Have Been Burled Like Pompeli-The Plateau Dweller of Arizona. calamity like that which buried

rompell once befell the plateau dwellers' villages of Arizona. Arid, sun-baked stretches of almost treeless mesas now greet the eye where once flourishing towns stood. The relics left be ind are found with

An almost impenetrable and apparently endless expanse of lava forms a coverlid for the ruined villages. Energetic and enthusiastic men have, however, accomplished much, and among them is Cecil A. Deane, custodian of the war relic room in the State House at Denver.

difficulty.

Mr. Deane spent many weeks last Fall searching the forlorn plateaus south of Holbrook for traces of its ancient inhabitants. He brought back with him many objects of absorbing interest which have never been displayed to the public eye and about which no word has been written in explanation.

Some of them tell plainly of the fives of their departed owners, while others afford only the subjects for wonder and conjecture.

In the course of his explorations Mr. Deane found undeniable proofs of a cataclysm of nature. The mesa dwellers were engulted in a wave of molten lava. To-day, hard, 1 egular and forbidding, it covers the earth to a depth of seventy-two feet where measured. The peaceful habitations of that early man were overswept by a flood of melted rock, which extended

over 400,000 acres.

The mesa or plateau dwellers, as they are called, were a large boned people, as their skeletons testify. They lived on the I ateaus and cultivated the soil for a livelihood. Ears of corn and pumpkins, calcined by the penetrating heat of lava, have been found in the rooms of stone buildings, proving them to have been an agricultural

The scarcity and character of the weayons found in the houses show that the mesa dwellers were not a warlike people nor addicted to hunting. If there were mastodons in those days they evidently did not pursue the monsters. Their spear and arrow heads are but an inch in length, and their stone hatchets were intended for domestic use. Although they dwelt on the mesas and tilled the soil, they

had places of refuge among the cinis. In the picturesque cliffs of sandstone, which rise to the height of 400 and 500 feet, they tunnelled homes for use in time of peril. What they feared no one knows. Perhaps they fled from a stronger race of people which sometimes invaded their land. Perchance some huge prehistoric animals menaced them. So they lived, having two homes-one for peace and the other for time of danger-until at length there was a tremendous erup-tion which ended their existence.

The objects in possession of Custodian Deane are of varied nature. There is corn which mutely tells of agriculture; sea shells found only in the Mexican Gulf or Gulf of California proving that the mesa dwellers either visited the distant sea or had communication with other people who had

been there. There is a polished sandstone tube, the use of which baffles imagination; a disc of sandstone strangely marked to resemble the interior of a court and evidently a symbol of some sort; a small sandstone vase with cover, possibly used as a water receptacle; a quartzite metal or primitive corn mill, found six feet below the surface in a grave near the Ricer Plata; it was dressed with stone hammers and is a good bit of work; a slab of sandstone having grooves made by the rubbing of stone axes in sharpening, and

The Lightest Substance.

What is the lightest substance in nature? The luminiferous ether, answers Pearsan's Weekly. This substance pervades the universe, and by means of its vibrations light is transmitted from place to place. Yet it must be almost absolutely without weight. The earth, the moon and the planets pass through it, but their mo-tion is not perceptibly retarded by it. The calculations of astronomers on the motions of these bodies are based upon the supposition that they are moving through empty space. NOTES OF THE FARM.

The spraying outfit can be put to good service in giving some of the horses and cows a good spraying as a bath during the warm days.

It is not altogether the aggregate amount of crops, but the profit made in growing them that determines the net gain. We may spend more than

Use fertilizers that contain a large percentage of potash, for potatoes, and put it over the rows, or broadcast it on the land. Being soluble the rains will carry it to the roots of the plants. The plague of flies can be very largely avoided, says a dairyman, by rubbing the horse and the cows all over with a sponge dipped in soap suds in which a small quantity of carbolic acid has been mixed.

The man who makes general farming pay the best is the one who has some products that he can put on the market every month. He is not tied down to any one crop or one branch of stock raising, but branches out sufficiently, so that if one thing fails he has other opportunities ready. Sheep and hogs should have free ac-

cess to apple orchards, as they will consume the fallen fruit and thus destroy many insects. Weeds and grass will also be kept down by sheep. They should, however, be fed also at night, if the herbage is scarce, in order to have them kept in the best condition. Sheep will not graze during the heat of the day, preferring to do so after sundown. They can be kept in any shady place until evening, and then driven to the pasture. In this manner they will be protected from the heat

of the sun and be in better condition for seeking their food during the even-We are sometimes surprised that certain portions of our crops endure drouth so much better. During the favorable weather they made a strong root growth. The roots have power to lay up nourishment for future use. If we wish to provide against

a drouth give root growth the best

possible opportunity. Can the proportion of butter in milk be increased by judicious feed-ing? The testimony that it can be done is rapidly growing. The experi-ments of many of the State stations and of dairy experts have gained pretty exact information, and show that certain foods rich in oils tend to produce an increase in the butter fats

When cows become dry, they should keep in good condition on pasture grass alone. Cows that produce largely of milk may be allowed grain and hay in addition to grass, and all that they will eat, but it is not necessary to highly-feed non-producing stock during the worm season, as less food is then required for their maintenance

compared with winter. Up to a certain point all food is ultilized in supplying the constant and natural waste of the system. A plant or an animal must be full fed. After an animal waste is supplied, then comes a demand for so much to furnish animal heat. After these demands bave been met, and not until then, surplus production becomes pos-Moreover, the latter object is best gained by the careful feeder and by a perfectly balanced ration.

Where sheep are pastur ver there is a constant checking of the plant, and this predisposes it to the forming of seed. Thus it produces a heavier seed crop than when the common practice is followed of allowing it to grow until in blossom and then cutting it close to the ground; but, if the clover is fed off, Canada thistles and other biennial weeds in it should be mown down to the surface with a scythe. The sheep will not take sufficient care of these to absolve you from giving some attention to them.

Testing and Preserving Eggs. Eggs that are to be packed should be perfectly fresh. There is no better way to tell a fresh egg than the old method of testing them by a paper tube. Roll up a piece of stiff paper, so that an ordinary egg will just fit in one end. Place the egg in the end of the tube, and look through the other end with the tube directed toward the light. The egg will appear translucent if fresh; if stale, it will appear dark, almost opaque. A good egg will gen-erally sink if placed in water; if stale it will float. Several ways of preserv-



ing eggs are practiced. The object is to prevent evaporation from the egg. Cutting off the air from the contents of the egg preserves them longer than with any other treatment. An egg which has lain in bran even for a few days will smell and taste musty. Packed in lime eggs will be stained. Covered with a coat of spirit varnish eggs have kept so perfectly that after the lapse of two years chickens were hatched

Spirit varnish for preserving eggs is made by dissolving gum shellac in snough alcohol to make a thin varnish. Coat each egg with this and pack, little end down, so that they canot move, in bran, sawdust, or sand; the sand is best. Whatever is used for packing should be clean and dry.

Bumble or Humble Bees. The large and small humble bees that are seen in garden and field are of different species, for bees, flies and similar insects do not increase in size with age. When they leave the pups case they are fully developed and do not grow afterward. There are many species of the bumble bee native of the WAYS OF THE EARTHWORM.

sting Facts About the Small Boy's Favorite Fish Bart.

Earth-worms have a reason for being ever so much more important than to serve as bait for fishermen. For all their lowly estate, few creatures have done more for mankind, Earthworms are not merely the original ploughmen-they have brought about the condition of the earth's surface that makes other ploughing possible and profitable.

Field crops, for the most part, grow and feed upon vegetable mould-the layer of warm light, brackish earth resting upon the subsoil. Save by grace of the earth-worm vegetable mold would exist only in those places where dead leaves and decaying growths generally resolved themselves into their original ele.nents. earth-worm, which may be described as an embodied appetite, eats everything-animal matter, green leaves and dead ones, twigs, leaf stalks, small stones and earth. The residuum of all he casts up on the surface at the rate, throughout pastures and garden ground, of some ten tons a year. Continue the process a hundred years or even fifty and many inches of fine

friable, productive soil result. Beyond all that, their burrows let down light and air from the subsoil. Sometimes the burrows run six feet deep. In winter the worms hibernate in roundish chambers at the bottom. The chambers are lined with very small stones or hard, rounded seed. A dozen worms sleep toge . r, knotted into a squirming ball. It is only in the winter sleep that they are thus gregarious. At other a nes they go in pairs. Though they co not in captivity appear very sensible of either cold or heat, in hot, dry weather they go almost as far down as they do in winter.

Eyeless, they have yet a certain perception of light, retreating before it to their burrows. Vibration also affects them-hence, say the country folk, the woodcock's habit of drumming to call them out of the ground. Their sense of smell is acute, and by the help of it they find their food, either buried or lying upon the surface. As soon as it is found the worms drag it to the burrow. They burrow by pressure of their srooth ringed bodies and by literally eating out the earth ahead. The digestive apparatus includes a crop and gizzard, like those of birds. After the manner of birds, the gizzards are kept supplied with small stones to serve as millstones

in grinding down the food. The burrows are plastered all round with the finely chewed earth, and keep shape often long after they are untenanted. From the dead leaves which make so large a part of their food the worms secrete humus acids, which attack and help to dissolve the rocks buried in the soil. Thus the earthworms not merely transform the soil chemically and mechanicalbut add to the bulk of it since soil of every kind

comes from the disintegration of rocks. Further, many leaves dragged ly eaten and decaying, furnish gases which permeate the soil and react upon its mineral element.

Earthworms are the best allies of those gentlemen the antiquaries. coin, an arrow head, a spear point, an inscribed slab, a tesselated pavement. they burry, surely, safely, to await the day of resurrection. The burying is done in two ways-by castings spread above the thing to be buried, and by undermining the soil beneath. Each honeycombed with burrows sings in times of heavy rain or frost. Thus, in course of a thousand years, an object may be many eet under the surface. yet remain exactly as it fell. Indeed the wise mer declare the earthworms in the mass, keep the whole face of the planet in a state of gradual evolution.

Sword of a Thousand Pieces. What do you think of a sword blade that contains a thousand sheets of metal? Yet they are not uncommon. and you wil readily imagine, are of Oriental workmanship. Our pains-taking, patient Japanese friends are the makers of them, and a few days ago I had the pleasure of seeing one in a Fourth avenue curiosity shop, and had its method of manufacture explained.

The blades of these sabres are made from magnetic iron ores. The steel is produced in small, very thin sheets, and the workman begins by fixing one of them to the end of an iron rod. which serves as a handle. To this are sodered other small sheets, until the mass has a length of about eight inches, a width of about two inches and a thickness of a little more than a quarter of an inch.

This bar is brought to a white heat, doubled on itself, and hammered until it is down to its original dimensions. This process is repeated fifteen times. Four similar bars are then soddered together, doubled upon themselves, repeated five times. This process makes the superposed layers so thin that a sabre contains at least a thousand sheets of metal. If you find one of these swords that has a veiled appearance you may know it is caused by alternate layers of iron and steel being soldered to gether.

in Potato Culture Which

Bring Results. Perhaps no farm crop is a subject to fluctuation in price as potatoes. One year the yield is immense and prices rule so low that chousands of bushels are dumped over some bank. The following spring will witness a much decreased acreage planted and prices are high. I know farmers who are continually shifting about in this manner, not infrequently buying seed at high prices expecting big returns in the fall. This same class of farmers are continually changing from sheep to cows, and again from cows to sheep. At the time I began on the old homestead I found it necessary to give a mortgage to secure money from an uncle to pay off other heirs. I shall never forget the friendly advice he gave me when he handed me the money. Said he: "I want to impress upon you this one thing. Mark out your course and do not deviate from it. If your plan is to raise pigs in connection with dairying, raise pigs every year. Because calves may be high one season do not change, but stick to pigs." This advice has been lived up to. I have practically followed the same rule in regard to farm crops, especially poteto growing. Only a few years ago potatoes were almost valueless in the spring, but I put in the usual amount, which has been from two and a half to three acres. This particular spring of which I write I put in about two and a half acres; Owing to a succession of heavy rains, planting was delayed until June: but in the meantime after each rain as soon as possible the ground was thoroughly cultivated, the potatoes were up before I fairly knew it and grew so rapidly that I had no use for paris green the entire season. Before time next planting time I sold from that two and one-half acres \$177 worth, besides all I needed to supply a large family and for seed.

The next spring I planted three acres and the weather kept good until I had cultivated them thoroughly. I use a shovel plow for hilling, as hilling is better than level culture on our soil. I had just time to hill up some eight or ten rows when there came on a very long, heavy rain. This was followed by others, so that not another stroke of work was done. I never took visitors to the potato patch because I was ashamed to have it seen, but I sold nearly \$150 worth besides seed and those used in the family.

Poultry Bluts.

The plum trees are becoming very popular for setting in hen yards. Experiments at Utah station proved that exercise has definite value in lowering the cost of egg production. One thousand pounds of poultry will cost less than 1,000 pounds of beef, and

sells for twice as much in market. Eggs are extract of grain, grass and waste food generally, and are one of forms in which to market such

products. In constructing home-made brood ers, corners are a nuisance and should be avoided as far as possible. A square top is the cheapest but the corners

may be filled in. It is a question just how much warm feeding pays. It has been claimed that warming alone will double the unmber of eggs as compared with fowls where cold grain is fed entirely.

Proper feeding two or three weeks before the fowls are killed for market will make a great difference in the price. There is nothing like corn and gluten meal to give the required yellowness and plumpness.

The poultry industry is on a boom in the South. Mississippi breeders have organized a State poultry association.

Eyelids of young ducks watering and sticking together is generally caused by their taking cold and becoming, what might be styled roupy, The changes of temperature in the morning and evening from that in the middle of the day, leads to this.

Nicely fattened poultry always sells quickly. When offered for sale, they should not have their crops filled with feed. The bird should fast at least twelve hours before being killed. They may have water in the morning before killing time, but no feed.

Among the Horses.

A California farmer is utilizing his low grade raisins by feeding them to his horses. He says they are cheaper than barley or oats, and that the horses seem to relish them, and keep in good condition.

Since the breaking out of the war. three months ago, the government has paid \$1,250,000 to the farmers of Missouri for mules, and \$97,500 for horses. The war has not been a bad thing for Missouri up to the present

date. Feeding roots to horses is a much more common practice in England than in our own country, where we stuff animals with corn in season and out of season. Carrots for the horses. and turnips for everything should be raised and stored for winter.

One of the best four-year-old fillies in Austria is said to be the result of crossing the American trotter Prince Warwick, on a highly bred Russian mare. This filly won all the big events at Vienna, and is a very promising animal.

At the recent horse show held at Richmond, England, in the class for the best horse in harness, shipped from Canada or the United States, the stallion Gold Ring won the \$350 cup, and Fides Stanton was given second place and also highly commended.
